Smallpox in Helena.

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., October 31, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to inclose herewith a clipping from the Arkansas Gazette of this date, giving an account of smallpox at Helena, Ark. Very respectfully.

HELENA, ARK., October 30, 1896.

Numerous rumors having been spread throughout the country by irresponsible parties to the effect that smallpox existed in this city in an epidemic form, the chamber of commerce this afternoon adopted the following resolutions:

Whereas, rumors have been circulated in adjoining towns that the city of Helena is infected with a large number of smallpox cases, and that the disease is epidemic here; and

Whereas, it is but proper that these rumors should be corrected and the exact truth published; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the chamber of commerce of the city of Helena, that the following true facts be published to the world: That from the reports of the city physician made officially to the board of health, it appears that there are 12 cases of smallpox in the city, no new cases occurring within a week and only 1 death so far has occurred; that the disease is confined entirely to negroes; that all the cases are but a mild form of the disease; that by strict enforcement of sanitary laws all danger of the spreading of the disease, or of any new cases, has been effectually stopped, and that no danger of contagion need be feared henceforth.

Reports of States and yearly and monthly reports of cities.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended October 24, 1896. Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, from 55 observers indicate that typhoid fever and influenza increased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present during the week at 230 places, enteric fever at 69, diphtheria at 34, scarlet fever at 21, whooping cough at 15, and measles at 9 places.

NEW YORK.—Month of September, 1896. Reports to the State board of health from 8 districts, including New York City, Brooklyn, and 150 other cities, towns, and villages, show a total of 9,468 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 1,023; enteric fever, 221; scarlet fever, 26; diphtheria and croup, 294; measles, 31, and whooping cough. 102.

The Monthly Bulletin says:

There were 500 fewer deaths reported than in the corresponding month of last year. Among zymotic diseases the only material difference from the mortality of September, 1895, is in diarrheal diseases, from which the number of deaths is less by 600; the mortality from all diseases of the digestive organs is diminished. Acute respiratory diseases caused 150 more deaths, and from diseases of the circulatory system there were 100 more deaths than a year ago; from other local diseases, as also from consumption and constitutional diseases, there was no material variation. There were 800 fewer deaths under five years of age. Compared with the preceding month of August, the total reported mortality is decreased by 3,000, the deaths under five years of age being fewer by 1,200. Among zymotic diseases, the diarrheal mortality was not half as large. Typhoid fever, malarial diseases, and diphtheria show an increase; whooping cough a decrease. Acute respiratory diseases have increased, all other local diseases diminished, and the deaths from accidents and violence, under which was placed last month a large number from sunstroke, have fallen to the normal. The death rate from all causes is 17.50, against 23.25 in August and 18.50 in September last. The percentage of zymotic mortality is 19.75, 24.65 in August, and 25.00 in September last. The September prevalence of typhoid fever is excessive in the Hudson and Mohawk valley districts, and in the southern tier and east central districts. The percentage of deaths from typhoid fever in urban parts of the State was 2.00; in rural parts of the State, 3.66. Diphtheria increased a little from August. but caused fewer deaths than in September of any year for ten years; in cities and villages it caused 3.50 per cent of the deaths; in rural parts of the State, 1.57 per cent. Scarlet fever continues to cause few deaths, but is more widely distributed than in August.

Smallpox and yellow fever in Cuban seaports.

The United States consul at Cardenas reports 3 deaths from yellow fever during the week ended October 24.

The United States consul at Santiago reports 12 deaths from yellow fever during the week ended October 24.

Under date of October 26 the United States consul at Cienfuegos reports that during the week ended October 25 there were in that city 9 deaths from yellow fever and 5 from smallpox.

The United States sanitary inspector at Sagua la Grande reports 6 deaths from yellow fever, with 79 cases during the two weeks ended October 24.

The United States sanitary inspector at Habana reports 73 deaths from yellow fever during the week ended October 29.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, October 24, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor of submitting the following sanitary report on Santiago de Cuba for the week ended October 24. There have been 56 deaths during this period of which 12 were from yellow fever at the military hospital, 3 from smallpox, 1 from typhomalarial fever, 10 from remittent fever, 2 from pernicious fever, 5 from dysentery, and the rest from common diseases of noncontagious character. The smallpox epidemic is now confined to the country villages and towns around Santiago, but in this city itself there are no cases at present. Yellow fever increases slightly, and remittent fevers of bad type are prevalent. Dysentery still makes victims, and diarrhea is very common.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that both yellow fever and small-pox have increased during the last few days, as will be seen embodied in the weekly mortuary report, which I forward you to-day, and which is as follows:

During the week ending October 29 there were 296 deaths in this city, 73 of which were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 200 new cases; 36 were caused by smallpox, with 250 new cases, approximately; 12 were caused by enteric fever, 12 by so-called pernicious fever, 4 by paludal fever, 17 by dysentery, 10 by enteritis, 3 by pneumonia, 39 by tuberculosis, and 1 by glanders.

Sixty-nine of the 73 deaths from yellow fever during the week were among Spanish soldiers in the military hospitals of the city, while the remaining 4 deaths from that disease were among civilians.

All of the 36 deaths from smallpox during the week, as for some weeks before, have occurred among civilians, though some new cases have lately been reported among the Spanish troops.

The weather is, and has been, unusually warm throughout the entire

month and remarkably free from strong winds.

EGYPT.

Decrease in virulence of the cholera epidemic.

CAIRO, EGYPT, October 7, 1896.

SIR: I have the honor to advise you that the outbreak of cholera prevailing in Egypt for upward of a year has now apparently come to an end. No death or new case has occurred in Lower Egypt for several days, while from Upper Egypt but 2 or 3 deaths daily are reported.

Alexandria has been free from cases for a fortnight past, and in Cairo

only 1 death from cholera has occurred since October 1.

The total number of deaths in Egypt, from the date of the appearance of the scourge to date, has been 18,110, it is officially stated.

JAPAN.

Report on the prevalence of cholera, dysentery, and smallpox.

Yоконама, October 14, 1896.

SIR: I was unable to send the inclosed report on infectious diseases in Japan by the steamer of October 10, for which it was prepared, neither am I able to bring the general statistics up to date, as usual. I have the honor, however, to report, as the only matters of urgent interest from a sanitary point of view, the great and increasing prevalence of smallpox in and about Kobe, my direct report from there giving 244 cases for the two weeks ended October 10, with a high mortality, and the occurrence of 3 cases of cholera in Yokohama within the past ten days, all fatal. In view of the lateness of the season, and the stringent measures of precaution which are being enforced by the native authorities, I am not inclined to fear an entensive epidemic.

It is somewhat remarkable that, although we had every reason to anticipate a severe and widespread epidemic of cholera during this year, this is the first outbreak of a malignant type in any part of the Empire since January last, the greater number of the isolated cases which have been reported from time to time during the summer being, considering the very low mortality accompanying them, of doubtful genuineness.

TURKEY.

Report of the United States sanitary representative.

[Report No. 161.]

CONSTANTINOPLE, October 14, 1896.

SIR: Scarlet fever, diphtheria, smallpox, measles, and typhoid fever are the prevailing diseases at the present. Scarlet fever is rather light and is scattered all over the town. There are a few cases of diphtheria here and there, but at Chenzuel-Kivi, on the Asiatic side of the Bosphorus, it exists in an epidemic form. In that village many children have been its victims. The other diseases are rather light, excepting smallpox, from which about 15 or 20 persons die every month. There exists also an epidemic of diarrhea with fever among children. The diarrhea lasts for several days and does not improve except by the administration of the salts of quinia.

The sanitary news from the provinces announce an outbreak of bubonic plague in Yemen. A quarantine of ten days with disinfection by the disinfecting furnace has been ordered against ships coming from Yemen, as well as from Bombay, where the same disease broke out. In Bas-

sorah the disinfection will be performed by chemical agents (suphur), as there does not exist any lazaretto or disinfecting furnace in the latter place.

Quarantine against Egypt has been already abolished. According to the last cholera bulletin from Egypt from the 3d instant up to the 11th last, there were 34 cholera deaths registered in Egypt. Since the beginning of the epidemic on the 15th of October of last year 17, 656 cholera deaths have been registered.

FRANCE—Nantes.—Month of September, 1896. Estimated population, 125,757. Total deaths, 265, including enteric fever, 5; diphtheria, 1, and measles, 3.

Roubaix.—Month of September, 1896. Estimated population, 125,000. Total deaths, 177, including diphtheria, 2; measles, 3, and whooping cough, 1.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended October 17, correspond to an annual rate of 16.3 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,846,971. The highest rate was recorded in Bolton, viz, 23.8, and the lowest in Leicester, viz, 9.4 a thousand.

London.—One thousand three hundred and thirty-three deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 9; scarlet fever, 16;

diphtheria, 66; whooping cough, 15; enteric fever, 17, and diarrhea and dysentery, 14. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.7 a thousand. In greater London 1,678 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 14.2 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 21 from diphtheria, 4 from whooping cough, and 6 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended October 17 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 18.9 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Kilkenny, viz, 4.7, and the highest in Armagh, viz, 35.1 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 148 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 2; enteric fever, 7, and whooping cough, 3.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended October 17 correspond to an annual rate of 17.9 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,518,347. The lowest mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 13.5, and the highest in Dundee, viz, 20.3 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 523, including measles, 5; scarlet fever, 10; diphtheria, 3, and whooping cough, 7.

UNITED STATES OF COLOMBIA—Barranquilla.—Month of September, 1896. Estimated population, 40,000. Total deaths, 67. No deaths from contagious diseases.

West Indies—Guadaloupe—Pointe à Pitre.—Four days ended October 4, 1896. Estimated population, 18,500. Total deaths, 15. Three cases and 2 deaths from yellow fever are reported from Barre Terre, 30 miles from Pointe à Pitre.
