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Early detection of skin cancer can drastically improve outcomes. Although the ABCDE chart is not a perfect tool, it can help you identify suspicious growth. If you have a mole or spot that meets any of the criteria below, immediately make an appointment to see your doctor or dermatologist.

Protecting You

The spring and summer months are the most dangerous times to be exposed to UV rays and the UV rays are at their strongest between 10 am and 4 pm. Some people think you cannot be exposed to UV rays on a cloudy day, but the ultraviolet rays can still get through the clouds. Below are some strategies and materials you can use to protect yourself from harmful UV rays.



Clothing:

If possible, wear long sleeved shirts with long pants, a hat and sunglasses. These types of clothing will provide you with the best protection from the sun. Dark or bright colors help prevent the UV rays from reaching the skin, because it absorbs them rather than letting them penetrate through. Some clothing lines make ultraviolet protection factor (UPF) labeled clothing. For extra protection, look for UPF labels.

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Sunscreens are an effective way to protect yourself from harmful UV rays if you do not have proper clothing. Nearly all sunscreens are assigned with a sun protection factor (SPF), which rates their effectiveness for blocking the ultraviolet light.

The higher numbers indicate more protection, and you should use a sunscreen with at least a SPF 15. Like most good things, sunscreen does not last forever. Therefore, reapplying sunscreen is a must if you are going to be out in the sun for long periods. Most sunscreens give a reapplication time listed on the bottle. Water resistant sunscreens are great to use if you will be in the water, but they still need to be reapplied after the recommended time.



Make sure to protect yourself from the sun and take a close look at any suspicious spots. Get a professional opinion for anything that meets any of the ABCDE criteria.
