

## Family Nurse Practitioner (PRIMEX) Programs

The National Center for Health Services Research and Development of HEW's Health Services and Mental Health Administration has awarded \$1,113,000 for a group of seven grants and contracts for family nurse practitioners (PRIMEX).

PRIMEX is a series of specially designed experimental projects in which the role of the nurse is expanded to provide health services in a variety of community settings. Closely cooperating with physicians and other health professionals, these nurses assess health problems, perform selected diagnostic and therapeutic procedures, treat minor illnesses using mutually agreed protocols developed by the physician and nurse, promote health and prevent illness through counseling, and supervise the health care of persons of all ages, including the elderly who require long-term care.

It is anticipated that the PRIMEX nurse will extend the capabilities of the physician by freeing him to provide those therapeutic services that are commensurate with his skill and preparation. This will also expand the capabilities of the nurse practitioner by broadening her sphere of nursing practice and making her better prepared to meet rising nationwide health expectations.

Newly funded programs are the Frontier Services of Wendover, Ky., Indiana University Foundation Regenstrief Institute for Health Care, Case Western Reserve University, University of California at Los Angeles, and Vanderbilt University. Schools receiving funds for the second year are Cornell University-New York Hospital School of Nursing and the University of North Carolina.
