DEAR DOCTOR: I am not in possession, at present, of all my notes, as I am having them written up by a friend, but am able to give you the information asked for.

Number of cases from February 26 to June 12: City and pesthouse, 54; number cases treated in pesthouse, 49; number cases treated in city, 5; number colored cases treated in pesthouse, 48; number white cases treated in city, 5; number deaths, colored (all in pesthouse), 8; number deaths, white, none; number deaths without complication, 2; number deaths, complicated, 6. All the deaths with complications were inmates of charity hospital when attacked with smallpox. * * Number discharged, 35; number under treatment, 6. First case received in pesthouse, February 26; 2 cases received June 8; 1 case received June 10 (last cases).

SIR: Following is the number of cases of smallpox occurring in

Tennessee during the month ending May 31:
In the city of Memphis there occurred 10 cases, all colored; in Shelby County (outside of the city of Memphis), 8 cases, with 2 deaths; all colored. There occurred in camp, near Covington, Tipton County, 14 cases, with 2 deaths; all colored. Thus making a total of 32 cases, with 4 deaths, in the State for the month.

In all the above cases the usual precautions for the restriction and prevention of the disease were observed.

SIR: I have the honor to report that we disinfected the baggage of, and bathed 63 Chinese steerage passengers from the steamer Peru.

A case of plague developed in one of firemen after leaving Hongkong, and the man was buried at sea. The vessel was quarantined nine days at Nagasaki.

The steamer Coptic, due here June 16, has also been placed in quarantine at Nagasaki, presumably from a similar cause.

Sanitary reports from medical officers of the Louisiana State board of health, on duty in Central America.

[The following reports are addressed to the president of the State board of health, Louisiana.

BELIZE, BRITISH HONDURAS, May 8, 1896.

DEAR SIR: I have the honor to report that the port of Belize, British Honduras, is without contagious or infectious disease.

May 29, 1896.

I have the honor to report that I left Belize, British Honduras, on the steamship Breakwater, Monday, 25th instant, for Puerto Cortez, Spanish Honduras, and returned to Belize this day, having visited all the intermediate points between these two ports, viz: Stann Creek, British Honduras; Punta Gorda, British Honduras; Little River, British Honduras; Monkey River, British Honduras; Port Barrios, Guatemala, and Livingston, Guatemala.

With the exception of Port Barrios, where an isolated patient was convalescing from smallpox, and where malarial intermittent fever was also prevailing, I beg to report that the other ports were free from contagious or infectious diseases.

CHINA.

The bubonic plague in Canton.

Under date of May 12, 1896, the United States consul at Canton reports that the bubonic plague has appeared in various parts of Canton and moves about from one portion of the city to another with varying fatality. No records or statistics are available. The plague is not so virulent or severe as in 1894, when it was estimated that 120,000 Chinese died of it between March 1 and August 31. It has appeared in some interior localites of this province, and is prevailing in Hongkong.

CUBA.

Sanitary reports from Santiago—Smallpox increasing.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, May 30, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor of submitting the following report on the sanitary condition of Santiago de Cuba for the week ended May 30:

The number of deaths has been 58, of which 7 were from smallpox, 2 from yellow fever, 8 from remittent fever, 5 from pernicious fever, 4 from dysentery, 3 from tuberculosis, 10 from enteritis, and the rest from noncontagious diseases. Variola is on the increase, and there are now over 100 cases known under treatment. Yellow fever continues the same as last week, while dysentery and intestinal diseases increase greatly.

The following vessels have been inspected and bills of health issued to them: May 22, British steamship Earnford, for Baltimore; American steamship Santiago, for New York (visé); Greek steamship Marfieltis Ralli, for Philadelphia. May 23, British steamship Earnwood, for Philadelphia. May 25, Spanish steamship Panama (visé), for New York. May 27, British steamship Mameluke, for Philadelphia. May 28, Belgium steamship Sagamore, for Philadelphia. May 29, British steamship Earndale, for Philadelphia.

Santiago de Cuba, June 6, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor of submitting the following report on the sanitary condition of Santiago de Cuba for the week ended June 6. The mortality for this period has increased to an alarming figure, the records showing 94 deaths—of these, 32 were from smallpox, 2 from yellow fever, 18 from bilious remittent fever, 8 from pernicious fever, 12 from enteritis, 4 from tuberculosis, and the rest from common diseases of noncontagious character.

Smallpox is raging epidemically, and the cases which can be numbered by hundreds are increasing daily. There are no precautions taken to keep the sick isolated, and wakes over the corpses are of daily occurrence.

Yellow fever has decreased somewhat, and there are only 2 deaths noted this week. * * *

Malarial affections of the most deadly character are very common, especially the remittent and pernicious form, enteritis among the children and dysentery among the adults are also providing a large contingent to the general mortality.

Under date of June 8, 1896, the United States consul at Cienfuegos reports that during the week ended June 7 there were 49 deaths from smallpox in Cienfuegos and 9 cases of yellow fever, of which 2 were fatal.

AUSTRALIA—New South Wales—Sydney.—Month of March, 1896. Estimated population, 408,500. Total deaths, 490, including enteric fever, 20; scarlet fever, 3; diphtheria, 7, and whooping cough, 1.

Bahamas—Dunmore Town.—Two weeks ended June 5, 1896. Estimated population, 1,472. No deaths.

Governors Harbor.—Two weeks ended June 6, 1896. Estimated population, 1,500. One death. No death from contagious disease.

Green Turtle Cay—Abaco.—Two weeks ended June 4, 1896. Estimated population, 3,900. No deaths.

BRAZIL—Pernambuco.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 200,000. Total deaths, 592, including yellow fever, 8; smallpox, 55, and enteric fever, 2.

British Columbia—Victoria.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 20,000. Total deaths, 73.

Cuba—Habana.—Under date of June 13, 1896, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 207 deaths in this city during the week ended June 11, 1896. Nine of these deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 17 new cases, 10 were caused by enteric fever, 3 by so-called pernicious fever, 2 by paludal fever, 2 by dysentery, 10 by enteritis, 1 by cholera infantum, 9 by smallpox, 41 by tuberculosis, and 4 by

pneumonia. Of the 9 deaths by yellow fever during the week 8 occurred among the Spanish troops in the military hospital.

CHILI—Antofagasta.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 13,456; total deaths, 50, including phthisis pulmonalis, 2, and enteric fever, 2.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended May 30 correspond to an annual rate of 17.6 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,846,948. The highest rate was recorded in Sunderland, viz, 24.1, and the lowest in Swansea, viz, 8.5 a thousand.

London.—One thousand four hundred and thirty deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 98; scarlet fever, 19; diphtheria, 40; whooping cough, 83; enteric fever, 8, and diarrhea and dysentery, 10. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.9 a thousand. In greater London 1,842 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 15.5 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 9 from diphtheria, 34 from measles, 28 from whooping cough, and scarlet fever, 4.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 30 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.3 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Drogheda, viz, 4.4, and the highest in Kilkenny, viz, 51.9 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 160 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 1, and enteric fever, 5.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 30 correspond to an annual rate of 19.2 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 14.3, and the highest in Perth, viz, 27.4 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 560, including scarlet fever, 6; diphtheria, 3; measles, 20, and whooping cough, 27.
