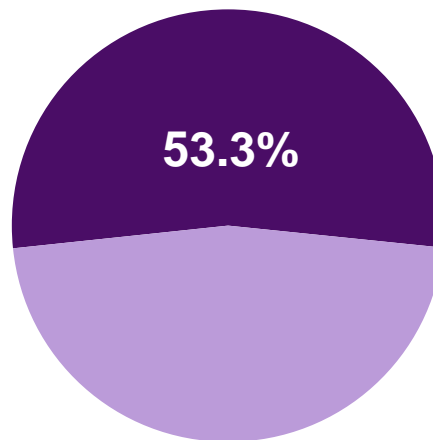
DATA FROM THE 2015 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Alabama, more than half of all adults providing unpaid care to loved ones with Alzheimer's or another dementia have been doing so for at least two years.

More than one-fourth of Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers provide 20 or more hours of care per week.

More than one in five dementia caregivers are in the "sandwich generation" – caring for both someone with dementia and a child or grandchild.

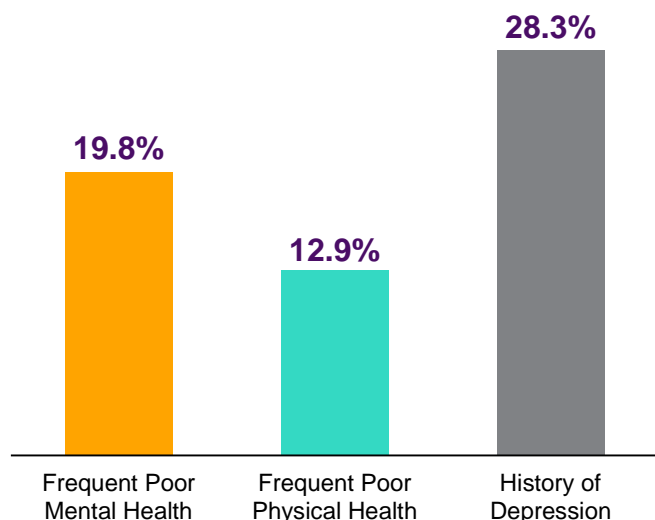
Percent of dementia caregivers providing care for at least 2 years



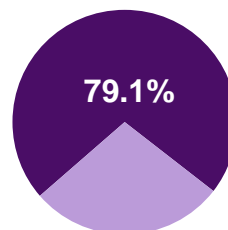

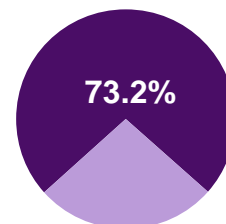
Impact of Alzheimer's and dementia caregiving
