STRATEGIC FOCUS

The CDC office works closely with Zimbabwe's Ministry of Health and Child Care (MOHCC) to further expand the robust national HIV response. CDC has implemented programs in a step-wise fashion to build capacity and technical expertise, and enhance the Zimbabwe infrastructure necessary for a sustainable, high impact HIV response.

Current areas of strategic focus include:

- HIV prevention, testing, care, and treatment
- · Integration of HIV and tuberculosis (TB) management, and TB infection control
- Laboratory support for HIV and TB diagnosis and monitoring
- Health systems strengthening: Surveillance, quality improvement, and health information systems

KEY ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision

VMMC is the cornerstone of biomedical HIV prevention in Zimbabwe; an estimated one new HIV
infection is averted with every 8 male circumcisions. In 2016, CDC supported nearly 60,000
circumcisions.

Surveys, Surveillance and Program Information

- Zimbabwe was one of 3 countries to pioneer the Population-Based HIV Impact Assessment (ZIMPHIA), revealing a decrease in national HIV prevalence from 15.1% (2010) to 14.0% (2016) in 15-49 year olds
- A national tablet-based electronic health record (EHR) system has been piloted by CDC, endorsed by the MOHCC at the end of 2016, and national rollout begins in 2017

HIV Treatment Program

Working together, CDC and MOHCC has dramatically increased the number of patients on ART, and
the country is rapidly approaching the 90-90-90 goals for epidemic control. This is largely the result
of technical and financial assistance, direct human resource support, and strong coordination
among stakeholders.

Laboratory Support

 Availability of viral load testing for PLHIV on ART has dramatically increased from 5% in December 2015 to approximately 41% by December 2016, after 6 new platforms were placed in labs across the country by CDC. Capacity building also continues to be a key priority through support for proficiency testing and strong quality management.
