El Paso, Tex.—Acting Assisting Surgeon Alexander reports, August 29, 1903, as follows: Week ended August 29, 1903. Mexican Central passengers inspected, 190; Rio Grande and Pacific passengers in-

spected, 22; Mexican immigrants inspected, 101; disinfection of soiled linen imported for laundry, 459 pieces; disinfection of baggage of 2 passengers, 12 days out of Vera Cruz, a port infected with yellow fever.

Statistical reports of States and cities of the United States—Yearly and monthly.

CONNECTICUT—*Stamford*.—Month of August, 1903. Estimated population, 22,000. Total number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

MARYLAND—*Cumberland*.—Month of August, 1903. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 30, including enteric fever 1, and 1 from tuberculosis.

MICHIGAN.—Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, for the week ended August 29, from 89 observers, indicate that measles were more prevalent, and neuralgia, tonsillitis, dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, inflammation of kidney, intermittent fever, inflammation of bowels, remittent fever, pneumonia, and diphtheria were less prevalent than in the preceding week.

Meningitis was reported present at one place, measles at 20, whooping cough at 27, diphtheria at 29, smallpox at 30, scarlet fever at 52, enteric fever at 72, and phthisis pulmonalis at 216 places.

NEW YORK.—Reports to the State board of health, Albany, for the month of July, 1903, from 156 cities, towns, and villages having an aggregate population of 7,910,000, show a total of 11,134 deaths, including diphtheria 234, enteric fever 126, measles 88, scarlet fever 89, whooping cough 72, and 991 from tuberculosis.

OHIO—*Toledo*.—Month of July, 1903. Estimated population, 150,000. Total number of deaths, 165, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 3, and 10 from tuberculosis.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Columbia*.—Month of August, 1903. Estimated population, 13,500. Total number of deaths, 22, including 2 from tuberculosis.

WISCONSIN—*Milwaukee*.—Month of July, 1903. Estimated population, 315,000. Total number of deaths, 308, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 32 from tuberculosis.

Thirteen cases of plague (1 Japanese and 12 Chinese) were reported for the week, with 11 deaths, a total of 1,363 since January 1, 1903. One case each of enteric and puerperal fever were the only other communicable diseases reported. Numerous cases of cholera are reported at Amoy.

Egypt.—During the period from the 1st to the 7th of August there were registered in the whole of Egypt 14 cases of plague (with 8 deaths), namely, 9 cases (4 deaths) in Alexandria; 3 cases (3 deaths) in Damiette, and 2 cases (1 death) in Port Said.

British India.—During the week ended July 18 there were registered in the Bombay Presidency 2,457 cases of plague (with 1,817 deaths).

Japan.—In Nagasaki, according to an official report dated June 30, plague has been stamped out. During the months of April and May over 20,000 rats were killed.

British South Africa.—In Cape Colony during the period from the 12th to the 18th of June the following plague cases were registered: Port Elizabeth, 1 case; East London, 1 case; Queenstown, 1 case. Plague rats continue to be found in Port Elizabeth, Queenstown, and King Williams Town.

British India.—In Calcutta during the period from the 5th to the 11th of July 15 persons died of plague and 35 persons died of cholera.

Turkey.—According to weekly bulletin regarding cholera in Syria the disease continues to spread. There have recently been registered 1,391 fresh cases (and 1,116 deaths).

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JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama—Plague and cholérine.

Assistant Surgeon Moore reports, August 7, as follows:

During the week ended August 1, 1903, five vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 431 crew and 550 passengers, were inspected, 193 steerage passengers and 16 crew were bathed, and 363 pieces of baggage were disinfected. The official report of contagious diseases in Yokohama for the week ended July 25 shows: enteric fever, 4 cases, 2 deaths; diphtheria, 1 case, 1 death; plague, 3 cases (previously reported), 1 death; dysentery, 11 cases, 0 deaths. The same report for the week ended August 1 shows: enteric fever, 8 cases, 1 death; diphtheria, 1 case, 0 deaths; plague, 0 cases, 1 death; dysentery, 12 cases, 1 death.

Cases of cholérine, some of which are probably true cholera, continue to be reported from Kobe and other places in southern Japan.

MEXICO.

Report from Progreso and Merida—Inspection of vessels—Yellow fever.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Harrison reports, August 29, as follows: Week ended August 29, 1903. Present officially estimated population, 8,000 (about); 1 case of yellow fever during the week; 1 death; number of deaths from other causes during the week, 9. Prevailing diseases, malarial and enteric.

General sanitary condition of this port and the surrounding country during the week, fairly good.

Merida.—Deaths 30, from following causes: Yellow fever, enteritis, gastritis, pernicious fever, meningitis, traumatism, broncho-pneumonia, etc.

During the week there were 9 cases of yellow fever officially reported; remaining from the previous week 17, making a total of 26 cases for the week ended August 29.

There were 22 deaths recorded from all causes, of which 6 were from yellow fever, 2 from tuberculosis, 2 from pernicious fever, 1 from cachexia palustris, 1 from tetanus, and 10 from noncontagious causes.

This shows a decided improvement in number of cases and deaths, probably due to there being very few nonimmunes remaining in this city.

The surrounding country is still badly infected.

John Tesclier, of the British steamship *Texan*, was removed and sent to hospital on August 25 with a temperature of 40°; proved malarial and was discharged from hospital on August 29.

Report from Vera Cruz—Mortality statistics—Yellow fever—Increase in number of cases of malarial disease.

Assistant Surgeon Goldberger reports, August 31, as follows:

During the week ended August 29, 1903, there was recorded in this city a total of 130 deaths from all causes; of these, 36 were due to yellow fever, 9 to tuberculosis, and 18 to malaria.

The sanitary condition of the port is much as at the date of my last report. With the first of next month the authorities expect to begin their campaign against yellow fever. Judging from the considerable increase in the number of cases of malarial disease, a sanitary campaign against this disease would be highly desirable.

NICARAGUA.

Report from Bluefields, fruit port.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Goodman reports as follows: Week ended August 29, 1903. Present officially estimated population, 4,000; 3 deaths; prevailing disease, malarial fever and intestinal disorders. General sanitary condition of this port and the surrounding country during the week good.

PERU.

Recurrence of plague on littoral of Peru and northern Bolivia.

The following is received from Minister Dudley at Lima, under date of August 13: Within a few days bubonic plague has reappeared upon the coast of Peru at Mollendo, the port of Arequipa and northern Bolivia (including La Paz), and at Pacasmayo, about 250 miles north of Callao. The number of cases thus far reported is small, but shipping from the two ports named is, of course, subjected to rigid quarantine at all other Peruvian ports.

Little surprise is felt at the return of the plague in view of the outbreak in May at Callao and Pisco, and its existence for several weeks past at Iquique and Valparaíso. It has in truth never disappeared from the coast of these adjoining Republics since it appeared at Callao over three months ago.

VENEZUELA.

General diffusion of smallpox.

Consul Ellsworth at Puerto Cabello reports, August 17, as follows: Smallpox has made its appearance in Maturin. The disease has passed, with fatality, over nearly the whole of the Republic, with the movement of the troops in the campaign.

Foreign and insular statistical reports of countries and cities—Yearly and monthly.

BRAZIL—Pernambuco.—Two weeks ended June 30, 1903. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 262, including smallpox 2, yellow fever 1, and 45 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Two weeks ended July 15, 1903. Total number of deaths, 240, including smallpox 6, and 37 from phthisis pulmonalis.

DUTCH GUIANA—Paramaribo.—Month of July, 1903. Estimated population, 32,263. Total number of deaths, 94. No contagious diseases reported.

GIBRALTAR.—Two weeks ended August 9, 1903. Estimated population, 27,460. Total number of deaths, 12. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended August 15, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 15.7 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 15,075,011.

London.—One thousand two hundred and fifty-five deaths were registered during the week, including measles 24, scarlet fever 8, diphtheria 11, whooping cough 15, enteric fever 4, and diarrhea 139. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 14.2 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,682 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 4 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended August 15, 1903, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 16.6 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,289. The lowest rate was recorded in Clonmel

and Sligo, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Galway, viz, 35.0 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 136 deaths were registered, including enteric fever 2, diphtheria 1, measles 1, whooping cough 1, and 30 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 15, 1903, correspond to an annual rate of 15.4 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,702,912. The lowest mortality was recorded in Edinburgh, viz, 12.2, and the highest in Greenock, viz, 18.8 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 505, including diphtheria 1, measles 5, scarlet fever 3, and 12 from whooping cough.

JAMAICA—Kingston.—Month of July, 1903. Estimated population, 46,542. Total number of deaths, 122, including whooping cough 1, and 16 from phthisis pulmonalis.

JAPAN—Nagasaki.—Ten days ended July 31, 1903. Estimated population, 148,883. Total number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

JAVA—Batavia.—Two weeks ended July 4 and July 18, 1903. Estimated population, 150,000. Number of deaths not reported. No contagious diseases.

MEXICO—Monterey.—Period from April 1 to August 12, 1903. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 1,322, including enteric fever 14, measles 45, whooping cough 23, and 110 from tuberculosis.
