One new case of smallpox in Pensacola, Fla.

Disinfection of the steamship North Anglia at Reedy Island Quarantine.

REEDY ISLAND, *May 26, 1896.*

SIR: Confirming my dispatch to you yesterday in regard to the British steamer *North Anglia*, thirty-one days from Alexandria, with a foul bill of health, I have to report that the vessel was fumigated, dunnage steamed, fresh water tanks cleansed, and refilled from the inspection steamer *Pasteur*, and the vessel released. The *North Anglia* lay at Alexandria over a week loading sugar, and shipped a man who had been in that port over a month. Some fresh water was also taken aboard. The vessel then stopped at Gibraltar for coal, but was not allowed in beyond quarantine, and the English bill of health from that port especially noted her unsanitary port of departure. Under these circumstances, the vessel was subjected to treatment, and, as no sickness had occurred aboard, she was promptly released.

MAINE—*Portland*.—Four weeks ended May 16, 1896. Estimated population, 40,000. Total deaths, 57, including phthisis pulmonalis, 8, and enteric fever, 2.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Worcester*.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 102,000. Total deaths, 160, including phthisis pulmonalis, 28; enteric fever, 1, and diphtheria, 5.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, from 58 observers, show that during the week ended May 16, diarrhea and pneumonia increased, and whooping cough and erysipelas decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present at 205 places, measles at 34, scarlet fever at 22, enteric fever at 22, diphtheria at 19, whooping cough at 10, and smallpox at 1 place—Ionia.

NEW JERSEY—*Hudson County*.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 338,671. Total deaths, 549, including phthisis pulmonalis, 46; enteric fever, 10; scarlet fever, 2; measles, 4; diphtheria and croup, 33, and whooping cough, 1.

Paterson.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 97,344. Total deaths, 161, including scarlet fever, 2; diphtheria and croup, 7; whooping cough, 4; enteric fever, 2, and phthisis pulmonalis, 19.

NEW YORK—*Syracuse*.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 125,000. Total deaths, 121, including enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 1, and phthisis pulmonalis, 10.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Pottsville*.—Two weeks ended May 19, 1896. Estimated population, 40,000. Total deaths, 10, including phthisis pulmonalis, 2.

Current quarantine measures.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, May 6, 1896.]

CHOLERA.

GREECE.—Advices of April 20 state that arrivals from Alexandria are subject to forty-eight hours' quarantine of observation.

PLAGUE.

JAPAN.—Under date of March 5 the governor of Nagasaki Ken ordered official inspection of all vessels arriving at Nagasaki from Hong-kong and Kuchinotzu.

YELLOW FEVER.

PORTUGAL.—By published ministerial order of April 3 the port of Ceara is declared infected, and all ports of the province are declared suspect.

Cholera notes.

EGYPT.—At Alexandria from April 16 to 22, 3 cases and 7 deaths from cholera were reported. On April 16 a woman from Alexandria died of cholera at Assiout.

EAST INDIES—*Calcutta*.—From March 22 to 28 there were 225 cholera deaths.

BRAZIL.

Sanitary report from Rio de Janeiro.

RIO DE JANEIRO, *April 28, 1896.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for the week ended April 25, 1896.

There were 14 deaths from *accessio pernicioso*, the same as in the foregoing week; 68 from yellow fever, a decrease of 30; 3 from smallpox, none in the foregoing week; 6 from beriberi, a decrease of 13; 8 from enteric fever, an increase of 5; 1 from whooping cough, the same as in the foregoing week; and 60 from tuberculosis, an increase of 8. There were 458 deaths from all causes, a decrease of 13. On the whole, the report is an improvement over the last one made.

Yellow fever.—This disease is declining, but much more slowly than the lower temperature would let us suppose. I have never known it to continue so strongly so late in the season.

Smallpox.—There are again 3 deaths from this disease, but only 1 new case reported.

Since last report, the following-named ships have received bills of health from this office: April 23, American barkentine *Good News*, for Baltimore, Md., and steamship *Merida*, British, from Buenos Ayres for New York, N. Y.

CUBA.

Sanitary report from Santiago.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, *May 16, 1896.*

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that there were 53 deaths during the week ended May 16. Of these, 4 were from yellow fever, 3 from smallpox, 12 from remittent bilious fever, 5 from tuberculosis, 1 from typhomalaria, 10 from enteritis, 1 from diphtheria, and the rest from common diseases of noncontagious nature. The temperature is excessively high just now, and the weather so dry that the water supply of Santiago is almost dried up. This brings a great deal of misery on the poor, who have to pay even for their drinking water, and a great many can not afford the expense. Water is selling at 5 cents for five pints.

The result of the drought is the prevalence of inflammatory diseases of the throat and stomach, while bowel complaints are very common.

Yellow fever, as usual, prevails to a more or less extent, while smallpox increases steadily.

Spread of plague in China.

The following information relative to the spread of plague in China—of date of April 27, 1896—has been received unofficially in this Bureau.

* * * The disease itself (the plague) is scattered everywhere in this town (Hongkong) and in the adjoining districts, and it is not sparing Europeans to the extent claimed. It seems to attack people in the most unlikely places, and some late cases by steamer into this port indicate that Amoy certainly, and Saigon probably, is infected. I wrote more than a month ago * * * that Amoy was under grave suspicion, and that cases had been, and would continue to be suppressed so as to avoid injury to trade. * * * The French mail steamers no longer carry Chinese passengers, and the Canadian Pacific people are refusing shipment of certain filthier kinds of freight (e. g. lily bulbs). Mistakes here ought to be on the safe side. * * * Almost nothing can be done, in the humble opinion of the undersigned, to prevent its spread in an infected place, if that place be a filthy one; for, after rat burrows are infected, as Yersin has pointed out, there is small chance of disinfecting them; and personal risk is a differential of personal hygiene when this stuff is knocking about. I have proved, and shall clinch the fact, that the germ may infect through unbroken muco-cutaneous surfaces, just as glanders is known to do; and the majority of people do not know enough to escape infection by such an agent. * * * Here they seem to pull together badly for some reason; but I am far from thinking that any other set of people would accomplish much in these premises. Canton does nothing and fares as well as Hongkong.

It is not declining at all, and there is, and will be, no reliable account of the number of cases that occur. About 60 cases a week come under the cognizance of the authorities. The Hongkong hotel servants developed their own epidemic. * * * Those affected all got away to Canton, but later a child of a half-caste accountant there died of it.

Report on cholera in Japan.

MEXICO.

Sanitary report of the City of Mexico for March, 1896.

EL PASO, TEX., *May 15, 1896.*

SIR: It may be of interest to your office to have the latest bulletin of the board of health of the City of Mexico, of March last, which has just appeared, and of which I give a true translation, as follows:

Deaths during the month of March were 1,537 (nearly 50 per day).

The principal diseases were pneumonia, 219; acute bronchitis, 209; dysentery, 105; consumption, 123; measles, 98; typhus, 49; whooping cough, 10, and smallpox, 4.

Taking the same average, the yearly account would show 18,000, or three times as many as San Francisco, a city of the same size, reports.

Prevalence of smallpox in Lima and Callao.

Under dates of April 24 and 30 the United States consul at Callao writes as follows:

Smallpox has not abated. It is more prevalent in Lima, where 47 cases are being treated in the lazaretto. The deaths from smallpox during the week ended April 26 reached the same number as in the first week in April (9), the greatest since this disease has been prevalent. The mortality is among children principally. No improvement in Lima.

The Lima Comercio of the 17th instant gives the following data relative to the prevalence of smallpox in that city since October of the past year:

Deaths in 1895.—October, in city, 4. November, in city, 9; in hospitals, 5. December, in city, 20; in hospitals, 8. Total in 1895, 46 deaths.

Deaths in 1896.—January, in city, 44; in hospitals, 11; total, 55. February, in city, 33; in hospitals, 15; total, 48. March, in city, 27; in hospitals, 11; total, 38. April, as far as reported, in city, 10; total, 10. No report from hospitals. Grand total, 151.

Up to April 15 the number of vaccinations during the prevalence of smallpox amounted to 17,623.

SCOTLAND.

Decrease of typhus fever in Glasgow.

GLASGOW, SCOTLAND, *May 13, 1896.*

SIR: I have much pleasure in reporting that typhus fever has been steadily decreasing for the past four weeks. There are at present 5 cases, all confined in hospital.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

BRAZIL—*Ceara.*—Month of March, 1896. Estimated population, 44,000. Total deaths, 139, including 3 from beriberi and 3 from yellow fever.

CUBA—*Habana.*—Under date of May 23, 1896, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 182 deaths in this city during the week ended May 21, 1896. Four of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 12 new cases, 6 were caused by enteric fever, 4 by so-called

pernicious fever, 2 by paludal fever, 2 by diphtheria, 5 by dysentery, 20 by enteritis, 6 by smallpox, 2 by measles, 1 by la grippe, 34 by tuberculosis, 6 by pneumonia. Two of the deaths from yellow fever during the week occurred in the military hospital, and the other 2 were in the civil hospital, Quinta de los Dependientes.

With the exception of mild showers on the 5th and 6th of this month, there has been no rain here for over two months.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended May 9 correspond to an annual rate of 18.5 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,860,971. The highest rate was recorded in Burnley, viz, 25.9, and the lowest in Portsmouth, viz, 12.3 a thousand.

London.—One thousand five hundred and twenty-three deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 137; scarlet fever, 11; diphtheria, 41; whooping cough, 96; enteric fever, 4, and diarrhea and dysentery, 10. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 17.9 a thousand. In greater London 1,948 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 16.5 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 14 from diphtheria, 31 from measles, 4 from scarlet fever, and 40 from whooping cough.

Sunderland.—Two weeks ended May 2, 1896. Estimated population, 40,386. Total deaths, 121, including diphtheria, 1; measles, 23, and whooping cough, 4.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 9 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.7 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 8.4, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 40.6 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 147 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 3; enteric fever, 5; typhus fever, 1, and 1 from diphtheria.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 9 correspond to an annual rate of 18.9 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 16.8, and the highest in Paisley, viz, 22.1 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 552, including measles, 11; scarlet fever, 3; diphtheria, 3, and whooping cough, 25.
