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
PHEP Cooperative Agreement Updates

ASPR, CDC Cancel October 19 HPP-PHEP Recipient Call

CDC and the HHS Office of the Administration for Strategic Preparedness and Response (ASPR) have canceled the quarterly joint HPP-PHEP recipient call scheduled for October 19 due to the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO) Directors of Public Health Preparedness (DPDH) annual meeting. The DPHP meeting is scheduled for October 18-21 in Nashville, Tenn. As a reminder, attendance at the DPHP annual meeting is a required PHEP activity, and use of PHEP funds to cover travel expenses is an allowable expense for PHEP recipients.

CDC PHEP Grants Management Call to Be Held October 27

DSLR and CDC's Office of Grants Services (OGS) will conduct the next PHEP grants management conference call from **3 p.m. to 4 p.m. EDT on Thursday, October 27**. During the call, CDC will discuss grants management issues related to the PHEP and the Public Health Crisis Response cooperative agreements. CDC Updates Infection Prevention and Control Guidance for U.S. Healthcare Settings

On September 23, CDC updated its infection prevention and control (IPC) guidance for U.S. healthcare settings to reflect the high levels of vaccine- and infection-induced immunity and the availability of effective treatments and prevention tools. The update provides additional protection measures for patients and healthcare workers, especially in hospitals and nursing homes, where COVID-19 is more likely to spread quickly or cause severe disease if introduced.

CDC recommends healthcare facilities reference updated <u>community transmission</u> metrics on a weekly basis to inform facility-level actions. Community transmission remains the metric used to guide select actions in healthcare settings, which is different than the COVID-19 <u>community levels</u> used for other settings. Community transmission is used to allow for earlier intervention, before there is strain on the healthcare system and better protect the individuals seeking medical care in these settings.

Updated Strategy for Global Response to COVID-19 Available Online

CDC has released an updated <u>Strategy for Global Response to COVID-19 (2020-2023)</u>. This updated strategy defines CDC's priorities and guides development of criteria for monitoring and evaluating public health achievements and the agency's impact on health security at home and abroad.

The strategy aligns with the goals of the U.S. government to protect the American people and to ensure the U.S. health security by mitigating the spread of infectious disease threats abroad, ending the pandemic, and building resilience and readiness for future pandemics.

New Psychological First Aid Course Available Online

The National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO), in partnership with ASPR, has developed a new psychological first aid course for leaders and teams. This free course, Building Workforce Resilience through the Practice of Psychological First Aid: A Course for Leaders and Teams, offers participants the opportunity to consider and pursue strategies for supporting colleagues and team members during a disaster response as stress levels increase for workers and organizational demands become more urgent. The goal of this course is to help individuals cope with stress at manageable levels, making it possible for them to effectively function and build resilience with each successive event they encounter. NACCHO Releases Three Funding Opportunities

NACCHO has released the following three funding opportunities.

 Demonstration Sites for Bridging Preparedness, Infectious Disease, Maternal-Child Health, and Birth Defects within Cities and Counties Project

This <u>funding opportunity</u> is designed to build community resilience and improve the lives of pregnant people and infants. NACCHO will award up to \$20,000 to a maximum of four local health departments to support them in identifying and addressing emerging infectious disease threats that impact pregnant people and their infants. <u>Applications</u> must be submitted by **11:59 p.m. EDT on Thursday, October 20**.

 Addressing Needs of People with Disabilities in COVID-19 Local Preparedness Planning, Mitigation, and Recovery Efforts

This <u>funding opportunity</u> is aimed at addressing the needs of people with disabilities in emergency preparedness, including COVID-19 planning, mitigation, and recovery efforts.

The main activities of the project include:

- 1. Embedding disability specialists, who will serve as subject matter experts, in local public health emergency preparedness planning and response programs;
- 2. Increasing partnerships between local health departments and local disability organizations; and
- 3. Updating local emergency response plans to better serve the needs of people with disabilities during outbreaks, pandemics, and other national emergencies.

NACCHO will fund up to 12, \$75,000 awards to local health departments. <u>Applications</u> must be submitted by **11:59 p.m. PT on Friday, October 21**.

Equipping Local Health Departments to Address Vaccine Hesitancy

This <u>funding opportunity</u> is a technical assistance and capacity-building opportunity that will provide local health departments (LHDs) with resources to address vaccine hesitancy across the lifespan for routine, influenza, COVID-19, and other vaccine-preventable diseases (VPDs). Selected LHDs will receive training, technical assistance, and other resources to address vaccine hesitancy and misinformation, build partnerships with other local organizations, and identify areas of need to improve vaccine confidence and uptake.

NACCHO will select up to three LHDs to receive \$100,000 to support project activities. <u>Applications</u> must be submitted by **11:59 p.m. PT on Friday, October 24**. CDC Releases Data on Chronic Diseases and Related Risk Factors

Data from the 2021 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) are now available online through CDC's web-based BRFSS prevalence and trends tool. BRFSS provides a sound basis for understanding

health issues in states, assessing and maintaining public health programs, and making progress on improving health and reducing health disparities. The prevalence and trends tool offers fast access to a large portion of the 2021 data set and can be a helpful resource to public health officials and decision-makers. Data topics include health-related risk behaviors, chronic health conditions, healthcare access, and use of preventive services.

CDC Announces \$90 Million in Funding to Support Pathogen Genomics Centers of Excellence

On September 20, CDC <u>announced</u> five-year awards to five state public health departments to establish the Pathogen Genomics Centers of Excellence (PGCoE) network. The PGCoE network is intended to foster and improve innovation and technical capacity in pathogen genomics, molecular epidemiology, and bioinformatics to better prevent, control, and respond to microbial threats of public health importance.

The five recipients are Georgia Department of Public Health, Minnesota Department of Health, Massachusetts Department of Public Health, Virginia Division of Consolidated Laboratory Services, and Washington State Department of Health. Each recipient is partnered with one or more academic institutions. Combined, the PGCOEs will serve as a network to perform a landscape analysis of gaps, needs and opportunities for genomics in the United States public health system; pilot and implement genomics technologies and applications for public health; and prepare for and respond to infectious disease threats.

Since early in the COVID-19 pandemic, CDC has worked with public health laboratories, academic and clinical laboratories, national organizations such as Association of Public Health Laboratories, and large private sector diagnostic networks to establish and expand a comprehensive genomic surveillance effort focused on large-scale sequencing of SARS-CoV-2 and its variants.

Academic partners have mobilized scientific resources and built collaborative partnerships to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. These partnerships have led to innovative applications of genomic epidemiology in public health. The PGCoE network will build on these collaborations for SARS-CoV-2 and other pathogens of public health concern in the future.
