


DATA FROM THE 2015 BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTOR SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

In Wisconsin, <u>nearly half</u> of all adults providing unpaid care to loved ones with Alzheimer's or another dementia have been doing so for at least two years.

More than one-fourth of Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers provide 20 or more hours of care per week.


One in five dementia caregivers are in the "sandwich generation" – caring for both someone with dementia and a child or grandchild.

Percent of dementia caregivers providing care for at least 2 years


