
DATA FROM THE 2016 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Tennessee, <u>more than 60 percent</u> of all adults providing unpaid care to loved ones with Alzheimer's or another dementia have been doing so for at least two years.

More than 40 percent of Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers provide 20 or more hours of care per week.


More than 1 in 3 dementia caregivers are in the "sandwich generation" – caring for both someone with dementia and a child or grandchild.


Percent of dementia caregivers providing care for at least 2 years
