The winners for an innovative single project:

- *The Connecticut Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition* for its "Diplomas before Diapers" project, a radio writing contest for junior and senior high school students. The project aims to get high school students thinking and talking to each other about the importance of graduation before taking on the responsibilities of parenthood.
- *The Lincoln (Nebraska) Council on Alcoholism and Drugs, Inc.* Lincoln's Fetal Alcohol Syndrome/Fetal Alcohol Effects Prevention Program aims to reduce the number of new cases of FAS/FAE, to assist those children and

families already affected, and to heighten public awareness about the effects of alcohol consumption during pregnancy.

The winner for coalition-building:

- *The South Carolina Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition.* More than 50 organizations compose the State Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition. Each member group has provided written commitment to a specific statewide Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies project. Nearly two-thirds of South Carolina's 46 counties also have active Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies networks. Each has identified local problems and needs

and is conducting educational programs to address the needs.

The competition for the 1986 awards will be announced through national members of the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition next June. Winners will be recognized at the 1986 Child Health Day celebration the following October in Washington, DC. The Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies National Coalition consists of nearly 70 national voluntary, governmental, and health professional organizations working together to improve maternal and infant health through public education programs. In addition, more than 40 States have Coalition chapters.

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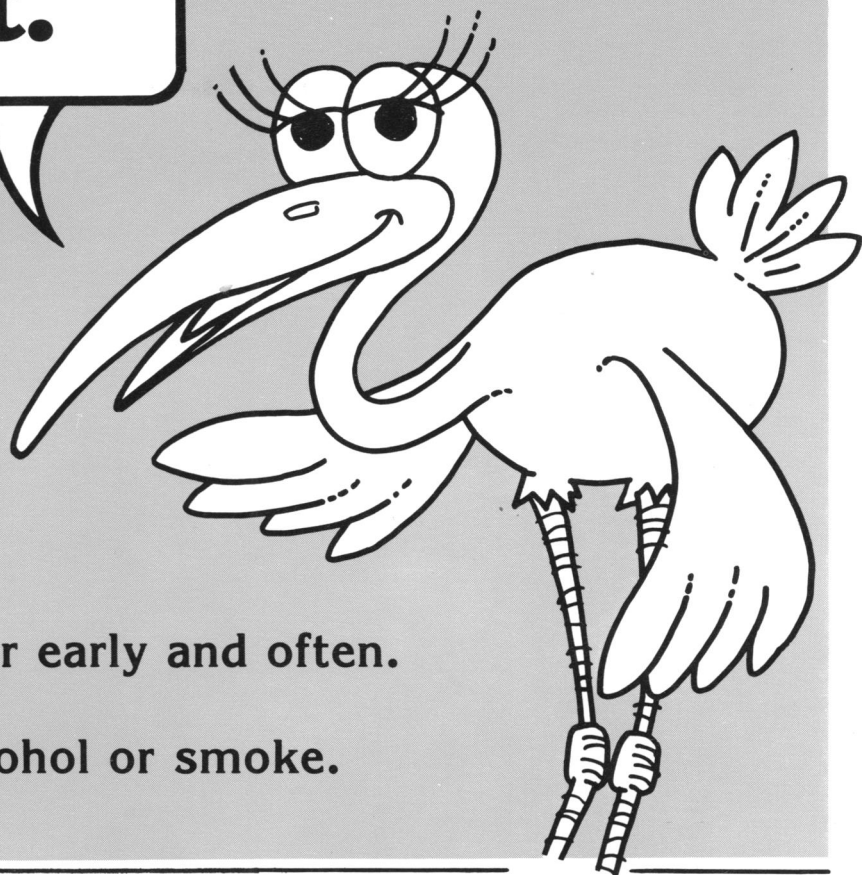
