Smallpox in New Orleans, La.—Vaccination of river boatmen in that city.

SIR: I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 11th instant, suggesting that the inspection and vaccination service which was carried on last spring be reinaugurated.

In reply, I have to state that, with regard to the inspection and vaccination of river boatmen at New Orleans, the Bureau will render you such assistance as you may require. You are directed to take such steps as may seem necessary and report same to this office.

To masters, agents, and owners,

Mississippi River steamboats, New Orleans, La.

GENTLEMEN: In view of the continued prevalence of smallpox in this city and the surrounding country and the danger of carrying the germs of the disease from one port to another on river steamboats, by direction of the Surgeon-General of the Service, it is proposed to vaccinate the officers and crews of outgoing steamers who are not protected by a recent successful vaccination or by a previous attack of the disease. A certificate of vaccination will be given to each man vaccinated, and to avoid the possibility of quarantine restrictions at various ports on the rivers, it is recommended that no person be employed on a river boat unless he produces a certificate of vaccination. Vaccinations will be made at the marine-hospital office, custom-house, between 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. and on board the steamers, if practicable, before sailing.

With your cooperation, as suggested, it is believed that the work of

vaccination, as outlined, will prove to be a valuable aid to the local health authorities in their efforts to suppress a loathsome disease.

SIR : At a meeting of this exchange yesterday a copy of your recent circular letter relative to the vaccination of the crews of the various steamboats represented, was read and discussed and it was unanimously agreed that such service should be accepted and the mates of all boats be instructed to ship up no men on deck who do not hold certificates of vaccination, and a disposition was manifested to lend a hearty cooperation in every way possible with your office and the local authorities for the suppression of the smallpox and the preservation of the general health. Your prompt and willing action was referred to and appreciated, and the ready response of your gentlemanly assistants had like appreciation, and, doubtless, your office will have many calls for such service.

Scarlet fever in Seattle, Wash. (Correction).

Under date of March 10 the health officer for the city of Seattle calls attention to the report of scarlet fever in Seattle, published in the PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS, Vol. XI, No. 9, page 179. He states that :

"During the year ended December 31, 1895, there were 264 cases and 7 deaths from scarlet fever reported. During January, 1896, there were 2 cases and no deaths. During February, 1896, there were 12 cases and 1 death. No public schools have been closed since June, 1895."

KENTUCKY—*Louisville*.—Month of February, 1896. Estimated population, 211,100. Total deaths, 259, including phthisis pulmonalis, 30; enteric fever, 8; diphtheria, 5; croup, 4; and whooping cough, 1.

Paducah.—Two weeks ended March 7, 1896. Estimated population, 20,000. Total deaths, 14, including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Phthisis pulmonalis is reported present during the week at 239 places, scarlet fever at 36, measles at 33, diphtheria at 19, enteric fever at 19, whooping cough at 8, and smallpox at 6 places—Bay City, Detroit, Imlay Township, Ionia, Marine City, and Saginaw.

Cholera notes.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, March 11, 1896.]

EGYPT.—According to a late report there were 7 new cases and 7 deaths reported at Alexandria from February 6 to 13.

EAST INDIES—*Calcutta*.—From January 19 to 25 there were 45 cholera deaths.

Current quarantine measures.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, March 11, 1896.]

RUSSIA.—According to advices of February 28, the governments of Volhynia and Kiew are declared free from cholera.

TURKEY.—Vessels which have left the port of Alexandria since February 26 are subject to five days' quarantine. Arrivals from Egyptian ports of the Mediterranean Sea are subject to forty-eight hours' quarantine of observation at Beirut, Tripolis (Africa), or Klazomena, and to disinfection of clothing and effects. For passenger vessels leaving Egyptian ports of the Red Sea for the Hedjaz, ten days' quarantine is ordered at Abu Saad; for vessels not carrying passengers, arriving from Egyptian ports other than Alexandria, official inspection at the first port provided with a sanitary physician is ordered.

SPAIN.—By royal order of February 26, quarantine against vessels from Yokohama, arriving under normal conditions, is suspended.

PORTUGAL.—By ministerial order of February 27, arrivals from Volhynia and Podolia are declared clean.

CUBA.

Sanitary report of Santiago.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, March 14, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor of submitting the following report on the sanitary condition of Santiago de Cuba for the week ended March 14. The total number of deaths for that period was 46. Of these, 1 was from yellow fever, 5 from remittent fever, 6 from tuberculosis, 5 from enteric fever, 4 from pernicious fever, 6 from heart affections, and the rest from diseases of noncontagious character.

Yellow fever seems declining, but this is only apparently so, owing to the absence of all the troops at present, the garrison duty being performed by native volunteers. Several cases of smallpox have made their appearance, but so far no death has been recorded this week. The rainy season has just commenced and I expect it will be a sickly one, as already want and misery are beginning their deadly work among the poorer classes.

The following vessels have been dispatched during the last week: British steamship *Earnford*, for Philadelphia; British steamship *Cheniston*, for Philadelphia; Spanish brig *Margarita*, for Brunswick, Ga.; British steamship *Acme*, for Philadelphia; American schooner *Anna E. Kranz*, for Apalachicola, and American steamship *Niagara*, for New York (visé bill of health).

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

AUSTRALIA—*New South Wales.*—Month of January, 1896. Estimated population, 408,500. Total deaths, 650, including enteric fever, 17; scarlet fever, 2; diphtheria, 2, and whooping cough, 2.

BERMUDA.—Three weeks ended March 20, 1896. Estimated population, 15,013. Total deaths, 2. No deaths from contagious diseases.

CUBA—*Habana.*—Under date of March 28, 1896, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 160 deaths in this city during the week ended March 26, 1896. Two of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, 2 by enteric fever, 6 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by diphtheria, 5 by enteritis, 6 by smallpox, 16 by pneumonia, and 10 by la grippe.

The 2 deaths by yellow fever during the week occurred in the military hospital.

JAMAICA—*Kingston.*—Month of February, 1896. Estimated population, 19,264. Total deaths, 123, including 1 from diphtheria.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended March 14 correspond to an annual rate of 20 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,860,971. The lowest rate was recorded in Croydon, viz, 12.4, and the highest in Sunderland, viz, 24.1 a thousand.

London.—One thousand seven hundred and fifty-two deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 137; scarlet fever, 21; diphtheria, 45; whooping cough, 110; enteric fever, 10, and diarrhea and dysentery, 10. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 20.6 a thousand. In greater London 2,177 deaths were registered,

corresponding to an annual rate of 18.5 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 12 from diphtheria, 30 from measles, 3 from scarlet fever, and 18 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended March 14 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 26.5 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Waterford, viz., 15, and the highest in Galway, viz., 49.1 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 190 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 4; enteric fever, 3, and whooping cough, 2.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ending March 14 corresponded to an annual rate of 19.6 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz., 12.8, and the highest in Perth, viz., 27.4 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 571, including smallpox, 1; measles, 9; scarlet fever, 7; diphtheria, 3, and whooping cough, 35.

INDIA—Singapore.—Month of December, 1895. Estimated population, 56,000. Total deaths, 735, including smallpox, 1, and beriberi, 85.

TURKEY—Constantinople.—Month of October, 1895. Estimated population, 700,000. Total deaths, 798, including 5 from smallpox.
