MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, Mich., from 55 observers indicate that for the week ended May 23, 1896, neuralgia, tonsillitis, and bronchitis decreased and inflammation of bowels increased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present at 206 places, measles at 37, scarlet fever at 31, enteric fever at 25, diphtheria at 21, and whooping cough at 13 places.

Cholera notes.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, May 13, 1896.]

EGYPT.—From April 23 to 29 5 cholera cases and 6 deaths were reported at Alexandria. At Ezbethel Korschid on April 23 and at Tanta on April 26, 1 cholera case and death, each, was reported. The first named occurred in the person of an arrival from Alexandria. The total number of cases and deaths reported in Egypt up to the present time, is 1,279 and 1,069, respectively. Of these, 179 cases, 133 deaths occurred in Alexandria.

EAST INDIES—*Calcutta.*—From March 29 to April 4 there were 310 cholera deaths.

Current Quarantine Measures.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, May 13, 1896.]

DENMARK.—By ministerial proclamation of April 30, the sanitary police measures declared against Russia and Finland for the purpose of preventing the introduction of contagious diseases are suspended. The prohibition against the importation of rags and carded wool from the said country and province is removed.

BULGARIA.—Quarantine measures against arrivals from Turkey and Russia were suspended April 21.

BRAZIL.*Sanitary report from Rio de Janeiro.*

RIO DE JANEIRO, *May 5, 1896.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for the week ended May 2, 1896:

There were 11 deaths from *accessio pernicioso*, a decrease of 3; 60 from yellow fever, a decrease of 8; 1 from smallpox, a decrease of 2; 5 from beriberi, a decrease of 1; 7 from enteric fever, a decrease of 1; 1 from diphtheria, none in the foregoing week; 1 from whooping cough, the same as in the foregoing week, and 60 from tuberculosis, a decrease of 6. From all causes there were 449 deaths, a decrease of 9.

Yellow fever.—This disease is more prevalent than usual at this time of the year, with the comparatively moderate temperature, but it is declining, and whilst there was only a decrease of 8 in the number of deaths, there were 26 less in the number of cases.

Smallpox.—The number of cases of this disease is on the increase.

On the whole, the showing this week is an improvement.

Since last report the following-named ships have been inspected or received bills of health from this office: April 28, steamship *Senior*, German, from Santos for New York, N. Y.; April 29, bark *Julia Rollins*, American, for Baltimore, Md., and steamship *Lassell*, British, for New York, N. Y.

CUBA.*Report of yellow fever and smallpox in Santiago.*

Under date of May 25, the following information has been received from the United States consul at Santiago:

During the week ended May 24, 1896, there was 1 case of yellow fever under treatment at the municipal hospital. There were 42 deaths from smallpox (estimated population of Cienfuegos, 24,030) during the same week, an increase of 24 over the foregoing week.

Yellow fever reported in Sagua la Grande.

Under date of May 18, 1896, the United States consul at Sagua la Grande reports that "yellow fever" exists "among the troops, but number of cases not reported."

FRANCE.

*Denial of report of cholera at Marseilles.*MARSEILLES, *May 19, 1896.*

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your telegram of to-day's date, as follows: "Wire status of cholera," and to confirm my reply thereto, viz: "No cholera."

On the 15th instant the Paris edition of the New York Herald stated that there had been several deaths from cholera at this port, but the report was undoubtedly incorrect. It is never possible to secure anything in the nature of official information as to quarantinable diseases here, * * * but I have made careful investigation, and up to this time I am sure the disease has not made its appearance here. Physicians and the health authorities are expecting it, and the condition of the city, resulting from a severe drouth, which has prevailed during the winter and spring, rendering dangerous a water supply which at best is never healthy, warrants the conviction that the disease may make its appearance here at any early date. Boats are arriving nearly every day from Alexandria, where, by to-day's reports, there were 28 deaths; at Cairo, 24, and at Tura, 1. These conditions are exceedingly unfavorable for Marseilles. * * * Should it (cholera) make its appearance, the Department will be at once informed.

GERMANY.

Vital statistics of certain Prussian cities.

[From the Hanover Courier of April 14, 1896.]

HANOVER, GERMANY, *April 15, 1896.*

SIR: The results of the vital-statistic census of 18 large cities of Prussia for 1895 have just been published. The numbers given are the ratios to 1,000 souls. As to living births, Dortmund, Düsseldorf, and Cologne head the list; in Frankfort on the Main and Berlin the number falls under 29; in Prussian Königsberg, Charlottenburg, and Crefeld, under 32. Hanover's figure is 32.9. In stillbirths, Breslau, Hanover, Altona, Elberfeld, and Danzig have bad preeminence, the rate being 1.3. As to marriages, Frankfort on the Main, Berlin, and Altona stand higher, namely, at 20, while Magdeburg, Crefeld, and Halle on the Saale stand at 15 and Hanover at 18.3. For deaths, the numbers are: Breslau over 27; then follow Stettin, Prussian Königsberg, and Danzig, whilst the best exhibits are those of Charlottenburg, Elberfeld, Frankfort on the Main, and Barmen. Hanover gives 19.1. As usual, in Prussia, there is an excess of births over deaths, in regard to which factor, the order is: Dortmund, 21.3; Barmen, 16.8; Elberfeld, 16.4; and Düsseldorf, 15.6, the lowest places being held by Prussian Königsberg, 4.3; Breslau, 6.7, and Danzig, 7.1, while Berlin and Stettin stand side by side at 8. Hanover comes in pretty well up, at 13.8.

TURKEY.

Sanitary report from Constantinople.

[Report No. 152.]

CONSTANTINOPLE, *May 30, 1896.*

SIR: The sanitary condition of Constantinople is always the same. An epidemic of influenza exists, and I fear that we will have an epidemic of scarlet fever. There are several cases of a disease which is not recognized as being scarlet fever until desquamation begins and nephritis occurs. The rash is more or less well marked and evident, but it is not accompanied by any elevation of the temperature of the body. It is to be hoped that on account of the season, during which the inhabitants of the town go to the country in order to breathe pure air, the above-mentioned disease will not spread.

The sanitary news from the different provinces state that in nearly all of them influenza and smallpox are prevailing. Besides these diseases there also exists in the provinces of Asia Minor a large epidemic of spotted typhus, typhoid fever, and dysentery. The day before yesterday 4 physicians were sent from Constantinople to Marash and surrounding places by the American Mission, directed by Miss Clara Barton, in order to take the necessary steps to check the epidemics and attend the patients.

According to the news received from the above-mentioned provinces the general condition there is terrible. The population is mowed down by epidemics and by famine—a wretched condition, which can not be described.

In Egypt, cholera cases and cholera deaths are becoming more and more numerous. On the 5th instant 11 cases and 11 cholera deaths were registered; on the 8th, 19 cases and 14 deaths; on the 9th, 24, and 16 deaths, and on the 10th and 11th there were registered 29 cases, with 21 deaths. In consequence of this news it has been decided that ships coming from the Mediterranean sea coast of Egypt have to undergo five days' quarantine in a Turkish lazaretto, with disinfection of wearing apparel in the disinfecting furnace. I have to state that some of the disinfecting furnaces in the lazarettos are not in the best condition, as the steam can not be put under pressure on account of the leakages. Passengers quitting Egypt for the Hedjaz have to undergo ten days' quarantine at the lazaretto of Tor.

BERMUDA.—Week ended May 22, 1896. Estimated population, 15,013. Total deaths, 2. No deaths from contagious diseases.

BAHAMAS—*Dunmore Town*.—Four weeks ended May 22, 1896. Estimated population, 1,472. One death.

Governors Harbor.—Four weeks ended May 22, 1896. Estimated population, 1,500. Two deaths. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Green Turtle Cay—Abaco.—Two weeks ended May 21, 1896. Estimated population, 3,900. No deaths.

CUBA—*Habana*.—Under date of May 30, 1896, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows :

There were 176 deaths in this city during the week ended May 28, 1896. Seven of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 13 new cases; 7 were caused by enteric fever, 8 by so-called pernicious fever, 3 by paludal fever, 1 by diphtheria, 6 by dysentery, 18 by enteritis, 1 by cholera-infantil, 5 by smallpox, 1 by measles, 35 by tuberculosis, and 3 by pneumonia.

All of the 7 deaths by yellow fever during the week occurred among the Spanish troops in the military hospital.

FRANCE—*Roubaix*.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 124,000. Total deaths, 245, including diphtheria, 4; measles, 25, and whooping cough, 3.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended May 16 correspond to an annual rate of 18.4 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,860,971. The highest rate was recorded in Manchester, viz, 28.5, and the lowest in Brighton, viz, 11.7 a thousand.

London.—One thousand five hundred and sixteen deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 111; scarlet fever, 16; diphtheria, 43; whooping cough, 83; enteric fever, 8, and diarrhea and dysentery, 11. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 17.8 a thousand. In greater London 1,922 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 16.3 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 12 from diphtheria, 29 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, and 29 from whooping cough.

Sunderland.—Two weeks ended May 16, 1896. Estimated population, 140,386. Total deaths, 124, including scarlet fever, 3; measles, 12, and whooping cough, 4.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 16 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.1 a thousand of the population. An equally low rate was recorded in Kilkenny and Sligo, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Londonderry, viz, 36.1 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 153 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 1, and 1 from diphtheria.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 16 correspond to an annual rate of 19.3 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 11.8, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 21.1 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes

was 563, including measles, 9; scarlet fever, 3; diphtheria, 1, and whooping cough, 38.

MOZAMBIQUE—*Mozambique*.—Month of December, 1895. Estimated population, 8,000. Total deaths, 3, including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Month of January, 1896. Total deaths, 3, including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Month of February, 1896. Total deaths, 6, including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

PUERTO RICO—*San Juan*.—Month of January, 1896. Estimated population, 27,000. Total deaths, 89, including measles, 1; diphtheria, 1; yellow fever, 9; enteric fever, 1, and phthisis pulmonalis, 12.

Month of February, 1896. Total deaths, 81; yellow fever, 14, and phthisis pulmonalis, 13.

SWITZERLAND—*Lucerne*.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 23,000. Total deaths, 44, including 1 from enteric fever.
