Smallpox in Alabama.

MOBILE, ALA., December 22, 1897.

SIR: I have the honor to state that modified smallpox has existed at McGrews Shoals, on the Tombigbee River, where colored hands were working on Government dredging since September. The origin is claimed to have been from Pine Hill, in Wilcox County, Ala. At Salitpa, Clarke County, near there, there have been about 25 cases. Dr. Fleming, the Government physician, has just recovered from an attack. At Walker Springs, Clarke County, there have been 5 cases; at Glendon, 1 case. Near Carneys Bluff, 4 cases. All, except some of the cases at Salitpa, were colored persons.

As the 200 hands employed on the Government work have been discharged, it is probable that cases will occur in Clarke, Washington, Wilcox, Choctaw, Marengo, Monroe, and Mobile counties. The health officer of Clarke County and other physicians are actively vaccinating the colored population and isolating patients when found, but it will not be surprising if cases occur in this city and that the disease will assume more dangerous features as the weather becomes colder.

RIO DE JANEIRO, November 22, 1897.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for the week ended November 20, 1897:

There were 5 deaths from accesso pernicioso, the same as in the foregoing week; 1 from yellow fever, none in the foregoing week; 4 from smallpox, none in the foregoing week; 2 from beriberi, a decrease of 4; 46 from tuberculosis, a decrease of 15; none from whooping cough, 1 in the foregoing week, and 259 from all causes, a decrease of 27.

From the above, it appears that the health of the port and town is good, though it is getting late in the season. In fact, until this last

week, we have had no really hot days.

There were 7 deaths from accesso pernicioso, an increase of 2; none from yellow fever, 1 in the foregoing week; none from smallpox, 4 in the foregoing week; 3 from beriberi, an increase of 1; 2 from enteric fever, none in the foregoing week; 45 from tuberculosis, a decrease of 1, and 259 from all causes, the same as in the foregoing week.

I have never known this place as healthy and free from epidemics at

this time of the year as it is now.

CUBA.

Smallpox and yellow fever in Cuban seaports.

December 21: The United States consul at Cardenas reports that during the week ended December 18 there was in that city no death from yellow fever and no death from smallpox.

December 20: The United States consul at Sagua la Grande reports that during the week ended December 18 there were in that city many cases of yellow fever, but authorities refuse to give number of cases and deaths, and 27 cases and 3 deaths from smallpox.

December 18: The United States consul at Santiago de Cuba reports that during the week ended December 18, there were in that city no deaths from yellow fever, and no deaths from smallpox.

Sanitary reports from Santiago.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, December 11, 1897.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that the mortality for the week ended Saturday, December 11, was as follows:

Yellow fever, 1; dysentery, 5; tuberculosis, 7; enteritis, acute and chronic, 12; malarial fevers, 15; common diseases of noncontagious character, 27; making a total of 67 deaths in a population estimated to-day to be about 40,000 inhabitants.

Yellow fever has almost disappeared from the military hospital, but intestinal and pulmonary affections are on the increase, owing to bad nourishment and the fatigue of a tropical campaign. Among the civil population, malarial fevers, anæmia, dropsy, and hunger carry off the greater number.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, December 18, 1897.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that the mortality for the week was as follows:

Dysentery, 10; malarial fevers, 18; tuberculosis, 9; diarrhea, 14; dropsy, anæmia, and want, 37, making a total of 88 deaths for the week.

For the first time in many months no deaths from yellow fever have been reported and there are but few cases at the hospitals, and these of mild character. Dysentery is again increasing among the poorer classes owing to the lack of proper nourishment. Tuberculosis, anæmia, and dropsy, due to the same causes, are making many victims. The greater number in the mortality is found among the "concentrados" who have no means of earning their daily bread and have to rely on the charitable feelings of a poverty stricken community for the means of keeping body and soul together.

JAPAN.

Sanitary condition of Japan.

YOKOHAMA, December 8, 1897.

SIR: Although I am unable to forward my regular report of infectious disease in Japan by the present mail, I have the honor to inform you that the sanitary condition of the Empire remains practically unchanged since my return of November 8 to November 28, save that a few cases of plague have occurred at a comparatively unimportant port of Formosa, exact statistics of which are not to be obtained, and that the Japanese quarantine officials at Nagasaki, and other points more directly in communication with Formosa, have been, accordingly, notified to take all due precautions.

NICARAGUA.

Quarantine against New Orleans raised at San Juan del Norte.

SAN JUAN DEL NORTE, NICARAGUA, November 25, 1897.

SIR: Under date of November 16, 1897, our consular agent at Bluefields, Nicaragua, reports as follows:

"Quarantine is raised to-day. The steamship Fulton arrived from New Orleans this morning and the officers reported that new cases of yellow fever were decreasing in number and that deaths were few.

"Upon hearing this report, Dr. Pruett, the health physician at this port, deemed it unnecessary to further continue the quarantine at this place from either New Orleans or Mobile.

"An official order to the above effect will soon be promulgated by General Reyes, the inspector-general of this coast."

AUSTRALIA—New South Wales—Sydney.—Month of October, 1897. Estimated population, 410,000. Total deaths, 389, including enteric fever 5; diphtheria, 5, and scarlet fever, 2.

BAHAMAS—Dunmore Town.—Two weeks ended December 17. Estimated population, 1,472. No deaths.

Governors Harbor.—Week ended December 18. Estimated population, 1,500. No deaths.

Green Turtle Cay—Abaco.—Two weeks ended December 18. Estimated population, 3,900. No deaths.

FRANCE—Nantes.—Month of November, 1897. Estimated population, 125,757. Total deaths, 191, including enteric fever, 3.

Roubaix.—Month of November, 1897. Estimated population, 130,750. Total deaths, 191, including enteric fever, 3; diphtheria, 1; measles, 10, and whooping cough, 3.

Rouen.—Month of November, 1897. Estimated population, 112,657. Total deaths, 232, including diphtheria and croup, 1; enteric fever, 1, and phthisis pulmonalis, 1.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended December 11 correspond to an annual rate of 20.8 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,992,524. The highest rate was recorded in Norwich, viz, 34.1, and the lowest in Cardiff, viz, 14.4.

London.—One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 122; scarlet fever, 18; diphtheria, 58; whooping cough, 46; enteric fever, 14, and diarrhea and dysentery, 12. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 21.8 a thousand. In greater London 2,414 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 20.0 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 20 from diphtheria, 40 from measles, 4 from scarlet fever, and 7 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended December 13 in the 23 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.0 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Kilkenny, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Clonmel, viz, 39.0 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 171 deaths were registered, including enteric fever, 7, scarlet fever, 4, and diphtheria, 1.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended December 11 correspond to an annual rate of 20.2 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,549,907. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 16.8, and the highest in Perth, viz, 29.0 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 603, including scarlet fever, 12; diphtheria, 5; measles, 16, and whooping cough, 20.

INDIA—Singapore.—Month of October, 1897. Estimated population, 56,000. Total deaths, 175, including cholera, 23; beriberi, 119, and phthisis pulmonalis, 101.

Jamaica.—November 27 to December 4. Estimated population, 694,865. Total deaths not reported. Seven deaths from yellow fever.

Kingston.—Month of November, 1897. Estimated population, 34,314. Total deaths, 106, including diphtheria, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 13, and yellow fever, 13.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of September, 1897. Estimated population, 282,000. Total deaths, 478, including diphtheria, 10; enteric fever, 11; measles, 5; scarlet fever, 19; whooping cough, 11, and phthisis pulmonalis, 42.

St. Helena.—October 30 to November 20, inclusive. Estimated population, 3,600. One death. No death from contagious disease.
