Passed Assistant Surgeon Cofer at Honolulu reports, February 24, the disinfection of American schooner *Carrier Dove* on account of tuberculosis, in accordance with Department circular No. 15, 1902, relative to prevention of tuberculosis among merchant seamen.

Yellow fever on vessel from Tampico, Mexico, at Mississippi River quarantine station.

A case of yellow fever was found January 3 on steamship Westhall from Tampico at the Mississippi River quarantine station.

Measures for checking smallpox in northern Maine.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Kalloch at Portland, Me., reports, March 23, that the work at Glasier Lake detention camp is progressing. The isolation building was completed March 10. Fifty-two men and their effects have been disinfected to March 15. Most of the men refuse vaccination. They live for the most part in remote places where there is no board of health. Dr. Nichols, of the State board of health, reports 23 cases of smallpox in vicinity of Fort Kent.

California—Los Angeles.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 135,000. Total number of deaths, 217, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 6, whooping cough 1, and 26 from tuberculosis.

· Oakland.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 83,000. Total number of deaths, 92, including diphtheria 2, and 13 from tuberculosis.

San Diego.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 18, including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

CONNECTICUT.—Reports to the State board of health for the month of February, 1903, from 165 towns, having an aggregate census population of 903,987, show a total of 1,294 deaths, including diphtheria 24, enteric fever 6, measles 19, scarlet fever 14, whooping cough 33, and 101 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Indiana—Evansville.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 65,000. Total number of deaths, 55, including 13 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MARYLAND—Baltimore.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 533,000; white, 451,000; colored, 82,000. Total number of deaths, 862; white, 681; colored, 181, including diphtheria 14, enteric fever 7, measles 21, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 2, and 106 from tuberculosis.

Cumberland.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 17,128. Total number of deaths, 36, including enteric fever 5, and 5 from tuberculosis.

Massachusetts—*Brockton*.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 44,873. Total number of deaths, 51, including whooping cough 1, and 4 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended March 14, 1903, from 68 observers, indicate that inflammation of kidney and whooping cough were more prevalent and

diarrhea and intermittent fever were less prevalent than in the preceding week.

Meningitis was reported present at 3, whooping cough at 25, diphtheria at 27, enteric fever at 36, measles at 53, scarlet fever at 85, smallpox at 105, and phthisis pulmonalis at 168 places.

Mortality during February, 1903: The total number of deaths returned to the Department of State for the month of February was 2,756, or exactly 100 fewer than the number of deaths in the preceding month. The death rate was 14.4 per 1,000 population, as compared with 13.5 in January. The mortality was also slightly higher than that for February of the preceding year. By ages, there were 559 deaths of infants under 1 year, 175 deaths of children aged 1 to 4 years, and 874 deaths of persons aged 65 years and over.

Important causes of death were as follows: Tuberculosis of the lungs, 182; other forms of tuberculosis, 35; typhoid fever, 34; diphtheria and croup, 52; scarlet fever, 16; measles, 17; whooping cough, 31; pneumonia, 372; influenza, 73; cancer, 126; accidents and violence, 134. There was a decrease in the number of deaths from typhoid fever and scarlet fever, while the number reported from influenza was nearly double the number in January. The death rate from this cause, however, was not as high as during the same time last year. Pneumonia showed a very slight decrease in the number of deaths reported. There were 5 deaths from smallpox, situated as follows: Torch Lake Township, Houghton County; Grand Haven city, Ottawa County; Brownstown Township, Wayne County; Detroit city, and Wyandotte city.

AFRICA.

Report from Lourenco Marquez—Suspect plaque at Inhambane.

Consul Hollis reports, January 29, as follows: I have the honor to advise the Department that the acting secretary-general of the province of Mozambique has just informed me in writing that at Inhambane there is a case of sickness that is suspected to be plague, and that the sick person is a native who came from Durban on the steamship Matabele.

The *Matabele* and her sister ship, the *Induna*, are small coasters. They carry large numbers of Kaffirs as deck passengers, and it is highly probable that rats at Durban carried plague germs on board of the Matabele.

A Durban dispatch of January 23, 1903, to the Johannesburg Star reads as follows:

The last plague returns show that there are in the hospital 3 Europeans, 9 natives, and 3 Indians (coolies from India). During the past twenty-four hours there have been 1 fresh case and 1 death.

Durban, it will be noted, is only 300 miles away from this port.

BRAZIL.

Report from Bahia.

During the week ended February 21, 1903, there were interred in the Bahia cemeteries 82 bodies.

The causes given for interment were the following: Bronchitis 3, cancer 1, enteritis 1, malarial fevers 5, gastritis 4, meningitis 2, Bright's disease 3, nephritis 5, pneumonia 2, syphilis 2, tetanus 3, tuberculosis 12, diseases of circulatory system 6, and other causes 33.

Report from Hongkong—Plague and smallpox—Plague-infected rats.

Passed Assistant Surgeon McMullen reports, February 11, as follows: During the week ended February 7, 1903, 10 vessels were inspected, 697 crew and 12 steerage passengers were bathed at the disinfecting station, and 775 pieces of baggage were disinfected. The communicable diseases reported in the colony for this week were: Plague, 12 cases and 12 deaths (Chinese); smallpox, 3 cases and 2 deaths (Chinese); enteric fever, 1 case, and scarlet fever, 1 case. From January 5 to February 2, 1903, 15,207 rats were caught in Victoria and Kowloon, and 120 of this number were found to be infected with plague. The number of plague cases suddenly increased during the past week, and the number of infected rats caught also showed an increase.

Plague and cholera in various countries.

Consul-General Mason reports, March 7, as follows:

Plague.

British India.—During the first February week there were registered in the Bombay Presidency 15,273 cases of plague (and 12,071 deaths), of which 29 cases (33 deaths) occurred in the town and port of Karachi.

Japan.—Up to the 11th of January there had been registered in Tokio since the 17th of December 11 plague cases (with 8 deaths).

British South Africa.—In Port Elizabeth during the week ended January 31, 2 fresh cases of plague, with fatal termination, were regis-

In Natal during the week ended January 17, 12 cases of plague were registered. The total number of cases up to January 17 amounted to 34 (with 17 deaths).

Cholera.

Turkey.—According to the seventeenth official bulletin regarding cholera in Palestine and Syria, 29 deaths from cholera were registered in Damascus between the 9th and 15th of February.

Japan.—During the second half of the year 1902, according to official statistics, there occurred in the district of Nagasaki-Ken 704 cases of cholera (486 deaths).

Death rate of Berlin.

I have to report that the death rate of Berlin for the week ended February 21 was somewhat lower than in the two foregoing weeks, and amounted, calculated upon the year, to 15.9 per thousand of the population, this being lower than for the corresponding week of last year, in which it amounted to 16.6. Of the large German cities, during this week, Carlsruhe, Kiel, Essen, Barmen, Crefeld, Braunschweig, Charlottenburg (with 11.2), and Schöneberg (with 8.7 per thousand) showed more favorable conditions than Berlin. But the mortality rate was considerably higher than that of Berlin in Leipzig, Dresden, Munich, Nürnberg, Cologne, Stettin, Königsberg, and Breslau, as well as in London, Paris, and Vienna. There was in this week a considerable increase in the number of deaths among children in their first year. The death rate among infants rose, since the second February week, from 3.1 to 4.1 per mille. Thirty-six deaths resulted from acute diseases of the intestines. Acute diseases of the respiratory organs claimed 63 victims (as compared with 83 in the foregoing There were also registered 83 deaths from consumption and 18 deaths from influenza. Forty persons died of cancer. An increase was noted in the number of cases of scarlet fever, which caused 8 deaths. Further, there occurred 8 deaths from measles and 9 deaths from diphtheria. Twelve persons died by violence.

Emigration from Naples.

The emigration from Naples is increasing greatly as the season advances. During the past week 9,314 emigrants were inspected. It is anticipated that the movement during March, April, and May will exceed all previous records.

Bubonic plague in Natal.

Reports from Durban, dated February 23, 1903, state that the epidemic of bubonic plague is abating. There were then 18 cases under treatment. Since the beginning of the prevalence there have been 83 cases and 50 deaths. February 25 a case was reported at Pietermaritzburg.

Bubonic plague in Mauritius.

A report from the governor of Mauritius states that during the week ended February 19, 1903, there were 4 fresh cases of bubonic plague, with 1 death.

Bubonic plague in India.

Reports from Bombay, dated February 26, 1903, indicate an alarming increase of bubonic plague. On the date of the report there were in the province of Bombay 195 cases and 180 deaths. On the same day last year there were 147 cases and 113 deaths.

JAPAN.

Reports from Yokohama.

Assistant Surgeon Moore reports, February 19 and 26, as follows: During the week ended February 14, 5 vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 593 crew and 455 passengers, were inspected; also 222 steerage passengers were bathed and 390 pieces of baggage were disinfected.

No official report of the health of Yokohama for the above period has been received by me. It seems that no new case of plague has occurred in Tokyo for more than a month, so that the disease in that city may be regarded as suppressed. Plague still exists in Formosa.

During the week ended February 21, 1903, three steamships, having an aggregate personnel of 285 crew and 474 passengers, were inspected; 216 steerage passengers were bathed and 420 pieces of baggage were disinfected.

The report of communicable diseases in Yokohama for the same period notes 2 cases of enteric fever with 1 death and 3 cases of diphtheria with no deaths. No cases of grave quarantinable diseases have been notified in this city during the year 1903.

CANADA—British Columbia—Victoria.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 21,000. Total number of deaths, 24, including diphtheria 1, and 1 from tuberculosis.

CHILE—Antofogasta.—Month of January, 1903. Estimated population, 8,000. Total number of deaths, 62, including enteric fever 1, smallpox 13, and 7 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended February 28, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 16.6 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 15,075,011.

London.—One thousand four hundred and forty-four deaths were registered during the week, including measles 57, scarlet fever 6, diphtheria 15, whooping cough 43, enteric fever 11, and diarrhea 15. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.3 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,965 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 6 from diphtheria, 3 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 14 from whooping cough, and 1 from smallpox.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 28, 1903, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,289. The lowest rate was recorded in Queenstown, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Newry, viz, 42.0 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 195 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 1, measles 1, scarlet fever 3, whooping cough 5, and 36 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended February 28, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 17.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,702,912. The lowest mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 9.3, and the highest in Aberdeen, viz, 22.0 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 581, including diphtheria 6, measles 9, scarlet fever 5, and 23 from whooping cough.

HAWAII—Honolulu.—Month of February, 1903. Population, 39,306. Total number of deaths, 81, including enteric fever 2, plague 2, and 15 from tuberculosis.
