


The CDC Foundation manages nearly 300 **CDC-led** programs in the United States and in 85 countries around the world.



Analyzing the health of 500 cities




Conducting data analysis for the 500 largest American cities, and the census tracts in cities, to identify, analyze and report data for certain chronic diseases.


Good partnerships:
