AFRICA.

No plague at Magude, Lourenço Marques.

LOURENÇO MARQUES, AFRICA, January 21, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to refer to my dispatch No. 218 of November 19, 1901, in relation to the plague, and to advise you that the secretary-general of Mozambique has just written to me as follows:

"In addition to the circular of this general office, No. 57 of November 18, last year, I have the honor to communicate to you by order of his excellency, counsellor government general, that seeing that there has not been a single case of plague in Magude since the 15th of last month, and considering that the sanitary service there is conducted in a manner to cause us not to expect to hear, in the future, of more cases of the plague, the board of health of the district of Lourenço Marques, at a meeting on the 8th instant, has decided to issue clean bills of health without any observations whatever."

CHINA.

Reports from Hongkong.

Hongkong, China, January 27, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the abstract of bills of health issued at this station during the week ended January 25, 1902. Nine vessels were inspected during the week, 536 individuals were bathed at the disinfecting station, and 560 bundles of clothing and bedding were disinfected by steam. There were 2 rejections because of fever. I also inclose under same cover a clipping from the Hongkong Daily Telegram, containing the recommendations of Professor Simpson, a sanitary expert from Calcutta, at present investigating the sanitary needs of the city at the instance of the local government, with reference to more successfully meeting the annual plague epidemic.

But 1 case of communicable disease was reported in the colony during

the week, a case of diphtheria occurring in the city of Victoria.

Thus far this year there has been but 1 case of plague with 1 death.

For the same period last year there were 7 cases and 7 deaths.

The mortality returns for the month of December, 1901, show 573 deaths from all causes, corresponding to an annual death rate of 23.2 per 1,000, excluding the army and navy. The death rate among the British and foreign population was 22.5 per 1,000, among the Chinese land population 23.4 per 1,000, and among the boat population 22 per 1,000. Of the total number of deaths, 3 were due to enteric fever. 1 to dengue, 14 to diarrhea, 4 to dysentery, and 2 to bubonic plague. Fiftynine were due to malaria, 38 to beriberi, 48 to general tuberculosis, 47 to bronchitis, 41 to pneumonia, and 70 to phthisis.

Plague at Shuitung.

CANTON, CHINA, January 23, 1902.

SIR: I learnt this morning that the bubonic plague has broken out at Shuitung, and considerably over 100 natives have already died of it. I promptly cabled you as follows:

SECRETARY OF STATE, Washington, D. C.: Over 100 deaths of plague at Shuitung, 250 miles south of Canton.—McWADE.

Shuitung is an unwalled town of about 30,000 inhabitants lying on an open bay just off the seacoast, and is about 250 miles to the south of Canton. It is the shipping center for the surrounding country, but has never yet been open to foreign traffic. Four steam launches carrying passengers and freight make regular trips between it and Canton. The plague works fearful havoc there every year and owing to the utter absence of sanitary arrangements of any kind, it has at least several thousand of victims annually. No reliable statistics of the mortality however, can be obtained from native official sources.

There are no cases of plague at Canton.

CIENFUEGOS, CUBA, March 3, 1902.

SIR: Through the chief quarantine officer for the island of Cuba, I have the honor to transmit the following report of the transactions in the district under my command, for the week ended March 1, 1902:

Eighteen deaths have occurred in this city. Of these, 2 occurred in the civil hospital. Causes of death as follows: Tuberculosis, 4; paludism, 2; sclerosis, arterial, 2; nephritis, 2; uræmia, 1; meningitis, 1; gastro-enteritis, 1; tetanus, infantile, 1; measles, 1; tetanus, 1; bronchitis, 1; hemorrhage, cerebral, 1. Death rate per 1,000 inhabitants, 23.46. Several cases of measles reported during past few days; am investigating and will report on same in next week's report. Thirteen vessels inspected and passed, granted pratique; 3 vessels boarded and passed; 2 vessels admitted without inspection; 19 bills of health issued vessels leaving this port, and 5 alien steerage passengers landed after inspection.

Casilda.—Acting Asst. Surg. A. Cantero reports 3 deaths in the city of Trinidad No contagious diseases reported. Ten vessels inspected and passed, granted pratique; 7 bills of health issued vessels leaving

that port, and no alien steerage passengers landed at that port.

Santa Cruz del Sur.—Acting Asst. Surg. P. M. Quevedo reports no deaths at that port during the week ended February 22, 1902. Seven vessels inspected and passed, granted pratique; 9 vessels given bills of health upon leaving that port, and no alien steerage passengers landed at that port.

Following is a recapitulation of the weekly reports of this district

transmitted during the month of February, 1902:

Cienfuegos.—Fifty-seven deaths have occurred in this city. Of these, 9 occurred in the civil hospital. Fifty-three vessels inspected and passed, granted free pratique; 6 vessels boarded and passed; 9 vessels admitted without inspection. One thousand five hundred and eighty members of crews of vessels inspected and passed; 557 passengers inspected and passed; 19 alien steerage passengers inspected and allowed to land; 60 bills of health issued vessels leaving this port.

Casilda.—Sixteen deaths in the city of Trinidad. No contagious diseases reported. Forty-four vessels inspected and passed, granted free pratique; 41 bills of health issued vessels leaving that port; no alien

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, February 24, 1902.

SIR: Through the chief quarantine officer for the island of Cuba, I have the honor to submit herewith the following report for the week ended February 15, 1902:

Santiago.—During this period there was a total of 20 deaths reported, making the annual rate of mortality for the week 24.18 per 1,000. The causes of death were the following: Fever, intermittent malarial, 2; tubercle of lungs, 3; cerebral congestion and hemorrhage, 1; mania, acute, 1; tetanus, 2; organic disease of the heart, 1; embolism, cerebral, 1; bronchitis, 1; diarrhea and enteritis (under 2 years), 1; abscess of the liver, 1; peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease, 2; gangrene, 1; diseases of early infancy, 1; ill-defined causes of death, 1. During the

week 7 vessels were inspected and passed on arrival, 6 vessels were passed without inspection, and 12 vessels received bills of health prior to leaving port. The provisional flag steamship *Julia* was disinfected prior to departure for Porto Rico. One immune and 44 nonimmune certificates were issued for passengers destined for Porto Rico. Forty-six pieces of baggage were disinfected by formaldehyd gas and 2 trunks were inspected and passed.

Manzanillo.—Acting Asst. Surg. R. de Socarras reports 4 deaths, due to the following causes: Fever, intermittent malarial, 1; cerebral congestion and hemorrhage, 1; diarrhea and enteritis (under 2 years), 1; suicide by firearms, 1. Annual rate of mortality for the week, 14.38 per 1,000. During the week 6 vessels were inspected and passed on arrival, 4 vessels were passed without inspection, and 8 vessels received bills of

health prior to leaving port.

Guantanamo.—Acting Asst. Surg. H. S. Caminero reports 9 deaths, the causes of which were as follows: Fever, intermittent malarial, 2; tubercle of lungs, 2; tetanus, 1; endocarditis, 1; organic diseases of the heart, 1; diarrhea and enteritis, 1; appendicitis, 1. AFRICA—Sierra Leone.—Three weeks ended February 7, 1902. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 58. No contagious diseases.

ARGENTINA—Buenos Ayres.—Month of December, 1901. Estimated population, 800,000. Total number of deaths, 1,232, including diphtheria, 16; enteric fever, 14; measles, 7; scarlet fever, 19; whooping cough, 9; smallpox, 86, and 154 from tuberculosis.

CANADA—Ontario—Hamilton.—Month of February, 1902. Estimated population, 52,550. Total number of deaths, 67, including diphtheria, 2; scarlet fever, 1, and 7 from tuberculosis.

Quebec—Sherbrooke.—Month of February, 1902. Estimated population, 12,000. Total number of deaths, 22, including enteric fever, 1, and 1 from scarlet fever.

France—St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended February 15, 1902. Estimated population, 146,559. Total number of deaths, 175, including diphtheria, 3; enteric fever, 1; measles, 1, and 27 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 75 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended February 15, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 22.6 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 14,862,003.

London.—Two thousand two hundred and seventy-seven deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 47; scarlet fever, 21; diphtheria, 32; whooping cough, 34; enteric fever, 13; smallpox, 54, and diarrhea and dysentery, 6. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 25.9 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,990 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 2 from diphtheria, 7 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, 5 from smallpox, and 5 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 15, 1902, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 25.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,092,322. The lowest rate was recorded in Drogheda, viz, 4.1, and the highest in Tralee, viz, 53.1 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 200 deaths were registered, including enteric fever, 2; measles, 3; scarlet fever, 2; whooping cough, 3, and 34 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended February 15, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 23.6 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,679,923. The lowest mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 12.5, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 25.2 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 761, including diphtheria, 3; measles, 12; scarlet fever, 3; smallpox, 2, and 20 from whooping cough.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of December, 1901. Estimated population, 282,000. Total number of deaths, 562, including diphtheria, 6; enteric fever, 17; measles, 5; scarlet fever, 36; whooping cough, 11; smallpox, 3, and 67 from phthisis pulmonalis.
