AFRICA.

Status of plague in Cape Colony.

CAPE TOWN, CAPE COLONY, December 17, 1902.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your dispatch No. 103, dated November 14, in reference to a bill of health issued at Port Elizabeth, given to the captain of the Norwegian bark Superior, in which you say the bill of health stated there had been 136 cases and 67 deaths at Port Elizabeth. There had been occasional cases of plague in Cape Colony for some time prior to my taking charge of this office, December 1, 1901. The records show that there have been more cases in Port Elizabeth than any other place. You will see by the inclosed report that they commenced counting February 2, 1901, and I have no later report showing the exact number that have existed in this place, but I quote the report from the colonial secretary for August 18, 1902, in which he gives the total number since the plague first started.

Plague-infected rats have been found at Port Elizabeth occasionally. The total number of cases in Cape Colony in this report is 907, Port Elizabeth alone having 135 cases at the date of August 18, above referred to. As this bill of health gives the statement that there have been 136 cases there, there has evidently been 1 case since last August,

which I find by the record was reported early in November.

In making a bill of health from this office, we always give the date of the last case of plague. The last case we had in Cape Town was January 2, 1902. The above report shows that the only case they have had in Port Elizabeth for many months was this case in November. I learn that the patient was alive and under treatment December 1.

I write Port Elizabeth to-day to make out their bills of health in

future as we do, giving the date of the last case.

We are practically free from plague in all portions of Cape Colony.

The following report by the medical officer of health for the colony on the state of the outbreak of bubonic plague in the Cape Colony for the week ended December 13, 1902, is published for general information.

Report of the medical officer of health on the state of plague in Cape Colony during week ended December 13, 1902.

One corpse dead of plague was discovered at Port Elizabeth on December 9, 1902, the deceased being a colored male adult. The last preceding case occurred on November 17, 1902, and is still under treatment at the plague hospital.

No other cases of plague have been discovered or were under treatment in the colony during the week ended Saturday, December 13, 1902.

BARBADOS.

Quarantine information.

Mr. James Sanderson, clerk general board of health and quarantine board, January 3, 1903, reports as follows: Between the nights of December 19 and the 2d instant 9 cases of smallpox have occurred, being 1 less than in the previous fortnight, and there have been 1 death and 37 discharges, leaving 28 under treatment last night. Total number of cases 1,402, with 113 deaths. Between the middle of last September and the end of the year, 102,952 persons were reported as having been vaccinated by the public vaccinators, in addition to from 15,000

to 20,000 who had been previously vaccinated.

The latest bills of health received from South American ports give the following information: From Santos, dated December 4, clean; Para, dated December 11, indorsed, a few sporadic cases of vellow fever; Bahia, dated December 21, 6 cases of smallpox; Pernambuco, dated November 24, 7 deaths from smallpox in previous fourteen days, and December 23, 5 deaths from smallpox in previous fourteen days; Rio de Janeiro, November 1 to November 15, 12 cases, 5 deaths from yellow fever, 32 cases, 20 deaths from smallpox, 46 cases, 11 deaths from plague; November 16 to November 30, 21 cases, 13 deaths from yellow fever, 25 cases, 28 deaths from smallpox, 31 cases, 6 deaths from plague; December 1 to December 17, 31 deaths from yellow fever, 23 deaths from smallpox, 13 deaths from plague.

CANADA.

Inspection of immigrants at St. John, New Brunswick.

St. John, New Brunswick, January 14, 1903.

Asst. Surg. W. C. Billings reports for the week ended January 10. 1903, as follows: Immigrants inspected, 304; detained, 17; passed, 287. The SURGEON-GENERAL.

CHINA.

Report from Hongkong.

P. A. Surgeon John McMullen reports December 8, 1902, as follows: Week ended December 6, 1902, 10 vessels were inspected, 758 individuals, viz, 145 steerage passengers, and 613 crew were bathed at the disinfecting station, and 852 pieces of baggage were disinfected. There were 3 rejections during the week from fever. Three cases of enteric fever-1 Japanese and 2 Chinese—were reported for the week with 1 death. No other cases of communicable diseases were reported in the colony during the week.

Report from Shanghai.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, December 16, 1902, as follows: There were inspected during the week ended December 6, 1902, 2 vessels, 56 crew, 15 cabin and 16 steerage passengers. Shipping orders were signed for 9,104 pieces of freight. Communicable diseases for the week ended December 14, 1902, were reported as follows: Smallpox, 1 case, 22 deaths: typhoid fever, 4 cases: diphtheria, 6 deaths: tuberculosis, 1 case.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin.

Consul-General Mason reports, January 3, 1903, as follows: The death rate of Berlin for the week ended December 20, 1902, was considerably lower than that of the foregoing week, amounting to 15.9 per 1,000 of the inhabitants (as compared with 17). Of the large German cities, only 4-Frankfort-on Main, Cassel, Schöneberg, with 15.6, and Charlottenburg, with 12 per 1,000 inhabitants—showed more favorable health The rate of mortality in Hanover, Leipzig, and conditions than Berlin. Dresden was higher than that of Berlin, while that of Hamburg, Cologne, Stuttgart, Munich, Königsberg, as well as London, Paris, and Vienna, was higher still. Acute intestinal diseases caused 38 deaths. Cases of acute disease of the respiratory organs increased again this week, claiming 82 victims. The increase in the number of cases of influenza was especially noticeable, 16 deaths from this disease being registered. There occurred 71 deaths from pulmonary consumption, a slight decrease as compared with the foregoing week. Cases of measles were somewhat less frequent, causing 11 deaths. Scarlet fever claimed 6 victims, and 2 deaths from diphtheria were registered. Finally, 5 persons died by violence.

The SURGEON-GENERAL.

Plague and cholera in various countries.

Plague.

CAPE COLONY.—In Port Elizabeth, on November 17, a fresh case of plague was registered. The patient was an European, and this was the first case since September 23.

MEXICO.—The report that plague has broken out in Mazatlan has

received official confirmation.

BRAZIL.—Between November 1 and November 15, 26 deaths from plague were registered in Rio de Janeiro. Fourteen of these deaths took place in the plague hospital at Jurujuba. No abatement of the plague was noticeable in the second half of November.

PARAGUAY.—According to an official statement, dated November 15, no fresh case of plague had occurred in Asuncion for twenty-two days.

Plague and cholera.

British India.—In Calcutta, during the week ended November 29, 12 persons died of plague and 42 persons died of cholera.

Cholera.

TURKEY.—Between December 8 and December 10, 15 cholera cases and 6 deaths were registered in Jaffa, and in 12 districts in the vicinity 996 deaths from cholera were reported on December 9. On December 6, 21 deaths were notified in Adjilun and Radjid. Ten cholera cases and

3 deaths occurred in Jericho between December 6 and December 8. Erhaya, on December 7 and December 8, 10 cases and 3 deaths were recorded. On December 10 and December 11, 15 cholera cases occur-

red among the foreign laborers and the inhabitants of Amman.

Regarding the course of the cholera in the East Jordan territory, the health office at Damascus publishes the following report: On December 4 the disease broke out in Kuneitra. A peasant returning from Salt brought the cholera to his native place, the village of Redscheb, where he, together with 15 others, succumbed to the disease. persons have died of cholera and 1 cholera patient is under treatment there. In Amman, on December 7, 5 deaths from cholera occurred among the soldiers.

DUTCH INDIES.—In Soerabaya, between November 2 and November

15, 165 cholera cases and 115 deaths were registered.

ITALY.

Report from Naples—Inspection of vessels—Plaque and cholera in various countries.

Naples, Italy, December 29, 1902.

P. A. Surg, J. M. Eager reports for the week ended December 27, 1902. as follows: December 21, steamship Palatia, of the Hamburg-American Line, bound with passengers and cargo for New York. There were inspected and passed 622 steerage passengers and 78 pieces of large baggage; 600 pieces of baggage were disinfected by steam. The rejection of 34 steerage passengers was advised. December 23, steamship Montevideo, of the Spanish trans Atlantic Line, bound with passengers and cargo for New York. There were inspected and passed 118 steerage passengers and 20 pieces of large baggage; 150 pieces of baggage were disinfected by steam. The rejection of 6 steerage passengers was advised. December 24, steamship Vancouver, of the Dominion Line, bound with passengers and cargo for Boston. There were inspected and passed 400 steerage passengers and 100 pieces of large baggage; 500 pieces of baggage were disinfected by steam. The rejection of 68 steerage passengers was advised.

Asiatic cholera in Egypt.

Reports from Cairo state that there were, December 19, 1902, 15 cases of cholera under treatment at Alexandria. No other cases were reported as existing in Egypt. December 22, the number of cases under treatment was reduced to 4.

Bubonic plague at Mauritius.

Reports from the governor of Mauritius state that for the week ended December 18, 1902, there were 27 cases of plague with 14 deaths.

JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama.

YOKOHAMA, JAPAN, December 18, 1902.

Asst. Surg. Dunlap Moore reports, December 11, 1902, as follows: For the week ended December 13, 1902, 4 vessels, having a total personnel of 379 crew and 535 passengers, were inspected; 399 steerage passengers were bathed and 497 pieces of baggage were disinfected. During the same period, cases of infectious diseases, as follows, were reported in Yokohama: Enteric fever, 6 cases, no deaths; diphtheria, 1 case, no deaths; dysentery, 1 case, no deaths. No grave quarantinable disease has recently been reported to me as occurring in this vicinity.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Cholera situation.

MANILA, P. I., December 13, 1902.

SIR: In reviewing the cholera situation in the Philippine Islands for the past month, and in transmitting cholera reports for the three weeks ended December 6, 1902, I have the honor to state that during this time cholera in Manila practically disappeared, when there was a rather sharp increase covering a period of ten days with a gradual decline until the disease assumed about the same proportions as before. This increase, in my opinion, was due principally to "fiestas," or large celebrations that were held in Manila immediately preceding the increase in the number of cases, since, during this time, large numbers of natives gathered in Manila attending the celebration of certain events, many of whom came from the surrounding districts. Another factor operative at this time was the coming to Manila of a number of refugees on account of the prevalence of ladrones in an adjacent province, the latter place being infected with cholera. A third factor which must not be overlooked in determining the cause of the increase is that of the shipment to Manila from Laguna Province, that had recently passed through a severe epidemic of cholera, of large quantities of such vegetables as radishes, lettuce, and small onions that are eaten in an uncooked state.

At the date of writing there are but few cases of cholera occurring in Manila, 1 or 2 cases daily in a population of 350,000 people, but the infection still exists, and as long as this is the case the danger is not over and Manila must be considered an infected port.

Relative to the disease in the provinces, the reports submitted do not show the actual condition of affairs, as the number of cases that actually have occurred during the period embraced by this data is much greater than shown. The disease in Luzon, Marinduque, and Cebu is practically over with the reservation mentioned in speaking of the disease in Manila.

Leyte, Samar, and adjacent islands may be placed in the same category with those already mentioned. There are a few centers of infection and the disease is apparently in abeyance, but the infection exists, and with the lax quarantine, or absence of quarantine, it is impossible to make predictions as to the time when the epidemic will have run its course.

The epidemic in Panay and western Negros is subsiding, but Oriental

Negros and some parts of Panay are still badly infected.

As stated in previous reports, the deadly factor of the native small boat, parao or banca, which defies quarantine restrictions and regulations, especially since they have to be enforced at most ports by native physicians, has continued its work in the dissemination of cholera, and at date of writing most of the ports and many of the inland towns of the island of Mindanao are badly infected, and Surigao and Zamboanga, as well as other places on that island, are suffering from severe epidemics.

By the same agency the disease has been carried to the island of Basilan, and to those of the Sulu group, where the epidemic has just commenced to assume severe proportions.

At present there are only a few provinces in Luzon, that are more or less inaccessible, and a few scattered and remote islands that have not

been visited by the epidemic, but they may yet become infected.

In reviewing the epidemic, two or three factors relative to the control of such a disease as cholera in the Philippine Islands are apparent. First, it would appear that the salvation would be in the maritime quarantine preventing the introduction of the disease into any part of the archipelago. This was done for two years, when the islands were threatened by the presence of epidemics in Singapore, but unfortunately failed the third year, probably on account of not having timely knowledge of the appearance of the disease in Canton in the severe epidemic which has spread throughout the Orient this year.

The second factor is, upon the immediate appearance of cholera in any part of the islands, the institution of the most rigid quarantine around the infected centers, in order to stamp out the disease in its

commencement. I believe this is possible.

The total number of cases reported to December 9, 1902, is as follows: Manila, 4,533 cases, 3,402 deaths; provinces, 117,246 cases, 74,505 deaths; but this number does not represent more than two-thirds of the actual number of cases and deaths which have occurred since the first appearance of the disease in these islands.

PORTO RICO.

Report from Ponce.

Assistant Surgeon Goldberger reports, January 5, 1903, as follows: For the month of December, 1902, there were inspected and passed 3 vessels, 156 crew, and 94 passengers; of the passengers, 3 were for Ponce; the others, in transit. Bills of health were issued to 7 vessels sailing from this port. The sanitary condition of the city and port of Ponce is not all that could be desired, chiefly on account of the lack of sewerage. There was considerable rain during the past week which gave to the streets a strong resemblance to some of our country roads—puddles, mud, and all. The temperature has, however, been comparatively low, and coincidently the mosquitoes not excessively numerous or annoying. During the month of December, there were examined 23 immigrants; all were passed, none certified for deportation.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS.

Report from Singapore.

Asst. Surg. Carroll Fox reports, November 8, 1902, from Singapore as follows: For the week ended November 1, 1902, there were reported in this city 19 cases of cholera. There were also 2 cases of smallpox and 1 case of plague. The city has been free from plague for several months until this case, and it is thought that it originated from an imported source, probably from India. This city has a large Chinese population, there being 180,000 Chinese in a total population of 250,000. The water supply comes from a lake 4 miles from the city, this lake being fed by brooks. The highest elevation in this vicinity is 500 feet. The city owns the land surrounding the lake and thus the water can be kept uncontaminated. For some time there has been almost no rain and the depth of water in the lake has fallen from 12 feet to 2½ feet, which has of course reduced the water supply of the city and put the inhabitants on short allowance. In the last few days, however, there has been some rain, causing the supply of water to be more plentiful.

Nassau.—Two weeks ended January 6, 1903. Estimated population, 12,535. Number of deaths not reported. No contagious diseases reported.

BRITISH GUIANA—Demerara—Georgetown.—Month of November, 1902. Estimated population, 36,567. Total number of deaths, 167, including 30 from tuberculosis.

Canada—Quebec—Sherbrooke.—Month of December, 1902. Estimated population, 12,000. Total number of deaths, 16, including diphtheria, 1, and 1 from whooping cough.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended December 27, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 16.9 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 14,862,880.

Bradford.—Two weeks ended December 27, 1902. Estimated population, 281,770. Total number of deaths, 203, including diphtheria, 5; enteric fever, 4; measles, 1; scarlet fever, 1; whooping cough, 3, and 12 from tuberculosis.

London.—One thousand four hundred and fifty-eight deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 42; scarlet fever, 12; diphtheria, 22; whooping cough, 32; enteric fever, 11, and diarrhea, 15. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.6 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,002 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring"

the deaths included 8 from diphtheria, 7 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, 7 from whooping cough, and 6 from diarrhea.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended December 27, 1902, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,092, 401. The lowest rate was recorded in Tralee, viz, 5.3, and the highest in Clonmel, viz, 51.3 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 188 deaths were registered, including diphtheria, 3; enteric fever, 3; measles, 7; scarlet fever, 2; typhus fever, 1; whooping cough, 1, and 36 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended December 27, 1902, correspond to an annual rate of 21.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,679,923. The lowest mortality was recorded in Aberdeen, viz, 17.5, and the highest in Paisley, viz, 23.7 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 688, including diphtheria, 6; measles, 6; scarlet fever, 3, and 20 from whooping cough.

JAPAN—Nagasaki.—Twenty days ended December 20, 1903. Estimated population, 131,700. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria and 2 deaths from enteric fever reported.
