STATISTICAL REPORTS OF STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES, YEARLY AND MONTHLY.

Connecticut—Stamford.—Month of March, 1906. Estimated population, 20,000. Number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

MICHIGAN.—The Monthly Bulletin of Vital Statistics says: The total number of deaths returned to the department of state for the month of February was 2,756, representing a total death rate of 13.9 per 1,000 population, as compared with the rate of 16.4 for February, 1905.

There were 532 deaths of infants under 1 year of age, 183 deaths of children aged 1 to 4 years, and 816 deaths of persons aged 65 years and over.

Important causes of deaths were as follows: Tuberculosis of the lungs, 168; other forms of tuberculosis, 26; typhoid fever, 33; diphtheria and croup, 27; scarlet fever, 25; measles, 24; whooping cough, 38; pneumonia, 287; diarrheal diseases, under 2 years, 46; influenza, 51; cancer, 130; accidents and violence, 126.

There was 1 death from smallpox in the township of Escanaba, Delta County.

MISSOURI—St. Louis.—Month of February, 1906. Estimated population, 685,000—white, 643,000; colored, 42,000. Total number of deaths, 770—white, 670; colored, 100—including diphtheria 9, enteric fever 5, measels 1, scarlet fever 3, whooping cough 6, and 119 from tuberculosis.

New Jersey—West Hoboken.—Two weeks ended March 24, 1906. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported.

NEW YORK.—Reports to the State board of health, Albany, for the month of January, 1906, from 156 cities, towns, and villages, having an aggregate population of 8,198,500 show a total of 11,838 deaths,

including cerebro-spinal meningitis 94, diphtheria 280, enteric fever 120, measles 127, scarlet fever 75, whooping cough 58, and 1,183 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Ithaca.—Two weeks ended March 26, 1906. Census population, 14,500. Total number of deaths, 12. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Oneonta.—Month of March, 1906. Estimated population, 8,054. Total number of deaths, 17, including enteric fever 2, and 3 from tuberculosis.

VIRGINIA—Petersburg.—Month of March, 1906. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from enteric fever, and 7 deaths from tuberculosis reported.

Richmond.—Month of February, 1906. Estimated population, 100,000—white 62,250, colored 37,750. Total number of deaths, 132—white 58, colored 74—including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 3, and 21 from tuberculosis.

Washington—Seattle.—Month of February, 1906. Estimated population, 160,000. Total number of deaths, 112, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, and 12 from tuberculosis.

WISCONSIN—*Milwaukee*.—Month of January, 1906. Estimated population, 335,000. Total number of deaths, 380, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 10, measles 5, whooping cough 1, and 40 from tuberculosis.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

CHINA.

Report from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Smallpox—Hongkong declared to be infected with plague and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, February 28, as follows: During the week ended February 24, 1906, one original and one supplemental bill of health were issued, and there were inspected 2 steamers, 178 crew and 37 steerage passengers. Twenty-nine packages of personal effects belonging to crew and steerage passengers were disinfected, and two packages were inspected and passed. Two vaccination certificates were issued to steerage passengers bound to the United States, and 1 emigrant for San Francisco, per steamship *Coptic*, was rejected on account of trachoma. Manifests were viséed for 563 pieces of freight.

The weekly report of the municipal health officer shows 2 deaths from smallpox. This report is a little misleading, inasmuch as it does not show, by a considerable number, the cases and deaths from smallpox

actually occurring in Shanghai.

Hongkong has been declared by the consular body and customs

officials here to be infected with both plague and smallpox.

No reports of quarantinable disease have been received from outports.

CUBA.

Report from Cienfuegos-Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Consul Baehr reports, March 26, as follows:

Week ended March 24, 1906. Bills of health issued to 6 vessels bound for the United States with 165 crew. Of these vessels the Spanish steamship *Riojano*, that cleared for Galveston, Tex., on the 23d, and the Norwegian steamship *Volund*, bound for New Orleans, La., on the 24th, were both duly fumigated by the Cuban authorities at this port, according to quarantine regulations prevailing. No passengers. The sanitary conditions of these vessels were reported good; no sickness.

JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama--Inspection of vessels—Plague and small-pox—Case of smallpox on steamship Siberia from Hongkong.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Moore reports, March 3, 8, and 15, as follows:

During the week ended February 24, 1906, bills of health were issued, after inspection, to 2 vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 388 crew and 745 passengers; 558 steerage passengers were bathed and their body clothing was disinfected; 1,284 aliens, would-be steerage passengers to the United States and its possessions, were examined with special reference to their freedom from any loathsome or dangerous contagious disease contemplated by the immigration laws of the United States.

During the week ended February 24 a case of smallpox was reported in Kobe.

Week ended March 3, 1906: 4 vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 328 crew and 438 passengers, inspected prior to the issuance of bills of health. One vessel, the U. S. S. Rainbow, was granted a bill of health without inspection; 348 steerage passengers were bathed and their clothing was disinfected; 1,070 aliens, would be steerage passen-

gers to the United States and its possessions, were examined.

Plaque.—During the present year plague has prevailed much less extensively in western Japan than during the closing part of 1905. The disease, however, has never been eradicated, and recently a distinct tendency to recrudescence has been noted; Kobe, Osaka, and Shimonoseki may all be regarded still as plague-infected ports. As lately as the 2d instant a case of plague, the tenth reported during 1906, terminated fatally in Kobe; 2 probable cases of plague were officially reported from Shimonoseki under date of the 5th instant. A telegram from Osaka, dated March 6, reports a probable case in that city.

Smallpox.—Telegraphic advices of the 6th instant report that 27 cases of smallpox with 4 deaths have occurred in a town in Yamaguchi

Ken.

Week ended March 10, 1906. Bills of health issued to 4 vessels. Two steamships, having an aggregate personnel of 224 crew and 130 passengers, were inspected. Bills of health were issued to 2 naval

vessels without inspection.

The American steamship Siberia arrived here on the morning of the 12th instant from Hongkong via ports en route to San Francisco, and on examination by the local quarantine officials a case of smallpox was discovered in the person of a Chinese steerage passenger embarked at Hongkong. The patient together with a suspect was removed from the vessel, suitable sanitary measures were enforced, and the Siberia sailed for San Francisco via Honolulu on the 14th instant.

March 22.—Passed the British steamship Ryton, bound for Port Eads, in ballast, with 28 in the crew; vessel fumigated. Passed the Cuban steamship Bayamo, bound for New York, via Habana, in gen-

eral cargo and live stock for Habana, with 47 in the crew.

March 23.—Passed the British steamship *Director*, bound for New Orleans, via Vera Cruz and Progreso, in a general European cargo, with 40 in the crew and 1 passenger. Passed the Norwegian steamship *City of Mexico*, bound for New Orleans, via Progreso, in a partial American cargo, with 21 in the crew and 8 first-class passengers. Inspection of incoming vessels—Insufficient water supply—Mosquitoes not prevalent.

Inspection of incoming steamers has been carried out by the local authorities. At present not only are steamers from United States ports boarded and inspected upon arrival, but all vessels, native crafts, schooners, sloops, etc., irrespective of port of departure.

All vessels from New Orleans are required by the board of health

of Louisiana to have on board a marine medical inspector.

The water supply of Bluefields is at present insufficient. This being the dry season, the cisterns and barrels are nearly empty. A large number of the population, because of the lack of rain, are drinking water drawn from wells. These wells are not wholesome sources of supply.

As a result of the dry seasons there are no puddles of water, the swamps are dry, and the cisterns mostly empty. The number of breeding places being greatly reduced, mosquitoes are noticeably few.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, February 19 and 28, as follows:

During the week ended February 17, 1906, quarantinable diseases were reported for the city of Manila as follows:

Smallpox, 1 death; cholera, 8 cases, 8 deaths.

During the same period cholera was reported from the provinces as follows: 283 cases, 229 deaths.

During the week vessels cleared for United States ports as follows: On February 13 the British steamship *Kaifong*, with 66 crew and 1 passenger, en route from Amoy to Iloilo and Cebu, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual quarantine and inspection at Mariveles.

On February 15 the United States army transport *Thomas*, with 180 crew and 297 passengers, was granted a bill of health for San Francisco. Crew and steerage passengers were bathed and their effects and baggage disinfected. Cargo and baggage either disinfected or passed after inspection. Vessel partially disinfected. All persons on board were inspected at the hour of sailing.

Week ended February 24, 1906: Smallpox, 2 cases, no deaths. Cholera, 3 cases, 2 deaths. During the week, cholera was reported

from the provinces as follows: 88 cases, 64 deaths.

During the week, vessels bound for United States ports were treated as follows:

On February 21, 1906, the American steamship *Tremont*, with 141 crew and 65 passengers, was granted a bill of health for Tacoma via Hongkong and Japan ports. All persons on board were inspected at the hour of sailing. Baggage and cargo either disinfected or passed after inspection. Miscellaneous cargo certified, 1,406 packages.

FRANCE—St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended February 28, 1906. Estimated population, 146,671. Total number of deaths, 129, including diphtheria 2, measles 1, and 24 from tuberculosis.

GERMANY—Weimar.—Month of February, 1906. Estimated population, 31,127. Total number of deaths, 53, including 3 from tuberculosis.

GIBRALTAR.—Two weeks ended March 11, 1906. Estimated population, 27,460. Total number of deaths, 19, including 4 from smallpox.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended March 10, 1906, correspond to an annual rate of 16.7 per 1,000 of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 15,818,360.

Bradford.—Two weeks ended March 10, 1906. Estimated population, 288,544. Total number of deaths, 173, including diphtheria 8, measles 3, scarlet fever 1, and 13 from phthisis pulmonalis.

London.—One thousand four hundred and sixty-eight deaths were registered during the week, including measles 56, scarlet fever 12, diphtheria 12, whooping cough 34, enteric fever 3, and 19 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.2 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,070 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 7 from diphtheria, 12 from measles, 3 from scarlet fever, and 9 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended March 10, 1906, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,093,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Newry, viz, 4.2, and the highest in Newtownards, viz, 40.1 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 187 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 2, whooping cough 1, and 39 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended March 10, 1906, correspond to an annual rate of 18.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,787,788. The lowest rate of mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 13.8, and the highest in Dundee, viz, 22.8 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 622, including measles 23, diphtheria 11, scarlet fever 2, enteric fever 4, and 10 from whooping cough.
