


DATA FROM THE 2015 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In West Virginia, <u>more than half</u> of all adults providing unpaid care to loved ones with Alzheimer's or another dementia have been doing so for at least two years.

More than 40 percent of Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers provide 20 or more hours of care per week.


Nearly one in three dementia caregivers are in the "sandwich generation" – caring for both someone with dementia and a child or grandchild.


Impact of Alzheimer's and dementia caregiving
