RESOURCE HIGHLIGHTS: Maternal Health

These resource highlights are designed to feature topics that are of interest to OT21-2103 grant recipients as a part of the *National Initiative to Address COVID-19 Health Disparities Among Populations at High-Risk and Underserved, Including Racial and Ethnic Minority Populations and Rural Communities.* This month's resource highlights focuses on maternal health.

<u>Transforming Maternal Health (TMaH) Model</u>

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services announced the new Transforming Maternal Health (TMaH). Access to care, infrastructure, workforce capacity, quality improvement and safety, and whole-person care delivery are important pillars of TMaH. TMaH focuses exclusively on improving maternal health care for people enrolled in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program. This service provides Medicaid agencies with support through technical assistance and funding over the next 10 years. All agencies that participate in TMaH will be required to develop and implement a health equity plan addressing care disparities across different groups.

Maternity Care Deserts in the US

America has the highest maternal mortality rate of any high-income country, and this problem is only becoming worse, not better. Between 2006 and 2020, over 400 maternity wards across the country closed, and many health systems have recently closed their obstetrics services departments. These closures lead to the existence of maternity care deserts across the country where people lack access to maternity and birthing health care services. As of 2014, roughly 45% of rural counties have no maternal health care services. This JAMA article discussed two main strategies to mitigate the problem of maternity care deserts: investing in safe, cost-effective community-based models of care and addressing workforce retention challenges. Maternal deserts leave expecting mothers without the care and support they need, especially in areas in which maternal and infant mortality are high. COVID-19 further intensified the challenges by making access to care difficult and putting a strain on the healthcare system. Focusing on health equity can help bridge the game if practitioners know what to look forward to and can prepare for better outcomes.

The Impact of Family Physicians in Rural Maternity Care

This study examines the role that family physicians play in maternity care in rural communities across the US. Authors collected data from 185 rural hospitals and found that family physicians delivered babies in 67% of these hospitals and were the only doctors doing so in 27% of these hospitals. The results of this study reveal the importance of family physicians in providing maternal health care in rural America. The study's authors stress the importance of adequate maternal care training for future family physicians who intend to practice in rural locations during their residency training.

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<u>Text and Telephone Screening and Referral Improved Detection And Treatment of</u> Maternal Mental Health Conditions

This study assessed the efficacy of a text and phone-based screening and referral program for perinatal mental health disorders and substance use disorders (SUDs). A randomized controlled trial was conducted comparing outcomes between Listening to Women and Pregnant and Postpartum People (LTWP), a text- and telephone-based screening and referral program, and usual care in-person screening and referral within the perinatal care setting. Research found that participants who had been assigned to the phone-based screening program were 3 times more likely to screen positive, 4 times more likely to be referred to treatment, and nearly 6 times more likely to attend treatment appointments compared to participants assigned to the control group. Qualitative research with Black peripartum people and those in rural areas can help identify which parts of the LTWP intervention most improve health equity.

Advancing Health Equity and Anti-Racism in MCH Policy

Surgo Ventures-The U.S. Maternal Vulnerability Index (MVI)

The U.S. Maternal Vulnerability Index is a tool for determining the vulnerability of mothers and children worldwide. With the rise of global pandemics and minimal access to care during them, the index is an important tool for projecting the outlook for the nation's children and mothers. The COVID-19 pandemic led to substantial changes in antenatal care provision in the United States, as patients and providers struggled to adapt to societal pandemic-related restrictions and a strained health system. This index is used a resource to respond to the pandemic and show the importance of how early and adequate antenatal care is essential for the wellbeing of mothers and newborns.
