PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.

UNITED STATES.

First annual conference between National and State health authorities.

The first annual conference under the law of July 1, 1902, of delegates from the health authorities of the States with the Surgeon-General of the Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service, was held on June 3, 1903, at the New Willard Hotel, Washington, D. C., the conference being called to order by the Surgeon-General at 10 o'clock a. m., and final adjournment being taken at 5.30 o'clock p. m. Twenty-three States were represented by delegates, three others sending letters of regret. A full report of the proceedings of this conference will appear in the Public Health Reports later on.

Statistical reports of States and cities of the United States—Yearly and monthly.

Connecticut—Stamford.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 21,000. Number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

GEORGIA—Augusta.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 42,441. Total number of deaths, 63, including diphtheria 1, whooping cough 1, and 5 from tuberculosis.

MARYLAND—Cumberland.—Month of April, 1903. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 28, including diphtheria 1, whooping cough 1, and 2 from tuberculosis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended May 30, 1903, from 82 observers, indicate that smallpox, whooping cough, erysipelas, and diphtheria were more prevalent, and diarrhea, intermittent fever, and enteric fever were less prevalent than in the preceding week.

Meningitis was reported present at 1 place, whooping cough at 25, diphtheria at 27, enteric fever at 31, scarlet fever at 59, measles at 74, smallpox at 92, and phthisis pulmonalis at 187 places.

MINNESOTA—Mankato.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 13,500. Total number of deaths, 11. No deaths from contagious diseases.

MISSOURI—St. Louis.—Month of April, 1903. Estimated population, 645,000—white, 605,000; colored, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 984—white, 864; colored, 120—including diphtheria 20, enteric fever 17, measles 32, scarlet fever 6, whooping cough 8, and 161 from tuberculosis.

Montana—Helena.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 13,000. Number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—Franklin.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 6,000. Total number of deaths, 2. No deaths from contagious diseases.

NEW YORK.—Reports to the State board of health, Albany, for the

month of April, 1903, from 156 cities, towns, and villages having an aggregate population of 7,910,600, show a total of 10,951 deaths, including diphtheria 247, enteric fever 105, measles 66, scarlet fever 131, whooping cough 86, smallpox 6, and 1,224 from tuberculosis.

The Monthly Bulletin says:

The April mortality is that of the average for five years past. Grippe perhaps caused 1,200 deaths; the reported deaths were 40 in New York City and 166 in the rest of the State. The mortality of early life is below the average, of old age it is excessive. Acute respiratory diseases have decreased from March. Pneumonia and Bright's disease, respectively, caused 1,067 and 692 deaths. Smallpox caused 3 deaths in Buffalo, 2 in Rochester, and 1 in New York; cases still prevail in Delaware, Chautauqua and Clinton counties; at Saranac, St. Regis Falls, and Malone a few; Elmira, 2 imported cases, and at Mechanicsville several recently discovered.

Saratoga.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 15,000. Total number of deaths, 20, including enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 4 from tuberculosis.

NORTH CAROLINA—Charlotte.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 48, including whooping cough 3 and 3 from tuberculosis.

OHIO.—Reports to the State board of health for the eight weeks ended May 9, 1903, from 62 localities having an aggregate population of 1,280,577, show 38 deaths from diphtheria, 144 from enteric fever, 5 from measles, 5 from scarlet fever, and 26 from whooping cough.

PENNSYLVANIA—Columbia.—Month of June, 1903. Estimated population, 13,500. Total number of deaths, 12, including enteric fever 1, and 3 from tuberculosis.

York.—Month of May, 1903. Estimated population, 37,000. Total number of deaths, 44, including 2 from diphtheria.

Passed Assistant Surgeon McMullen reports, April 23 and 30, as follows:

During the week ended April 18, 1903, 7 vessels were inspected, with an aggregate personnel of 652 crew and 467 passengers—189 cabin and 278 steerage; 525 crew and 276 steerage passengers were bathed, and 883 pieces of baggage disinfected. During the week there were 51 cases of plague and 47 deaths (2 Indians and 49 Chinese); 1 fatal case of smallpox (Chinese), and 1 case of enteric fever (European).

From January 1 to April 22 there have been 307 cases of plague

reported—1 European, 6 Indians, and 300 Chinese.

During the week ended April 25, 1903, 15 vessels were inspected, with an aggregate personnel of 1,075 crew and 1,614 passengers—252 cabin and 1,362 steerage; 732 crew and 1,351 steerage were bathed and 2,295 pieces baggage disinfected. There were 6 rejections among the steerage. Weekly return of communicable diseases shows 79 cases and 72 deaths from plague and 1 fatal case of smallpox, all Chinese, making a total of 404 cases of plague to date this year.

Report from Shanghai—Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, May 6, as follows: During the week ended May 2, 1903, 3 vessels, 172 crew, 141 steerage, and

71 cabin passengers were inspected.

Communicable diseases were reported to the municipal health department as follows: Smallpox, 3 deaths; typhoid fever, 1 case; diphtheria, 1 death. The total mortality was 3 foreigners and 121 natives.

COLOMBIA.

Report from Bocas del Toro, fruit port—Smallpox—Vaccination.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Osterhout reports as follows: Week ended May 26, 1903. Present officially estimated population not obtainable; number of deaths from smallpox during the week, 5; number of deaths from other causes, 7; prevailing diseases, smallpox and malarial fevers; general sanitary condition of this port and the surrounding country during the week, not good. Disinfection of Russian bark Paramatta from Port Elizabeth at Habana.

Assistant Surgeon Trotter, at Habana, reports, June 2, the disinfection of the Russian bark Paramatta upon request of the chief quaran-

tine officer for the island of Cuba. This vessel arrived at Caibarien with all well on board and no sickness en route from Port Elizabeth, South Africa, being fifty days out from port of departure. The vessel was not granted pratique at Caibarien on account of the presence of plague at Port Elizabeth. It was disinfected at Habana and released after twenty-four hours. Careful examination failed to show the presence of rats, and as the vessel loaded and discharged cargo in open bay at Port Elizabeth it is likely that there were none on board. The vessel was destined for Europe.

Reports from Matanzas—Mortality statistics.

Passed Assistant Surgeon von Ezdorf reports, June 1, as follows: During the week ended May 30, 1903, twelve vessels received bills of health prior to sailing for ports in the United States. Twelve deaths were reported in the city of Matanzas during the period covered by this report, making an annual rate of mortality for the week of 13 per 1,000. GERMANY.

Report from Berlin-Plague and cholera in various countries.

Consul-General Mason reports, May 25, as follows:

Plague.

Turkey.—The cases of suspected plague which have occurred at Zobeir have been declared by the medical officer of Bassora to be true bubonic plague. Up to the 9th of May there had occurred at that place 28 cases of plague and 18 deaths. In the neighboring district of

June 12, 1908 932

Messayda 9 cases of plague, with 7 deaths, have occurred since the 24th

of April.

Egypt.—On the 6th of May another case of plague was registered in Port Said. In Borgayah (District Minieh) there occurred 1 case of plague and 1 death during the week ended May 8, and in the District Magagha there were registered 8 cases and 5 deaths.

French Indo-China.—Between the 22d and 28th of April there were

registered at Hanoi 18 deaths from plague.

Mauritius.—During the period from March 13 to April 2 there occurred on the island 1 case of plague and 1 death. The last case

registered was on the 19th of March.

British South Africa.—According to the weekly bulletin issued in Cape Colony, there were registered between the 5th and 11th of April 12 cases of plague in Port Elizabeth and 3 cases in King Williams Town.

Cholera.

Turkey.—According to the official weekly bulletin, there occurred in Damascus, between the 27th of April and 8th of May, 8 cases of cholera and 7 deaths. There had been registered altogether, up to the 11th of May, since the commencement of the present epidemic, 92 cases of cholera and 81 deaths.

Dutch India.—According to official reports there were registered in Batavia, between March 14 and April 1, 6 cases of cholera (with 4 deaths). In Soerabaya there occurred between March 8 and April 4 cases of cholera (with 2 deaths). Within the Government district of Celebes there were recorded, between the 1st and 10th of March, at Binamoe 18 cases of cholera (with 18 deaths). In Kadjang there occurred within the same period 82 cases of cholera (with 56 deaths). In Balangnipa, between the 11th and 20th of March, there were registered 7 cases of cholera and 6 deaths.

Death rate of Berlin.

The death rate of Berlin for the week ended May 9 was higher than in the two foregoing weeks, and amounted, calculated upon the year, to 16.3 per thousand of the population, this rate being considerably higher than that for the corresponding week of last year, in which it amounted to only 14.9. Three-fourths of the large German cities, however, showed less favorable figures than Berlin, the death rate of the following towns, among others, being higher than that of this city, namely: Dresden, Leipzig, Hanover, Magdeburg, Cologne, Frankfort-on-the-Main, Munich, Stuttgart, Königsberg, Breslau, as well as Paris and Vienna. The following places had a lower rate than Berlin, viz: Hamburg, Düsseldorf, Charlottenburg (12.9), Schöneberg (with 12.4 per thousand), also London. The increase in the number of deaths since the foregoing week was exclusively confined to children in the first year of life, the number of deaths among the higher age classes remaining relatively low. The rate of mortality among infants rose from 3.9 to 5.2 per year and mille. This rate, however, did not amount to much more than half that of Breslau and Munich. Acute intestinal diseases showed no important change, causing 40 deaths. however, a noticeable increase in the number of cases of acute disease of the respiratory organs, which claimed 64 victims. Phthisis pulmonalis caused 73 deaths. There were registered also 4 deaths from

scarlet fever and 4 deaths from diphtheria. There was a decrease in the number of cases of measles, 5 of which ended in death. Further, there occurred 47 deaths from cancer and 2 deaths from influenza. Nine persons died by violence.

centage of deaths at civil hospital has been about 100.

The weather has been extremely dry since the 5th ultimo. Last night we had our first rain since the above-mentioned date, and as a consequence of this dry spell mosquitoes were becoming comparatively few, but as no precautions are taken and as nearly every house has rain barrels, many of which were filled by the rain of last night, the mosquitoes will probably show themselves in large numbers, and if the larvæ have become infected there is nothing to prevent many foci of infection from forming.

Report from Vera Cruz-Yellow fever.

Assistant Surgeon Goldberger reports, May 25, as follows: The total mortality for the week ended May 23, 1903, was 41, including yellow fever 7, remittent fever 5, and tuberculosis 9.

During the twenty-three days ended May 23 there were reported

24 cases of yellow fever, with 13 deaths.

NICARAGUA.

History of yellow fever case on schooner Sunbeam and treatment of nessel.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Goodman reports, May 14, as follows: On May 8 the schooner Sunbeam, of about 25 tons, entered this harbor from Port Limon, Costa Rica, and in accordance with quarantine in force against that port, was immediately ordered into quarantine waters, an open roadstead 5 miles from Bluefields and three-fourths of a mile from the harbor proper. When boarded there by the port physician the captain was found to be sick. The day following I visited the boat in company with this physician and elicited the following history: The schooner arrived in Limon from Bluefields Sunday morning, May 3, and left there Monday night. The captain was ashore both Sunday and Monday. On Tuesday night he was taken sick, and from the history of the case and his condition when I saw him on the fifth day of his illness, I did not hesitate to pronounce it yellow fever, though of a mild type. He has since gone on to recov-As the crew had been in communication with him for five days and had been six days from Limon and were all well and as there was no suitable place in which to isolate them, I advised that all be kept aboard, a thorough disinfection of the boat and contents to be performed, and close observation made for six days, when if all had continued well she could be safely given free pratique.

The disinfection was supervised by me and consisted in the burning of sulphur in open pots in the hold, forecastle, and cabin, 5 pounds to the 1,000 cubic feet, followed by washing the hold and all woodwork in forecastle and cabin with a sea-water solution of bichloride of mercury 1:1,000. This was the easier done, the boat being in ballast. A close inspection before and after disinfection failed to reveal the presence of mosquitoes, a condition to be expected, as the schooner for three days sailed against strong head winds. I anticipate no spread of the infection to the town or shipping.

The local health authorities, especially the port physician, Dr. V. Gurdian, are to be commended for establishing the quarantine and the vigorous enforcement of the same.

PERU.

Plague at Callao—Origin of outbreak—Quarantine against Callao.

Minister Dudley, at Lima, reports, May 12, as follows: The existence of bubonic plague at Callao became public on the 5th instant, three deaths having occurred during the preceding week, as is supposed, from this cause.

The bacteriologist of the municipality of Lima and physicians who have undertaken a diagnosis of the alleged cases of plague at Callao state the number of genuine cases, I am told, to have been 10. Of

this number, 4 have proved fatal, 2 are expected to terminate fatally,

and 4 will recover.

All have originated in the mill of Milne & Co., at Callao, and the germs of the disease are alleged to have been brought either from India in a cargo of rice or from Australia in a cargo of wheat, both of which were imported for the mill. Flour made from this wheat has been seized and destroyed wherever it has been possible to trace and find it, not only in Lima and Callao but in Pisco and several other points.

By supreme decree of the 9th instant, Ancón, 10 or 15 miles north of Callao, was proclaimed a port of entry in the latter's place during

the continuance of the plague there.

The ports of Paita and Mollendo will decline to receive ships clearing from Callao, Ancón, or Pisco. Other ports will probably follow their example. It is reported that until confidence is reestablished no ship proceeding from any Peruvian port will be received at Guayaquil or Panama, or in Chili.

Statement of vice-consul at Callao.

In this connection Vice-Consul Cree at Callao reports, under date of May 12, that the outbreak in the flour mill of Milne & Co. occurred among laborers engaged during the night in cleaning a cesspool from which a number of dead rats were taken out. These men were all attacked simultaneously with severe sickness. No other cases occurred among the men employed in the mill, about 80 in all, nor in the family of Mr. Milne, who lives on the premises.

Cholera increasing.

Assistant Surgeon Heiser reports, April 23 and May 8, as follows: April 23: The disease seems to be becoming more active in certain parts of the islands, particularly in northern Luzon. During the week we had one vessel infected from that source. At Cebu there has also been a case, but an investigation seems to show that the case did not gain entrance through the quarantine. The general feeling in medical circles is that there will be a sharp increase in the number of cases upon the advent of the rainy season, and it is feared that Manila will become infected from adjacent provinces by the overland route. At the present time there are cases in the villages situated within a radius of 50 miles of Manila.

May 8: As was predicted in the report of two weeks ago, the first rains brought a sharp increase in the number of cholera cases in Manila. About half occurred among the crews of the launches and other small craft that never leave the harbor. Not a single case could be traced to importation by sea. The cases that were reported on deep-sea vessels all occurred five days after entering port.

Cholera has been spreading rapidly down the western coast of Luzon. Arrangements have just been completed with the army with the view of protecting the village of Mariveles on the land side. The village officials had the town cleaned up and the inhabitants vaccinated,

and have regulated the sale of vegetables.

TURKEY.

Cholera at Damascus.

Consul Ravndal at Beirut reports, April 25, as follows: The quarantine against Damascus has been reduced to forty-eight hours. As far as known, cholera is extinct in all other parts of Syria.

Thirty-three deaths from cholera have been reported to me by the sanitary authorities of this city during the last three weeks ending yesterday—that is, 15 deaths during the week ended the 4th instant, 14 deaths during the week ended the 11th instant, 4 deaths during the week ended the 18th instant.

Boukowski Pasha, delegate of the Sultan, has informed me that the quarantine at Mrejat has been reduced to forty-eight hours since the 16th instant, and he hopes that if the state of the disease continues

favorable the sanitary cordon will shortly be removed.

Foreign and insular statistical reports of countries and cities—Yearly and monthly.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended May 9, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 16.0 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 15,075,011.

London.—One thousand three hundred and eighty-eight deaths were registered during the week, including measles 64, scarlet fever 10, diphtheria 14, whooping cough 39, diarrhea 17, and enteric fever 4. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.7 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,904 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 5 from diphtheria, 6 from measles, and 8 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 9, 1903, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.6 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,289. The lowest rate was recorded in Armagh and Queenstown, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Newtownards, viz, 34.3 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 192 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 3, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 4, smallpox 4, and 37 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 9, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 17.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,702,912. The lowest mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 11.5, and the highest in Greenock, viz, 24.8 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 585, including diphtheria 5, measles 8, scarlet fever 4, and 26 from whooping cough.

France—Marseille.—Month of April, 1903. Estimated population, 491,161. .Total number of deaths, 188, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 11, measles 1, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 1, small-pox 36, and 108 from tuberculosis.

St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended April 30, 1903. Estimated population, 146,671. Total number of deaths, 133, including enteric fever 1 and 18 from tuberculosis.

GIBRALTAR.—Two weeks ended May 17, 1903. Estimated population, 27,460. Total number of deaths, 16. No deaths from contagious diseases.
