## Seasonal Influenza (Flu)

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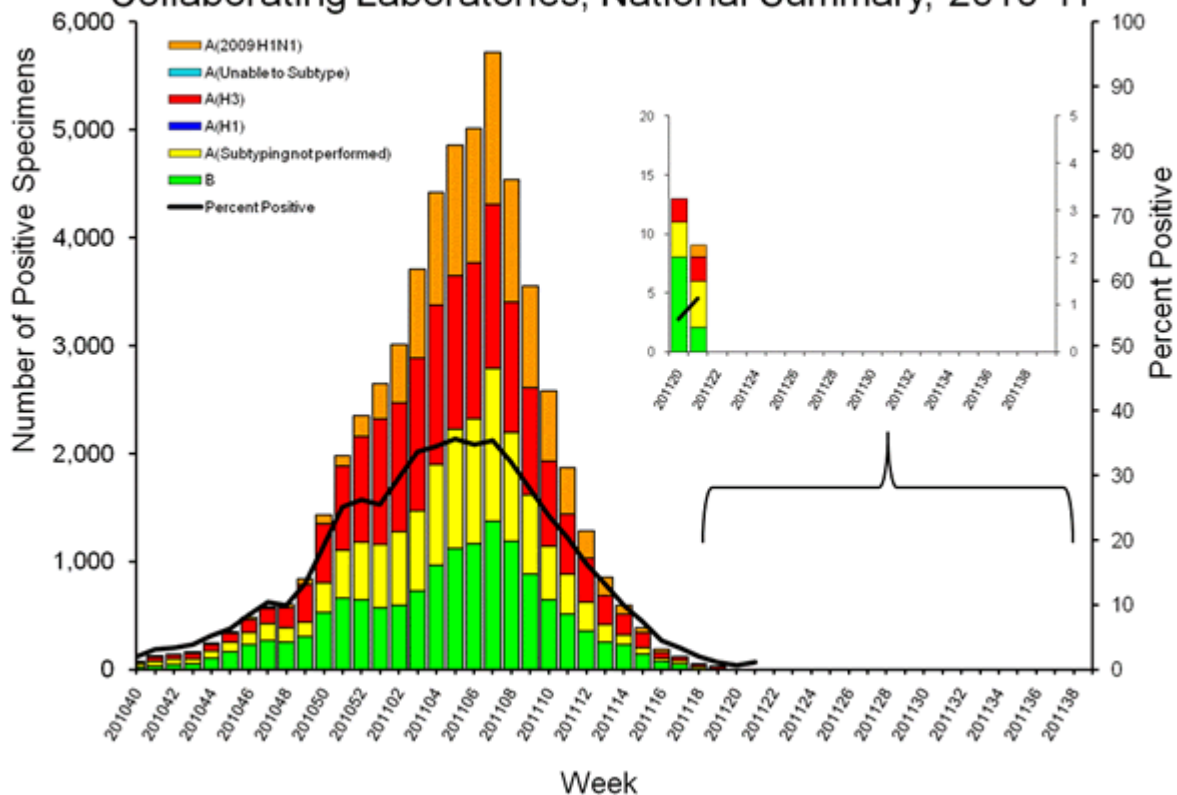
2010-2011 Influenza Season Week 21 ending May 28, 2011

### U.S. Virologic Surveillance:

WHO and NREVSS collaborating laboratories located in all 50 states and Washington, D.C. report to CDC the number of respiratory specimens tested for influenza and the number positive by influenza type and subtype.

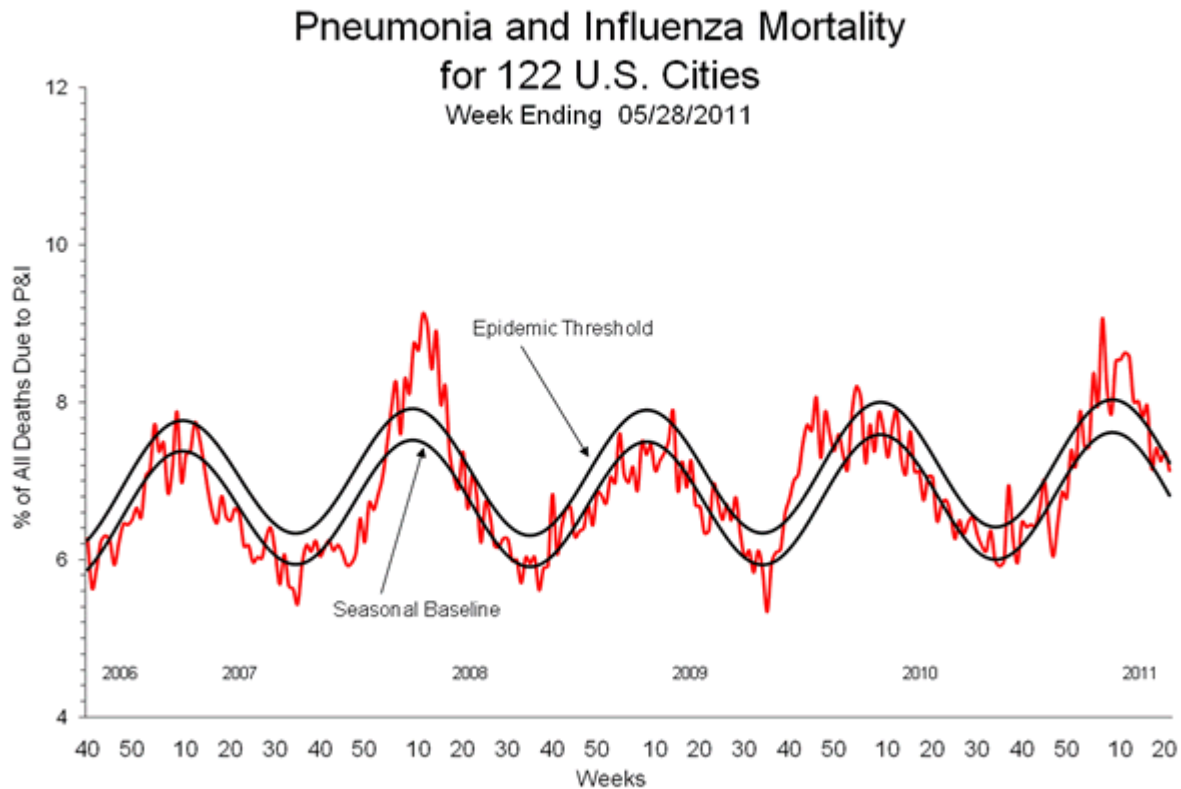
Influenza Positive Tests Reported to CDC by U.S. WHO/NREVSS

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## Pneumonia and Influenza (P&I) Mortality Surveillance

During week 21, 7.1% of all deaths reported through the 122-Cities Mortality Reporting System were due to P&I. This percentage was below the epidemic threshold of 7.2% for week 21.



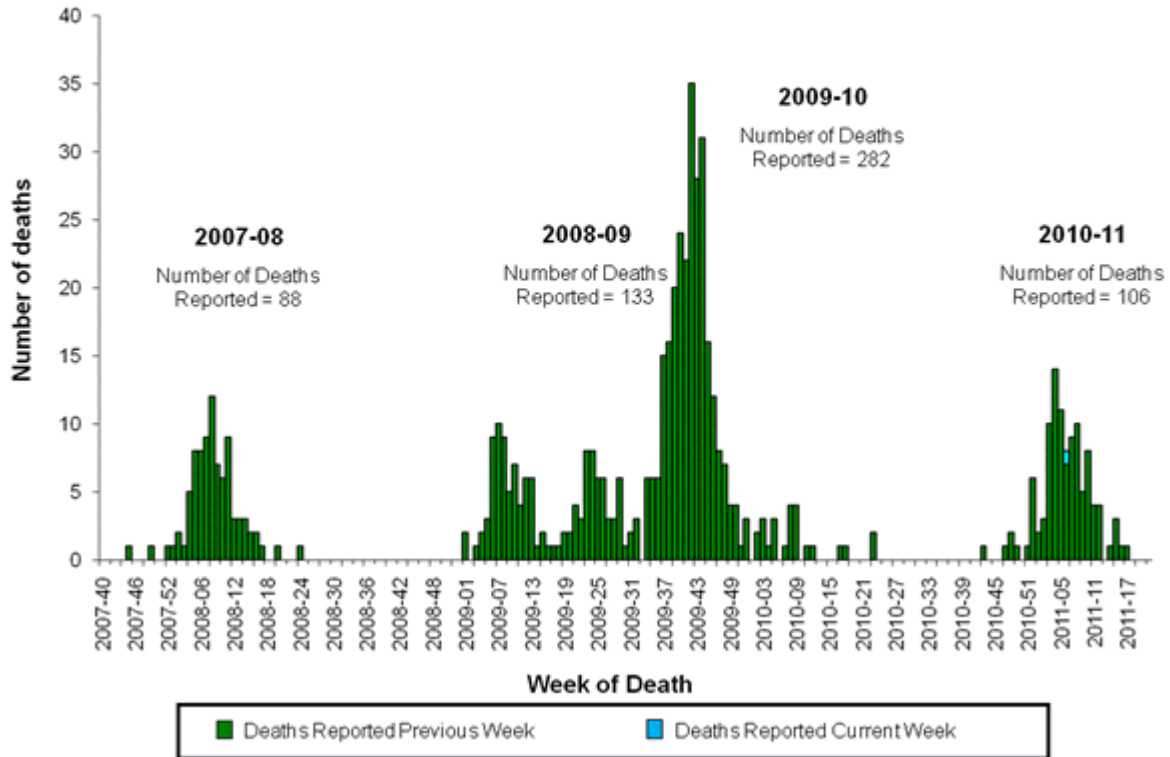
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## Influenza-Associated Pediatric Mortality

One influenza-associated pediatric death was reported to CDC during week 21 and was associated with an influenza B virus.

This season, 106 laboratory-confirmed influenza-associated pediatric deaths from 33 states, Chicago, and New York City have been reported. Forty-one of the 106 deaths reported were associated with influenza B viruses; 27 were associated with 2009 influenza A (H1N1) viruses; 18 deaths reported were associated with influenza A (H3N2) viruses, and 20 were associated with an influenza A virus for which the subtype was not determined.

## Number of Influenza-Associated Pediatric Deaths by Week of Death: 2007-08 season to present

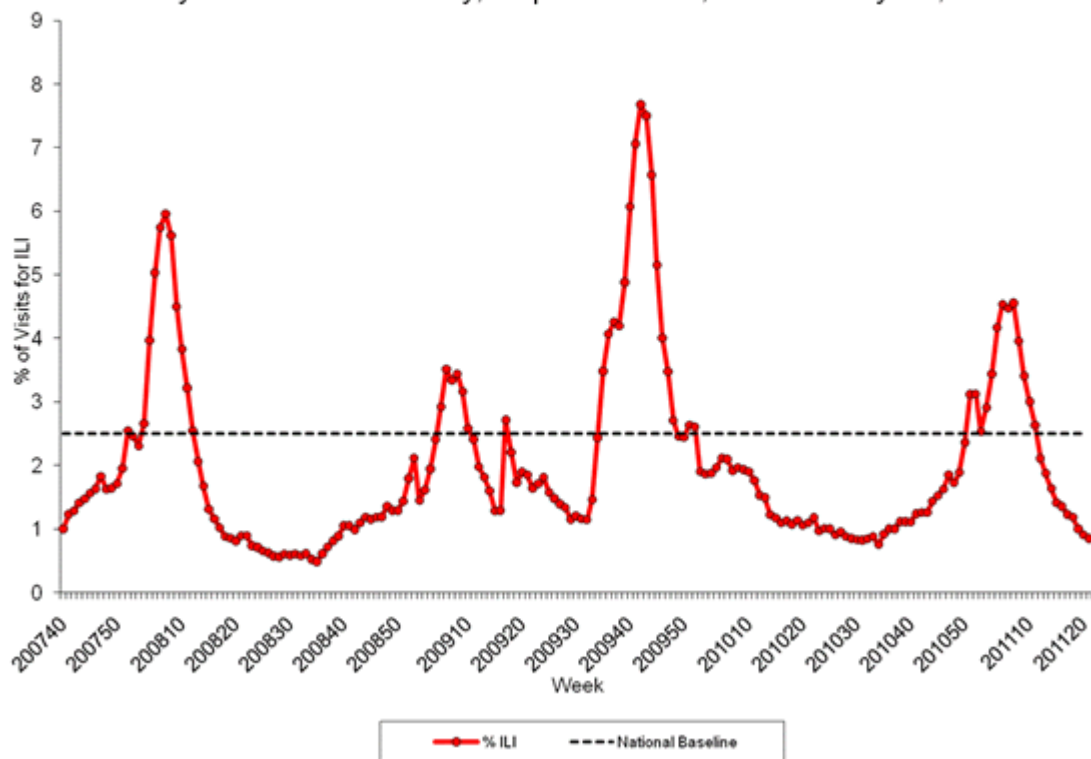


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### Outpatient Illness Surveillance:

Nationwide during week 21, 0.9% of patient visits reported through the U.S. Outpatient Influenza-like Illness Surveillance Network (ILINet) were due to influenza-like illness (ILI). This percentage is below the national baseline of 2.5%.
