□ The National Health Planning and Resources Development Act is a vehicle that may help us arrive at a more rational means of planning for the delivery of responsive health services. The health systems agencies called for by the act will be responsible for developing a health services plan for areas with populations between 500,000 and 3 million, although there are some exceptions because of geography and political boundaries.

These agencies will review and approve applications for Federal dollars to support and develop health resources within that area. By setting up a locally oriented planning group and giving it authority to approve applications for Federal funds under the auspices of the plan, we in the Health Resources Administration hope that local decisions about the health system of any particular area will be made on the basis of a realistic assessment of the need and the capabilities within that area. In addition, development funds may be made available to the area health systems agencies to be used in helping to achieve the objectives of their approved plans.

Women and Their Health. The National Center for Health Services Research and the University of California School of Nursing, San Francisco, are co-sponsoring a conference on "Women and Their Health; Research Implications for a New Era." The conference, open to the public, will be held August 1-2 in the university's Cole Hall.

Management courses for health and human services executives. The Executive Development Program, Department of Health Administration, School of Public Health, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, is offering mid-1975 management courses for health and human executives. Participants can register for a comprehensive module that will survey contemporary developments in the management and policy areas of health and other human services or for a comprehensive workshop module that will permit in-depth exploration of key management issues.

Laboratory biohazard and injury control courses. Four courses in biohazard and injury control in the biomedical laboratory will be offered throughout the United States in 1975. They are designed for senior-level biomedical laboratory technicians, especially those engaged in viral oncology research.

The first course, which includes a laboratory session as well as lectures and discussions, will be held on the University of Minnesota's Minneapolis campus June 3-6. Courses consisting of lectures and discussions will be held at La Jolla, Calif., Sept. 23-25; at Houston, Tex., Oct. 29-31; and at Bethesda, Md., Dec. 9-11. The faculty, selected from institutions throughout the United States, presents topics such as disinfection and sterilization, animal containment, personnel motivation, primary and secondary barriers, and control techniques for biological, chemical, and radiological hazards.

The course is tuition-free so that the student's laboratory pays only for travel and living expenses. Enrollment is limited.
