SPECIAL NOTE

Information contained in this report is a summary of data reported to CDC by State Health Departments, Epidemic Intelligence Service Officers, National Office of Vital Statistics, collaborating influenza diagnostic laboratories, and other pertinent sources. Much of it is preliminary in nature and is primarily intended for those involved in influenza control activities. It is understood that the contents of these reports will not be released to the press, except by the Office of the Surgeon General, Public Health Service, U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. State Health Officers, of course, will judge the advisability of releasing any information from their own states.

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I. Summary of Information

Further small outbreaks of influenza-like illness have occurred among Poy Scouts returned from the Jamboree. These have been reported from Texas and two areas in Alatama. At least one additional outbreak has been reported from a military facility in California.

Another local cutbreak of influenza-like illness has occurred among migrant workers in Sonoma County, California. At present, only small groups among these workers have been involved.

Due to some difficulty in performing hemagglutination-inhibition tests with currently available antigen, isolates from several outbreaks have so far been grouped only by complement-fixation tests. Influenza A virus has been identified in some outbreaks listed in Table II. These will not be noted until confirmation of Asian strain virus has been obtained.

II. Epidemic and Case Reports

7-A. IDAHO, Ketchum

(Reported by Drs. H. H. Henderson and C. R. Reinstein, Idaho State Eoard of Health.)

Approximately 39 children, aged 14-17 years, were affected with an influenza-like illness in mid-July at the Cathedral Pine summer camp, located north of Ketchum, Idaho. Total population of the camp is not noted but 4 children have been hospitalized. Symptoms have included coryza, temperature to 105°, malaise, cough, chest pains, tenderness of the skin and "burning eyes." Myalgia has mainly been a late symptom. Duration of illness has been 4 to 5 days. Throat washings and blood specimens are under laboratory study. At present all campers have returned home.

7-B. CALIFORNIA, Sacramento County

(Reported by Dr. P. K. Condit, California Department of Public Health, and Lt. Col. G. K. Fair, OSG, Department of the Air Force.)

From 300 to 500 cases of influenza-like illness have occurred at the Hamilton Air Force Base. Total strength on the base was not given. Thirty-two patients have been hospitalized with complications incident to the influenza-like illness. Specimens are being studied at the Sixth Army Regional Medical Laboratory.

7-C. ALABAMA, Jackson (2007) pages of the establish the second selection and the

About July 20, a scout returned to Jackson from the Boy Scout Jamboree with a mild febrile respiratory illness. Shortly after his return, however, he became gravely ill, with a temperature of 1050 for

several days and rulmonary infiltrates. The boy has apparently recovered satisfactorily. At about the same time, 3 or 4 other cases were present in returned scouts. Throat washings from the severe cases are under study at CDC. Sera are also being obtained.

7-D. ALABAMA, Thomasville

(Reported by Dr. D. G. Gill, Alabama State Department of Health.)

Four cases of influenza-like illness in teenagers have been reported from Thomasville. None of those affected had been at the Boy Scout Jamboree but there was contact with a scout, who had a slight "cold" on return from the Jamboree. Throat washings and sera were obtained for study at CDC.


III. Progress Reports

7-E. CALIFORNIA, Sonoma County

(Reported by Dr. P. K. Condit, California Department of Public Health.)

In addition to the previously noted influenza outbreak: among migrant workers in Fresno County, another has recently occurred. About 50 workers were ill in a Sonoma County labor camp. This latter group had been in the county for about seven days. No extensive spread of the influenza-like illness to neighboring groups is evident. Throat washings and blood specimens are under laboratory study.

7-F. CALIFORNIA, San Diego, Naval Training Center (see also CDC Influenza Report No. 1-C)

(Reported by Dr. Clayton Loosli, University of Chicago, Department of Medicine, and Capt. J. R. Seal, MC, USN, Preventive Medicine Division.)

Of a population of approximately 4300 recruits and 6600 non-recruits, the attack rate for the influenza outbreak of June 16-July 4 was 72% among recruits and 11.5% among non-recruits. The outbreak hit with considerable explosiveness, with a concentration of cases occurring from June 17-27. The epidemic curves, reproduced above, show a striking difference between recruits and non-recruits. The onset was abrupt among the recruits, gradual (in stepwise fashion) among the non-recruits. Of 50 throat washings analyzed so far 32 have yielded type A influenza virus, 20 of which have been shown to be closely related to the Asian strain. Sera from a representative sampling are being examined.
