

PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.

UNITED STATES.

NOTE.—The name of the acting assistant surgeon appointed at Progreso, Mex., for duty in the office of the United States consul was erroneously stated as Thompson in Public Health Reports of April 24, 1903. The officer appointed is Dr. J. F. Harrison.

Amendments to regulations of Louisiana State board of health governing disinfection at Habana and Cuban ports, adopted April 15, 1903.

The Galveston regulations governing disinfection at Habana and other Cuban ports are hereby reconsidered and rescinded and the following substituted:

1. Pyrethrum powder shall be burned in the living quarters at Habana immediately before the departure of the vessel.

2. Baggage of passengers shall be sealed and signed in Habana by joint medical inspector, and each passenger to have a certificate signed by the inspector.

3. Certificate to show temperature at time of inspection, hour to be noted.

4. Thorough disinfection of living quarters and baggage (and holds when no perishable cargo) upon arrival at quarantine stations.

5. Noninfected vessels from Cuban ports other than Habana (so long as reported free of yellow fever) shall be given pratique after thorough disinfection at quarantine station.

Owners of baggage from Florida ports and from Jacksonville (Fla.) coming to Louisiana shall have to satisfy the inspector of the Louisiana State board of health that they do not come from Cuba, or their baggage shall be held at the Louisiana line or stations for inspection and disinfection.

Quarantine proclamation, State of South Carolina.

CHARLESTON, S. C., April 15, 1903.

The quarantine regulations of this State will be rigidly enforced from Friday, May 1, at sunrise, and continue until Saturday, October 31, at sunset, at the several ports of this State. Section 948, general statutes of South Carolina:

That for the certain prevention of the introduction of disease into the several ports of this State, every vessel arriving from a foreign

port, or from a suspected or infected port of the United States, shall immediately proceed to the quarantine station of the port of arrival and display a yellow flag or the vessel's ensign in the rigging, and shall be visited by the quarantine officer between sunrise and sunset, as soon as possible after such arrival.

Vessels having had on board yellow fever, typhus, cholera, small-pox, bubonic plague, either at port of departure or during voyage or at time of arrival, will not be boarded by pilots, but shall be directed by them to the South Atlantic Quarantine Station, Sapelo Sound. Pilots must anchor at the quarantine station all other such vessels that are subject to inspection. They will be held responsible for all violations of quarantine regulations after they have boarded any vessel, and they must not leave such vessel until authorized to do so by the quarantine physician.

BAKERSFIELD, CAL., *April 26, 1903.*

Measures for checking smallpox in northern Maine (Canadian border).

Surgeon Kalloch reports from Portland, Me., April 18 and 23, that during the first ten days of the present month Acting Asst. Surg. J. M. Boothby inspected 103 persons and vaccinated 16 at Lowelltown, Me. He states that there are 20 cases of smallpox in the towns in Canada which are nearest his point of inspection.

There has been no log driving in the vicinity of Lowelltown, owing to lack of rain, but it will begin as soon as the rivers are filled by the rains, and many lumbermen will then pass this point.

No lumbermen passed Camp Glazier during the week ended April 20, the log driving not having begun at that point. Fourteen persons in the neighborhood were vaccinated. At Sandy Bay 88 persons were bathed.

Smallpox in Oregon.

Assistant Surgeon White reports April 22, from Portland, as follows: Two types of smallpox are present in epidemic form in Oregon—first, the mild atypical type, with slight or no mortality. This is widely scattered over the State and is usually regarded by the laity as of little moment on account of its mildness, being diagnosed as negro itch, poison oak, chicken pox, etc. This type is considered to have existed in Oregon for more than a year, and there are now probably 250 cases throughout the State.

The second type is a recent importation. The city councilmen of Shaniko and Prineville, after consultation with the secretary of the State board of health, visited all the residents of their respective wards and urged that they be immediately vaccinated. The result of their advice, in conjunction perhaps with the reported mortality, is entirely satisfactory to those in charge of the situation.

It is the purpose of the State board of health to take measures to eradicate the disease from the State as soon as practicable.

CALIFORNIA—*San Diego*.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 21, including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Sacramento.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 44, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, and 8 from phthisis pulmonalis.

CONNECTICUT—*Bridgeport*.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 75,000. Total number of deaths, 110, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 2, and 10 from phthisis pulmonalis.

INDIANA—*Evansville*.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 70,000. Total number of deaths, 67, including enteric fever 3, and 16 from tuberculosis.

IOWA—*Davenport*.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 51, including enteric fever 1 and 5 from tuberculosis.

Month of March, 1903. Total number of deaths, 66, including enteric fever 3 and 5 from tuberculosis.

MARYLAND—*Cumberland*.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 17,128. Total number of deaths, 28, including enteric fever 1 and 4 from tuberculosis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended April 18, 1903, from 74 observers indicate that whooping cough and inflammation of bowels were more prevalent, and phthisis pulmonalis, remittent fever, enteric fever, and diphtheria were less prevalent than in the preceding week.

Meningitis was reported present at 6, diphtheria at 24, whooping cough at 27, enteric fever at 36, measles at 62, scarlet fever at 66, smallpox at 84, and phthisis pulmonalis at 170 places.

The Monthly Bulletin of Vital Statistics says: The total number of deaths returned to the Department of State for the month of March was 3,034, or an increase of 278 over the preceding month. The death rate was exactly the same as for the preceding month, being 14.4 per 1,000 population. The mortality was also slightly higher than for March of the preceding year.

By ages there were 582 deaths of infants under 1 year, 181 deaths of children aged 1 to 4 years, inclusive, and 951 deaths of persons aged 65 years and over.

Important causes of deaths were as follows: Tuberculosis of the lungs, 197; other forms of tuberculosis, 40; enteric fever, 48; diphtheria and croup, 34; scarlet fever, 22; measles, 29; whooping cough, 34; pneumonia, 403; diarrheal diseases, under 2 years, 51; influenza, 140; cancer, 143; accidents and violence, 150.

Comparing March with the preceding month, there was an increase of mortality from all the causes stated above with the exception of diphtheria and croup, which diseases showed considerable decrease. The mortality from influenza was nearly double that of the preceding month. The death rate was slightly higher than for March, 1902.

There were 2 deaths reported from smallpox during the month, both from the city of Grand Rapids. The number returned from this cause last month was 5.

NEW YORK—*Buffalo*.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 380,000. Total number of deaths, 504, including diphtheria 7, enteric fever 11, measles 2, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 14, small-pox 1, and 46 from tuberculosis.

OHIO—*Youngstown*.—Month of March, 1903. Census population, 44,885. Total number of deaths, 86, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 17, and 4 from tuberculosis.

TENNESSEE—*Nashville*.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 81,809; white, 51,387; colored, 30,416. Total number of deaths, 150; white, 79; colored, 71, including enteric fever 2, measles 3, whooping cough 1, and 26 from tuberculosis.

WASHINGTON—*Seattle*.—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 115,000. Total number of deaths, 86, including enteric fever 4, measles 1, and 12 from tuberculosis.

Report from Yokohama—Smallpox on steamship Gaelic among Korean emigrants bound for Hawaii.

Assistant Surgeon Moore reports, March 27, as follows: During the week ended March 21, 1903, there were inspected 2 vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 186 crew and 357 passengers; 132 steerage passengers were bathed, and 344 pieces of baggage disinfected.

The local quarantine officers removed a case of smallpox (mild varioloid) from the steamship *Gaelic*, sailing from Hongkong to San Francisco via ports. The vessel was disinfected at the Nogahama quarantine station.

The case occurred in the person of a Korean child, one of a band of Korean steerage passengers taken on at Nagasaki and bound for the Hawaiian Islands. Judging from such reports as reach me, as well as the large proportion of disfigured faces observed during inspection of Korean emigrants, smallpox must be a very common malady in Korea, in marked contrast to Japan, where, at present, thanks to an efficient system of vaccination, the disease is rare.

The official report of infectious diseases in Yokohama for the above period shows: Enteric fever, 1 case, 0 deaths; diphtheria, 4 cases, 3 deaths; dysentery, 2 cases, 0 deaths.

Suspected evasion of United States immigration laws by emigrants affected with trachoma.

Assistant Surgeon Moore reports, April 2, as follows: During the week ended March 28, 1903, four vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 562 crew and 971 passengers, were inspected; 506 steerage passengers were bathed, and 775 pieces of baggage were disinfected.

During the above period there were officially reported in the city of Yokohama cases of infectious diseases as follows: Enteric fever, 1 case, no deaths; diphtheria, 2 cases, no deaths.

It is noted that a large proportion of the emigrants recently engaging passage at this port for the United States and its possessions exhibit evidence of disease of the conjunctivæ. When cases are observed at inspection presenting symptoms of trachoma sufficiently well marked to act as a bar under the immigration laws of the United States, suitable recommendations are made to the steamship officials. These measures are, however, to a certain extent rendered futile, since it commonly happens that emigrants suffering from trachoma, and thereby unable to secure direct passage to the United States, buy steamship tickets to Canadian ports, especially Victoria, British Columbia, apparently with the intention of evading the immigration laws of the United States.

MEXICO.

Report from Mazatlan—No new cases of plague.

Consul Kaiser reports, April 3, that there had been no new cases of plague for more than two weeks prior to the date of his dispatch, and that at the date of writing there were only 13 patients confined in the pesthouse. Of these, the majority were convalescent. Confidence is restored, and the people who fled from the city are returning.

For the week ended April 14, Consul Kaiser reports as follows: There are only two patients in the pesthouse at the present time, one of whom is better, and the other case is doubtful. The death that occurred in the pesthouse during the past week was of a patient who had been there since last January. The plague is considered by every one here extirpated, as we have had no new cases for over three weeks, although there are some cases in a little hamlet 20 miles northwest of this city.

AUSTRALIA—*New South Wales—New Castle.*—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 48,600. Total number of deaths, 37, including 1 from diphtheria.

Sydney.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 383,386. Total number of deaths, 545, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 13, measles 2, scarlet fever 6, whooping cough 2, and 40 from tuberculosis.

BAHAMAS—*Dunmore Town.*—Two weeks ended April 10, 1903. Estimated population, 1,232. One death. No contagious diseases.

Green Turtle Cay, Abaco.—Two weeks ended April 8, 1903. Estimated population, 3,314. No deaths and no contagious diseases.

Nassau.—Two weeks ended April 13, 1903. Estimated population, 12,439. Number of deaths not reported. No contagious diseases reported.

FRANCE—*St. Etienne.*—Two weeks ended March 15, 1903. Estimated population, 146,671. Total number of deaths, 128, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 1, and 17 from tuberculosis.

GIBRALTAR.—Two weeks ended April 5, 1903. Estimated population, 27,460. Total number of deaths 16. No deaths from contagious diseases.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended April 4, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 15.8 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 15,075,011.

London.—One thousand three hundred and eighty-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles 73, scarlet fever 5, diphtheria 15, whooping cough 60, enteric fever 3, and diarrhea 20. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.7 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,875 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring"

the deaths included 5 from diphtheria, 8 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, and 14 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended April 4, 1903, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 24.0 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,289. The lowest rate was recorded in Armagh, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Queenstown, viz, 46.1 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 204 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 2, smallpox 1, and 42 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended April 4, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 18.0 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,702,912. The lowest mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 12.6, and the highest in Greenock, viz, 25.5 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 589, including diphtheria 1, measles 12, scarlet fever 1, and 25 from whooping cough.

HAWAIIAN ISLANDS—*Honolulu.*—Month of March, 1903. Census population, 39,306. Total number of deaths, 77, including enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 11 from tuberculosis.

ITALY—*Milan.*—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 507,690. Total number of deaths, 971, including diphtheria 14, enteric fever 9, measles 3, typhus fever 1, and 70 from phthisis pulmonalis.

JAMAICA—*Kingston.*—Month of March, 1903. Estimated population, 46,542. Total number of deaths, 101, including diphtheria 1 and 12 from phthisis pulmonalis.

JAVA—*Batavia.*—Two weeks ended March 7, 1903. Estimated population, 150,000. Number of deaths not reported. No contagious diseases.

NORFOLK ISLAND.—Month of February, 1903. Estimated population, 971. No deaths and no contagious diseases.
