The goal of the Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity for Infectious Diseases program (ELC) is to reduce illness and related deaths caused by a wide range of infectious disease threats. The ELC program accomplishes this by administering one of CDC's key nationwide cooperative agreements, awarding approximately 300 million dollars annually. They provide funding, strategic direction, and technical assistance to 64 jurisdictions for surveillance, detection, response, and prevention. For nearly a quarter-century, the ELC program has provided direct support to health departments in all 50 states, several cities, and U.S. territories, ensuring continuity of operations for the nation's infectious disease-related infrastructure.
