Eliminating Syphilis Lancaster County, South Carolina

Why is Syphilis Elimination in the U.S. within our reach now?

- Syphilis is a preventable and curable sexually transmitted disease (STD).
- Infectious syphilis is at the lowest rate ever reported: 2.6 cases/100,000 population (6,993 total cases).
- Syphilis is now very concentrated; half of all new cases in 1998 were reported from only 28 counties, which represent less than 1% of all U.S. counties.
- Other industrialized countries have already eliminated syphilis.

Why is it Important to Eliminate Syphilis in Lancaster County?


- In 1998 Lancaster County ranked 27th in the nation in new cases of infectious syphilis (47 cases) and had a rate 31 times higher than the national rate.
- To reduce one of the most glaring racial disparities in health
 - \$ 87% of cases are among African Americans (79% of cases nationally).
 - S The infectious syphilis rate in Lancaster County for African Americans is 19 times greater than the rate for white Americans.

To decrease spread of HIV infection

S Syphilis increases HIV transmission at least 2to-5 fold.

To improve infant health

- Syphilis can be transmitted from mother to fetus during pregnancy causing stillbirths or congenital infection, some of which may result in persistent health problems.
- S In 1998, 4 cases of congenital syphilis were reported from Lancaster County for a rate of 554.0 cases/100,000 births, 27 times higher than the national rate of 20.6 cases/100,000 births.



Lancaster County Responds

- Screening of persons at high risk for syphilis is conducted in the local county jail.
- Case prevention efforts have been intensified for all early syphilis cases reported.
- The county health department is visiting private health care providers to inform them of the syphilis problem and the syphilis services provided by the county health department.
