Yellow fever in Key West, Fla.

SEPTEMBER 2, 1899.

Thursday afternoon, August 31, word was received from Assistant Surgeon McAdam, marine hospital, Key West, Fla., that Dr. Sweeting, the State quarantine officer, reported 2 cases of yellow fever in the city and several suspicious cases.

September 1 (Friday), Dr. McAdam wires that 2 more suspicious cases developed last night at the hotel at Key West, and the inmates were quarantined. Last night he reported 4 new cases in different parts of the city, 1 moribund, and a number of suspicious cases.

Immediately on receiving the information, late Thursday afternoon, Dr. McAdam was directed by wire to see that the Treasury regulations were enforced in Key West, and to prepare a list of people who had left Key West within the last two weeks; made the same request of the Plant Line of steamers on the west coast of Florida and the Flagler Line on the east coast. As soon as these names are received the authorities at the places of destination will be notified in order that persons from Key West may be kept under observation for ten days. There should be no alarm caused by this measure, which is simply one of precaution.

The same evening the Surgeon-General had a conference with the representatives of the Plant Line steamers in Washington and they agreed to take no passengers at all from Key West. He also wired the president of the Flagler Line at St. Augustine, notifying him that the vessel which usually leaves Friday night for Key West should not be allowed to go,

as the quarantine regulations would require disinfection and detention of the vessel on her return. Arrangements will be provided for delivering mails and necessary supplies to Key West on floats some distance from the shore.

The same night that he received the information (Thursday) The Surgeon-General notified all the quarantine officers of the South. He wired also State Health Officer Porter at Jacksonville for information as to what measures had been taken by the State authorities. In the meantime word was received from Assistant Surgeon McAdam, at Key West, that all possible precautions had been taken.

As it was deemed necessary to have an expert in Key West, Surgeon Carter, at Havana, was directed to proceed there for temporary duty. He immediately obtained a tugboat, and announced his arrival at Key West this (Saturday) morning at 2 o'clock. P. A. Surg. M. J. Rosenau takes his place temporarily at Havana.

September 2: Assistant Surgeon McAdam reports as follows: "One death last night, no new cases reported this morning. Surgeon Carter has advised regarding list of persons having left recently. Am canvassing hotels and boarding houses."

An agreement has been arrived at with the Navy Department by which some 60 marines and naval employees will be taken on board a naval vessel to Portsmouth, N. H.

The removal of the troops at Key West has been ordered by the War Department, but no information has yet been received as to the details. Surgeon Carter reports that the troops have been isolated and quarantined in their barracks since the first report of yellow fever. In the meantime preparations are being made to open the detention camp recently removed from Egmont Key to Mullet Key. It may not be necessary to utilize this camp, but preparations are nevertheless being made. Assistant Surgeon Corput is in charge of the camp on Mullet Key, and has Assistant Surgeon Trotter with him. Dr. Geo. A. Sheldon, an immune, has been ordered from Mobile to report at the camp. Hospital Steward Peck has been detached from duty at Hampton and directed to proceed to the detention camp at Mullet Key. Surg. G. M. Magruder has been ordered from Memphis, Tenn., to Port Tampa, Fla., to supervise the operations of the Service from that point. Acting Assistant Surgeon Atree, of Tampa City, in the meantime is meeting vessels arriving at Port Tampa and keeping close watch on all communication from Key West. P. A. Surg. W. G. Simpson has been ordered from Old Point to Miami, Fla., to represent the Service on the east coast.

The State health officer telegraphs, September 2—

Detention camps for nonimmunes from Key West at Tampa Bay and Miami wanted and will be appreciated. From advices, judge infection is very general over Key West, and proper method to check and stamp out is indicated by thorough depopulation of nonimmunes.

Can you assist in effecting? Think can provide temporarily for Miami by river steamer accommodating 36, on which new disinfecting plant is located, if you will help out in maintenance. Think island should be patrolled by water to prevent emigration of suspects to neighboring keys and mainland. I have no boat, *Germ* sold. Will arrive at Key West to-morrow afternoon.

Assistant Surgeon McAdam reports that the tugs *Nezinscot* for Port Royal and *Potomac* for Portsmouth, N. H., left last night with most of the force from the naval station. Small launch left for Elliots Key this morning with 6 or 7 passengers. Four schooners in the past ten days have gone to the mainland; probably only immunes on board. List of departures agrees with steamship companies' lists so far as determined.

The quarantine officer at Port Royal, S. C., is informed that the tug *Nezinscot*, which left Key West last night for Port Royal with part of force from naval station, Key West, should be quarantined.

September 5: The quarantine officer at Port Royal is directed to remand the *Nezinscot* to South Atlantic Quarantine.

September 3: Deputy Collector of Customs Barr is telegraphed as follows:

Passed Assistant Surgeon Stimpson will reach Miami to-morrow. Kindly give him all assistance possible. Look out for people from Elliots Key. Launch left Key West yesterday morning for this key with 6 or 7 passengers. They should be detained.

Deputy Collector of Customs Barr reports from Miami, Fla., that State Health Officer Jackson is carefully watching the situation. That launch was dispatched this morning by the latter to catch passengers to Elliots Key and that he is acting with the custom-house vigilantly.

Dr. Porter is telegraphed as follows:

Detention camp on Mullet Key will be ready in two or three days. Possibly, Tortugas might be used as detention camp. Will wire definitely concerning this later. Regarding subsistence for detention steamer at Miami, can not make expenditures except through Service officer.

Surgeon Carter is directed to wire details of boat patrol, and what vessels were in use.

September 4: Recommend Tortugas for camp for four weeks service. Put on water guard early yesterday morning, Sweating concurring. Chartered 2 launches, perfected to-day by adding a schooner. Porter asks me to continue it. [I] recommend it, and do so pending action of Bureau. Schooner with boats anchored in Man-of-War Harbor—launches in other channels—no egress without pratique. For this need navy launch and *Gamma*. *Dora* needed if available.

Surgeon Carter is informed that Tortugas would be opened as detention camp—that arrangements were being made with the Plant Line to transport equipage from Mullet direct to Tortugas for one hundred people.

Assistant Surgeon Corput at Mullet Key is directed to ship by to-

night's boat to Clarke at Tortugas, tentage and floors, outfits, including bedding, cooking and dining room utensils for one hundred people. Steward Peck to assist. Arrangements made with Plant Line to transfer material.

Assistant Surgeon Fricks' orders to New Orleans revoked and he is to proceed to Key West and report to McAdam.

The State health office of Florida is informed that all preparations have been made for opening Tortugas as a detention camp, which is thought sufficient for egress from Key West; that arrangements are being made for revenue cutter and navy launches; the tug *Neminscot* can be obtained after her arrival at Port Royal, and the patrol instituted by Carter will be continued.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Sheldon is ordered to Tortugas. Passed Assistant Surgeon Smith is ordered from Hampton, Va., to Tortugas to take charge of the detention camp. Surgeon Carter reports to date (night of 4th) 28 cases and 3 deaths from yellow fever at Key West.

September 5: Surgeon Carter reports to date 50 cases and 6 deaths.

September 5: Passed Assistant Surgeon Stimpson reports a mild case of yellow fever at Miami in the person of a refugee from Key West. The case has been isolated five days, and all precautions taken against the spread of the disease.

September 6: Surgeon Carter reports to date 64 cases and 6 deaths.

Surgeon Carter is telegraphed as follows:

Papers state Porter wired State board, Jacksonville, to direct various State quarantine officers to redisinfect all vessels coming from Government quarantine stations. Wire meaning of this.

Surgeon Carter replies:

Porter says measure taken as temporary expedient to prevent panic and distrust believed imminent at Pensacola. No distrust felt and none intended by him. He sees and agrees to this. Authorizes you to use this to health officials. Asks not to publish it.

September 7: Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports the arrival of the *Nezinscot* at South Atlantic Quarantine, via Port Royal, with 21 men on board, five days out from Key West—all well. Held for disinfection. Assistant Surgeon McAdam reports to date, 96 cases and 7 deaths.

September 8: Assistant Surgeon Clarke telegraphs that the detention camp at Tortugas is ready for occupation.

Yellow fever in New Orleans.

September 8: Dr. Edmond Souchon, president of the Louisiana State board of health, reports as follows: "One new case, mild, making third only. Isolated and under control. Second case convalescent. Returns from 75 physicians show no other case. Inspection continues. State board was in session to-day—parish members present. Decided quarantine not necessary."

YELLOW FEVER IN THE NATIONAL SOLDIERS' HOME, NEAR HAMPTON, VA.

[Continued from last PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.]

September 1: Surgeon Vickery telegraphs that the hospital patients have been moved to tents; the building is being disinfected, and the last fever case discharged.

September 3: Assistant Surgeon Von Ezdorf reports: Inspected all sick; found no suspicious cases. Medical inspection of all inmates of Home this morning showed general health excellent. Disinfection complete in 23 buildings of 2,590,000 cubic feet. Hospital requires bichloriding of floors of rooms; fumigated. About 400 men in tents.

September 5: The health officers in the vicinity of Hampton are informed that limited egress will be allowed from the Soldiers' Home on the 7th instant, and all restrictions will be removed on the 9th. Ingress prohibited until the 15th. In accordance with this, Assistant Surgeon Von Ezdorf at Hampton is directed to remove guards on the 9th at 6 p. m., and to pass a limited number of Home officers and employees as early as Thursday on governor's request. He, the governor, agrees to prevent visitors entering the Home till the 15th, and limit same later. Von Ezdorf is ordered to confer with the governor.

Yellow fever on the schooner Anna M. Stammer.

GULF QUARANTINE STATION, *August 26, 1899.*

SIR: Confirming my telegram of the 21st instant, I have the honor to report that 2 of the crew of the schooner *Anna M. Stammer* were taken ill with yellow fever about five days after leaving Havana. Upon arrival here, seven days later, 1 case, a boy of 18 years, had recovered, and showed no sign of having been ill, except a slow pulse—42 to the minute. This, with the history given and the presence of the second case, made the diagnosis quite certain in case No. 1. Case No. 2 was in a hopeless condition upon his arrival. I found him in the lazaretto, where he had been during the preceding night, delirious, with deeply congested and mottled skin. He died the following day. The necropsy confirmed the diagnosis.

The other case, taken ill the evening before arrival, is doing well. Albumen appeared in the urine on the third day, yesterday, and is somewhat increased this morning. The vessel has been thoroughly treated, and no new case has thus far developed.

PORTO RICO.

*Sanitary report from Ponce—The storm.*PONCE, PORTO RICO, *August 19, 1899.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the weekly quarantine and abstract of bills of health reports for the week ended August 19; also mortality statistics for the two weeks ended August 12. This I should have sent last week. It was not possible to get it before, as the building occupied by the municipal judge was damaged by the hurricane, and he had to move his office to another house. His work was kept back and he could not send us the statistics at the usual time. By some only 138 deaths by drowning are reported up to August 12, but the judge himself thinks the number will reach 700 in the district of Ponce. The hurricane has caused immense damage to all the island in lives as well as in the general business.

As yet public health has not suffered. There are no cases of conta-

gious diseases reported. The sanitary condition of Ponce is so far good. Nothing of interest has occurred during the week among the shipping.

Dr. Lavinder, officer in command of this office, was taken to the military hospital. He is better.

Quarantine of United States transport Kilpatrick.

SAN JUAN, PORTO RICA, August 21, 1899.

SIR: I have the honor to report the arrival of the United States transport *Kilpatrick* direct from Havana, Cienfuegos, and Matanzas. After a careful inspection of vessel, passengers, and crew, I placed this transport in quarantine and addressed a letter to the adjutant-general of this department (copy inclosed), stating the situation.

In an interview with the governor-general the same day, I suggested loading the vessel in quarantine, which General Davis favored, but the chief quartermaster considered it difficult and dangerous to handle 500 horses and mules on lighters.

The next morning's inspection did not alter the situation, the sanitary condition of the vessel was bad, and she was accordingly ordered north for disinfection. The fact that this vessel had to be sent away

for disinfection shows the urgent need of at least one complete modern disinfecting barge for this island.

I inclose a copy of a cablegram received some time ago, stating that no more transports would be sent direct from Cuba.

SIR: Referring to my letter to you of yesterday, the 17th instant, announcing the arrival of the U. S. transport *Kilpatrick* from Havana, Cienfuegos, and Matanzas, Cuba, and the placing of the vessel in observation quarantine, I have the honor to make this additional report.

Upon boarding this vessel yesterday morning and examining the ship's papers, I was informed that there were 4 cabin passengers and 16 steerage passengers. I then directed a muster of the crew and passengers for inspection. Dr. del Valle and myself found the crew well, but we ascertained that there were 8 cabin and 29 steerage passengers.

In the muster line of the latter we found 1 man sick, a teamster from Matanzas, who had not reported to nor had been seen by the ship's surgeon. Careful inquiry elicited the fact that some days ago he had bilious vomiting a number of times during the night. I directed that his temperature be taken, which showed a half degree above normal. Last night the temperature was 102° F., and this morning normal. Going farther back, the patient informed me that another teamster, a companion, had a spell of fever lasting five days, the latter part of July, in their camp at Matanzas.

The points in the present case are these: First, the total want of a clinical history in a case of sickness coming from a suspected port; second, the patient's tongue is not malarial in appearance, but is clean and red, the sclerotics have a slight yellowish tinge; there is that slight hue of the face toward the ææ of the nose, and most positively the patient's debility is at total variance with the small amount of fever present yesterday.

A test of the urine this morning showed no albumen. The whole history and appearance of the man indicate that he may have passed through a mild attack of yellow fever, from which he is now convalescing.

Taking all the facts into consideration, that the vessel comes directly from suspected and infected ports, having a note upon the Havana bill of health, stating that there were 8 cases and 2 deaths of yellow fever and the disease increasing in that port, it is considered a grave danger to admit this vessel to free pratique.

As there is no disinfecting apparatus provided at this station for the treatment of infected vessels, and because of the difficulty of loading this vessel in quarantine, the patient and his effects should be removed to the quarantine station, and the vessel ordered north without delay or communication with this port.

The Matanzas supplemental bill of health mentions 1 case of yellow fever at that place.

*Concerning the case of yellow fever at Port Limon.*PORT LIMON, COSTA RICA, *August 20, 1899.*

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that the case of yellow fever in the charity hospital of Port Limon, information of which was cabled to the Department on August 18, died the same day. This patient had been removed to the said charity hospital from the "cuartel" a few hours before death, and I had no knowledge of the case until I saw it in said hospital. When I first saw the patient he was fast merging into a stage of collapse, and excepting a pronounced and general icterus, with appreciable albuminuria, the other concomitant characteristics of the disease, although present, were in a modified degree. No clinical record of the case was obtainable, but as I regarded the evidence I had as sufficient, and my diagnosis of the case being in full accord with the hospital physician, I cabled as follows:

PORT LIMON, COSTA RICA, *August 18, 1899.*

SURGEON-GENERAL, *U. S. Marine-Hospital Service—Washington*—One yellow in Port Limon—CARSON.

My suggestion that a post-mortem be held was not favorably entertained.

Sanitary report from Nuevitas.

NUEVITAS, CUBA, August 25, 1899.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report for the seven days ended August 19, 1899:

Seven vessels arrived at this port during the week, and 7 bills of health were issued.

The city of Nuevitas is at present suffering severely from a water famine, there being practically no water in the town save that which is brought to it from a distance. This water comes almost entirely from 2 sources, from Principe, and from a small river, Rio Saramáguacan, about 5 miles southwest of the city. The Principe water is from a large spring in the neighborhood of that city, and is brought to Nuevitas by rail by the Quartermaster's Department, United States Army. This water is for the use of Government officers and employees, and is also distributed to the poor of the city. The river water is brought into town and sold at about 15 cents (Spanish) for 4 gallons.

The disinfecting house of the Service here was finished during the week, and the steam chamber is about ready for operation, though the fuel, and especially the water problem may delay the getting up of steam for some little time. I purpose using wood for the present as fuel, and until the rains begin, getting my water from the quartermaster.

The office of the Service has been temporarily located in the custom-house in very cramped and unsuitable quarters, but it is my intention to utilize a room in the new disinfecting house as soon as I can furnish and equip it properly.

The weather here is cool, very cool for Cuba, and but for the awful lack of water, Nuevitas would not be an unpleasant place.

I inclose herewith the mortuary report for the city for the period covered by this report.

SIR: I have the honor to make the following sanitary report of this city for the week ended August 19. There was a total of 24 deaths in the civil population, an increase of 9 over the previous week. The principal causes of death were as follows: Malarial fevers, 7; tuberculosis, 2; intestinal diseases, 3; heart disease, 4; cancer, 2; other causes, 6; total, 24. Population, 34,000. Mortality, 36.76 per 1,000.

During the same week there were no new cases of yellow fever and but 1 death. One case of fever appeared at Cristo, Maj. Russell B. Harrison. It is here that headquarters have been stationed since General Wood's return. This is the first case to appear there, though there has been free communication with the town.

One vessel was disinfected, the steamship *Maria Herrera*, bound for Santo Domingo and Porto Rican ports.

*Yellow fever on vessels at Vera Cruz.*VERA CRUZ, MEXICO, *August 22, 1899.*

SIR: I have the honor to report that the steamship *Mayo*, which is infected, will sail to-morrow for Mobile via Ship Island Quarantine. I had 4 cases of yellow fever brought ashore from this vessel and put in the hospital. Three cases were convalescent when the ship was ready for sea, but the fourth case was in the fourth day of the disease and left in the hospital. The convalescents, who were the 3 engineers, sail with the ship. The compartment of the engineers was fumigated and disinfected immediately after they were taken to the hospital, but the fourth case, a fireman, was infected and taken sick in the same compartment afterwards. I suggested to the captain to have the whole ship fumigated before leaving for the States, and upon application to the health authorities he was informed that it would take a ton of sulphur to do the job, and \$300. The captain reported to me the result of his conference with the local health authorities, and I suggested to him that it would be better for the vessel to proceed directly to Ship Island and undergo fumigation and detention there, than to remain here in an infected port where I could not vouch for the fumigation after it was through with.

The steamship *King Gruffydd*, another infected vessel, has not yet been disinfected, although I asked that it should be done four days ago. This morning I sent the captain 30 pounds of sulphur to disinfect the forecabin, and we will try to do our own disinfection. * * *

The condition in the shipping remains about the same, no new cases aboard for three days. The mortality in the city will be higher than last week.

SIR: I have the honor to make the following health report for the week ended August 24: Yellow fever, 19 cases, and 12 deaths; deaths from remittent fever, 2; pernicious fever, 4; tuberculosis, 7; from all causes, 58.

The shipping is clear of infection at present, all the infected vessels having sailed.

The passenger traffic to Havana continues large, and I am only issuing certificates to the immunes, and the nonimmunes from the noninfected interior.

I have just heard of a case of scarlet fever in Orizaba, that was brought from Jalapa. This case was reported by a physician who moved his family from Orizaba on account of the disease. Can hear of no case in or about Vera Cruz. * * *

CITY OF MEXICO, MEXICO, *August 24, 1899.*

SIR: In view of the fact that the yellow fever has spread to other towns than Vera Cruz, Cordova, and Tuxpan, viz, Amealca, Cinchapa, San Juan la Junta, San Lorenzo, San Geronimo, Hidalgo, Coatzacoalcos, and Tapona on the frontier of Chiapas and Cosaloapan, I have the honor to request that you direct the consuls under your office to confine their certification of passengers to residents of noninfected districts, and not to certify a passenger, even if he has remained in a noninfected locality ten days, unless it can be conclusively proven that no infected locality has been visited during the present season, or unless the fact that his baggage has not been disinfected be entered on said certificate for the information of the inspectors on the border. In cases where the least doubt exists, the Marine-Hospital Service inspectors at Laredo, El Paso, and Eagle Pass should be notified (collect) by wire.

ARABIA—*Aden*.—Month of June, 1899. Estimated population, 41,910. Total number of deaths, 124, including 61 from enteric fever.

ARGENTINA—*Buenos Ayres*.—Month of June, 1899. Estimated population, 800,000. Total number of deaths, 1,115, including diphtheria, 3; enteric fever, 11; measles, 3; scarlet fever, 9; smallpox, 1, and 8 from yellow fever.

AUSTRALIA—*Victoria*.—Two weeks ended July 22, 1899. Estimated population, 1,140,405. Number of deaths not reported. Six deaths from diphtheria, and 4 from enteric fever reported.

BERMUDA—*Hamilton*.—Two weeks ended August 22, 1899. Census population, 1,503. No deaths and no contagious diseases reported.

St. Georges.—Two weeks ended August 19, 1899. Estimated population, 2,150. No deaths and no contagious diseases reported.

BRAZIL—*Ceara*.—Month of July, 1899. Estimated population, 50,000. Total number of deaths, 116, including 14 from measles.

BRITISH WEST INDIES—*Antigua*—*St. John*.—Four weeks ended August 19, 1899. Estimated population, 15,000. Total number of deaths, 76, including 1 from enteric fever.

CANADA—*Ontario*—*Amherstburg*.—Two weeks ended August 26, 1899. Estimated population, 2,300. No deaths, and no contagious diseases reported.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended August 19, 1899, correspond to an annual rate of 25.7 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 11,404,408. The highest rate was recorded in Burnley, viz, 38.3, and the lowest in Halifax, viz, 12.8.

London.—Two thousand two hundred and eight deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 48; scarlet fever, 8; diphtheria, 33; whooping cough, 28; enteric fever, 11; diarrhea and dysentery, 481, and 16 from cholera and choleraic diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 25.3 a thousand. In Greater London 3,187 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 25.2 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 13 from diphtheria, 12 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 323 from diarrhea, and 19 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended August 19, 1899, in the 22 principal town districts of Ireland was 25.0 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,053,188. The lowest rate was recorded in Newry, viz, 10.1, and the highest in Dublin, viz, 31.2 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 234 deaths were registered, including enteric fever, 1; measles, 10, diphtheria, 1, and whooping cough, 7.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 19, 1899, correspond to an annual rate of 19.3 a

thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,587,414. The lowest mortality was recorded in Aberdeen, viz, 13.5, and the highest in Perth, viz, 25.4 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 546, including diphtheria, 2; measles, 17; scarlet fever, 6, and whooping cough, 10.

HAITI—*Port au Prince*.—Six weeks ended August 14, 1899. Estimated population, 60,000. Total number of deaths, 98. No contagious diseases reported.

ITALY—*Naples*.—Three weeks ended May 20, 1899. Estimated population, 566,836. Total number of deaths, 687, including diphtheria, 5; enteric fever, 4, and 72 from phthisis pulmonalis.

JAMAICA.—Week ended August 12, 1899. Estimated population, 694,866. Two deaths from enteric fever reported.

KINGSTON.—Two weeks ended August 12, 1899. Estimated population, 34,314. No deaths and no contagious diseases reported.

NEW SOUTH WALES—*New Castle*.—Three months ended August 1, 1899. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 53, including enteric fever, 2, and 1 from whooping cough.

NORFOLK ISLAND.—Month of June, 1899. Estimated population, 846. No deaths and no contagious diseases reported.

RUSSIA—*Odessa*.—Month of June, 1899. Estimated population, 400,600. Total number of deaths, 923, including diphtheria, 6; enteric fever, 3; measles, 31; scarlet fever, 6; smallpox, 4, and 80 from phthisis pulmonalis.

ST. HELENA.—Four weeks ended August 5, 1899. Estimated population, 4,300. Total number of deaths, 4. No contagious diseases reported.
