The smallpox outbreak at Key West, Fla.

KEY WEST, FLA., August 8, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to report the status of affairs here as follows: There have been, so far as known, no fresh cases of variola occurring in the city since Saturday, July 26 (and this case was very promptly taken to camp). The last before that was on the preceding Wednesday. All houses known to be infected have been very thoroughly disinfected, and all soiled clothing and bedding soaked with strong solution of bichloride of mercury. Clean clothing removed to camp and will be there disinfected with formol as soon as possible, and stored until wanted. At the camp I report good progress. Several cases have recovered and are only held because they are children whose parents can not be discharged. * * *

I hope to have all existing cases dismissed by August 20 or 25 at

latest.

BRAZIL.

Sanitary report from Rio.

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 21, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to forward report for the week ended July 18, 1896:

There were 3 deaths from accesso pernicioso, a decrease of 2; 4 from yellow fever, a decrease of 1; 2 from smallpox, the same as in the foregoing week; 58 from tuberculosis, an increase of 13, and none from other infectious diseases, whilst in the foregoing week there were 6 from beriberi, 6 from enteric fever, and 1 from measles. From all causes there were 291 deaths, an increase of 19, due principally to diseases of the respiratory system, caused by the excessively cold and humid weather. The health of the town and port is as good as it ever is.

Sanitary improvements.—A commission of all the most scientific health experts of Brazil is now in session here, discussing the best means to ameliorate the present very bad sanitary arrangements of this town. This is not the first time a like committee has occupied itself on this subject. I hope they may do something to improve the existing system.

Since last report the following named ships have been inspected or visited, and received bills of health from this office: July 15, steamship Campana, French, for New Orleans from Santos; July 17, ship Harvest Queen, British, for Mobile, Ala., and steamship Abbeymoor, British, for New Orleans, La.; July 18, barkentine Francis, American, for Baltimore, Md.; July 20, steamship Manitoba, British, for New York, N. Y.; and steamship Kaffir Prince, British, for New York, N. Y.

CUBA.

Yellow fever and smallpox in Cuban seaports.

Under date of August 3 the United States consul at Cardenas reports that during the week ended August 1 there were 22 cases of yellow fever and 5 deaths therefrom in that city.

The United States consul at Cienfuegos reports 7 deaths from yellow fever and 44 deaths from smallpox in Cienfuegos during the week ended August 2.

The United States sanitary inspector at Habana reports that there were 55 deaths in that city from yellow fever during the week ended August 6.

The United States consul at Matanzas reports that during the two weeks ended August 5 there were in Matanzas 67 deaths from yellow fever. He states that yellow fever is confined to the Spanish troops. No cases in the harbor; hospitals and infirmaries overcrowded.

The United States consul at Sagua la Grande reports that there were 74 cases of yellow fever, with 8 deaths therefrom, in Sagua la Grande during the week ended July 25, 1896.

Sanitary report from Santiago.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, August 1, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that 108 deaths have taken place at Santiago de Cuba during the week ended Saturday, August 1. Of these, 21 were from yellow fever, 39 from smallpox, 1 from typhomalaria, 5 from remittent fever, 6 from enterocolitis, and the rest from common diseases, both acute and chronic, and of noncontagious character.

Yellow fever has augmented greatly this week, and there are quite a number of cases at the military hospital at present. Reports from different parts of the island state that yellow fever is prevalent among the soldiers, and as the hot season is now at its culminating point I am afraid an epidemic of this terrible malady will be established.

Smallpox is decreasing somewhat and the cases presenting a milder character. Malaria is very deadly, the remittent form of the fever prevailing. Diarrhea under the form of enterocolitis, is still causing many victims among the infantile population. Temperature very high, alternating with heavy showers of rain.

Report on yellow fever and other infectious diseases.

HABANA, CUBA, August 1, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that there were 1,062 deaths in this city during the month of July, 1896. One hundred and twenty-two of these deaths were caused by yellow fever, of which 97 occurred in the military hospital, 60 were caused by enteric fever, 22 by so-called pernicious fever, 11 by paludal fever, 2 by diphtheria, 27 by dysentery. 83 by enteritis, 84 by smallpox, 10 by measles, 14 by pneumonia, 3 by glanders, and 148 by tuberculosis.

The newspaper "Diario de la Marina," published to-day the following: "In Yaguajay, Caibarien Remedios, Camajuani, Vueltas, Zulueta, Buena Vista, and Placetas, towns of Santa Clara Province, district of Remedios, yellow fever has taken an epidemic form and attacks natives coming from the interior of the island to seek protection in these crowded places."

Smallpox.—July 2 to 11: Tokio Fu, 10 cases, no deaths; Kioto Fu, 2 cases, no deaths; Fukuoka Ken, 1 case, no deaths; Fukushima Ken, 2 cases, no deaths; Hokkaido, 2 cases, no deaths; Ishikawa Ken, 1 case, no deaths; Kanagawa Ken, 2 cases, no deaths; Miyagi Ken, 10 cases, 5 deaths; Osaka Fu, 7 cases, 2 deaths; Saitama Ken, 5 cases, 1 death; Shiga Ken, 1 case, no deaths; Yamanashi Ken, 1 case, no deaths; Awomori Ken, 1 case, no deaths; total, 48 cases, 9 deaths.

Dysentery.—This disease, the appearance of which, in epidemic form, I reported July 3, is but slowly increasing, and has not yet, in any locality, attained to the severity of many former outbreaks.

Relapsing fever.—Spirillum fever is slowly invading new territory, but is, so far as I am able to judge from the very incomplete data placed at my disposal, scarcely so malignant as at its first outbreak. Regulations for the sanitary management of the malady have been promulgated and are now enforced.

Plague.—Plague still exists in this empire in Formosa only, where it is reported from but two localities, Appel, where, from outbreak to date. there have been 43 cases and 33 deaths, and Dainau, where the latest returns mention simply its presence.

MEXICO.

No further cases of yellow fever in Acapulco.

The United States consul at Acapulco, under date of July 25, writes that "the case of yellow fever reported last week was isolated and the patient recovered. No other cases."

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

Australia—Brisbane.—Month of May, 1896. Estimated population, 93,657. Total deaths, 67, including 2 from enteric fever.

Bahamas—Governor's Harbor.—Two weeks ended July 31, 1896. Estimated population, 1,500. One death. No death from contagious disease.

Green Turtle Cay—Abaco.—Estimated population, 3,900. Two weeks ended July 30, 1896. No deaths.

BERMUDA.—Two weeks ended July 31, 1896. Estimated population, 15,013. Total deaths, 3.

CUBA—Habana.—Under date of August 8, 1896, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 309 deaths in this city during the week ended August 6, 1896. Fifty-five of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 120 new cases; 28 were caused by enteric fever, 12 by so-called pernicious fever, 3 by paludal fever, 1 by bilious fever, 5 by dysentery, 27 by enteritis, 17 by smallpox, 7 by pneumonia, and 29 by tuberculosis. Of the 55 deaths from yellow fever, 46 occurred among the Spanish troops in the military hospital.

FRANCE—Rouen.—Month of June, 1896. Estimated population, 111,847. Total deaths, 247, including phthisis pulmonalis, 28; enteric fever, 1; measles, 8; croup, 3, and whooping cough, 2.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended July 25, correspond to an annual rate of 24.8 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,846,971. The highest rate was recorded in Birmingham, viz, 34.4, and the lowest in Swansea, viz, 11.6 a thousand.

London.—Two thousand one hundred and forty-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 58; scarlet fever, 17; diphtheria, 50; whooping cough, 50; enteric fever, 10, and diarrhea and dysentery, 503. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 25.3 a thousand. In greater London 2,830 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 23.9 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 11 from diphtheria, 17 from measles, 23 from whooping cough, and 5 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended July 25 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 19.7 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 4.2, and the highest in Dublin, viz, 23.1 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 159 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 1, and whooping cough, 3.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended July 25 correspond to an annual rate of 18.3 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Aberdeen, viz, 11.9, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 20.7 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all

causes was 534, including scarlet fever, 3; measles, 25; whooping cough, 18, and diphtheria, 4.

St. Helena.—Four weeks ended July 11, 1896. Estimated population, 3,600. Total deaths, 3. No deaths from contagious diseases.

SWITZERLAND—Lucerne.—Month of June. 1896. Estimated population, 23,000. Total deaths, 28. No deaths from contagious diseases.

WEST INDIES—St. Christopher.—Two weeks ended July, 1896. Estimated population, 31,000. Total number of deaths not given. Sixteen deaths from measles.
