UNITED STATES.

Yellow-fever case in Galveston, Tex., imported from Habana.

The following telegram was received December 28 from Dr. George R. Tabor, State health officer of Texas:

DECEMBER 27, 1905.

One case yellow introduced into Galveston by steamer from Habana. Proper precautions have been taken. No *Stegomyia* in Galveston. Steamer arrived 24th. Developed 26th.

On the same date the following telegram was received from Passed Assistant Surgeon Foster at Galveston:

DECEMBER 27, 1905.

Undoubted case of yellow fever here. Diagnosis concurred by city authorities. Left Habana December 20. Arrived December 24. Taken sick that day. Two days sick in city. Now in John Seally Hospital and screened. All possible precautions taken. City health officer states all *Stegomyia* in city have been killed. Two light frosts lately. Few mosquitoes.

Smallpox present on the Canadian frontier of Maine.

At the request of the State board of health Dr. M. L. Young has been appointed temporary acting assistant surgeon, at Vanceboro, Me. The appointment was made owing to the presence of smallpox on the Canadian frontier.

TENNESSEE—Chattanooga.—Month of November, 1905. Estimated population, 40,000; white 27,000, colored 13,000. Total number of deaths, 47; white 19, colored 28, including enteric fever 1, and 7 from tuberculosis.

UTAH—Salt Lake City.—Month of November, 1905. Census population, 53,531. Total number of deaths, 64, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 7, and 1 from tuberculosis.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

Report from Trieste—Inspection of immigrants.

Assistant Surgeon Foster reports, November 29, as follows:

During the week ended November 25, 1905, the following ships were inspected at this port:

November 20, 1905, the steamship *Pannonia* sailed for New York via Fiume. Inspected and passed 34 steerage passengers. Number of pieces of baggage disinfected, 12; number of pieces inspected, 11.

November 25, 1905, the steamship *Erny* sailed for New York via Patras. Inspected and passed 270 steerage passengers. Number of pieces of baggage disinfected, 179; number of pieces inspected, 5.

BRAZIL.

Report from Para—Epidemic smallpox—Yellow fever.

Consul Ayme reports, November 17, as follows:

I have the honor to confirm my telegram of this date as follows:

“Smallpox epidemic raging, assuming serious proportions; 20 additional cases daily. There has been a great deal of yellow fever in the last few days.”

Every year during the last four months of the year—the dry season—there is a marked increase in the number of cases of both smallpox and yellow fever. This year the season is unusually dry and hot, and both diseases have assumed the character of an epidemic. It is becoming evident that the smallpox epidemic is extending to the neighboring towns and villages.

My attention was first called to the severity of the nascent epidemic late in September. I have received official information as follows:

The percentage of deaths to cases has been: Yellow fever, 29.72 per cent; smallpox, 27.46 per cent

Smallpox patients are isolated in a special hospital, which is now accommodating twice the number it was built for. Temporary wings of rough lumber are being erected and a second hospital has been taken for the shelter of smallpox patients: As there is no system of registry

of cases of contagious and infectious diseases, it is difficult to obtain exact statistics.

There is also a large and increasing number of cases of typhoid fever in this city. I have authentic information to this effect, but no exact data.

The yellow fever and smallpox patients are not confined to the lower or even middle classes, but all alike suffer. Foreigners in particular are liable, and scarcely one here has escaped one or the other; the number of deaths among the foreign colony is large. The rains will not set in before the middle of December. When they do begin it is said that both diseases rapidly begin to diminish in numbers and intensity, particularly smallpox.

Week ended December 16, 1905: One bill of health issued for a vessel bound for the United States, with 26 crew. No passengers. The sanitary condition of this vessel was reported good; no sickness.

No quarantinable diseases were reported at this port during this week.

Report from Habana—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Health certificates issued, after inspection, to nonimmunes going to Mobile, New Orleans, and Galveston—Yellow fever.

Passed Assistant Surgeon von Ezdorf reported, December 18, 19, 22, and 26, as follows:

During the week 8 cases and 3 deaths of yellow fever were reported in Habana.

Upon advice received at this office of the removal of immunity requirement for passengers for all southern ports except Florida, I informed the different agents of the steamship lines interested by letter of this order.

Accordingly, nonimmunes wishing to go to Mobile and New Orleans and Galveston are required to first obtain health certificates from this office on the day of sailing before ticket is sold them. These certificates are issued after making a personal inspection of the individual, taking his temperature, and finding him in good health.

Reports from Matanzas—Yellow fever in Matanzas Province—Inspection and precautionary detention of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, December 16, 18, and 22, as follows:

Referring to my cablegrams dated December 13 and 14 instant, reporting 2 new cases of yellow fever at Colon, and 1 at the Valiente plantation in Union de Reyes, I have the honor to submit the following information respecting the same:

The 2 new cases reported at Colon, and which are now isolated in the civil hospital of that town, were brought from different sugar plantations located within its municipal district. One of them occurred at the Alava plantation close to the rural town of Banaguises, and about 9 miles to the north of Colon. It is in a Spanish woman, an immigrant who had recently arrived at the plantation from Spain through Habana, to which city the infection has been traced. The diagnosis of yellow fever of a mild type has been confirmed in this case. I have been informed that there are about 200 immigrants of the same origin at present working at the plantation referred to, and it is feared that the infection may have spread among them, giving rise to new developments. Precautionary sanitary measures are, it is said, being taken to prevent the propagation of the disease.

According to the last census, made during the American intervention in this island in 1899, the population of the district of San José de los Ramos, to which the town of Banaguises belongs, is 6,765. Making a low estimate at the present time, having in view the great number of immigrants arriving in the island since the census was made, it may be considered to exceed 8,000. The difference from the former number of inhabitants—that is, 1,235—may be presumed to constitute, for the most part, a nonimmune element and a favorable medium for the dissemination of the disease.

The other case of yellow fever referred to was also brought to the hospital of Colon from a sugar plantation near the rural town of Calimete, situated to the south, and at a distance of about 30 miles from Colon. The population of Calimete is about 4,000.

The diagnosis in this case has not as yet been definitely settled according to the latest information. The patient is also an immigrant, a Spaniard, who likewise stayed in Habana prior to his coming to Calimete, and it is probable that the contagion may have been contracted in that city should the nature of the disease be confirmed as yellow fever.

The second case at the Valiente plantation in Union de Reyes is said to be as yet doubtful, inasmuch as the patient visited Habana over twenty days ago.

Week ended December 16, 1905:

Bills of health were granted to 4 vessels leaving this port for the United States. One of these, the Norwegian steamship *Fortuna*, bound from the island of Curaçao to New York, via Cardenas, Matanzas, and Habana, was held in precautionary quarantine while in this harbor. No quarantinable disease appeared on board up to the time of leaving for Habana.

Since November 26 no new cases of yellow fever have been reported within the city limits. As the period of incubation, which originated

from the first case of that disease, is overdue without further issues, it may safely be inferred that the contagion was successfully eradicated by the prophylactic measures employed by the local sanitary authorities.

In reference to my cablegram of yesterday I will state that one of the cases recently reported at the town of Colon, originating from the rural district of Calimete, died December 16, and the true nature of the disease was not fully determined until the post-mortem findings proved that the cause of death was not yellow fever. The other case, reported on the same date as brought to Colon from the plantation at Banaguises, has been confirmed as yellow fever of a mild form and is expected to recover.

I am informed that a trained disinfecting gang has been ordered from Habana to the Alava plantation, with a medical officer at the head of it, for the purpose of disinfecting the premises, destroying all the mosquito-breeding places, and seeing that a screened ward is fitted up at the plantation so as to be prepared to meet properly any future emergencies that may arise.

The new case reported at the Valiente plantation near Union de Reyes has not yet been confirmed as yellow fever.

The local health officer has been directed to prepare an additional mosquito-proof ward for women at the civil hospital of this city, for the isolation of suspicious cases of yellow fever in that sex which might occur. An independent wooden frame close to the same hospital, now devoted to tuberculous patients, will be thoroughly disinfected, and afterwards conveniently screened for the care of the confirmed yellow fever cases, in the event this epidemic disease should extend in this city in some future time.

DECEMBER 22, 1905.

One yellow fever confirmed reported to-day Valiente plantation.

ECUADOR.

Report from Guayaquil—Yellow fever declared epidemic.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Gomez reports, December 20, as follows: The local board of health declared yellow fever epidemic December 19.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Status of cholera in Russia.

Passed Assistant Surgeon McLaughlin reports, December 6, as follows:

In the Vistula territory of Russia 23 new cases and 8 deaths from Asiatic cholera were reported between November 16 and 22.

With the exception of 1 case and 1 death in the city of Lodz, all the cases were in the districts of Kolno and Ostrow, government of Lomza.

In Kolno district the center of infection was at Jedwahno, and in the district of Ostrow, Czyzewo. Both Jedwahno and Czyzewo are small hamlets.

HONDURAS.

Report from Puerto Cortez—Yellow fever—Measures taken to prevent spread.

Consul Johnson reports, November 27, as follows:

New cases of yellow fever have occurred at the following places in this consular district: Puerto Cortez, 2 cases, 1 recovery, 1 death; San Pedro, 6 cases, 6 recoveries; Choloma, 2 recoveries.

Active steps are being taken at San Pedro to stamp this disease out. An inspector of fumigation has been appointed, and a house-to-house inspection will be made. One of the new cases at this port was brought here from New Orleans.

INDIA.

Report from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera and plague mortality.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, November 23, as follows:

During the week ended November 18, 1905, bill of health was issued to the steamship *Aros Castle* bound for Boston and New York with a total crew of 40. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, and rat guards placed on wharf lines. No Asiatics on board.

During the week ended November 11, 1905, there were 33 deaths from cholera and 21 deaths from plague in Calcutta.

In Bengal during the week ended November 11, 1905, 314 cases and 230 deaths.

JAPAN.

Report from Kobe--Plague.

Consul Sharp reports, November 14, as follows:

Plague has broken out at this port, the official sanitary returns showing as follows: November 8, 1 case, 1 death; November 9, 1 case, no death; November 10, 2 cases, 1 death; November 11, no case, 1 death.

The cases of plague above mentioned were not known to this consulate until the 13th instant, and as several clean bills of health had been granted to vessels destined for American ports on the 8th and 11th instant, I have cabled this information to the quarantine stations at those ports concerned.

A messenger is sent every morning from this consulate to the city office to obtain the sanitary statistics of this port, but the statistics above referred to were not communicated in time to be used for the vessels in question.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Report from Manila--Cholera and smallpox.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, November 11 and 17, as follows:

During the week ended November 4, 1905, the following quarantinable diseases were reported for the city of Manila: Smallpox, 2 cases, no deaths; cholera, 9 cases, 7 deaths.

During the week vessels bound for ports under the jurisdiction of the United States were granted bills of health as follows:

On October 30, 1905, the British steamship *Sikh*, with 64 crew, en route from Yokohama to New York, was granted a supplemental bill of health. Forecastles were fumigated with sulphur. Crew were inspected at hour of sailing; 7,728 packages of miscellaneous cargo certified.

On October 30, 1905, the British steamship *Kaifong*, with 64 crew, 6 cabin and 14 steerage passengers, en route from Hongkong and Amoy to Cebu and Iloilo, was granted a supplemental bill of health after being held in quarantine at Mariveles a sufficient length of time to make the detention and voyage aggregate the quarantine period.

On November 2, 1905, the British steamship *Lowther Castle*, with 45 crew, en route from Cebu to New York, was granted a supplemental bill of health. Vessel was fumigated throughout at Cebu. Crew inspected prior to sailing. Miscellaneous cargo certified, 22,113 packages.

Week ended November 11, 1905. Cholera, 6 cases, 8 deaths.

There has been practically no cholera in the city of Manila during the past two weeks which could be correctly charged to the city itself.

The cases reported have almost invariably occurred among persons who came from the provinces within twenty-four hours of the time they were taken ill with the disease. The situation in the provinces is not as encouraging as it might be. The number of towns infected is constantly growing and there is no longer a sufficient number of experienced medical men available to combat the disease at the numerous places at which it has made its appearance. The rainy season is now about over and the disease will probably not spread so rapidly, provided the streams can be kept free from cholera. Heretofore, in the towns in which cholera appeared, the health authorities have had the assistance of the community in stamping it out. The disease has now made its appearance in Cavite Province, where a large portion of the population refuses to believe that the disease is cholera and they render no assistance whatever to the health authorities. In consequence the disease is spreading there much more rapidly than at other places.

During the week vessels cleared for the United States as follows:

On November 11, 1905, the American steamship *Hyades*, with 58 crew and no passengers, cleared for Tacoma via China and Japan ports. Cabins, forecastles, and storerooms were fumigated with sulphur dioxide. Cargo certified, 2,159 packages. Crew inspected on board at the hour of sailing.

PORTO RICO.

Report from San Juan—Transactions of Service.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Atilas reports, December 8, as follows:

The vessel fumigated was the American steamship *Arkadia*, which arrived at this port on October 14, 1905, from New Orleans. The vessels held in quarantine but permitted to transact business under guard were the German steamship *Iris*, from Haitian ports and La Guaira, the American steamships *Caracas* and *Philadelphia*, from ports of Venezuela and Curaçao, and the Spanish steamship *Montserrat*, from Central and South American ports.

The health of this port continues good and no quarantinable diseases have been reported.

The subports show the following transactions for the month: Mayaguez, 7 vessels inspected and 12 bills of health issued; Arecibo, 3 vessels inspected and 4 bills of health issued; Humacao, 1 vessel inspected and no bills issued; Aguadilla, 3 vessels inspected and 8 bills of health issued; Arroyo, 1 vessel inspected and 4 bills of health issued; Fajardo, 4 vessels inspected and 3 bills of health issued.

ARGENTINA—*Buenos Ayres*.—Month of September, 1905. Estimated population, 1,002,821. Total number of deaths, 1,334, including diphtheria 9, enteric fever 5, measles 13, scarlet fever 2, smallpox 57, and 171 from tuberculosis.

BRAZIL—*Pernambuco*.—Two weeks ended November 15, 1905. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 299, including enteric fever 3, measles 1, plague 5, smallpox 43, and 58 from tuberculosis.

CANADA—*British Columbia—Vancouver*.—Month of November, 1905. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

CUBA—*Habana*.—Month of August, 1905. Estimated population, 275,000. Total number of deaths, 474, including enteric fever 11, measles 4, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 101 from tuberculosis.

GIBRALTAR.—Two weeks ended December 10, 1905. Estimated population, 27,460. Total number of deaths, 25, including 1 from enteric fever.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended December 2, 1905, correspond to an annual rate of 16.7 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 15,609,377.

Bradford.—Two weeks ended December 2, 1905. Estimated population, 286,799. Total number of deaths, 168, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 2, and 12 from tuberculosis.

London.—One thousand six hundred and twenty-three deaths were registered during the week, including measles 53, scarlet fever 18, diphtheria 5, whooping cough 25, enteric fever 3, and 16 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 18.1 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,163 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 5 from diphtheria, 5 from measles, 2 from whooping cough, and 1 from diarrhea.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended December 2, 1905, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 20.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Tralee, viz, 5.3, and the highest in Ballymena, viz, 33.5 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 157 deaths were registered, including enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 28 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended December 2, 1905, correspond to an annual rate of 18.7

per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,749,917. The lowest rate of mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 12.8, and the highest in Dundee, viz, 25.7 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 628, including measles 33, diphtheria 5, scarlet fever 3, and 6 from whooping cough.

HAWAII—Honolulu.—Month of November, 1905. Estimated population, 39,306. Total number of deaths, 75, including enteric fever 5, and 10 from tuberculosis.

JAMAICA—Port Antonio.—Two weeks ended December 9, 1905. Estimated population not reported. No deaths reported. The health of the port is good.

JAPAN—Nagasaki.—Ten days ended November 20, 1905. Estimated population, 159,041. Total number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

MEXICO—Jalapa.—Two weeks ended November 24, 1905. Estimated population, 22,000. Total number of deaths, 40, including 3 from tuberculosis.

SPAIN—Tarragona.—Two weeks ended December 2, 1905. Estimated population, 19,600. Total number of deaths, 13, including enteric fever 2, and 2 from tuberculosis.

WEST INDIES—Antigua.—Month of October, 1905. Estimated population, 36,780. Total number of deaths, 77. No contagious diseases reported.

Month of November, 1905. Total number of deaths, 51. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.
