## Letter from Conference Co-Chairs

December 2007

Dear Conference Participants:

Welcome to the 2007 National HIV Prevention Conference. We thank you for participating and look forward to an exciting and ambitious program over the next few days.

CDC estimates that over one million persons are living with HIV in the United States and that one quarter of these people are unaware of their HIV infection. In addition, the number of people living with AIDS is increasing, as effective new drug therapies keep HIV-infected persons healthy longer and dramatically reduce the death rate.

The simple fact is that HIV and AIDS will not be defeated until we reduce the number of people who become infected. This requires strengthening collaboration between researchers, program practitioners, and affected communities particularly with regard to developing and promoting behavioral interventions for populations disproportionately affected by HIV.

## Welcome to the 2007 National HIV Prevention Conference

### Conference Background and Purpose

More than 25 years after the first report of a handful of cases of a nameless deadly disease among gay men in Los Angeles, there are more than 1 million persons living with HIV in the United States; about one-fourth of those with HIV have not yet been diagnosed and are unaware of their infection. The "new" syndrome identified over 25 years ago has become one of the deadliest epidemics in human history, killing more than 25 million people around the world, including more than 500,000 Americans. In the last decade, major advances in prevention and treatment for HIV/AIDS have prolonged and improved the lives of many, but despite this, the epidemic is far from over.

The simple fact is this: to defeat HIV and AIDS, we need to reduce the number of people who become infected. Throughout the epidemic, prevention has remained the most effective defense against HIV/AIDS. A comprehensive approach must be used to prevent the further spread of HIV infection. Comprehensive HIV prevention strategies include monitoring the epidemic to target prevention and care activities; determining the effectiveness of prevention methods; diffusing proven effective interventions; implementing and evaluating prevention efforts in high-risk communities; encouraging early diagnosis of HIV infection; continuing basic behavioral and prevention research to identify new effective prevention interventions; and fostering linkages between prevention and treatment programs. Many governmental and non-governmental organizations at all levels collaborate to implement, evaluate, disseminate, and further develop and strengthen effective HIV prevention efforts nationwide.

This unique conference covers the entire spectrum of HIV prevention, from science to programs. It convenes HIV prevention experts and advocates from various backgrounds and communities nationwide.

- Share effective prevention approaches and research findings among governmental, community, and academic partners in HIV prevention.

**Session Description:** This session describes an analysis of baseline data from HIV-infected patients at two North Carolina clinics to identify their stressors and coping processes, specifically in relation to gender and race. The most significant stressors were relationships with others, demonstrating the providers' need to acknowledge PLWHA's psychosocial issues. This session describes a study of HIV transmission beliefs and viral load, and the correlation between these beliefs and condom use, among a group of PLWHA. Findings suggest that beliefs about transmission risk are not correlated with condom use and that prevention programs should focus on strategies other than knowledge and beliefs about viral load and HIV transmission to influence sexual risk behaviors. The session also describes the use of social network strategies to identify HIV infection in high-risk communities of color. Findings suggest that network structure can play an important role in HIV transmission in at-risk communities of color, as well as provide opportunities for targeting high-risk individuals. The session

describes an examination of demographic characteristics, HIV-related behavioral risk factors, and perceptions of risk among African American women in Washington (DC), Jackson (MS), and Oakland (CA). Findings indicate that women who reported having sex with someone with a history of incarceration and other risk factors (e.g., IDU) appear to be more aware of their risk for HIV and are screened more often, but report inconsistent condom use.

Study participants’ suggested intervention strategies include flexible social marketing approaches; outreach in local social settings; and strategies that transcend county lines. The session will also describe results from semi-structured focus group sessions for Black MSM that elicited descriptions of discrimination, risk of HIV transmission and seroconversion, and methods of coping with oppression. Findings suggest that these men face multiple forms of discrimination and that interventions should acknowledge its impact and discuss methods for coping with discrimination and stigma.

This session describes a secondary data analysis of data from the Las Angeles Drug Users' Intervention Trial (DUIT) to explore examine associations between those in injection-discordant and concordant partnerships engaging in sexual risk behavior. Findings suggest that programs to reduce risk behaviors among IDUs should distinguish between those with IDU partners vs. non-IDU partners. In addition, the session describes an analysis of qualitative information from DUIT about IDUs' risk behaviors and relationships with sexual partners. Findings indicate that young IDUs engage in related injection drug use and sexual risk behaviors that place them at-risk for both HCV and HIV — the interconnection of these behaviors requires a targeted comprehensive approach for prevention. The session also describes results from a study assessing HIV infection among IUDs in Washington DC and piloting a rapid HIV testing project for that population. The prevalence of HIV disease among the target group suggests that more targeted HIV testing and counseling efforts be conducted

towards these IDUs. The session also describes a randomized controlled trial of an intervention designed to reduce sexual and drug risk and increase utilization of health care and adherence to HIV medications among HIV-positive IDUs in Baltimore, Miami, New York City, and San Francisco. The number of psychosocial problems reported by HIV-positive IDUs was related to sexual risk, injection risk, poor utilization of health care, and non-adherence to HIV medications and suggests the importance of addressing broader health issues among this population.

Part 4 describes preliminary findings from a gay-specific intervention for reducing methamphetamine use and HIV sexual risk behaviors using evidence-based interventions, which indicate that culturally tailored methamphetamine abuse treatment reduces both drug use and sexual risk behaviors among gay and bisexual men, thus functioning as effective HIV prevention among this high-risk population.

Findings indicate that those who have experienced interpersonal abuse are more likely to report high-risk sexual practices – interventions are needed targeted at homeless and unstably housed PLWHA who have experienced abuse in order to reduce the risk of HIV transmission to partners. The session also describes a study to assess characteristics associated with depressive symptoms in an on-line sample of MSM. Findings indicate that being HIV-positive, a person of color, and having low income and education are associated with vulnerability for depression.

Young MSM report riskier sexual behaviors than older men, and young MSM of color are among the most severely impacted by this disease. The session describes a study of sexually experienced, young MSM who halt sexual activity to reduce their risk for HIV and other diseases. Findings suggest that these men are more connected to ethnic communities (and to the importance of their ethnic identity than sexually active, young MSM) and that research should gather information about ethnic/gay identity to develop interventions to reduce sexual activity through enhancing community connections and sense of self. The session also describes an examination of the agreements that MSM couples make about sex outside the relationship to determine the relationship variables that are associated with sexual HIV risk. Findings indicate couples that rate their agreement quality and relationship satisfaction higher engage in less unprotected anal intercourse with sero-discordant and unknown status external partners. The session also describes an examination of the relationship between HIV acquisition and sexual acts with


