

Health Communications by Satellite

■ A collaboration between the governments of Canada and the United States will result in the launching of a Communications Technology Satellite (CTS) in December 1975. After several months of testing and adjustment, this satellite will be available 3 days a week to each country for experimental application to a variety of communications problems.

Acting as technical coordinator and facilitator on behalf of the health community, the Lister Hill National Center for Biomedical Communications of the National Library of Medicine has tentatively requested 9 hours per week for health-related applications of this unique communications system.

The satellite will be capable of blanketing the entire continental United States from its stationary position over the equator. It will have two movable "footprints," each of which can cover approximately one-third of the nation at a time. The satellite will permit bidirectional audiovisual connections between ground terminals.

The Lister Hill center plans to install several stationary ground stations at

hospitals and other appropriate facilities and to install at least one mobile station in a motor van. From these ground stations, it will be possible to interconnect with surface communications systems, thus expanding the potential audience.

Possible applications of the satellite to health are many, including public and professional education communication of research results, teleconferencing, and remote professional consultation. In all cases, uses of the system will be experimental. One important objective of the experiments will be to compare the efficiency and cost-effectiveness with alternative systems. Federal health agencies and their constituents in the private sector will be responsible for the choice and development of program content. Planning for utilization of the system is now in progress. Method to Test Toxic Effects Of Diethylstilbestrol On Unborn Animals

■Scientists at the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS), Research Triangle Park, N.C., have devised a method for testing the toxic effect of DES (diethylstilbestrol), a synthetic hormone, on unborn animals.

The latent appearance of previously rare genital tract tumors in young women whose mothers were given DES during gestation has recently been reported. During the 1950s and 1960s, a number of women who were having difficulties with their pregnancies were given the drug to keep them from aborting.

The NIEHS investigators, using mice in their experimental model, are trying to determine how and when damage to the offspring of DES-treated mothers occurs. The experiment should be useful in studying the factors associated with transplacental carcinogenesis, and it is hoped, may help investigators find predictive indicators of cancer.

Very early ovaries can be removed from unborn mice and grown in culture. Some of the ovaries are then traced through the normal process of development and studied to see how changes occur when there is no interference. Other fetal ovaries are exposed to DES in vitro to determine what changes in cell development occur.

In studies to date of live mice exposed to DES, visible abnormalities in the whole animal have been found. Their offspring appear to both grow normally and reach puberty normally. There is some evidence, however, that reproductive tract lesions may be produced in male as well as female offspring of mice following DES exposure during gestation. Work will continue to determine whether the male offspring of DEStreated mothers may be at risk.

Although DES generally has been discredited as a method for preventing abortion, it has been found to be an effective postcoital contraceptive and has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in emergencies. A proposed legislative moratorium on this use was opposed by Health, Education, and Welfare Secretary Caspar Weinberger.

Fellowships available in Sweden and Switzerland. The Swedish Medical Research Council and the Swiss National Science Foundation will each offer three research fellowships in 1976 to qualified biomedical scientists, the Fogarty International Center of the National Institutes of Health has announced. The 1-year fellowships will provide postdoctoral training in basic or clinical research.

Candidates for the grants must be American citizens, have been engaged in independent research at least 2 of the last 4 vears, present evidence of aptitude and promise in the basic sciences or clinical research, have an active interest in pursuing a health research career, and provide evidence of acceptance by a training institution and preceptor.

The recipients will be required to start their fellowships within 10 months of their late spring 1976 award. Stipends for the Swedish grants range from \$10,000 to \$13,-600 per year. The Swiss grants range from

\$9,533 to \$11,627 per year, plus \$1,560 for a spouse and \$470 for each child.
