CALIFORNIA—*San Diego*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 25, including 8 from tuberculosis.

MARYLAND—*Baltimore*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 525,000—white, 445,000; colored, 80,000. Total number of deaths, 1,052—white, 817; colored, 235—including enteric fever, 19; measles, 8; scarlet fever, 5; whooping cough, 13; diphtheria, 2, and 87 from tuberculosis.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Fitchburg*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 33,848. Total number of deaths, 22, including 1 from measles.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended August 23, 1902, from 68 observers, indicate that cholera infantum, dysentery, enteric fever, erysipelas, remittent fever, pneumonia, and diphtheria were more prevalent, and measles was less prevalent than in the preceding week. Meningitis was reported present at 7, diphtheria at 16, whooping cough at 18, measles at 23, smallpox at 36, scarlet fever at 48, enteric fever at 86, and phthisis pulmonalis at 219 places.

MISSOURI—*St. Louis*.—Month of July, 1902. Census population, 621,000—white, 582,000; colored, 39,000. Total number of deaths, 910—white, 796; colored, 114—including diphtheria, 15; measles, 3; scarlet fever, 9; whooping cough, 25, and 135 from tuberculosis.

NEW JERSEY—*Hudson County*.—Month of July, 1902. Estimated population, 409,810. Total number of deaths, 794, including enteric fever, 9; diphtheria, 13; measles, 3; scarlet fever, 5; whooping cough, 11; smallpox, 16, and 71 from tuberculosis.

Passaic.—Four weeks ended August 23, 1902. Census population, 27,777. Total number of deaths, 62, including diphtheria, 1, and 1 from enteric fever.

SIR: Reporting further upon the development of the cholera epidemic in Egypt, I have the honor to inform the Department that since the first few days of the appearance of the scourge at Moucha, and subsequently at Cairo, the rapid progress of the disease has been checked by the efficiency and extraordinary energy of the sanitary department, and the situation thus improved and made more hopeful. Turkey and most of the European countries have declared Egypt infected and imposed more or less severe quarantine restrictions against travelers and traffic from this country.

Report from Berlin—Plague and cholera in various countries.

BERLIN, GERMANY, *August 18, 1902.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the latest information regarding plague and cholera, obtained from the imperial health office (Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamt), Berlin.

Plague.

RUSSIA.—In Ut-Kudas, the sixth case of suspected plague has also terminated in death. The tents of the sick persons, as well as the neighboring tents, have been disinfected. The surviving members of families have been isolated. In the village of Aksai (Government of Astrachan), according to an official statement in the Government Gazette of July 31, 26 cases of suspected plague have occurred since July 3—16 cases ending in death.

EGYPT.—During the week ended August 1, there were registered 2 new plague cases and 1 death, all in Alexandria.

BRITISH INDIA.—In the Bombay Presidency, according to official statistics, 66,755 persons died of plague in the month of March. In the month of April 49,062 deaths from plague were recorded. In the city of Bombay there were registered during the week ended July 15, 26 deaths from plague as compared with 22 in the foregoing week. According to a further report, there occurred in the Bombay Presidency during the week ended July 18, 1,156 plague cases and 750 deaths.

CHINA.—Since the end of June, 1 to 3 cases of plague have been registered daily in the port of Swatow.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—On August 7, a case of plague was registered in Newcastle.

QUEENSLAND.—On June 28 there were still 7 cases of plague under treatment in Brisbane.

BRITISH INDIA.—In Calcutta, during the week ended July 5, 27 persons died of plague and 21 of cholera.

CEBU, P. I., July 18, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that I have found the probable source of infection of Cebu by cholera. There is very little doubt that this is the true source. On January 27, 1902, a banca arrived at Tobogan, on this island, with a dead Filipino

on board from Carigara, Leyte, and requested permission to enter that port and to inter the dead man. This was refused by the presidente who knew Carigara was infected with cholera, and report made in a letter to the provincial governor, Cebu, on the same date. I do not know what date this letter was received.

The governor informed me to-day that the banca had gone, after this refusal, to Catmon, where it was allowed to land and the body buried. Following this within a few days (the exact time not known), several cases of death occurred preceded by vomiting and diarrhea.

Cases of a similar nature have been reported from Danao, but no definite data can be obtained, as there is no physician there. It has also been reported in Tobogan, but not officially, and very meager news can be obtained from that place. It is now reported, unofficially, to be in Cordova, Mactan, and is said to have been there for some time.

It is pretty nearly certain that the disease reported in Catmon is cholera. Inasmuch as absolutely no information was received from there, no quarantine was instituted against that place.

There is very frequent communication between there and Cebu both by land and sea. As cholera did not appear here until July 9, 1902, it had ample time to be introduced from Catmon, Danao, or Tobogan and in my opinion, came from one of those ports.

It has also appeared at Mandaue on this bay, but reports vary as to whether it was there prior to its appearance in Cebu or not.

CEBU, P. I., July 26, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report of the progress of cholera at this port, as follows:

It is decidedly on the increase, the average number of daily cases having risen from 10 to about 20. The infection is thoroughly scattered throughout the town, and has gone from here to Naga, this island, where 2 cases and 2 deaths occurred yesterday.

Likewise it has spread to the small barrios immediately surrounding the town, 5 cases having occurred in Guadalupe.

Absolutely no quarantine is imposed on the land side of town, and I look for a general infection of this island. Moreover, the people desiring to leave here are allowed to do so, going principally to Talisay and Naga, where they take bancas for any other islands they desire. I am powerless to prevent this, as this travel to these small places is done entirely by land, the distance to Naga being only 16 miles.

The work being done here by the local authorities is extremely bad. For example, I found a man dead from cholera on a small banca and notified the local authorities where he was, requesting them to take the body. This they promised to do immediately. I towed the banca within 200 yards of the police station, where there were men whose duty it was to remove it. They were notified at 4 p. m. and removed the body at 8 a. m. the next morning.

A cholera hospital has been established, but agitation is going on here to have cases treated in their houses.

There is no quarantine camp here for suspects and contacts are allowed to remain in shacks where cases have occurred simply under guard of a Filipino policeman, who, when he is not down the street some place, is generally asleep.

Disinfection of houses is accomplished by sprinkling carbolic acid, not by scrubbing with it. You can readily see what an effect this would have on a nipa house.

Up to date I have quarantined 140 boats, including bancas, and have had no end of work trying to control them. Cases are occurring almost daily on bancas. All of the cases so far have occurred on those in port, lying in the mud flats and with free communication with shore. One case has occurred on the steamship *Tabas*, which was two days in quarantine, in the person of a female passenger, a Filipino. She died. All boats having cases are removed at once to quarantine, disinfected and held five days.

Bradford.—Two weeks ended August 9, 1902. Estimated population, 281,770. Total number of deaths, 155, including enteric fever, 3 ; scarlet fever, 5 ; diphtheria, 2 ; measles, 6, and 20 from tuberculosis.

London.—One thousand one hundred and seventy-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 31 ; scarlet fever, 16 ; diphtheria, 13 ; whooping cough, 37 ; enteric fever, 16 ; smallpox, 4, and diarrhea and dysentery, 93. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 13.4 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,558 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 2 from diphtheria, 4 from measles, 1 from smallpox, 1 from scarlet fever, and 4 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended August 9, 1902, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 17.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,092,401. The lowest rate was recorded in Ballymena, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Kilkenny, viz, 44.2 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 154 deaths were registered, including diphtheria, 2 ; enteric fever, 4 ; measles, 20 ; scarlet fever, 1 ; whooping cough, 1, and 28 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 9, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 13.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,679,923. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 12.2, and the highest in Greenock, viz, 18.9 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 449, including diphtheria, 2 ; measles, 5 ; scarlet fever, 3, and 16 from whooping cough.

JAVA—*Batavia.*—Two weeks ended July 19, 1902. Estimated population, 150,000. Number of deaths not reported. Sixty-nine deaths from cholera reported.
