Health Technology Recommendations Assist Coverage Decisions

Evaluations of the safety, effectiveness, and use of a number of new or unestablished medical technologies considered for Medicare coverage are now available from the Public Health Service.

Health Technology Assessment Reports detail findings from analyses undertaken at the request of the agency which administers the Medicare Program, the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), of the Department of Health and Human Services. The analyses are performed by the National Center for Health Services Research and Health Care Technology Assessment, part of the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Health.

The assessments reflect a review of medical literature concerning the technologies and information from consumers, manufacturers, trade organizations, and the biomedical community. The assessments become available after HCFA issues its decision on whether a specific technology will be covered by Medicare.

Recent reports cover fully automated ambulatory blood pressure monitoring of hypertension, cochlear implant devices for the profoundly hearing impaired, continuous positive airway pressure for the treatment of obstructive sleep apnea in adults, single photon absorptiometry for measuring bone mineral density, hemoperfusion in conjunction with deferoxamine for the treatment of aluminum toxicity or iron overload in patients with end-stage renal disease, and Angelchik anti-reflux prosthesis.
