ANGEL ISLAND, CAL., July 20, 1896.

SIR: Two hundred and seventy-two Chinese and Japanese steerage passengers from steamship *China* quarantined. One case of varioloid.

Smallpox outbreak at Key West, Fla.

KEY WEST, FLA., July 19, 1896.

SIR: Camp outfitted and attempt made by State health officer to remove patients, resulting almost in riot. Health officer has used every means available to control trouble. Local and State civil forces proving unreliable, he now asks the Governor to appeal to the President for national force in patrolling the harbor to effectually prevent both ingress and egress and protect the mainland against Key West, which apparently refuses self-protection. I heartily indorse Dr. Porter's action and recommend your assistance. Two launches here are available if I am authorized to use them in conjunction with other forces in establishing effective cordon.

To PASSED ASSISTANT SURGEON WHITE, *Key West, Fla.*

KEY WEST, FLA., *July 20, 1896.*

SIR: Twenty-nine cases, 7 deaths to date; 2 new cases during the last three days; house-to-house inspection not done; vaccinating rapidly as peculiarities of Latin population permit; camp outfitted by State before my arrival, as Dr. Guitéras had already turned over tents. Camp was intended for use of both sick and suspects, holding the hospital, which will be finished this week, in reserve. Dr. Porter does not wish us to interfere, so far as internal control goes, until State funds are exhausted; city not enforcing removals; Dr. Porter proposed cordon to protect other points; official laymen undertake to handle 14 separate premises, while there are many desquamating, and isolation well nigh impossible, wishing the camp left unused and demanding maintenance of practically 14 pesthouses in the densest part of the town. Dr. Porter had disease well in grasp, but this change spoils all. He and I agree that treatment in city is dangerously costly—not good on any grounds—while cheap and safe at camp. In event of cordon desired to limit ingress to effectual vaccinations, I wish to emphasize danger of leaving cases in situ.

I inspected "Keys" to-day for suspects, but found no cases.

Smallpox at Shreveport, La.

SHREVEPORT, LA., *July 16, 1896.*

SIR: I have to report another case of variola discovered to-day, a colored female resident of this city. This makes the record as follows: Total cases to date, 58, of which 6 were white, and 52 colored. Total number of deaths (all colored), 11; all in pesthouse. Of the total cases, 51 were local—5 white and 46 were colored; and 1 white and 6 colored cases were imported, as follows: New Orleans, 3; this (Caddo) parish, 2; Bossier Parish (separated from Caddo by Red River), 1; Baton Rouge, 1, white; others colored. Of the above number, 52 colored and 1 white were treated in pesthouse; 5 (all white) were treated in their homes in this city. Discharged, 44; white, 6; colored, 38; under treatment, 3; all in pesthouse.

The above data were furnished me by Dr. J. F. O'Leary, city physician.

Two cases of smallpox in Mobile County, Ala.

MOBILE, ALA., *July 9, 1896.*

SIR: I have the honor to report the occurrence of a case of smallpox at Magazine Point, in this county, in the person of Mollie Parker, colored female, aged 30. The case was discovered on the 5th instant and was immediately sent to the pesthouse. The house was fumigated as soon as possible and all the colored people in the vicinity subjected

to vaccination. The woman came here from Pensacola (her story) on the 3d instant, and claims that she contracted the disease from her brother, who "died of black measles, or consumption, about two weeks ago."

A case of modified smallpox was discovered in a colored man about June 5 (while I was absent), which was sent to the pesthouse and has recovered.

The Mobile and Mobile County record now stands, 8 cases : 2 died, 5 recovered, and 1 remaining.

CALIFORNIA.—Month of June, 1896. Reports to the State board of health from 57 cities, towns, and villages, having an aggregate population of 734,314, show a total of 938 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 134; enteric fever, 20; diphtheria, 2; croup, 5; scarlet fever, 3; measles, 2, and whooping cough, 5.

Los Angeles.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 100,000. Total deaths, 116, including phthisis pulmonalis, 18, enteric fever, 3, and diphtheria, 1.

Oakland.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 60,000. Total deaths, 62, including phthisis pulmonalis, 9, and enteric fever, 2.

CONNECTICUT.—Month of June, 1896. Reports to the State board of

health from 165 towns, having an aggregate population of 850,300, show a total of 1,099 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 115; enteric fever, 8; scarlet fever, 3; diphtheria and croup, 29; measles, 47, and whooping cough, 9.

ILLINOIS—*Chicago*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 1,175,000. Total deaths, 1,895, including phthisis pulmonalis, 190; enteric fever, 44; scarlet fever, 2; measles, 7; diphtheria, 50, and whooping cough, 7.

IOWA—*Boone*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 10,000. Total deaths, 3, including 1 from diphtheria.

Clinton.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 25,000. Total deaths, 31, including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Decorah.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 3,200. Total deaths, 2. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Eldora.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 8,000. Total deaths, 4, including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Eldon.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 1,900. Total deaths, 3. No deaths from contagious diseases.

LOUISIANA—*New Orleans*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, white, 195,000; colored, 80,000; total, 275,000. Deaths, white, 391; colored, 250; total, 641, including phthisis pulmonalis, 61; leprosy, 1; smallpox, 11, and enteric fever, 12.

MAINE—*Portland*.—Four weeks ended July 11, 1896. Estimated population, 41,500. Total deaths, 31, including phthisis pulmonalis 2, and diphtheria, 2.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Fitchburg*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 26,409. Total deaths, 26, including phthisis pulmonalis, 4; scarlet fever, 1, and whooping cough, 1.

North Attleboro.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 6,727. Total deaths, 10. No deaths from contagious diseases.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended July 11, 1896. Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, from 51 observers, indicate that whooping cough, inflammation of bowels, and remittent fever increased, and cholera morbus, intermittent fever, and influenza decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present during the week at 210 places, measles at 38, enteric fever at 34, scarlet fever at 19, whooping cough at 18, and diphtheria at 11 places.

MINNESOTA—*St. Paul*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 140,292. Total deaths, 120, including phthisis pulmonalis, 26; enteric fever, 1; croup, 2, and whooping cough, 1.

MISSOURI—*St. Louis*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 570,000. Total deaths, 1,127, including phthisis pulmonalis, 84; enteric fever, 6; diphtheria, 14; croup, 5, and whooping cough, 8.

NEW JERSEY—*Hudson County*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 338,671. Total deaths, 510, including phthisis pulmonalis,

36; enteric fever, 7; diphtheria, 41; croup, 3; measles, 3, and whooping cough, 5.

NEW YORK—*Buffalo*.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 335,709. Total deaths, 330, including phthisis pulmonalis, 33; croup, 4; diphtheria, 9; enteric fever, 3; measles, 2; scarlet fever, 1, and whooping cough, 7.

*Report of yellow fever cases in hospitals in Habana.*HABANA, CUBA, *July 18, 1896.*

SIR: Wishing to give you all information of interest during this time in which yellow fever prevails in an alarming manner, I have visited all the private and general hospitals of the city to investigate the exact number of cases of yellow fever: In the Mercedes Hospital, none; Integridad Nacional, none; Garcini, 1; Benéfica, 1; Rey, none; Purísima Concepción, 1; Hospital Militar, 94.

As you will see, most of the cases belong to the military. During the next two months of August and September, which is generally the

time that more cases occur among the civil population, there will be a still larger number among the soldiers, as they are not acclimated.

Sanitary report of Santiago de Cuba.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, *July 11, 1896.*

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that the sanitary condition of Santiago de Cuba for the week ended July 11 has been exceedingly bad. One hundred and twenty deaths have been recorded for this period, of which 48 were from smallpox, 18 from yellow fever, 10 from pernicious fever, 7 from remittent fever, 5 from tuberculosis, 12 from dysentery, and the rest from diseases of noncontagious character.

I have never seen the mortality rise so high as it has this week, and I believe one of the principal causes has been the oppressive heat of the last few days, alternating with light showers of rain which did not lower the temperature at all, and also to the agglomeration of the poor, miserable inhabitants of the surrounding country who flocked into the city for refuge.

Smallpox continues to increase, so does yellow fever, and there is quite a considerable number of soldiers attacked with the latter disease.

Dysentery is also prevailing to a more or less extent, and malarial fevers, both remittent and pernicious, are very fatal.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

CUBA—*Habana.*—Under date of July 18, 1896, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows :

There were 272 deaths in this city during the week ended July 16, 1896. Twenty-two of those deaths were caused by yellow fever with approximately 55 new cases, 24 were caused by enteric fever, 6 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by paludal fever, 1 by diphtheria, 8 by dysentery, 24 by enteritis, 23 by smallpox, 4 by measles, 31 by tuberculosis, and 6 by pneumonia. Of the 22 deaths by yellow fever, 17 occurred among the Spanish troops in the military hospital.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended July 4 correspond to an annual rate of 17.8 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,846,971. The highest rate was recorded in Gateshead, viz, 27.5 and the lowest in Derby, viz, 9.2 a thousand.

London.—One thousand five hundred and fifty-two deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 17; measles, 81; scarlet fever, 15; diphtheria, 43; whooping cough, 60; enteric fever, 11, and diarrhea and dysentery, 128. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 18.3 a thousand. In greater London 1,939 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 16.4 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 9 from diphtheria, 21 from measles, 19 from whooping cough, and 2 from scarlet fever.

Sunderland.—Two weeks ended June 27, 1896. Estimated population, 140,386. Total deaths, 110, including enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 1; measles, 7, and whooping cough, 4.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended July 4 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 23 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Drogheda, viz, 4.4, and the highest in Londonderry, viz, 29.8 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 172 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 6; whooping cough, 5, and enteric fever, 3.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended July 4 correspond to an annual rate of 18.8 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Aberdeen, viz, 12.6, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 21.8 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 548, including scarlet fever, 6; diphtheria, 9; measles, 38, and whooping cough, 22.

INDIA—Singapore.—Month of April, 1896. Estimated population, 56,000. Total deaths, 926, including cholera, 93; smallpox, 2, and beriberi, 95.

JAMAICA—Kingston.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 34,314. Total deaths, 140, including enteric fever, 4; measles, 4; diphtheria, 3, and phthisis pulmonalis, 16.
