CALIFORNIA—*Los Angeles*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population 120,000. Total number of deaths, 172, including diphtheria, 2 ; enteric fever, 4 ; whooping cough, 2, and 32 from tuberculosis.

Oakland.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 75,000. Total number of deaths, 73, including diphtheria, 1 ; enteric fever, 1, and 10 from tuberculosis.

San Francisco.—Month of June, 1902. Estimated population, 360,000. Total number of deaths, 551, including diphtheria, 21 ; enteric fever, 6 ; measles, 1 ; scarlet fever, 2, and 97 from tuberculosis.

ILLINOIS—*Peoria*.—Month of July, 1902. Census population, 56,100. Total number of deaths, 71, including enteric fever, 2 ; whooping cough, 1, and 5 from tuberculosis.

INDIANA—*Evansville*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 65,000. Total number of deaths, 56, including enteric fever, 2, and 5 from tuberculosis.

IOWA—*Keokuk*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 19,500. Total number of deaths, 13, including diphtheria, 2, and 1 from enteric fever.

LOUISIANA—*New Orleans*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 305,000—white, 223,500 ; colored, 81,500. Total number of deaths, 507—white, 281 ; colored, 226—including diphtheria, 3 ; enteric fever, 13 ; whooping cough, 2, and 104 from tuberculosis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended August 2, 1902, from 90 observers, indicate that neuralgia, measles, dysentery, enteric fever, remittent fever, and scarlet fever were more prevalent and influenza, inflammation of kidney, whooping cough, smallpox, pneumonia, and diphtheria were less prevalent than in the preceding week. Meningitis was reported at 4, diphtheria at 20, whooping cough at 25, smallpox at 41, scarlet fever at 45, enteric fever at 47, measles at 47, and phthisis pulmonalis at 213 places.

Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended August 9, 1902, from 89 observers, indicate that bronchitis, cholera morbus, enteric fever, influenza, inflammation of kidney, whooping cough, pneumonia, diphtheria, and meningitis were more prevalent and

remittent fever, erysipelas, and measles were less prevalent than in the preceding month. Meningitis was reported present at 5, diphtheria at 14, whooping cough at 23, smallpox at 35, measles at 36, scarlet fever at 47, enteric fever at 56, and phthisis pulmonalis at 212 places.

Grand Rapids.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 90,000. Total number of deaths, 84, including enteric fever, 1, and 5 from tuberculosis.

MINNESOTA—*Minneapolis.*—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 240,000. Total number of deaths, 188, including diphtheria, 5; enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 5; whooping cough, 1, and 30 from tuberculosis.

Winona.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 12, including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Case of plague on the steamship Duca di Galliera at Barcelona; also on the steamship Espagne at Marseille.

TENERIFFE, CANARY ISLANDS, July 16, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to report that the Italian steamship *Duca di Galliera*, from Buenos Ayers, put in at Grand Canary, where she took coal, landed and took passengers. When she arrived at Barcelona plague was discovered on board and she was ordered in quarantine.

The French steamship *Espagne*, also from Buenos Ayres, stopped at this port for coal, and on her arrival at Marseille bubonic plague was discovered on board and she was sent to quarantine quarters. The above 2 cases have given the inhabitants of these islands a quiet scare, on account of the quarantine regulations, which I reported in my dispatch, No. 172, dated April 22, 1902, having not been strictly enforced.

CHINA.

Reports from Hongkong—Plague and cholera diminishing in Hongkong, but prevalent in the north.

HONGKONG, CHINA, July 1, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the abstract of bills of health issued at this station during the week ended June 28, 1902. Eleven vessels were inspected, 444 individuals were bathed at the disinfecting station, and 489 bundles of clothing and bedding were disinfected by steam. The cholera situation in this city continues to show great improvement, but 2 cases and 2 deaths having been reported during the week. This makes a total of 362 cases and 318 deaths from this disease thus far this year. Unofficial reports from the Canton district indicate that the disease is subsiding. Reports from the coast cities in the north of China indicate that the disease is especially severe. The local papers state that the foreign population of Shanghai has suffered to a considerable extent.

I respectfully inclose a letter from Dr. Anna K. Scott, of the Baptist mission at Swatow, which describes the conditions in that district.

There was a slight improvement in the plague situation in this city during the week, 44 cases and 42 deaths having been reported. This makes a total of 373 cases and 364 deaths thus far this year. One case of enteric fever and 1 case of smallpox, the latter terminating fatally, were also reported to the sanitary board.

SWATOW, CHINA, June 15, 1902.

SIR: In compliance with your request for information concerning the prevalence of Asiatic cholera in the Swatow district, I have now to report that the disease has been

on a steady increase during the past month. Most of our cities have been visited by the epidemic, there being many cases and the disease taking a rapid and fatal course.

At the present writing there is a marked improvement in the cities, but the villages in all directions are suffering severely—the epidemic spreading far and wide. In the port of Swatow there is now but little of either plague or cholera.

Since writing my letter of the 15th instant there has been a fresh outbreak of cholera in Swatow. Yesterday Mr. Mathieson Brown, of Messrs. Butterfield & Swire, succumbed to the disease after an illness of twelve hours. I am informed that many of the Chinese are dying of it within the past four days.

HONGKONG, CHINA, July 7, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the abstract of bills of health issued at this station during the week ended July 5: Thirteen vessels were inspected, 806 individuals were bathed at the disinfecting station, and 1,043 pieces of baggage were disinfected by steam. There were 9 rejections during the week because of fever. One of the bills of health was issued to the British steamship *Austrasia* July 3, after disinfection of the crew and their living apartments. This vessel had a case of cholera develop among the crew while in this port, which was removed to the infectious-disease hospital June 5, 1902.

A few cases of cholera continue to occur in the colony, 9 cases and 6 deaths having been reported during the week. Of the total cases reported, 4 were Chinese, 3 were Japanese, 1 an European, and 1 an Indian.

Information received from Shanghai and Hankow during the week indicate that those ports are being visited by severe epidemics, and that the disease has spread to the surrounding villages and country. The Japanese steamship *America Maru*, of the San Francisco lines, was quarantined here July 3 because of a case of cholera which developed in the steerage after leaving Shanghai.

Thirty-two cases of plague and 31 deaths and 1 case of smallpox and 1 death were also reported during the week. One of the plague cases was landed from the P. and O. steamship *Valetta*, carrying the outward English mail. During the past two days 2 other cases have been removed to Kennedy Town hospital suffering with plague, and other cases are under observation. I am informed that many cases of illness developed after the ship left Singapore and that on arrival here many dead rats were found in the vessel. This vessel had lain in Bombay for some months prior to this voyage.

GERMANY.

*Report from Berlin—Health of the city.*BERLIN, GERMANY, *August 4, 1902.*

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that for three years the mortality rate in Berlin has not been so low as it was for the week ended July 19 this year, amounting to only 12.8 per 1,000—that is to say, but two-thirds of that of the corresponding week of last year. London, Paris, Vienna, and most of the large German cities had higher death rates during the week in question; of 33 of the latter towns, only Altona, Elberfeld, Crefeld, Schöneberg (12.7), and Charlottenburg (9.3) showed more favorable statistics than Berlin. Acute diseases of the intestines were of less frequent occurrence than during the foregoing six weeks, and caused 57 deaths. No important change occurred in the number of cases of acute diseases of the respiratory organs, which caused 33 deaths. Consumption claimed 66 victims. Eleven deaths resulted from measles and 4 from scarlet fever. A decrease was noticeable in the number of cases of diphtheria, 2 ending in death. Five persons died by violence, as compared with 20 during the foregoing week.

Report from Naples—Cholera and plague in Egypt—Plague in Odessa.

NAPLES, ITALY, August 4, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to report that for the week ended August 2, 1902, the following ships were inspected:

July 28, the steamship *Cambroman*, of the Dominion Line, bound with passengers and cargo for Boston. There were inspected and passed 489 steerage passengers and 154 pieces of large baggage; 750 pieces of baggage were disinfected by steam. The rejection of 29 steerage passengers was advised.

July 30, the steamship *Nord America*, of the Veloce Line, bound with passengers and cargo for New York. There were inspected and passed 459 steerage passengers and 65 pieces of large baggage; 350 pieces of baggage were disinfected by steam. The rejection of 38 passengers was advised.

July 31, the steamship *Hohenzollern*, of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company, bound with passengers and cargo for New York. There were inspected and passed 218 steerage passengers and 65 pieces of large baggage; 350 pieces of baggage were disinfected by steam. The rejection of 23 steerage passengers was advised.

Asiatic cholera in Egypt.

Reports from Egypt state that, July 27, there were 38 deaths from Asiatic cholera in Cairo and 35 new cases, and in Moucha 21 deaths and 10 new cases. All the cases at Moucha, which is in the Assiut province, are being isolated at a place 10 kilometers south of Assiut. The surface wells of Moucha, which are the source of water supply, have been placed under military surveillance. All infected wells have been closed. July 28, there were 37 fresh cases of cholera and 27 deaths at Cairo. At Moucha there were 19 new cases and 25 deaths. One case was reported from Gizeh. July 29 there were 41 fresh cases at Cairo, and July 30, 29 new cases.

Bubonic plague in Egypt.

July 26, the total number of cases of bubonic plague throughout Egypt was 19. At Alexandria, there were 16 cases; at Tukh, 1 case, and 2 at Damanhur. From reports dated July 26, it was shown that since April 7, 1902, the beginning of the second year of the epidemic, there had been 152 deaths and 117 recoveries from plague in Egypt.

Bubonic plague at Odessa.

In the latter part of July there were 3 additional cases of plague at Odessa, making in all 5 cases and no deaths in July. Hundreds of rats are being burnt daily.

*Reports from Yokohama—Cholera at Tokyo, Fukuoka Ken, and Kobe.*YOKOHAMA, JAPAN, *July 15, 1902.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith abstract of bills of health for the week ended July 12, 1902. Two vessels were inspected with a total personnel of 182 crew and 100 passengers.

During the past week the local newspapers reported a death from cholera in Yokohama, which report, however, was later denied; the official statement for the week ended July 12 shows this city to be free from quarantinable disease. A death from cholera occurred in Tokyo on the 9th instant. The disease in that city seems to be, for the time, under control.

Fukuoka Ken, a prefecture in the island of Kyushu, has furnished the bulk of the new cases of cholera reported in Japan during the past week, its total up to July 10 being 74 cases with 44 deaths in addition to 27 cases with 12 deaths resulting from the outbreak in Fukuoka prison, and 43 cases now regarded as merely doubtful or suspicious. A considerable number of the emigrants now passing from Japan to Hawaii at the rate of more than a 1,000 monthly, come from the above-mentioned prefecture, and it has seemed proper to hold them under observation for five days at this port before shipping. At a conference with leading Japanese sanitary officials, brought about through the courtesy of United States Minister Buck, the propriety of administering prophylactic inoculation to emigrants for the United States from cholera-infected districts, was suggested. I mention this fact as illustrative of the confidence with which the anticholera vaccine is regarded in Japan.

Three of the cases reported from Fukuoka Ken (all fatal) are credited to Moji, a considerable shipping town. Cholera exists at Kobe.

SIR: I have the honor to report to the Department that since my No. 706, of the 10th instant, there have been no new cases of plague, and as far as I have been able to ascertain, no deaths from plague. The authorities have made no official or other announcement concerning the 2 cases mentioned in my dispatch No. 706. I issued a bill of health this day for the German steamship *Seriphos*, bound for New York via Black Sea ports, and I made no mention of the plague because during the past two weeks there have been no new cases.

CANADA—*British Columbia—Vancouver.*—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 29,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria reported.

Victoria.—Estimated population, 21,000. Total number of deaths, 23, including 1 from tuberculosis.

Quebec—Sherbrooke.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 12,000. Total number of deaths, 20. No contagious diseases reported.

CHILE—*Antofagasta.*—Month of June, 1902. Estimated population, 8,000. Total number of deaths, 57, including 5 from tuberculosis.

CHINA—*Amoy.*—Two weeks ended July 12, 1902. Estimated population, 250,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cholera present.

FRANCE—*St. Etienne*.—Two weeks ended July 15, 1902. Estimated population, 146,559. Total number of deaths, 125, including diphtheria, 4; enteric fever, 1; measles, 1; scarlet fever, 1; whooping cough, 1, and 12 from tuberculosis.

GIBRALTAR.—Three weeks ended July 27, 1902. Estimated population, 27,460. Total number of deaths, 13. No deaths from contagious diseases.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended July 26, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 13.9 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 14,862,456.

***Bradford*.**—Two weeks ended July 26, 1902. Estimated population, 281,770. Total number of deaths, 162, including diphtheria, 4; measles, 4; scarlet fever, 3, and 20 from tuberculosis.

***London*.**—One thousand two hundred and sixty deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 32; scarlet fever, 8; diphtheria, 31; whooping cough, 49; enteric fever, 19; smallpox, 4, and diarrhea and dysentery, 47. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 14.3 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,656 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 6 from diphtheria, 2 from measles, 2 from smallpox, and 7 from whooping cough.

***Ireland*.**—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended July 26, 1902, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 17.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,092,322. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk and Porta Down, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Galway, viz, 31.1 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 150 deaths were registered, including diphtheria, 1; enteric fever, 1; measles, 8; scarlet fever, 1; whooping cough, 1, and 22 from tuberculosis.

***Scotland*.**—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended July 26, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 15.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,679,923. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 8.3, and the highest in Glasgow, viz, 18.1 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 512, including diphtheria, 4; measles, 10; scarlet fever, 6, and 13 from whooping cough.

JAMAICA—*Kingston*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 46,543. Total number of deaths, 147, including 12 from phthisis pulmonalis.

***Port Antonio*.**—Weeks ended July 19 and August 2, 1902. Estimated population not reported. No deaths and no contagious diseases.

JAPAN—*Nagasaki*.—Ten days ended July 10, 1902. Estimated population, 131,700. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria, and 3 from enteric fever reported.
