TIPS TO LIVE BY

- ☐ Never back up if you don't know what is behind you.
- ☐ Get out of your cab and do a walk-around to look for pedestrians and any hazards. Look under your truck too.
- ☐ Use hazard lights and sound horn before backing up.
- ☐ Use all mirrors to scan entire area around vehicle. Consider installing backup cameras with a cab monitor.
- ☐ Use a spotter and hand signals. Make sure spotter is wearing high-visibility clothing and is located away from traffic and other hazards.
- ☐ If you must spot for yourself, wear high-visibility clothing and walk cautiously around your truck.
- ☐ Maintain lighting at the loading dock and terminal yard.
- ☐ Consider providing LED headlamps to all employees who work outside after dusk or before dawn.
