UNITED STATES.

Statistical reports of States and cities of the United States—Yearly and monthly.

CALIFORNIA—*San Diego*.—Month of September, 1902. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 21, including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended October 25, 1902, from 84 observers, indicate that phthisis pulmonalis, inflammation of kidney, diphtheria, pneumonia, whooping cough, measles, and smallpox were more prevalent and influenza, scarlet fever, erysipelas, remittent fever, and cholera infantum were less prevalent than in the preceding week. Meningitis was reported present at 3, measles at 16, whooping cough at 17, smallpox at 18, diphtheria at 38, scarlet fever at 73, enteric fever at 91, and phthisis pulmonalis at 228 places.

MARYLAND—*Cumberland*.—Month of September, 1902. Estimated population, 17,128. Total number of deaths, 21, including 1 from enteric fever.

NORTH CAROLINA—*Charlotte*.—Month of October, 1902. Census population, 18,091. Total number of deaths, 31, including diphtheria, 5; enteric fever, 3; smallpox, 2, and 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Pottsville*.—Month of October, 1902. Census population, 15,710. Total number of deaths, 22. No deaths from contagious diseases.

OHIO—*Columbus*.—Month of September, 1902. Estimated population, 150,000. Total number of deaths, 128, including diphtheria, 1; enteric fever, 11, and 12 from tuberculosis.

CHINA.

Reports from Hongkong—Inspection of vessels—Plague and cholera.

SEPTEMBER 30, 1902.

Week ended September 27. Nine vessels inspected, 667 individuals bathed at the disinfecting station, and 699 pieces of baggage disinfected. Three rejections during the week from all causes. The only communicable disease reported in the colony during the week was cholera, 3 cases and 2 deaths having occurred (all Chinese). The last case of plague was reported September 8, and it is safe to say that the epidemic has subsided for this year.

Week ended October 4, 1902. Five vessels inspected, 180 individuals bathed at the disinfecting station, and 175 bundles of clothing and bedding disinfected by steam. The health conditions of this colony continue to improve. Two cases of cholera and 2 deaths were reported during the week, making a total of 464 cases and 400 deaths since the outbreak of the disease. Two cases of diphtheria (Europeans) were also reported, being the only other communicable disease reported in the colony during the week.

EGYPT.

Status of cholera.

Vice Consul-General H. T. Smith reports from Cairo under date of October 7, 1902, as follows:

I have the honor to confirm the following telegram regarding the cholera epidemic in Egypt:

CAIRO, October 4, 1902.

SECRETARY OF STATE, *Washington:*

Since 28th September 2,114 cases cholera—all Egypt; 2,136 deaths. Conditions continue to improve rapidly.

SMITH.

Each succeeding daily bulletin received from the sanitary department shows a rapid decrease in the number of new cases and deaths. Up to yesterday, at noon, there have been in all Egypt since the date of the outbreak (July 15, 1902) 37,358 cases of cholera, 31,693 deaths, and 5,331 cases cured. Cairo is now practically free; 1 new case was discovered yesterday, 1 death occurred, and 7 cases are under treatment.

GERMANY.

Annual mortality from pulmonary phthisis in Europe.

BERLIN, GERMANY, October 15, 1902.

SIR: Apropos of the conference which, as stated in my report of September 18, will be held in Berlin under the auspices of the international central bureau for combating tuberculosis, in the great hall of the Reichstag on October 22 to October 26, the following statistics published by the imperial health office will be of interest:

Annual mortality in the various countries of Europe from pulmonary phthisis alone.

Russia, more than 4,000 deaths per 1,000,000 population; Austria, Hungary, and France, more than 3,000 deaths per 1,000,000 population; Sweden, Germany, Switzerland, and Ireland, more than 2,000 deaths per 1,000,000 population; Netherlands, Italy, Belgium, Norway, Scotland, and England, more than 1,000 deaths per 1,000,000 population.

Report from Berlin—Plague and cholera in various countries.

BERLIN, GERMANY, October 17, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the latest information concerning plague and cholera, obtained from the imperial health office (Kaiserliches-Gesundheitsamt) at Berlin:

Plague.

RUSSIA.—During the period from September 24 to September 29, 6 cases of plague and 3 deaths were registered in Odessa. A general medical inspection of the inhabitants of the infected districts is continuously being made. Up to September 12 about 2,000 dwellings and 13,000

persons had been examined. Special attention is being paid to the destruction of rats. Up to September 7 about 3,400 rats had been delivered at the bacteriological station.

TURKEY.—In Smyrna on October 3, 1 case of suspected plague was recorded, the patient being a waiter.

EGYPT.—During the period from September 26 to October 3, 1 case of plague and 1 death were registered in Alexandria.

BRITISH INDIA.—In the Presidency of Bombay between September 14 and September 20, 9,249 plague cases and 6,731 deaths were registered, of which 65 cases and 48 deaths occurred in the city of Bombay, and 23 cases, with 15 deaths, in the city and port of Karachi.

JAPAN.—According to a communication dated October 8, 3 cases of plague occurred in Yokohama, of which 2 ended in death.

BRAZIL.—Between September 6 and September 8, 3 deaths from plague were registered in Rio de Janeiro.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—According to a report issued by the public health office at Sydney, the last plague patient was discharged there on August 19. Plague is regarded as stamped out in the whole of Australasia.

BRITISH INDIA.—In Calcutta during the week ended September 6, 16 persons died of plague and 15 of cholera.

Statutes of the Central Bureau for combating tuberculosis.

Section 1. The task of the central bureau for the combating of tuberculosis is to further the international efforts for the combating of this disease by the means stated in section 15. The central office has its seat in Berlin.

Sec. 2. The central office has ordinary members, corresponding members, and honorary members. The duties of the corresponding members are confined to keeping the central office continually informed of the state of the movement for the combating of tuberculosis within the spheres of observation assigned to them.

Sec. 3. The ordinary members are appointed by the central anti-tuberculosis organs at home and abroad affiliated with the central office. Each country has at least 2 members. Countries with more than 10,000,000 inhabitants get 1 member more for each 5,000,000 over and above that number, but the total number for 1 country must not exceed 5. A union of States is regarded as 1 country.

Sec. 4. The corresponding members are chosen by the inner council (sec. 10).

Sec. 5. The honorary members are chosen by the high council (sec. 13) on the proposal of the inner council (sec. 10).

Sec. 6. The business of the central office is conducted by the board of management. It consists of a president and 4 members. The president and the members are elected by the inner council (sec. 10) for three years. Reelection is allowed.

Sec. 7. All the ordinary business that is not transacted by the president devolves on the secretary-general of the board. He is engaged by the board for three years.

Sec. 8. The board is empowered to appoint assistants, especially

from foreign countries, to help the secretary-general in his business. The assistants are obliged to reside permanently in Berlin.

Sec. 9. The salaries to be paid to the secretary-general and the assistants are fixed by the board.

Sec. 10. The inner council consists of the ordinary members, but the honorary members also are permitted to speak and vote at its meetings.

Sec. 11. The ordinary meeting of the inner council takes place in Berlin annually in spring. Extraordinary meetings are to be held whenever the board considers necessary. An ordinary member who is prevented from appearing may be represented by another ordinary member.

Sec. 12. The inner council decides the measures to be taken for the furtherance of the aims of the central office; besides this it receives the business report of the board and has to make the elections incumbent upon it at the ordinary meeting.

Sec. 13. The high council consists of all the members of the central bureau. It meets, as a rule, every two years. At this meeting it receives a report of the work done by the central office. Besides the appointment of honorary members (sec. 5) the right to alter these statutes belongs to it alone. Such alterations can be made only at the suggestion of the inner council and with a two-thirds majority of the members present.

Sec. 14. The invitations to the meetings of the high council and the inner council (secs. 10, 11, and 12) are sent out by the president of the board.

Sec. 15. The central office performs its duties as follows:

1. By continually collecting all news relating to the international conflict with tuberculosis in all countries.

2. By collecting the whole literature on the subject.

3. By answering interrogatories coming from parties that have a right to ask for information.

4. By suitable petitions in authoritative quarters.

5. By other suggestions relative to the international combating of tuberculosis, especially as regards investigations, the publication of popular essays, and the arranging of lectures and meetings.

6. By publishing a periodical to be sent free of charge to all members, reporting on the work done by the central office, and discussing all subjects of interest in connection with the international combating of tuberculosis.

Sec. 16. So long as the central bureau has no adequate funds of its own, the expenses of administration are defrayed by the German central committee for the establishment of sanatoria for consumptives.

Health of Berlin—Weekly death rate.

BERLIN, GERMANY, *October 22, 1902.*

SIR: I have the honor to report that the mortality rate in Berlin for the week ended October 11 was higher than in any of the four preceding weeks, and amounted to 15.7 per 1,000 inhabitants—that is to say, considerably higher than during the corresponding week of last year. The sanitary conditions in two-thirds of the large German towns, how-

ever, were less favorable than in Berlin, viz, Munich, Hamburg, Cologne, Leipzig, and Dresden. The death rate of London, Paris, and Vienna, too, was much higher than in Berlin. On the other hand, the mortality in the neighboring towns, viz, Charlottenburg (with 13.1 per 1,000) and Schöneberg (with 6.8 per 1,000) was lower than that of Berlin. The participation of infants in the mortality showed only a slight increase. There was, however, an important increase in the number of deaths among persons of advanced age. Acute diseases of the intestines decreased. They were, however, in contradistinction to most of the other large towns, of more frequent occurrence in Berlin than the acute diseases of the respiratory organs, the latter having caused 48 deaths, the former claiming 65 victims. The number of deaths from pulmonary consumption was again higher than during the foregoing week, 79 being registered. Cases of measles and of scarlet fever were of somewhat less frequent occurrence, although the former caused 3 deaths and the latter 7. Furthermore there were recorded 4 deaths from diphtheria, and 13 persons died by violence.

JAPAN.

*Cholera and plague.*YOKOHAMA, JAPAN, *October 16, 1902.*

SIR: I have the honor to report for the week ended September 27, 1902, the inspection of 5 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 482 crew and 824 passengers. Four hundred and eighty-seven steerage passengers were bathed and 517 pieces of baggage were disinfected by formaldehyd. The official report of contagious diseases in Yokohama for the two weeks ended September 27, 1902, shows, enteric fever, 11 cases, 3 deaths; diphtheria, 6 cases, 1 death; dysentery, 7 cases, 1 death. The cases of cholera, therefore, reported in the press as having recently occurred in Yokohama lack official confirmation. According to the official returns, Yokohama has remained free from cholera during the present outbreak, with the exception of 1 case which occurred about two months ago. The total number of cases of cholera reported in the Empire from outbreak to September 30 is 11,228, with 6,302 deaths.

Plague deaths at Yokohama.

One vessel inspected carried a personnel of 81 crew and 71 passengers, inspected during the week ended October 4, 1902. During this period, there were reported in Yokohama 2 cases of enteric fever with no deaths, and 2 cases of dysentery with 2 deaths. In general, the cholera situation in Japan seems rather more favorable. It is stated, unofficially, that the disease has, for the time, disappeared in Saga Ken, also in the town of Moji (Fukuoka Ken). From official sources, it is learned that there has been a plague death in Yokohama. The patient was a girl of 16, and there seems good reason to believe that the disease was contracted from infected merchandise, possibly waste cotton. The death occurred on the 7th instant. The newspapers to-day report several other cases of plague in Yokohama, which, however, the authorities pronounce spurious or doubtful. Stringent measures for the control of the disease are being enforced. An order making the wearing of foot covering compulsory has been issued. During the past night, when presumably the inhabitants were at home, a substantial board fence was erected in such a manner as to effectually confine and isolate residents of the buildings adjacent to the infected focus. This morning, an ample force of police is guarding the quarantined district. It would seem proper that quarantine officers having to deal with vessels from Yokohama should have such facts placed before them. At least 3 cases of plague have occurred in

this city. More than 1,200 possible contacts are held in strict quarantine in their dwellings. A reward of 5 sen a piece has been offered for rats, and it is stated that a few rats showing pest bacilli have been captured.

I have the honor to report for the week ended October 11, 1902, the inspection of 5 steamships having an aggregate personnel of 547 crew and 1,119 passengers. Five hundred and forty-one steerage passengers and 58 crew were bathed and 711 pieces of baggage were disinfected.

For the period under consideration no official report of contagious diseases has yet been received by me. I learn from authoritative sources that there has been 1 case of true plague in Yokohama, as previously reported. One or 2 of the suspected cases may possibly prove to be real plague. The authorities are taking vigorous measures to prevent the progress of the disease. It is understood that in the neighborhood of 1,200 possible contacts are held in quarantine.

As to the cholera situation in the Empire as a whole, the meager data at hand indicate that the height of the epidemic has passed. According to a printed statement purporting to give the results of the investigations of the sanitary bureau, the total number of cases of cholera occurring in the Empire from outbreak to October 15 was 12,578, of which 8,313 resulted fatally.

MEXICO.

Report from Vera Cruz.

VERA CRUZ, MEXICO, *October 20, 1902.*

Week ended October 18, there were reported from all causes 47 deaths. Twenty cases and 4 deaths were reported from yellow fever, 5 deaths from pernicioso, 3 from remittent, and 8 from tuberculosis. One case of malaria developed in the harbor aboard of a steamship that plies between here and Baltimore. The case is now convalescent and will go to sea to-morrow.

PORTO RICO.

Report from Ponce.

PONCE, P. R., *October 13, 1902.*

During the week ended October 11, 1 vessel was inspected and passed and 4 bills of health were issued. According to the official reports of the board of health, the city and district are free from any quarantinable disease.

During the week ended October 18, 2 vessels were inspected and passed, 2 were held in quarantine, and 1 bill of health was issued. Those in quarantine were the French steamship *Salvador*, from Port au Prince, via Jeremie, Les Cayes, Jacmel, Santo Domingo, and Mayaguez; the Cuban steamship *Julia*, from Havana, via Nuevitas, Gibara, Baracoa, Santiago, Santo Domingo, and Macoris. Both arrived on the 18th, transacted their business under guard and sailed on the same day. Baggage from ports of Haiti and Santo Domingo was disinfected; 15

pieces and 2 sacks of mail from the former and 22 pieces and 1 sack of mail from the latter. Nothing of interest has occurred in the sanitary condition of this city and district.

ARGENTINA—*Buenos Ayres*.—Month of August, 1902. Estimated population, 860,000. Total number of deaths, 1,377, including diphtheria, 17; enteric fever, 11; measles, 5; scarlet fever, 14; smallpox, 8, and 181 from tuberculosis.

BRAZIL—*Pernambuco*.—Two weeks ended September 15, 1902. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 225, including enteric fever, 2; smallpox, 2, and 39 from tuberculosis.

BRITISH GUIANA—*Demerara—Georgetown*.—Month of September, 1902. Estimated population, 36,567. Total number of deaths, 193, including diphtheria, 2, and 32 from phthisis pulmonalis.

GERMANY—*Hanover*.—Month of August, 1902. Estimated population, 244,313. Total number of deaths, 363, including 62 from infectious diseases.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended October 11, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 18.1 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 14,862,084.

London.—One thousand five hundred and fifty-two deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 18; scarlet fever, 6; diphtheria, 22; whooping cough, 26; enteric fever, 18, and diarrhea, 111. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 17.7 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,077 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 1 from diphtheria, 3 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 1 from smallpox, and 6 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended October 11, 1902, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,092,401. The lowest rate was recorded in Lisburn, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 33.6 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 192 deaths were registered, including diphtheria, 2; enteric fever, 2; measles, 11; scarlet fever, 2; and 36 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended October 11, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 15.4 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,679,923. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 7.3, and the highest in Perth, viz, 29.7, per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 496, including diphtheria, 5; measles, 4; scarlet fever, 5, and 12 from whooping cough.

JAPAN—Nagasaki.—Ten days ended September 30, 1902. Estimated population, 131,700. Total number of deaths not reported. Thirty-one deaths from cholera reported.

Yokohama.—Two weeks ended September 27, 1902. Estimated population, 189,455. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria and 3 deaths from enteric fever reported.

JAVA—Batavia.—Two weeks ended September 13, 1902. Estimated population, 150,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Eighty deaths from cholera reported.

WEST INDIES—St. Thomas.—Week ended October 3, 1902. Estimated population, 11,012. Total number of deaths, 4. No contagious diseases. Week ended October 15, 1902. Total number of deaths, 6. No contagious diseases.
