## UNITED STATES.

[Reports to the Supervising Surgeon-General United States Marine-Hospital Service.]

Yellow fever in Mississippi.

(Continuation of report from June 23, contained in the preceding issue.)

June 24: No new cases reported.

June 25: The negro case, reported June 23, is the child of a woman who worked for one of the earlier cases. This case has been moved to a tent and the remainder of the family isolated in tents under guard, and the house burned. A hospital tent has been erected, 1 patient is there; suspects are isolated in tents, and many negroes will go to the detention camp which will be established in a few days. One new case in town, developed Thursday, moved to tent and premises disinfected; only 1 person exposed and that one was immune. One case in the country 4 miles out, developed Sunday; house will be disinfected Monday.

June 26: No new cases.

June 27: Passed Assistant Surgeon Geddings instructed to open a small detention camp at McHenry. No new cases.

June 28: Three cases under treatment. One suspect isolated in tent. No new foci. Investigation of a death at Biloxi, which had aroused suspicion, proved it to have occurred from malaria. The town of Gulfport reported clean.

June 29: One new case, the suspect reported yesterday. One known focus in town, which as soon as patients recover will be obliterated.

Refugee camp established one mile from town and contains about sixty refugees. Thirty-eight refugees left for Fontainbleau.

June 30: No new cases; 5 under treatment; 1 focus. Local refugee camp has 21 immates. Eucuta released to-day; all well.

Brig Amapala, war prize, remanded for disinfection to Tampa Bay quarantine.

The following telegram was received on the 25th instant from the medical officer in command U. S. Marine-Hospital Service, Key West, Fla.:

Brig Amapala arrived, war prize, twenty-four hours from Habana, where she has lain two months. Crew of 32, about 30 passengers, many children, much bedding and baggage. \* \* \* Vessel now in the jurisdiction of the U.S. court. \* \* \*

This vessel was ordered to Tampa Bay quarantine for disinfection on June 27, 1898.

## Smallpox at Fredonia, N. Y.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 23, 1898.

SIR: At the urgent request of the local board of health of Fredonia, N. Y., I visited that village yesterday to determine whether a number

of suspected cases of smallpox were genuine.

On inspection, I found 16 well developed cases of this disease and no precautions having been taken, it will not be surprising if this number is doubled within a few days, as a great many of the inhabitants of the village and vicinity have been exposed.

At my suggestion, the local board of health has taken steps to pre-

vent the spread of the disease.

The case of smallpox which we had in this city was discharged from the quarantine hospital on the 18th instant, all danger of contagion

being past.

Report of smallpox on the steamship Roumanian en route.

Under date of June 25 the following telegram was received from Passed Assistant Surgeon G. B. Young, U. S. Marine-Hospital Service, in command of Delaware Breakwater Quarantine Station:

Roumanian arrived; no passengers; 1 very mild case of rubeola. Reported that they had landed passengers at Liverpool with smallpox; the bill of health shows that she left smallpox suspect (steerage passenger's infant) at Halifax. \* \* \* Unless you disapprove, will allow vessel to proceed to Reedy Island for vaccination.

In accordance with the above, the vessel was allowed to proceed to Reedy Island Quarantine Station.

REEDY ISLAND QUARANTINE, June 26, 1898.

SIR: I have the honor to report that the steamship Roumanian, from Glasgow via Liverpool, St. Johns, and Halifax, arrived to day, and has been passed. She had 1 man aboard convalescent from what was, apparently, measles; certainly not smallpox; all others well. I inclose a copy of the certificate issued by the quarantine medical officer at Halifax relative to the case of illness removed at that point, which he states was not, in his opinion, smallpox.

HALIFAX, June 22, 1898.

This is to certify that the steamship Roumanian from Liverpool via Johns, Newfoundland, arrived to-day. One young child, steerage passenger, had some signs of disease (skin eruption) being developed. I am not sure as to the nature of the eruption, but think it is not smallpox. I have decided, however, to remove all the steerage passengers, 21 in number, to the quarantine station and disinfect their luggage and keep the people under observation for a few days. The ship's hospital and places occupied by these passengers have been cleansed and fumigated. The doctor of the ship promises to continue the work thoroughly.

REIDSVILLE, N. C., June 30, 1898.—One case of smallpox here, isolated and guarded. All known suspects isolated and vaccinated. Will advise with authorities.—Wertenbaker, Passed Assistant Surgeon, U. S. M. H. S.

## Smallpox reported at Boulder, Colo.

DENVER, Colo., June 24, 1898.

SIR: In compliance with the agreement embodied in resolution adopted by the conference of State boards of health respecting interstate notification of the occurrence of certain communicable diseases, you are hereby notified that 4 cases of smallpox have been reported to this office as existing near Boulder, Boulder County, this State. The origin of the disease is probably Old Mexico and local exposure. The precautions taken are quarantine and vaccination.

## Reports of States and yearly and monthly reports of cities.

Iowa—Dubuque.—Month of May, 1898. Population, 45,000. Total number of deaths, 35, including enteric fever, 2; whooping cough, 2, and phthisis pulmonalis, 5.

MAINE—Portland. Four weeks ended June 11, 1898. Estimated population, 41,500. Total number of deaths, 45, including diphtheria, 2; enteric fever, 2; whooping cough, 1, and phthisis pulmonalis, 1.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended June 18, 1898, from 85 observers, indicate that dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, inflammation of kidney, pleuritis, diarrhea, erysipelas, and measles increased, and intermittent fever and remittent fever decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present at 174, measles at 59, diphtheria at 27, enteric fever at 20, scarlet fever at 19, and whooping cough at 18 places.

MINNESOTA—St. Paul.—Month of May, 1898. Estimated population, 215,582. Total number of deaths, 184, including diphtheria, 2; enteric fever, 6; measles, 6; scarlet fever, 3, and phthisis pulmonalis, 24.

MISSOURI—Kansas City.—Month of May, 1898. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 193, including diphtheria, 1; measles, 3, and phthisis pulmonalis, 5.

### BRAZIL.

Sanitary reports from Rio-Yellow fever at Rio, Santos, and interior towns.

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 24, 1898.

SIR: I have the honor to forward to you official report for the week

ended May 13:

There were 368 deaths from all causes, a decrease of 5, as compared with the foregoing week; 23 deaths from accesso pernicioso, an increase of 5; 53 deaths from yellow fever, an increase of 1; 7 deaths from typhoid fever, an increase of 3; 14 deaths from beriberi, an increase of 6, and 45 deaths from tuberculosis, a decrease of 14.

Information.—The cooler weather continues and an improvement in the general state of health is noticeable, especially as regards the decrease of yellow fever. We had, during the last few days, a copious rainfall, which vouchsafed to us a further improvement of the sanitary

conditions.

What I could learn in regard to yellow fever in Santos, justifies the assertion that its ravages were severer there lately than heretofore. In the interior of the State of Sao Paulo, in the mountain city of Sao Carlos de Pinhal, the yellow fever epidemic continues to an astonishing and certainly unprecedented degree.

With the beginning of the cooler season there has been an increase of smallpox in the city of Sao Paulo. During the month of April the

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 1, 1898.

SIR: I have the honor to forward to you the official report for the

week ended May 20.

There were 342 deaths from all causes, a decrease of 26, as compared with the foregoing week. Sixteen deaths from accesso pernicioso, a decrease of 7; 33 deaths from yellow fever, a decrease of 20; 2 deaths from typhoid fever, a decrease of 5; 1 death from whooping cough, none before; 10 deaths from beriberi, a decrease of 4, and 57 deaths from tuberculosis, an increase of 12.

There occurred during the week ended May 27, 386 deaths from all causes, 10 deaths from accesso pernicioso, 37 deaths from yellow fever,

7 deaths from beriberi, and 29 deaths from different fevers.

Although the better and more agreeable climatical conditions continue and the general state of health shows an improvement, the number of deaths remain about as before. In regard to yellow fever, the number of cases has diminished, but not the number of deaths, consequently the mortality is greater among those who fall sick late in the season.

From the report of the delegate of hygiene at Campos, I take some

notices concerning the first three months of this year.

Campos is a city of the State of Rio de Janeiro, with about 40,000 inhabitants, and distant from the city of Rio de Janeiro about twelve hours, railway journey. It is the center of relatively considerable industry, of which that of sugar is the most important. The city is situated on the Parahyba, shortly above its mouth. Along its lower course the river often overflows and thereby transforms the country into marshes that become the seat of malaria. Also in Campos and its surroundings this sickness is very common. Of 314 deaths in the city, 62 were caused by malarial infection, of which 15 were accesso pernicioso, 7 febris remittens typhoidea, 6 febris remittens biliosa, and 6 febris remittens palustris.

In Campos some sporadic cases of yellow fever occurred spread by

people coming from Rio de Janeiro.

In the surroundings of Campos, at Sao Gonçalo, the following happened: A man, returning from a voyage only a short time before, became ill, then 6 members of his family and 3 other persons became ill. Of these 9 persons 8 died. The physicians entertained the positive opinion that the sickness was yellow fever. From all experience yellow fever is not transportable from person to person, but if the germ finds favorable conditions to its development, then it may also produce a further infection. So it probably happened in the above-mentioned case. On the other hand, there are countries that from all experience have an immunity to yellow fever, where the conditions to its development do not exist. Such a locality is the city of Petropolis, in the neighborhood of Rio de Janeiro, the seat of the diplomatic world and the place of refuge for the better situated people of Rio. Single cases of yellow fever, spread from Rio, will be also observed, but never an epidemical extension. Vaccinations have not been executed at Campos, because the inhabitants oppose that prophylactical measure.

Since last report the following-named ships have been inspected and received bills of health from this office: May 27, barkentine *Doris*, American, for Baltimore. May 28, steamship *Bellena*, British, for New York; schooner *Roland*, German, for Port Eads. May 30, schooner *Brunhilde*, British, for New York; bark *Normandy*, American,

for Portland.

Brazil—Ceara.—Month of May, 1898. Estimated population, 50,000. Total number of deaths, 138.

FRANCE—Roubaix.—Month of May, 1898. Estimated population, 125,131. Total number of deaths, 189, including diphtheria, 2; enteric fever, 2; measles, 6, and whooping cough, 1.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended June 11 correspond to an annual rate of 16.9 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 11,218,378. The highest rate was recorded in New Castle on Tyne, viz, 24.1, and the lowest in Croydon, viz, 8.4.

London.—One thousand four hundred and eleven deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 74; scarlet fever, 10; diphtheria, 23; whooping cough, 51; enteric fever, 4, and diarrhea and dysentery, 22. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.3 a thousand. In greater London 1,840 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 15.0 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 20 from measles, 11 from diphtheria, 4 from scarlet fever, and 18 from whooping cough.

Sunderland.—Two weeks ended June 4, 1898. Estimated population, 143,849. Total number of deaths, 141, including diphtheria, 1; enteric fever, 1; measles, 1; scarlet fever, 1, and whooping cough, 4.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended June 11 in the 23 principal town districts of Ireland was 23.9 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Carrickfergus, viz, 7.3, and the highest in Lisburn, viz, 38.3 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 168 deaths were registered, including enteric fever, 1, and whooping cough, 2.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended June 11 correspond to an annual rate of 21.3 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,568,536. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 11.6, and the highest in Dundee, viz, 24.0 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 642, including measles, 42; scarlet fever, 4; diphtheria, 1, and whooping cough, 43.

GUIANA—Parimaribo.—Month of May, 1898. Estimated population, 30,535. Total number of deaths, 71. No deaths from contagious disease.

JAMAICA.—Four weeks ended June 4, 1898. Estimated population, 694,865. Total deaths not reported. The deaths included enteric fever, 3, and whooping cough, 1.

Kingston.—Month of May, 1898. Estimated population, 34,314,
