The Monthly Bulletin for October, 1905, says:

Public health conditions during the month are normal. There were 500 more deaths than the average of five years, but the death rate is the average. One-eighth of the deaths were epidemic. Diphtheria increased but little above September and is low for the month. Diarrheal deaths are excessive; there were 75 over the age of 5 years to 250 under that age, the average age being at 70; dysentery caused more than half, without, however, prevalence at any locality, the majority so reported being at age 70 or over. Grippe has been the reported cause of a few deaths during the month. Pneumonia has increased in all the districts.

Saratoga Springs.—Month of November, 1905. Estimated population, 12,119. Total number of deaths, 16, including 2 from tuberculosis.

AFRICA.

Report from Cape Colony—Examination of rodents for plague infection.

The report of the medical officer of health for Cape Colony shows that during the week ended October 28, 1905, no plague was present in the colony. At Port Elizabeth 1 case remained under treatment at the plague hospital, and of 368 rodents examined, 12 were found to be plague-infected. The total number of rats examined at King Williams Town, East London, and other districts of the colony, including shipping in the Cape Town Harbor, was 1,038. No infection was found.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

Report from Trieste—Inspection of emigrants.

Assistant Surgeon Foster reports, November 23, as follows:

During the week ended November 18, 1905, the steamship *Georgia* sailed for New York via Naples. There were inspected and passed 260 steerage passengers. The number of pieces of baggage disinfected was 149, and the number of pieces inspected 5.

Reports from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Case of malarial fever on steamship China—Smallpox—Typhus fever and plague at Niuchwang.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, October 24 and Novem-

ber 1, as follows:

During the week ended October 21, 1905, 4 original bills of health were issued to 3 steamships, 1 schooner, and 4 vessels; 161 crew and 2 cabin passengers were inspected and passed. The effects of 44 Asiatic crew, 64 pieces of baggage, were disinfected with sulphur dioxide, 5 per cent, for 18 hours. Forty-three of these men were members of the crew of the steamship Winnebago, bound for San Francisco, and 1 was a new member of the crew of the Lowther Castle, bound to Cebu. The crew of the sailing vessel, the Polar Star, were all Europeans, and were not submitted to disinfection. There was 1 case of trachoma in the person of one of the passengers on the Polar Star, which fact was entered on the bill of health, there being no immigrant manifests on board.

A report for the week ended October 7, 1905, from Niuchwang shows 1 case and 2 deaths from typhus fever. No other outports reported quarantinable disease present.

Shanghai and Chefoo have declared Niuchwang an infected port on account of the prevalence of plague there, and both ports have with-

drawn their restrictions against Hongkong and Foochow.

Week ended October 28, 1905: Two bills of health, 1 original and 1 supplemental, were issued to 2 steamships, the former being granted to the United States battle ship *Oregon*, without inspection, upon the certificate of her medical officer. One vessel, 170 crew and 125 steerage passengers, were inspected and passed, together with 5 pieces of baggage, and there were disinfected 5 pieces of baggage. One case of fever, probably malarial, was discovered at inspection on board the steamship *China*, and noted on bill of health. Manifests were viséed for 4,158 pieces of freight, while 6 pieces, household effects, were

inspected and passed. Eight emigrants for San Francisco, per steam-

ship China, were examined and passed.

Smallpox is not reported officially, but I understand that it is beginning to make its appearance to a noticeable extent among the Chinese.

Niuchwang was the only outport reporting quarantinable disease present. For the period ended October 21, 1905, there were reported at that port 1 new case and 3 deaths from plague. There have been so far, it is said, but 4 deaths from that disease, and its spread is claimed to be checked.

CUBA.

Reports from Cienfuegos—Inspection of vessels.

Consul Baehr reports, December 1 and 4, as follows:

During the week ended November 25, 1905, 6 bills of health were issued for vessels bound for the United States, with 120 crew. No passengers. The sanitary conditions of these vessels were reported good; no sickness on board. No quarantinable diseases were reported at this port during the week.

Week ended December 2, 1905, 2 bills of health issued for vessels bound for the United States, with 47 crew. No passengers. The sanitary conditions of these vessels were reported good; no sickness. No quarantinable diseases were reported at this port during the week.

Reports from Habana—Inspection of vessels—Yellow fever—Quarantine against Gulf ports of United States raised conditionally.

Passed Assistant Surgeon von Ezdorf reports, December 5, 6, 8, 9, 11, and 13, as follows:

During the week 17 cases and 7 deaths from yellow fever were reported. November 28, 1 case was reported from Marianao, a suburb of Habana. This case was of a woman who, it is reported, had not left Marianao for four months, consequently infection could not be traced to Habana proper. One case was also reported the same day as occurring in Vedado, another suburb. Cases are being reported as occurring outside of what was known as the infected district, so that conditions regarding infection do not appear favorable. Rain has prevailed the latter part of the week, which is unusual for this time of the year. In looking over the record of yellow-fever cases reported it is interesting to note the large proportion of persons who have contracted the disease after a short residence on the island.

From November 10 to December 2, inclusive, there have been 35 cases and 10 deaths reported from yellow fever. The authorities have, I understand, increased their fumigating and oiling brigades.

Four new cases of yellow fever reported December 6.

Report from Mantanzas—Inspection and precautionary detention of vessels—Observation of nonimmunes in vicinity of yellow fever case—Mortality.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, December 4, 8, 11, and 13, as follows:

DECEMBER 4.

During the week ended December 2, 1905, five bills of health were

granted to vessels leaving this port for the United States.

Precautionary quarantine while in port was observed by the Cuban authorities against the British steamship Framfield and the schooner Prosperare of the same nationality, both arriving from Mobile. The former cleared for an unknown port in the United States, November 26, while the latter left for Gulfport, Miss., on the 29th instant without any sickness on board.

The case of yellow fever reported November 26 has recovered and

is still held under observation at the civil hospital.

As a result of the investigation mentioned in my previous report it has been ascertained that over 50 nonimmunes, mostly Spaniards, are living in the neighborhood where the case of yellow fever occurred, who are being inspected daily to complete the twenty days from the appearance of the disease. The inspection of passengers arriving from Habana by train and sea is also being continued. Up to my present writing no new cases and no suspicious cases have been reported.

Mortality of the city of Matanzas from November 20 to 30, 1905, 22. During the month of November, 1905, 19 bills of health were granted to vessels leaving for the United States, having an aggregate number

of 544 crew and 134 steerage passengers in transit for various ports in Cuba. There were no transactions for the Canal Zone, nor for the Republic of Panama.

Yellow fever in Matanzas Province.

DECEMBER 8.

One case of yellow fever, ending in death, reported December 8 at Union de Reyes within this province.

DECEMBER 11.

One case of yellow fever within this province reported December 11.

DECEMBER 13.

Two additional cases of yellow fever reported to-day at Colon, Province of Matanzas, Cuba.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin-Status of cholera in Russia.

Passed Assistant Surgeon McLaughlin reports, November 25, as follows:

According to the publications of the Russian plague commission, there occurred in the Vistula territory (Russia), between October 26 and November 1, 11 fresh cases of cholera with 6 deaths, and between November 2 and 8, 18 cases (18 deaths). Of the cases reported in the last week of October, 7 cases and 4 deaths occurred in the district of Makow (government of Lomja), 2 cases in the city of Lodz, 1 case and 1 death in the city of Warsaw and the district of Ostrow. Of the 18 fatal cases in the first week of November, 13 cases (12 deaths) occurred in the district of Kolno (government of Lomja), 2 cases (2 deaths) in the city and district of Lomja, 1 case (1 death) in the district of Makow, and 1 death in the district of Masowetzk.

INDIA.

Reports from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera and plague mortality—Plague in Rangoon—Rat destruction.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, November 9 and 16, as follows:

During the week ended November 4, 1905, bill of health was issued to the steamship *Bucrania*, bound for Philadelphia and New York, with a total crew of 49. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards placed on wharf lines, and lascars' effects disinfected.

During the week ended October 21, 1905, there were 51 deaths from

cholera and 6 deaths from plague in Calcutta.

In India during the same period there were 4,407 cases and 3,336 deaths from plague.

Week ended October 28, 1905, 26 deaths from cholera and 6 deaths

from plague in Calcutta.

In Bengal, week ended October 21, 1905, 145 cases and 88 deaths from plague.

In India, week ended October 28, 1905, 3,551 cases and 2,713 deaths

from plague.

During the month of October there were 145 cases of plague in Ran-

goon, as against 148 in September, with 132 deaths.

The regular winter increase of plague in Upper India had not yet begun at the first of this month, but in the Bombay Presidency the death rate was mounting. During the last week of October, out of a total of 2,713 plague deaths in the whole country the Bombay Presidence had 1 150

dency had 1,956.

Week ended November 16, 1905: According to reports at hand, rat destruction is continuing in Rangoon. During October, 1905, 10,259 rats were killed. Out of 135 which were examined in the plague laboratory 99 were found to contain plague bacilli. Efforts made to ascertain the number of rats still left in the crowded area of the town by the employment of trained rat catchers resulted in a complete failure to capture a single rat.

Week ended November 4, 1905: Forty-two deaths from cholera and

14 deaths from plague in Calcutta.

Week ended November 11, 1905: Bill of health was issued to the steamship *Clan Maclachlan*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 40. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, and rat guards placed on wharf lines. No Asiatics on board.

In Bengal, week ended October 28, 1905, 150 cases and 115 deaths from plague; week ended November 4, 1905, 272 cases and 207 deaths

from plague.

JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama—Inspection of vessels—Plague in Kobe and Osaka.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Moore reports, November 4, as follows: During the week ended October 28, 1905, bills of health were issued to 5 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 348 crew and 508 passengers; 151 steerage passengers were bathed and their clothing was disinfected; 327 aliens, would-be steerage passengers for the United December 15, 1905 2698

States and its possessions, were examined with special reference to their freedom from any loathsome or dangerous contagious disease contemplated by the United States immigration laws.

Plague.—A death from plague is reported to have occurred in Osaka on the 27th ultimo. No new cases of this disease have been notified in

Kobe since my last report.

Week ended November 4, 1905. Bills of health issued to 4 vessels

having an aggregate personnel of 235 crew and 100 passengers.

Yokohama remains free from grave quarantinable disease, save lep-

rosy.

Plague.—This disease has made considerable progress in Osaka since my last report. During the period from October 27 to November 9, 11 cases of plague, with 5 deaths, have been notified in that city. Moreover, from the latter part of October to the 7th instant, 66 rats showing plague bacilli have been found in Osaka.

After a few weeks of quiescence, plague has again appeared in Kobe,

one of the busiest sections of the city being involved.

Three probable cases were reported on the 8th and 9th instant. During the period extending from the latter part of August to November 7, 1905, there had been discovered in Kobe 13 cases of human plague and 24 plague-infected rats.

According to an official report dated Niuchwang (China), November 9 the port has been declared free from infection, no new cases of

plague having occurred there since October 29.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship China recommended October 28 for rejection: For Honolulu, 15; for San Francisco, 6.

Per steamship *Doric*, recommended November 11, 1905, for rejection: For Honolulu, 67. Held for observation, 3; for San Francisco, 2.

Per steamship Iyo Maru, November 14, 1905: For Seattle, 15.

Per steamship *Manchuria*, November 19, 1905: For Honolulu, 28; for San Francisco, 4.

Report from Kobe—Plague declared epidemic at Kobe and Osaka.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Fowler reports, November 21, as follows: The ports of Osaka and Kobe were declared infected with epidemic plague on the afternoon of November 20, 1905, by the United States consul at Kobe.

The following returns of plague for the month of November show

the disease to have assumed an epidemic form:

Between November 8 and 19 there were 13 cases of plague in Kobe, 11 of which were fatal. These cases were distributed over 9 districts, showing that the disease is spreading through the city.

In Osaka, between November 2 and 17, there were 23 cases, 15

proving fatal.

Bradford.—Two weeks ended November 18, 1905. Estimated population, 286,799. Total number of deaths, 169, including diphtheria 4, scarlet fever 3, and 12 from tuberculosis.

London.—One thousand five hundred and fifty-two deaths were registered during the week, including measles 54, scarlet fever 8, diphtheria 19, whooping cough 20, enteric fever 8, and 13 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 17.3 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,050 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 3 from diphtheria, 9 from measles, 5 from whooping cough, and 4 from diarrhea.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended November 18, 1905, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 19.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Waterford, viz, 3.9, and the highest in Clonmel, viz, 41 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 158 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 38 from tuberculosis.
