El Paso, Tex., May 24. 1902—Typhus fever at Cananen.—I have the honor to submit herewith summary of transactions at this station for the week ended May 24, 1902. Inspection Mexican Central Railroad passengers, 144; inspection Rio Grande and Pacific Railroad passengers, 15; inspection of immigrants, 105; disinfection of soiled linen imported for laundry, 482 pieces; disinfection of carload of cattle hides; vaccination of immigrants' children, 9. During the past week mining laborers coming from Mexico report a terrible scourge in the Cananea mining camps.

Disease similar to spotted fever is reported to be killing shop and office employees at the rate of 100 or more per month, and men attacked by the scourge die in less than three days. From what I can gather from different sources, I am of the opinion that the disease is pure typhus fever. Cananea is a mining camp of the Green Consolidated Copper Company. It is situated in the northeastern part of the State of Sonora. Mexico, and reached by a short railway line connecting with the Southern Pacific railway system at Benson, Ariz. This railway crosses the international boundary line at Naco. Cananea is possibly 150 miles from the boundary line and about 300 miles from El Paso, Tex. Like all great mining camps that suddenly spring into existence, where thousands of men gather and where no attention is given to systematic sanitary measures, in time epidemic diseases such as smallpox and typhus fever will eventually make their appearance. Passengers from the Cananea mining camp reach El Paso over the Southern Pacific Railroad.

Meningitis was reported present at 9, whooping cough at 17, diphtheria at 22, enteric fever at 38, measles at 61, scarlet fever at 74, smallpox at 87, and phthisis pulmonalis at 223 places.

Plague and cholera in Canton—Precautions against spread.

[No. 189.]

CANTON, CHINA, April 17, 1902.

SIR: In further continuation of my No. 184, regarding the spread of Asiatic cholera in Canton and vicinity, I have the honor to report as follows:

On Wednesday, April 16, 1902, I received the following report from

Dr. John M. Swan, the chief physician in charge of the American Medical Mission Hospital, Canton:

CANTON, CHINA, April 16, 1902.

SIR: In connection with our out-patient clinic to-day I obtained reliable information of a rather sudden outbreak of bubonic plague in a town of about 10,000 inhabitants located about 5 miles south from Canton and not far beyond what is known as the Macao Fort. Several tens of cases are occurring each day according to my informant, though he at first said 100 cases a day. My closer questioning brought the number he was certain of to probably 40 or 50. There is no question but in this town called Ping Chau plague is epidemic and of sudden and only recent appearance.

So far as I can learn on careful inquiry there is almost no plague here in the city of Canton at present. Cholera has also abated to a considerable extent, though there are still some cases occurring in Honam. Any further reliable information I can get in

this line I will forward to you promptly.

Acting on the foregoing information, I cabled to the Department as follows, duplicating the dispatch to Minister Conger at Peking:

SECRETARY OF STATE, Washington, D. C.: Bubonic plague epidemic Ping Chau, south of Canton. Several cases Canton. Cholera disappeared here, abating Honam.

McWade

We have had several heavy rains since my previous dispatch, with the result that the sewers and streets have been well flushed and the accumulated filth swept into the Canton river. The heavy rains also produced a decided amelioration in the cholera conditions, both in Canton, Honam, and Fati. It is feared, however, that we are on the eve of another visitation of bubonic plague. As this is what is known here as an "off" year, I do not anticipate a heavy mortality through that pestilence, neither do I expect it to be epidemic here. There are a number of towns on the southern seacoast and some large villages in the interior of Kwangtung and Kwangsi, which are visited by the plague every year, and on account of their filthy condition lose thousands of lives during this visitation. Recent reports from them are of a contradictory character.

Dr. W. J. W. Anderson, of the Wesleyan Mission, officially reported to me, this morning, that entire areas of large villages and market towns on the banks of the North river, near Shinkwanfu, are suffering terribly and have really been devastated by the ravages of small-pox and typhoid fever. He believes that the victims number *in toto* almost 1,000 per day. Shinkwanfu is about 300 miles from Canton and is reached by passenger junks, which occupy about a fortnight in making a single trip.

Dr. Anderson also reported that cholera and plague claim over 100 victims daily in Fatshan. Acting on his information I cabled to the Department as follows, transmitting a copy of my dispatch to Minister Conger:

SECRETARY OF STATE, Washington, D. C.: Whole villages banks North River vicinity Shinkwanfu devastated smallpox typhoid. Fatshan suffering cholera plague.— McWade.

The Hongkong Telegraph of April 9, 1902, published the following brief article, which is self explanatory:

Plague and cholera precautions in Canton.

For the last two days, the city has been filled with proclamations issued by the Nam Hoi and Pun U magistrates re the precautions to be taken against plague and cholera. The inhabitants are to have all their houses cleaned and disinfected, and no water is to be drunk unless properly boiled and diluted with certain medicinal acids. It appears

that the American consul in Canton is responsible for this matter, as we are informed that the Chinese officials were at a loss to know how to check the diseases and finally had recourse to the American consul, who advised them what to do.

The proclamations referred to in the foregoing newspaper article were issued jointly by the Nam Hoi and Pun U magistrates by the commands of H. E. Tao Mu, viceroy of the Two Kwangs, and in addition to being posted in the streets of Canton and Honam, were published in all the Chinese newspapers. I inclose clippings from two of the Chinese newspapers, the Achow Yat Po and the On Nga Shu Koh, containing the proclamations. I also inclose translations of the proclamations.

Proclamation issued for the prevention of cholera.

The ways of precaution against cholera must be firmly done and must not only be by speaking from the mouth.

Now, the Nam Hoi and Pun U magistrates have issued the following proclamation: We have jointly and respectfully received a communication from H. E., the Viceroy, reading as follows:

I am in receipt of a dispatch from the Hon. Robert M. McWade, United States consul at Canton, saying that the alarming prevalence of cholera in Canton, Honam, and vicinity induce me to suggest to your excellency the propriety of issuing a proclamation embodying the following rules for the better protection and safety of the lives of the natives and foreigners alike:

"All the streets, large and small, and all the drains should be thoroughly flushed with water from the river, and especially where animal matter and other refuse is usually allowed to collect.

"After being thoroughly flushed with water from the river, the drains should also

have lime profusely scattered therein.

"All decayed or unripe fruit and vegetables should be immediately destroyed and the sale thereof severely punished.

All vegetables should be thoroughly well cooked before being eaten.

"Under no circumstances should water be drunk or used for family purposes until it has been boiled for at least half an hour.

"Cleanliness of person, of all clothing, of cooking and other utensils and of the interior of every household is essentially necessary.

"An excellent precaution against cholera is, for each person to take twice every day five drops of aromatic sulphuric acid in a glass of water which has been well boiled. small bottle of aromatic sulphuric acid can be easily procured at the Canton hospital."

I feel satisfied, your excellency, that a proper observance of the foregoing rules will be the means of preventing the spread of the cholera and of saving many human lives. If I can be of any personal service in this important matter, or in any other, it will be a pleasure to me.

At present I find that cholera is spreading in the vicinities of Canton, and when I lately received the communication from the Hon. James Scott, British consul-general, and the commissioner of Canton customs. Mr. Ma, I immediately forwarded to the said magistrates, etc., instructing them to act according to last year's method by summoning and ordering all the gentries and elders to caution for its prevalence and at the same time to issue proclamations advising the people that they must not have any of the filth piled up in heaps as they pleased, and insist upon the Taepo (chief watchman) of the different streets to clean all the streets every day, with the hope that the disease will be exterminated, and report to me, with full particulars of their proceeding, for my consideration.

And, again, we have respectfully received the communication from the honorable British consul-general, through his excellency the viceroy, stating as before, so that besides replying to his excellency the viceroy, ordering all the gentries and informing the municipal board, etc., accordingly, we have the right to inform you (soldiers and people) by proclamation that all of you must understand that the prevalence of the disease is caused through all the dirty things, and that hereafter you must keep the streets clean and must not collect any filth thereof as you pleased, then the disease will be utterly extinguished, so everyone of you must not fail to obey.

Marine-Hospital Service. Washington, D. C. So far as known, there are no cases here at the present time. These cases were brought here by a steamer coming from Venezuela.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin-Plague and cholera in various countries.

BERLIN, GERMANY, May 17, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit the latest information regarding plague and cholera, obtained from the imperal health office (Kaiserliches-Gesundheitsamt) at Berlin:

Plague.

EGYPT.—From April 25 to May 1, inclusive, there were registered 22 new plague cases and 13 deaths, viz, 2 cases, 1 death, in Alexandria; 12 cases, 5 deaths, in the district of Magagha, province Minieh; 2 cases, 1 death, in Benha, province Galinbieh; 2 cases in the district of Tala, province Menusieh; 1 case, 2 deaths, in Tantah, province Garbieh; 1 case, 2 deaths, in the district of Mit Sammanud, province Dakalieh; 1 case, 1 death, in Decheneh, province of Keneh, and 1 case, 1 death, in the district of Beni Mazar. Furthermore, according to an official report from Suez, a case of plague occurred on the English steamer Victoria during her voyage from Bombay. The patient was isolated, and on April 25 he disappeared. Probably the sick man plunged into the sea. The requisite measures for disinfection were taken.

BRITISH INDIA.—At Ratnagiri, a port in the Bombay Presidency, a case of plague, with fatal termination, was recorded on March 18. In Akyab, according to a report dated April 12, the plague has been stamped out.

BRITISH EAST AFRICA.—Up to May 2, 61 plague cases and 19 deaths had been registered in the protectorate.

QUEENSLAND.—From May 2 to March 15, according to the official bulletins, 12 plague cases and 2 deaths occurred in Brisbane.

During the week ended April 5, 4 new plague cases and 3 deaths were recorded in Brisbane and 1 new case in Townsville.

Plague and cholera.

BRITISH INDIA.—In Calcutta, during the week from March 30 to April 5, 689 persons died of plague and 128 of cholera.

Cholera.

In Djiddah there occurred between April 8 and April 10, 13 deaths of cholera, and between April 10 and April 24, 28 deaths. Among the pilgrims who arrived by caravan between March 4 and March 17 in Medina and Mecca, 423 deaths from cholera have been recorded.

Health of Berlin.

BERLIN, GERMANY, May 18, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to report that during the week ended May 3. the mortality rate in Berlin was a little higher than during the foregoing week, and amounted, calculated on the year, to 15.2 per 1,000 of the population, so that only about one third of the large German cities could show more favorable statistics than Berlin. The lowest death rate among these towns was that of Schöneberg, with the extraordinarily low mortality of 5.4 per 1,000 of the inhabitants. The death rate of Munich, Paris, and Vienna was still considerably higher than that of The number of cases of acute disease of the intestines decreased somewhat in this week, too, causing 27 deaths. Cases of acute disease of the respiratory organs increased, and caused 59 deaths. The number of deaths from consumption amounted to 86, being considerably less than during the foregoing week. Confirming telegraphic reports of plague in Honolulu.

HONOLULU, H. I., May 14, 1902.

SIR: Referring to my telegram of May 14, relative to 5 new deaths from plague having occurred here, 2 on May 8, 2 on May 11, and 1 on May 13, I have the honor to report as follows: The cases occurred in 5 Hawaiians who had been residing at Peck's stable yard, and who, in the opinion of the board of health, received their infection at this latter place. No dead rats have been found in this locality and the source of the infection is not known, this despite the board's efforts to trace the origin of the outbreak. All of the houses in this neighborhood have received a most thorough disinfection, the portable sulphur furnace lent by you being used for the purpose. The ground has been cleansed, sprayed by a strong solution of corrosive sublimate, and the flumes treated with large quantities of sulphuric acid. The inmates of all the houses in the neighborhood have been placed in Kalihi camp in quarantine. I will give further details concerning these cases when I receive the data. I have resumed the out-going quarantine work with

no changes from the old plan, although I have written to all of the Pacific coast quarantine officers again, giving the details of our work for their convenience. The board of health is most energetic and thorough in their work of handling the situation, and therefore I do not regard the outlook as a serious one.

Sterilization of salads.

NAPLES, ITALY, May 16, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report:

The sterilization of salads.

The news reports to the effect that the recent outbreak of the Asiatic cholera at Manila was due to an importation of germs on fresh vegetables brought from Hongkong has given rise to a discussion in Italian medical journals as to the appropriate methods for the sterilization of The subject is of especial interest in Italy, where salads crude greens. form one of the staples of diet. In times of epidemics the question has a bearing on maritime hygiene. Large quantities of salad plants, lettuce, congeners of the cabbage, fennel, and other greens, are usually carried on board ship by emigrants leaving Italy. During the cholera epidemic in 1893, all such articles were prohibited and their exclusion was made a condition to granting the United States consular bill of Heat is, of course, inapplicable to the sterilization of fresh food health. stuffs, inasmuch as their virtues as articles of diet depend largely on their being eaten raw. Popular opinion naturally tends to the view that any hygienic measures applied to salad vegetables should be on the principle of asepsis rather than antisepsis. While the palatability of fresh greens might not be affected by suitable chemical treatment, it is easily understood that the impression produced by the antisepticizing would not be conducive to good cheer. Yet one experimenter, G. Ceresole, writing in the Policlinico, recommends the use of tartaric He states that a sample of salad infected experimentally with a culture of the cholera spirillum was sterilized in five minutes by a 2 per cent watery solution of tartaric acid. To avert danger from the consumption of crude greens it is sufficient to immerse them for half

an hour in a 3 per cent solution of tartaric acid. It is asserted that salads so treated and afterwards washed with water are absolutely non-toxic and that their gastronomic qualities are unaffected by the process. It is recorded that the bacilli of pest and of diphtheria are killed in five minutes by a 5 per cent solution of tartaric acid.

The recent studies of Wurtz and Bourger are in point. In these inquiries it was demonstrated that the use of washings of cesspools for manuring truck gardens is perilous to health. Pathogenic organisms thus deposited on vegetables are capable of retaining their virulence for long periods. In France, an official inquiry has been made into this matter and a hygienic commission has confirmed the conclusions of Wurtz and Bourges. The commission was composed of Brouardel, Roux, Wurtz, and Ogier.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Increase of cholera in Manila and spread to provincial towns.

MANILA, P. I., April 19, 1902.

SIR: Continuing report on cholera in Manila and other places in the Philippine Islands, submitted on the 30th ultimo. I have the honor to state that the prediction made in former communication relative to "stamping out" the epidemic unfortunately has not been verified, although the disease has been kept well in control notwithstanding the numerous difficulties encountered in fighting contagious diseases among a prejudiced and ignorant population.

The disease has been almost exclusively among the natives, although 16 Chinese, 7 Americans, and 5 Europeans have contracted the disease.

The cordon formed by native constabulary has not proved thoroughly effective and some of the towns near Manila have become infected by the escape of people from this city.

Orion, a town on Manila Bay, has had a number of cases and was

infected by the escape of people from Manila in bancas.

Hagonoy, another town on Manila Bay, is badly infected, the disease being introduced from Manila. In fact, most of the towns on the bay have had cases of cholera, the infection being introduced by small boats and bancas that escaped from Manila soon after the appearance of the epidemic. This office has assumed no jurisdiction over this class of small boats, and as there are hundreds of them, some escaped the vigilance of the board of health.

Another bad center of infection is Nueva Caceres in the Camarines, southern portion of the island of Luzon. The disease was introduced by a boat which left Manila about the time the epidemic appeared and quarantine of all island boats was instituted. The disease gained an entrance into the other places in the Camerines from Nueva Caceres. Except those places and the towns bordering on or adjacent to Manila Bay, the provinces have so far escaped. However, a few cases have occurred in the towns on the Pasig River.

The cases reported from Mariveles occurred at the station and were not in the adjacent town.

The caseos and lorchas in the river and bay early became infected and a number of cases have occurred on this class of boats. When cholera began to increase on these boats they were ordered out of the river by the board of health, and must remain in the bay during the night, being inspected before being allowed to enter in the morning for the purpose of loading or discharging cargo. This has proved a wise procedure, and the spread of the disease among these boats has been materially checked.

The provincial towns infected with cholera have suffered more severely than Manila in proportion to population, as will be readily noticed by examination of the statistics for the badly infected centers. This is no doubt due to the fact that the provincial boards of health did not have the requisite number of inspectors or disinfectants and other means for promptly dealing with the epidemic.

During the past few days the disease has slowly increased in Manila

and a further increase is expected.

That the quarantine of island boats for five days before being allowed to sail for United States and island ports was a wise regulation has been demonstrated by cholera having developed on 7 boats held in quarantine, and none on any boats that have been dispatched during the past four weeks. All baggage on these boats is disinfected as soon as the boat goes into quarantine and then the vessel is held five days. Cholera

has developed on 2 on the fourth day of their quarantine, but the other cases developed on the second and third day.

I inclose tabulated reports showing the daily progress of the epidemic in Manila, and the number of cases that have occurred in the provincial ports to date.

SIR: Through the chief quarantine officer for Porto Rico, I have the honor to transmit herewith the quarantine and abstract of bills of health reports for the week ended May 17, 1902. Also the report of the deaths in this city during the month of April, 1902. On the 17th, the French steamship St Domingue arrived from Port au Prince, Jeremie. Les Cayes, Jacmel, Santo Domingo, and Mayaguez. She was held in quarantine, but allowed to land passengers after disinfection of their baggage. Twenty-two pieces and 1 sack of mail were disinfected. The vessel sailed on the same day for St. Thomas. The board of health reports 2 new cases of smallpox and 13 recoveries during the past week. Besides the above vessel held in quarantine, there were 3 vessels inspected and passed, and 4 bills of health issued.

SPAIN.

Smallpox in Cartagena decreasing.

CARTAGENA, SPAIN, May 9, 1902.

SIR: Referring to my dispatch, No. 17, of the 15th ultimo, announcing an outbreak of smallpox in this city, I have the honor to inform you that very few new cases are reported now, and that the disease will probably disappear shortly.

It has not been of a malignant character and the death rate has been

very slightly effected by it.

In the absence of statistics I estimate that probably 10,000 persons have been vaccinated in this city during the last six weeks, and the vaccinations now practiced daily are largely in excess of the birth rate.

DUTCH GUIANA—Paramaribo.—Month of April, 1902. Estimated population, 31,626. Total number of deaths, 95, including 1 from yellow fever.

GERMANY—Weimar.—Month of April, 1902. Estimated population, 29,116. Total number of deaths, 42. No contagious diseases reported.

Jamaica—Port Antonio.—Two weeks ended May 17, 1902. Estimated population, not reported. Total number of deaths, 5. No contagious diseases.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended May 10, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 17.2 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 14,862,909.

London.—One thousand four hundred and fifty-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 45; scarlet fever, 13; diphtheria, 30; whooping cough, 45; enteric fever, 5; smallpox, 44. and diarrhea and dysentery, 18. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.6 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,987 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 4 from diphtheria, 3 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, 17 from smallpox, and 8 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 10, 1902, in the 21 principal

town districts of Ireland was 22.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,092,322. The lowest rate was recorded in Newry, viz, 8.3, and the highest in Tralee, viz, 58.5 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 173 deaths were registered, including diphtheria, 2; measles, 6; enteric fever, 2, and 32 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 10, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 18.1 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,679,923. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 9.9, and the highest in Paisley, viz, 21.1 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 586, including diphtheria, 3; measles, 9; scarlet fever, 4, and 16 from whooping cough.

JAPAN—Formosa.—Month of January, 1902. Estimated population, 2,797,543. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from enteric fever and 141 deaths from plague reported.

Nagasaki.—Ten days ended April 30, 1902. Estimated population, 131,700. Number of deaths not reported. Three deaths from enteric fever reported.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS—Manila.—Month of February, 1902. Estimated population, 302,154. Total number of deaths, 711, including diphtheria, 1; enteric fever, 1; plague, 1, and 55 from tuberculosis.
