Measures for checking smallpox in northern Maine.

PORTLAND, ME., March 6, 1903.

Sir: I have the honor to make the following report of my trip made in compliance with Bureau telegrams of the 14th and 15th ultimo.

After consulting with Dr. C. D. Smith, president of the State board of health, I proceeded to Augusta on the 15th ultimo, discussed with Dr. A. G. Young the matter of assisting the State board in its work of checking smallpox in the northern part of the State, and made recommendations by telegraph for the establishment of a detention camp at Glazier Lake, and the employment of inspectors.

As authorized by Bureau telegram of the 19th ultimo, I proceeded with Dr. Young to Millinocket, at which point we hoped to meet Dr. E. Bayard Fisher, of the provincial board of health, but as this appointment failed I next went to Fort Kent and Connors, New Brunswick, on the 24th ultimo, with Dr. Estes Nichols, chief inspector of the Maine board of health, and met Dr. Fisher at that point.

Dr. Fisher seemed desirous of doing his share of the sanitary work, and agreed to establish a detention and disinfection camp on the Temiscouata Railroad on the same general plan of the one to be established by the Public-Health and Marine-Hospital Service at Glazier Lake.

I next visited Glazier Lake, the foot of which is 9 miles from Connors, New Brunswick, and, with Dr. Nichols, decided that this point would be better for our camp than the head of the lake as first proposed, as the lumber for a small isolation building must be hauled from Connors, and the expenses of detention would otherwise be less at this point.

An arrangement was made to board the lumbermen passing, at 75 cents per day, and instructions have been given to hold such persons long enough for an antiseptic bath, to disinfect the clothing with formaldehyde (sprinkling and folding), and to vaccinate those not already protected. Any persons sick with smallpox are to be isolated in the building erected for the purpose.

Circulars were to be issued by the Maine and New Brunswick authorities notifying all persons in lumber camps of the necessity of complying with the above procedures, and as the Glazier Lake camp was to be on New Brunswick territory, I requested Dr. Fisher to appoint the inspector and helpers at the camp as officials (without pay) under the Canadian health laws, though it seems quite probable that no such authority will be necessary. It was, however, considered advisable to provide for an emergency.

I returned to Ashland on the 26th ultimo, hoping to make the nominations from that point, but finding there would be further delay, I telegraphed to the Bureau recommending that the nominations be made from Portland.

It is probable that an inspector will soon be needed at Jackman, as noted in my telegram of the 27th, and as this is authorized by Bureau telegram of the 19th ultimo, I will nominate some one for the purpose when called upon to do so by the State board.

Report from Rock Springs, Wyoming—Smallpox, diphtheria, and scarlet fever.

FEBRUARY 23, 1903.

SIR: I have the honor to inform you that Rock Springs has been suffering from an epidemic of smallpox, diphtheria, and scarlet fever for some months past, which is indicated by the circular I herewith inclose.

My appointment as county health officer took effect December 26, 1902. At this time I am pleased to report to you that we have but one case of smallpox, which belongs to the "nonvaccine" and "not afraid" class, and is now serving his sentence in the pest house.

At present we are entirely rid of diphtheria and to the best of my knowledge and belief have only two cases of scarlet fever. At the time of my appointment there were seventeen cases of smallpox and 351 March 13, 1908

about the same number of scarlet fever and diphtheria, saying nothing of the numerous cases that had existed prior to that and had either died or got well.

I put on the necessary police to quarantine, isolate, and disinfect all business houses and public places of whatsoever character, in addition to the vaccination of all school children and the public in general that had not been vaccinated or had the smallpox.

In addition to the above results, we have rid the city of a lot of worthless curs and cats which were continually carrying these diseases from house to house.

Iowa—Burlington.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 29, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, and 2 from tuberculosis.

Des Moines.—Month of January, 1903. Estimated population, 75,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Four deaths from tuberculosis reported.

MASSACHUSETTS—Worcester.—Month of January, 1903. Estimated population, 124,331. Total number of deaths, 192, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 3, and 23 from tuberculosis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended February 28, 1903, from 68 observers, indicate that measles, phthisis pulmonalis, erysipelas, intermittent fever, and diphtheria were more prevalent, and inflammation of kidney and enteric fever were less prevalent than in the preceding week.

Meningitis was reported present at 5, whooping cough at 29, diphtheria at 37, enteric fever at 43, measles at 58, scarlet fever at 96, smallpox at 114, and phthisis pulmonalis at 180 places.

MISSOURI—St. Louis.—Month of December, 1902. Estimated population, 621,000; white, 582,000; colored, 39,000. Total number of deaths, 796; white, 713; colored, 83, including diphtheria 17, enteric fever 25, measles 1, scarlet fever 11, whooping cough 3, smallpox 2, and 111 from tuberculosis.

Month of January, 1903. Total number of deaths, 919; white, 815; colored, 104, including diphtheria 32, enteric fever 15, measles 1, scarlet fever 7, whooping cough 6, smallpox 1, and 118 from tuberculosis.

## Report from Berlin.

Consul-General Mason forwards the following:

Sanitary regulations for the port of Fuchau, China.

Definitions.—1. Port health officer shall mean the medical officer holding that appointment, the deputy port health officer, or such other medical officers as may be appointed to temporarily fulfill their duties.

2. An infected vessel is one which on arrival outside Sharp Peak has on board, or which has had on board within ten days of her arrival, a case of cholera, typhus fever, yellow fever, or plague, or a person who might reasonably be suspected of being affected by any one of these diseases, or the dead body of a person who had been or who might reasonably be suspected to have been so affected.

3. A plague-infected vessel is an infected vessel as above in which

the disease existing (or having existed) is bubonic plague.

4. A suspected vessel is one which arrives outside Sharp Peak within ten days from her departure from an infected port, whether she has called at an intermediate port or not.

5. The Spiteful Island quarantine anchorage is that to the westward

of Spiteful Island.

General regulations.—1. Infected and suspected vessels on approaching Sharp Peak shall hoist the yellow flag at the fore, and this shall be kept flying until pratique has been granted by the port health officer.

- 2. No person shall be allowed to go on board or to leave an infected or suspected vessel without the sanction of the port health officer, nor shall such vessel be allowed to discharge or take in cargo, baggage, etc., without such sanction.
- 3. Pilots bringing in infected or suspected vessels shall not leave such vessels without authority to do so from the port health officer.

4. Infected and suspected vessels shall on arrival anchor within the

Spiteful Island quarantine anchorage.

5. The port health officer will inspect vessels between the hours of 6 a.m. and 6 p.m., as soon as possible after their arrival. The master shall, on the port health officer's requisition, muster the officers, crew, and passengers, give every facility for the examination of the vessel, and afford all required information within his knowledge regarding the past and present sanitary condition of the vessel.

371 March 13, 1903

7. In the case of suspected vessels, should there be no case or suspicious case of infection found during inspection, the vessel shall (harbor notifications being complied with) be admitted to immediate pratique. Should there be a suspicious case, the vessel becomes an infected vessel.

8. It rests with the superintendent of customs and the board of treaty consuls—

(a) To declare when necessary the infection of ports.

(b) To withdraw such declaration.

(c) To authorize such other precautions as may be expedient for the purpose of preventing either the importation or, in the event of an epidemic of disease in the ports, the exportation of disease.

The public will be informed of such declarations by means of a har-

bor notification.

The commissioner of customs (or other authority in the case of a foreign port) at the port declared infected will be informed by the Fuchau commissioner in the case of a Chinese port, and by the consul of the nation concerned in case of a foreign port, of the declaration of infection or its withdrawal.

9. Should any case of plague, cholera, typhus, or yellow fever occur on board any vessel at Pagoda Anchorage or Nantai, the fact should be immediately notified to the harbor master, who may, on the advice of the port health officer, order such vessel to the Spiteful Island quarantine anchorage.

10. Relatives of patients will not be allowed to communicate with

them in the hospital except by permission of the health officer.

11. The clothing of patients must be either burnt or thoroughly dis-

infected on their discharge from hospital.

12. The port health officer may grant permission to the relatives of deceased patient to view the body at a distance and to assist at the funeral.

13. The port health officer appointed by the superintendent of the customs and the treaty power consuls shall receive a fee of \$25 for each junk visited by him in carrying out these regulations, and this fee shall be collected by the Imperial maritime customs from each vessel before it can be allowed to depart. A certificate shall be issued to each vessel examined without extra charge.

14. The Chinese authorities will provide a steam launch for the use of the health officer and the customs officials, and suitable accommoda-

tion for patients will be provided either afloat or on shore.

15. Any person who commits a breach of these regulations will be dealt with by the authorities to whose jurisdiction he is amenable.

#### PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

### Cholera situation.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Perry reports, January 29, as follows: The condition in Manila remains quite satisfactory, although the infection still exists, and as long as that is the case the danger is not passed.

The disease is widely scattered through the provinces, and, although the number of cases is comparatively small, still the infection of a new

town is followed by a severe local epidemic.

Albay Province, that has so long escaped, has become infected, the disease spreading overland from Sorsogon Province on the south, and several of the towns are suffering severely.

## Outgoing quarantine at Manila provisionally raised.

Manila, P. I., February 4, 1903.

SIR: I have the honor to report that, owing to improved conditions in Manila and vicinity relative to the cholera situation, and since no case of cholera has occurred on vessels in quarantine for the past two months, I have this date provisionally raised the outgoing quarantine imposed on vessels sailing from Manila to clean ports in the Philippine Islands and United States ports.

This action is based on the fact that cholera in Manila has practically subsided, since for the past month there has not been more than one case in a week, which, in a population of 300,000, shows that little risk exists if vessels are allowed to sail without quarantine detention.

### CIRCULAR.

Manila, Philippine Islands, February 3, 1903.

SIRS: Owing to the improved conditions relative to cholera in Manila and immediate vicinity, and in view of the fact that most of the islands in the archipelago either are or have been infected with this disease, the outgoing quarantine imposed on vessels sailing from this port to other places in the Philippine Islands and to United States ports is hereby provisionally raised, and until further notice vessels will be dispatched under the following conditions:

1. Vessels sailing for United States ports will not be subject to quarantine unless passengers are embarked from badly infected ports in the southern islands that have not completed five days since departure from these places. However, these vessels, in the event of taking a large number of steerage passengers, will be subject to inspection by the quarantine officers before a bill of health will be granted.

2. Boats sailing for island ports will not be inspected unless sickness of a suspicious nature is on board among passengers or crew. Such vessels will secure a bill of health in the office of the chief quarantine officer, as was the custom before the establishment of the out-

going quarantine.

- 3. The captain, or other responsible officer of a vessel, will be required to make a declaration that no one of the personnel of his ship is sick, and in the event of having sickness of a suspicious nature on board, such vessel must be inspected before a bill of health will be granted, and the captain is required to immediately notify that quarantine officer of such an event.
- 4. Any captain, owner, or agent of a vessel making a false statement relative to the health of crew and passengers on board, relative to the condition of his ship, or attempts to conceal sickness of a suspicious nature that might subject his vessel to quarantine, will be

prosecuted for each and every offense to the full extent of the law, which provides for heavy fine and imprisonment upon conviction.

5. This order goes into effect on this date and will continue until

further notice.

STEAMSHIP AGENTS AND OTHERS, Manila, Philippine Islands.

A disease resembling measles prevalent at Iloilo.

Assistant Surgeon Gwyn reports, January 26, as follows: A disease is present in Iloilo similar to rötheln, save that the known cases have been among adults. It is characterized by a macular eruption covering the whole body, macules about the size of a pin head and slightly larger or varying from 1 to 2 millimeters in diameter. The eruption appears over the trunk and extremities, palms of the hands, soles of

the feet, and soft palate; as a rule none on the face.

Temperature but slightly elevated, not over 38° C. Patient hardly aware of being sick until the eruption is seen; no itching. There may be slight malaise. The lymphatic glands of the neck are enlarged, as are the supra trochlears and inguinal, the two latter not constant. The disease is unaccompanied by pain, although there may be a slight headache in the beginning. The eruption lasts three or four days and then gradually fades, leaving the skin slightly pigmented. The eruption disappears on pressure, but returns when the pressure is relieved.

The period of incubation could not be determined, but the disease is probably contagious. The eruption resembles that of dengue, but there is an entire absence of joint symptoms and thickening of the skin. The eruption of measles is more closely simulated, except that there is

no crescentic distribution.

# Report from Ponce.

Assistant Surgeon Goldberger reports, February 23, as follows: For the week ended February 13, 1903, there were reported for the district of Ponce a total of 34 births and 24 deaths. Except for some cases of scarlatina, there has been no material change in the public health conditions of this district since my last report.

BRITISH GUIANA—Demerara—Georgetown.—Month of December, 1902. Estimated population, 36,567. Total number of deaths, 203, including 32 from tuberculosis.

CANADA—Quebec—Sherbrooke.—Month of January, 1903. Estimated population, 12,000. Total number of deaths, 16, including 1 from diphtheria.

FRANCE—St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended January 30, 1903. Estimated population, 146,559. Total number of deaths, 166, including diphtheria 1, and 24 from tuberculosis.

GERMANY—Hanover.—Month of December, 1902. Estimated population, 245,901. Total number of deaths, 353, including 59 from infectious diseases.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended February 14, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 17.1 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 15,075,011.

London.—One thousand five hundred and four deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 45; scarlet fever, 8; diphtheria, 22; whooping cough, 55; enteric fever, 5, and diarrhea, 25. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 17 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,996 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 1 from diphtheria, 4 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, 11 from whooping cough, and 1 from diarrhea.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 14, 1903, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 23 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,289. The lowest rate was recorded in Galway, viz, 3.9, and the highest in Newry, viz, 37.8 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 193 deaths were registered, including diphtheria, 1; enteric fever, 1; measles, 2; scarlet fever, 3; whooping cough, 3, and 43 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended February 14, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 18.1 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,702,912. The lowest mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 10.8, and the highest in Aberdeen, viz, 22.3 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 594, including diphtheria, 3; measles, 15; scarlet fever, 8, and 32 from whooping cough.

ITALY—Genoa.—Month of December, 1902. Estimated population, 221,774. Total number of deaths, 592, including diphtheria, 5; enteric fever, 3; measles, 1; scarlet fever, 3, and 66 from tuberculosis.

Spain.—Barcelona.—Two weeks ended February 25, 1903. Estimated population, 600,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Ten deaths from enteric fever and 4 from smallpox reported.

Cadiz.—Month of January, 1903. Estimated population, 70,177. Total number of deaths, 169, including enteric fever, 4; whooping cough, 3, and 18 from tuberculosis.
