[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, June 10, 1896.]

EGYPT.—From May 21 to 29, 247 new cases and 221 deaths were reported at Alexandria. Of the last named, 96 occurred out of hospital. At Cairo, from May 21 to 28, 331 cases and 280 deaths were reported (225 out of hospital); at Taurah, from May 21 to 27, 64 cases, 42 deaths (18 out of hospital); at Ghizeh, May 20 to 28, 21 cases, 18 deaths (14 out of hospital); at Mahumdieh, from May 22 to 27, 5 cases, 4 deaths (2 out of hospital); at Mehallet Abou Ali, from May 22 to 27, 33 cases, 24 deaths (15 out of hospital); at Beni Souef, on May 26 and 27, 10 cases, 4 deaths (out of hospital); at Choubrah Klut, from May 25 to 27, 15 cases and 4 deaths (2 out of hospital). In addition to these, from May 20 to 27, 2 cases each were reported at South Helouan, Gamagnoun, and Desouf el Fanah; 1 each at Tantah, Suez, Masloub, Damanhour, Beni Harun, and 1 death each at Hagar el Nawatieh, Ezbeth el Korschid, Suez, Maslaub, Gamagnoun, and Desauk el Fanar.

Current quarantine measures.

[Translated in this Bureau from the "Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes," Berlin, June 10, 1896.]

GERMANY—Hamburg.—By ministerial resolution of June 1, the prohibition issued August 23, 1893, against the importation or transportation of personal clothing and bed clothing from Russia is suspended.

AUSTRIA.—By order of the ministry of the interior of May 26, the five days' sanitary supervision of arrivals from Alexandria is made to apply to arrivals from Egypt generally.

Instructions issued by the same ministry, May 29, to the municipal authorities of Trieste and Zara reaffirm the necessity for united action on the part of all officials and organizations for the prevention of the importation of cholera, and direct attention to previous instructions issued in regard to the arrival of sick persons, the transportation of the sick and dead, disinfection, and the effective operation of the established medical service.

By order of the port authorities of Trieste, vessels belonging to the Austrian Lloyd Line, bound for Egypt with intention to return, shall

carry sufficient water for the entire voyage; use of Nile water on board is forbidden. Inspection of travelers' luggage shall take place on board. Vessels carrying a physician must also have a sanitary guard who has undergone disinfection. Soiled wash clothing must be thoroughly disinfected. A further sanitary inspection must take place at Trieste.

EGYPT.—By proclamation of the governor of Cairo, of May 18, the ministerial order of October 17, 1895, is put in force. It contains some special regulations with regard to mosques. It further forbids the unlading of goods and the washing of clothing on the east bank of the Nile, between the most northerly point of the Island of Rodah and the old museum of Bulak. Water is allowed to be drawn only at certain specified points. The public baths, which are known to be a source of danger, are closed. Violation of these regulations is punishable by flogging.

BRAZIL.

Sanitary report from Rio de Janeiro.

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 2, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for the week ended May 30, 1896.

There were 10 deaths from accesso pernicioso, an increase of 3; 23 from yellow fever, the same as in the foregoing week; 1 from smallpox, a decrease of 1; 9 from beriberi, an increase of 1; 2 from enteric fever, a decrease of 1; 31 from tuberculosis, a decrease of 8, and none from whooping cough. From all causes there were 303 deaths, a decrease of 36—on the whole, an improvement, and while the number of cases and deaths from yellow fever is the same, we still may consider the disease on the decline.

The Montevidean Government raised the quarantine on ships from

Brazilian ports on the 27th of the month of May.

Since last report, the following named ships have been visited or received bills of health from this office: May 27, bark Auriga, British, for Brunswick, Ga. May 28, barkentine Effendi, British, for Savannah, Ga.; bark Charles Loring, American, for Barbados, West Indies, and bark Ella, American, for Barbados, West Indies. May 29, bark Sereia, Portuguese, for Savannah, Ga., and steamship Olbers, Belgian, for New York. May 30, ship Mary L. Burril, British, for New York, and steamship Grecian Prince, British, for New York from Santos. June 1, steamship Uganda, British, for Mobile, Ala.

CHINA.

Report on plague in Canton.

Canton, May 12, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor, besides sending sanitary reports to the United States Marine-Hospital Bureau, to inform you that the bubonic plague is causing many deaths among the Cantonese, and has appeared in several localities in the interior of Kwangtung Province. It is not so bad as in 1894, when it was estimated that about 120,000 Chinese died of the plague in the city of Canton between March and August, inclusive.

Hongkong has had the plague, more or less, since May, 1894, and has been losing about 12 persons daily during the past month. Of course, a much larger number of deaths occur in Canton, perhaps half as many as occurred here up to May 12, 1894.

Great care is necessary on the part of European and American residents to prevent this malignant pestilence from extending to foreigners.

In all probability the bubonic plague will become established in Canton and Hongkong as it has been in Pakhoi, and in its "home" in the province of Hunan. As yet physicians are baffled and perplexed in treatment of a disease which can be prevented but not cured. It is blood poison; and no one seems to know how it should be treated.

CUBA.

Prevalence of smallpox and yellow fever in Cuban seaports.

Under date of June 15, 1896, the United States consul at Cardenas reports that there were 3 cases of yellow fever—1 fatal—during the week ended June 13.

The United States consul at Cienfuegos reports 4 deaths from yellow fever and 64 from smallpox in that city during the week ended June 21, 1896. Under the head of prevailing diseases he reports "smallpox, yellow fever, intestinal disorders, and malarial fevers."

The United States sanitary inspector at Habana reports that during the week ended June 25, 1896, there were approximately 20 cases of yellow fever, with 9 deaths. There were also 21 deaths from smallpox during the same period.

The United States consul at Matanzas reports that during the week ended June 24, 1896, there were 56 cases of yellow fever and 42 deaths therefrom in Matanzas. He adds: "All cases of yellow fever are confined to the Spanish troops; no cases in the harbor." In reply to a cablegram from this office asking for confirmation of a report of cholera in Matanzas, the consul wired on June 28 as follows:

"No cholera here. Yellow fever prevalent among the troops. One case of smallpox reported in the city."

The following reports have been received from Sagua la Grande and Santiago:

SAGUA LA GRANDE, June 9, 1896.

SIR: In forwarding sanitary report for the week ended the 6th instant, in which are reported 17 cases and 3 deaths from yellow fever, I have the honor to say that, from credible information, this official report does not show the extent of the ravages of yellow fever.

During the week referred to, the deaths from yellow fever, confined

almost exclusively to the troops, reached over 30.

Under date of June 15, 1896, the consul reports that there were 41 cases of yellow fever and 4 deaths therefrom in Sagua la Grande during the week ended June 13.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, June 13, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that Dr. H. S. Caminero, sanitary inspector, United States Marine-Hospital Service here, has assured me that there are over 1,000 cases of smallpox in this city. There are a number of families down with it within 200 feet of the consulate. From information I glean that the whole south coast of Cuba, from Cienfuegos to Baracoa, is infected with smallpox, and I have the honor to notify you to this effect so that quarantine officers in the United States may be put on their guard and prevent the transmission of the disease to our cities. * * *

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, June 13, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor of submitting the following report on the sanitary condition of Santiago de Cuba for the week ended Saturday, June 13. Eighty-four deaths have been recorded, of which 31 were from smallpox, 7 from yellow fever, 1 from typhoid fever, 5 from remittent fever, 3 from pernicious fever, 10 from enteritis, 3 from tuberculosis, and the rest from common diseases of noncontagious character. Smallpox under an epidemic form is raging with great violence, the confluent and hemorrhagic form predominating, the great majority of the cases not having been vaccinated. Yellow fever is also increasing, 7 deaths being reported this week. I have no doubt it will keep on augmenting as the temperature rises. The heat is very high just now, about 95° F. in the shade. Summer diarrhea prevails to a great extent, especially among children.

A report from Manzanillo states that 25 persons have died from small-

A report from Manzanillo states that 25 persons have died from smallpox during the last two weeks. Guantanamo, also, is full of smallpox patients, and the mortality is very high. There has been a cholera scare, but it turned out to be a case of pernicious fever which took that

form.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, June 20, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor of submitting the following report on the sanitary condition of Santiago de Cuba for the week ended Saturday, June 20:

The total number of deaths was 86. Of these, 39 were from small pox, 5 from yellow fever, 1 from typhoid fever, 8 from remittent fever, 5 from pernicious fever, 12 from enterocolitis, and the rest from common diseases of noncontagious character. Smallpox is now raging epidemically, the total number of cases as far as known reaching up to about 900. The authorities and citizens are doing all in their power to prevent its ravages as far as possible. Yellow flags will be placed on the houses where smallpox patients are located to warn citizens away, and commissions and committees have been organized to succor the poor with medicines and food.

Yellow fever is also on the increase this week, and affections of the

intestinal canal are very common. Malaria, as usual, is causing many deaths.

The captains and crews of the American schooners *Montana* and *Harriet G*. have been vaccinated by me. A large shipment of raw hides was prevented on account of noncompliance with the law, which orders such material to be thoroughly disinfected

EGYPT.

The cholera outbreak in Egypt.

Reports received from Egypt show that during the period from May 29 to June 7, 1896, there were 66 deaths from cholera in Alexandria and 246 deaths from cholera in Cairo.

During the same period there were 500 deaths in small towns and villages in the interior, and since the outbreak of the disease in Egypt to the date of the last official report—June 7, 1896—there have been 3,556 cases and 2,990 deaths.

Enforcement of quarantine regulations in regard to shipments of rags from Alexandria.

CAIRO, EGYPT, June 10, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your cabled instructions of yesterday's date with reference to the shipment of rags from Alexandria.

The consular agent at Alexandria has been directed to refuse to invoice shipments of rags to the United States until thirty days after the cessation of cholera in that city, and to promptly notify shippers of this order.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

BAHAMA ISLANDS—Dunmore Town.—Two weeks ended June 19, 1896. Estimated population, 1,472. One death.

Governors Harbor.—Two weeks ended June 20, 1896. Estimated population, 1,500. No deaths.

Green Turtle Cay—Abaco.—Two weeks ended June 18, 1896. Estimated population, 3,900. No deaths.

CUBA—Habana.—Under date of June 27, 1896, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 187 deaths in this city during the week ended June 25, 1896. Nine of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 20 new cases, 7 were caused by enteric fever, 3 by so called pernicious fever, 2 by paludal fever, 1 by diphtheria, 5 by dysentery, 17 by enteritis, 21 by smallpox, 1 by measles, 25 by tuberculosis, and 2 by pneumonia. All the 9 deaths from yellow fever during the week occurred among the Spanish troops in the military hospital.

FRANCE—Roubaix.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 124,000. Total deaths, 214, including 1 from enteric fever, 13 from measles, and 2 from whooping cough.

Nice.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 108,227. Total deaths, 179, including smallpox, 1; measles, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 19.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended June 13 correspond to an annual rate of 16.7 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,846,948. The highest rate was recorded in Manchester, viz, 24.3, and the lowest in Norwich, viz, 9.1 a thousand.

London.—One thousand three hundred and ninety-seven deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 111; scarlet fever, 22; diphtheria, 49; whooping cough, 58; enteric fever, 3, and diarrhea and dysentery, 20. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.5 a thousand. In greater London 1,796 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 15.2 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 3 from diphtheria, 37 from measles, 21 from whooping cough, and 2 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended June 13 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.5 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Sligo, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Kilkenny, viz, 28.3 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 159 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 3; whooping cough, 4, and 2 from enteric fever.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended June 13 correspond to an annual rate of 18.5 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 12, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 21 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 539, including scarlet fever, 4; diphtheria, 1; measles, 21, and whooping cough, 23.

JAMAICA—Kingston.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 34,314. Total deaths, 158, including enteric fever, 5; measles, 4; diphtheria, 3, and phthisis pulmonalis, 11.

MOZAMBIQUE—Mozambique.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 8,000. Total deaths, 7. No deaths from contagious diseases.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 225, 000. Total deaths, 449, including 4 from measles, 33 from scarlet fever, 1 from smallpox, 1 from enteric fever, 9 from diphtheria, 1 from croup, and 59 from phthisis pulmonalis.

SPAIN—Barcelona.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 440,000. Total deaths, 925, including 64 from smallpox, 20 from enteric fever, 26 from diphtheria, and 112 from phthisis pulmonalis.

SWITZERLAND—*Lucerne*.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 23,000. Total deaths, 38, including 1 from enteric fever, 4 from scarlet fever, and 5 from diphtheria.
