### PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.

### UNITED STATES.

Disinfection of vessels at Tampa Bay Quarantine on account of tuberculosis.

Asst. Surg. C. C. Pierce reports the disinfection of the Norwegian bark *Pallas* at the Tampa Bay Quarantine, Mullet Key, Fla., November 4, 1902, on account of a case of tuberculosis, and the master of the vessel was instructed as to precautions to prevent further infection. The vessel was fumigated on account of rats, 22 of which were collected and burned.

Disinfection of vessels at San Francisco on account of tuberculosis.

P. A. Surg. W. G. Stimpson reports the disinfection of 3 vessels during September, 1902, on account of the employment of tuberculous seamen on board.

Statistical reports of States and cities of the United States—Yearly and monthly.

ILLINOIS—Springfield.—Month of October, 1902. Estimated population, 36,000. Total number of deaths, 50, including diphtheria, 1, and 7 from tuberculosis.

MASSACHUSETTS—Newton.—Month of October, 1902. Estimated population, 36,336. Total number of deaths, 35, including 4 from tuberculosis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended November 1, 1902, from 69 observers, indicate that diarrhea, enteric fever, pneumonia, erysipelas, and measles were more prevalent and scarlet fever, inflammation of bowels, cholera morbus, and dysentery were less prevalent than in the preceding week. Meningitis was reported present at 3, measles at 18, smallpox at 19, whooping cough at 20, diphtheria at 43, scarlet fever at 63, enteric fever at 91, and phthisis pulmonalis at 226 places.

MINNESOTA—Winona.—Month of October, 1902. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths 24, including enteric fever, 1; whooping cough, 1, and 2 from tuberculosis.

NEW YORK.—Reports to the State board of health, Albany, for the month of September, 1902, from 156 cities, towns, and villages having an aggregate estimated population of 7,467,050, show a total of 9,682 deaths, including diphtheria, 166; enteric fever, 179; measles, 7; scarlet fever, 31; whooping cough, 83; smallpox, 6, and 917 from tuberculosis.

The Monthly Bulletin says:

The record of the month for healthfulness has been good. There was a low summer mortality, and September follows with 500 fewer deaths than the average of past years. The saving has been in diarrheal and digestive diseases. Acute respiratory diseases which had an excessive mortality through the summer have continued about 10 per cent above the normal rate for the month. Diseases of the kidney have likewise been moderately excessive. There were 417 deaths from pneumonia and 385 from Bight's disease. Acute diarrheal diseases have been returned under various phases and names. The nomenclature of 470 death returns have the following numerical ratio: Cholera infantum, 227 deaths; gastro-enteritis, 57; entero-colitis, 43; enteritis, 28; ileo-colitis, 16; colitis, 7; dysentery, 68; diarrhea, 24. Of the last they were variously named infantile diarrhea, cholera morbus, choleraic diarrhea, summer complaint or summer diarrhea, bowel trouble, and diarrhea. Of these, 11 occurred in infancy, 5 in middle life, and 8 past the age of 60 Various contributory causes of deaths were given. There were but 17 of the entire number in which meningitis was given, and 18 were complicated with convulsions, these sometimes being noted as the chief cause of death. Dentition, lack of proper food, malassimilation, milk infection, innutrition, marasmus, stomatitis are frequently noted as attendant and contributory causes of death. Of the 227 deaths from cholera infantum, 167 occurred in the first year of life, 34 in the second year, 15 in the third year, and 2 were so called in whom death occurred at the age of 5 years. Of deaths returned as from gastro-enteritis, 40 were in the first year of life, 2 in the second, 1 at 40, and 13 past 60 years, 30 of the 57 having no contributory cause given. Entero-colitis caused 30 deaths in infancy, 8 in childhood (between 2 and 10 years of age), and 5 past 60. Of 28 deaths from enteritis, 10 fell in the first year of life, 6 in the second, 2 in middle life, and 10 past 60 years of age. Two were defined as catarrhal enteritis and 1 as likewise cholera infantum. Ileo-colitis was given as a cause of death only in infancy and early They were all attended with meningitis, convulsions, marasmus, and malassimilation. Six were noted as ulcerative ileocolitis, all occurring at one locality on Long Island. Colitis, sometimes noted as acute catarrhal and once as ulcerative, caused 7 deaths, 4 in infancy and 3 past 60 years of age. Dysentery was given as the cause of 68 deaths, 15 per cent of the whole number. They were distributed in all parts of the State, and in no special locality, 4 occurring in Westchester County and 2 on Long Island. Bloody dysentery was the term applied to 2, and intestinal hemorrhage occurred in 3 others. Meningitis, convulsions, improper food, and senility were given as contributory, but with 50 no comment was made. Thirteen of the deaths were in the first year of life, 9 at 4, 3 at 10, 12 between 30 and 50, and 31 were past 60 years of age. Of the entire number 470 deaths for diarrheal diseases occurring in all parts of the State, both rural and urban (New York City and Buffalo not being included), 352 occurred in the first year of life, 22 in the second year, 6 in youth, 20 in middle and 70 in old age, the majority of the last being past the age of 70 years.

OHIO—Cleveland.—Month of September, 1902. Estimated population, 400,000. Total number of deaths, 457, including diphtheria, 7; enteric fever, 11; measles, 1; scarlet fever, 1; whooping cough, 3; smallpox, 50, and 27 from tuberculosis.

Month of October, 1902. Total number of deaths, 509, including

diphtheria, 31; enteric fever, 8; scarlet fever, 3; whooping cough, 3; smallpox, 47, and 42 from tuberculosis.

RHODE ISLAND—Newport.—Month of October, 1902. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 35, including enteric fever, 2, and 5 from tuberculosis.

#### Cholera at Hodeidah.

ADEN, ARABIA, October 8, 1902.

SIR: I beg to state that the following is an extract of a letter dated October 5, 1902, from the consular agency at Hodeidah re cholera:

I regret to have to report that the disease is spreading in Hodeidah, as well as in the interior, and consequently the international sanitary board of Constantinople has extended the ten days' quarantine for all arrivals from above Yambo, down to Mokha, both ports included.

Goods arriving from Hodeidah are ten days in quarantine in Aden.

#### BRAZIL.

### Causes of death in Bahia.

Bahia, Brazil, October 13, 1902.

For the week ended October 11, 1902, there were reported in Bahia 93 deaths from the following causes: Arterio-sclerosis, 3; beriberi, 5; bronchitis, 3; cirrhosis of liver, 4; diarrhea and dysentery, 3; enteritis, 2; entero-colitis, 1; malarial fever, 3; gastritis, 5; senile debility, 1; Bright's disease, 3; stillborn, 4; pneumonia, 1; syphilis, 2; tetanus, 3; infantile tetanus, 2; tuberculosis, 10, and from other causes, 38.

For the week ended October 4, 1902, there were reported in Bahia 90 deaths from the following causes: Arterio-sclerosis, 4; beriberi, 4; bronchitis, 3; diarrhea, 1; enteritis, 1; puerperal fever, 1; malarial fever, 5; gastritis, 5; hepatitis, 3; senile debility, 5; stillborn, 9; syphilis, 3; tuberculosis, 9, and from other causes, 37. I have further to report that during the week mentioned there were reported 3 cases of smallpox and 42 disinfections of domiciles took place, being for tuberculosis, 30; smallpox, 8; typhoid fever, 2, and dysentery and diphtheria, 1.

### Smallpox at Pisagua.

September 29, 1902, the consul at Iquique reports an epidemic of smallpox at Pisagua, and some cases in the villages between Pisagua and Iquique.

October 13, 1902, the consul reports that after careful investigation he is able to ascertain the existence of only 6 cases of smallpox at Pisagua, and that reports of an epidemic have been exaggerated.

### Yellow fever at Port Limon.

Acting Asst. Surg. Wm. H. Carson reports 4 cases and 3 deaths from yellow fever at Port Limon from October 6 to October 30, 1902.

#### EGYPT.

### Cholera epidemic.

CAIRO, EGYPT, October 13, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to confirm the following telegram to the Department regarding the cholera epidemic in Egypt:

CAIRO, EGYPT, October 11, 1902.

SECRETARY OF STATE, Washington:

Since 4th instant, 971 cases cholera, 915 deaths—all Egypt.

SMITH.

Comparing the figures of the foregoing with those given in my cable of the 4th instant, it will be seen that there has been a decrease in the number of cases and deaths of over 50 per cent.

#### GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Plague and cholera in various countries.

BERLIN, GERMANY, October 27, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the latest information regarding plague and cholera, obtained from the imperial health office (Kaiserliches-Gesundheitsamt) at Berlin:

#### Plague.

RUSSIA.—During the period from September 30 to October 7 there were registered in Odessa 5 new plague cases and 1 death.

TURKEY.—The 18-year-old waiter, attacked with plague in Smyrna,

died on the sixth day of his illness.

According to a report, dated September 17, from Syria, it appears that in the district of Beni-Cheir 9 plague cases and 8 deaths have been recorded.

EGYPT.—During the period from October 3 to October 10 no fresh cases of plague have been recorded. Only in Alexandria were 4 plague patients still under treatment on October 10. On October 11, however, 1 new case of plague was registered in Alexandria.

BRITISH INDIA.—In the Bombay Presidency between September 21 and September 27 there occurred 9,931 plague cases and 7,443 deaths—that is to say, 682 cases and 712 deaths more than during the foregoing week. In the city of Bombay 78 plague cases and 63 deaths were recorded; in the town and port of Karachi there occurred 19 cases and 13 deaths.

• MAURITIUS.—During the period from August 8 to September 4 there were registered 6 plague cases with 5 deaths.

MOZAMBIQUE.—In Magude, according to a report dated September

15, 2 cases of suspected plague have been registered.

CAPE COLONY.—During the period from August 17 to September 13, according to the official bulletins, no fresh plague cases have occurred in the colony, but dead rats which have succumbed to plague are still found from time to time in Port Elizabeth.

#### Plague and cholera.

British India.—In Calcutta, during the week ended September 13, 6 deaths from plague and 10 deaths from cholera were recorded.

Report from Berlin-Cholera in various countries.

BERLIN, GERMANY, October 27, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the latest information obtained from the imperial health office (Kaiserliches-Gesundheitsamt) at Berlin:

RUSSIA.—According to the official reports published in the Government Gazette (Regierungs-Anzeiger) of October 9, there occurred in the Amur district between September 29 and October 5, 22 fresh cholera cases, of which 3 cases occurred on river steamships; the remaining 19 cases were distributed as follows: Blagoweschtschensk, 1; Nikolajewsk, 1; Vladivostock, 8, and Chabrowsk, 9. The total number of cases recorded in the Amur district since the outbreak of the disease amounts to 1,183, of which 888 (75 per cent), occurred in the 3 most important towns of this territory, Blagoweschtschensk, Vladivostock, and Chaba-

In the Kwantung district, during the period from September 28 to October 1, there were recorded in Port Arthur 5 cholera cases, and in Dalnij 1 case. Altogether in these 2 towns there have been registered, between July 13 and October 1, 1,015 cholera cases.

TURKEY.—In Syria the cholera is spreading from the south in the direction of Jerusalem. According to a report dated October 6, several cases of cholera have been notified in two districts from four to six hours' journey from Gaza. In Gaza itself an alarmingly high rate of mortality prevails, and on October 18 the place was officially declared to be infected with cholera. Two days previously a similar declaration was made concerning Lydda, near Ramleh. According to a report dated October 18 traffic between Jaffa and Ramleh has been interrupted. Hodeida, according to a communication dated October 5, 25 cases of cholera have been registered.

EGYPT.—During the week ended October 6, 1,971 villages were reported to be infected with cholera; 1,571 cases and 1,546 deaths.

KOREA.—In Chinnampo, up to August 29, 139 cholera cases and 79

deaths had been registered.

JAPAN.—According to a report issued by the ministry of the interior, there had been registered, up to August 29, 4,329 cases of Asiatic cholera, with 1,650 deaths. To these must be added 213 cases which had occurred up to August 26 in Formosa, of which 133 ended in death.

GENOA, ITALY, October 14, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to state that I arrived here yesterday, October 13, 1902, and immediately visited Mr. Pearson, the United States consul at this port.

I learn that there is no disease in the city at present of interest from

a quarantinable standpoint.

The water supply is extremely good, being obtained from the moun-

tains some distance away from the city.

The streets are very clean. This was one of the first things I noticed on arrival, and Mr. Pearson tells me that the entire city is in a clean and healthy state.

There is very little malaria in the city, there being very few places

### KOREA.

Measures to prevent the spread of cholera in Seoul.

[No. 513.]

SEOUL, KOREA, October 4, 1902.

SIR: In my dispatch No. 509, of September 23, I handed you a copy of a joint note sent to the Korean minister for foreign affairs by the foreign representatives in Seoul regarding measures to be taken for the suppression of the cholera. The very hour that we had our meeting for that purpose the Emperor took voluntary steps in the same direction and postponed the October celebrations as well. This action was supposed to have been taken to anticipate the attitude of the foreign representatives.

I now have the honor to hand you inclosed a copy of a very prompt reply to this joint note, being but an account of the action taken by the

Emperor in the direction of that indicated by our joint note.

FOREIGN OFFICE, September 25, 1902.

YOUR EXCELLENCY: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your joint note suggesting the prevention of the spread of cholera.

I beg to inform you that His Majesty, on the 20th instant, issued a decree as follows: "At this time during the season of summer and autumn changes there must be some

sickness, and we hear that lately there are severe cases of cholera among the people, which disease is very sudden and there is no time to try with medicine to cure it. Also, the poor people may not be able to get medicine for it, so there may be some untimely deaths, which we are very sorry for. Therefore, we furnish \$5,000 to the sanitary board, and the officials of that board shall invite all the doctors to discuss very carefully and write out a proper prescription and a plan of preventing its spread, and to buy good medicine and think out a way of rescuing the people without the danger of dying because the patients are not at once attended. This prescription they make out to be also sent to the country districts to do the same way. In case anyone neglects to attend it in the same way and cause the disease to increase or spread, it can not be said that he did according to our earnest desire for the good of the people So have the home department to instruct all the governors and magistrates accordingly."

Under this decree I think the officers and doctors of the sanitary board will do what is proper to answer His Majesty's gracious desire, and I also have written to the home department to dispatch policemen to help as much as they need.

#### MEXICO.

### Report from Vera Cruz.

VERA CRUZ, MEXICO, October 27, 1902.

SIR: I have the following report to make for the week ended October 25, 1902: From all causes there were reported 55 deaths—10 cases and 3 deaths from yellow fever, 5 deaths from pernicious fever, 6 from remittent fever, and 6 from tuberculosis.

The health conditions in the shipping have been very good. The captain of the steamship *Frey* had a malarial attack while in port.

The American schooner Oscar G, from Pascagoula, arrived here on the 25, with 1 man suffering from malarial fever, having been sick since the second day at sea, October 12. During the voyage the first officer died after having been sick for eight days, probably also from malaria. No more sickness has occurred aboard. The forecastle and cabin were fumigated and the water casks emptied. The casks were found to be breeding places for mosquitoes.

### Yellow fever at Tampico.

Tampico, Mexico, October 31, 1902.

SIR: I desire to make a final report on the yellow-fever situation in this city. Since the date of my last report there have been officially reported 7 deaths from this disease. It is impossible to learn the number of cases occurring in this city, but the number is large and type generally mild. In short, the disease is epidemic, and unless the winter turns quite cool there is an excellent promise of an extensive outbreak next spring.

#### MAURITIUS.

### Plague, surra, and other diseases.

PORT LOUIS, MAURITIUS, September 20, 1902.

SIR: It is now over four years ago since bubonic plague broke out in Mauritius, and has continued its ravages and devastation up to date amongst all classes of the population, except with slight cessation at occasional intervals.

To add to the many other misfortunes of the island, this town was threatened a short time since with Asiatic cholera and smallpox brought here by Indian troops and contract coolie laborers regularly imported to work on the sugar plantations. On the arrival of the vessel in port it was reported that several cases of cholera and smallpox had occurred on board during the voyage from India to Port Louis. The passengers were at once sent to a quarantine station, about 30 miles distant from this port. By the last reports from this station it appears that the disease is abating and the health of the quarantined improving.

Unfortunately, on the other hand, it will be seen from the inclosed newspaper reports that surra in an epidemic form has broken out amongst the cattle, horses, mules, asses, and oxen used as beasts of bur-

den in the colony.

All the horses in use here are imported from Australia, oxen from Madagascar, mules and asses from South America. There is no stock whatever raised on the island, except a few goats for the use of the Mohammedans and Hindoos, whose religion proscribes the use of other animal food.

### Quarantine proclamation from Christiania.

October 16, 1902, quarantine was declared against Odessa on account of plague, and the following cities and countries were declared infected with plague: Constantinople, Arabia, Persia, India, China, Manila, Formosa, Egypt, Cape Town, Port Elizabeth, Madagascar, Réunion Islands, Mauritius, Porto Alegre and Paranague (Brazil), and Buenos Ayres. Pernambuco was declared no longer infected.
