### UNITED STATES.

#### STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—YEARLY AND MONTHLY.

CALIFORNIA—*Los Angeles*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths reported, 267, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 9, and 48 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 52, enteric fever 36, scarlet fever 15, and tuberculosis 19.

*San Diego*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 27,000. Total number of deaths, 43, including enteric fever 1, and 10 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 1, measles 1, and scarlet fever 1.

INDIANA—*Evansville*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 75,000. Total number of deaths, 63, including diphtheria 1, and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 14, enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 4, and phthisis pulmonalis 3.

MINNESOTA.—Month of September, 1906. Estimated population, 1,979,658. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 1,255, including diphtheria 17, enteric fever 39, measles 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 15, and 132 from tuberculosis. Deaths reported from State institutions during the month numbered 33, including enteric fever 1, and 10 from tuberculosis.

*Minneapolis*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 261,974. Total number of deaths, 230, including diphtheria 9, enteric fever 9, scarlet fever 1, and 24 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 135, enteric fever 20, scarlet fever 29, tuberculosis 29.

MONTANA.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 280,000. Reports to the State board of health from 27 counties show as follows: Total number of deaths, 270, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 11, measles 1, whooping cough 1, and 17 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases were reported as follows: Diphtheria 40, enteric fever 90, measles 22, scarlet fever 20, smallpox 6.

NEW JERSEY—*Paterson*.—Month of August, 1906. Estimated population, 113,301. Total number of deaths, 202, including enteric fever 1, measles 1, whooping cough 3, and 17 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 11, enteric fever 14, scarlet fever 2, tuberculosis 26.

Month of September, 1906. Total number of deaths, 147, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 23 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 19, enteric fever 10, scarlet fever 10, tuberculosis 16.

NEW YORK—*Troy*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 76,861. Total number of deaths, 131, including enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 14 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 10, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 9, whooping cough 76, and tuberculosis 22.

OREGON.—Month of October, 1906. Reports to the State board of health from 33 counties show as follows: Total number of deaths from all causes, 367, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 18, and 27 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases were reported as follows: Diphtheria 36, enteric fever 151, measles 7, scarlet fever 12, smallpox 7.

UTAH.—Month of October, 1906. Reports to the State board of health from 27 counties, having an estimated population of 315,966, show as follows: Total number of deaths, 306, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 22, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 2, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 33, enteric fever 197, scarlet fever 31, smallpox 33, whooping cough 165, tuberculosis 15 (incomplete).

### AFRICA.

*Report from Cape Town—Examination of rodents for plague infection in the Colony.*

The following is received from the medical officer of health for Cape Colony, under date of October 15, 1906:

*East London.*—Week ended October 13, 1906. Rodents examined, 159; 6 found dead; no infection.

### AUSTRIA.

*No further cases of plague at Trieste.*

Information was received, November 12, from Consul Hossfeld, thru the Department of State, of the existence of plague at Trieste. (See Public Health Reports, November 16, 1906, page 1361.) Passed Assistant Surgeon McLaughlin, stationed at Naples, was directed by the Bureau by letter on November 16 and later by cable on November 19 to proceed to Trieste and Fiume and investigate the presence of plague at the former place, reporting to the Bureau whether the necessities of the case permitted the enforcement of paragraph 36 of the United States quarantine regulations, relative to the detention of emigrants. Passed Assistant Surgeon McLaughlin cabled from Trieste as follows, under date of November 23:

“The necessities of the case do not permit of our insisting on paragraph 36. Fatal case November 8; none since.”

Doctor Doty, quarantine officer at New York, was informed by the Bureau November 24 that no necessity existed for the detention of emigrants at Trieste prior to embarkation.

### BRAZIL.

*Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Plague, smallpox, and yellow fever.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, October 26, as follows: Week ended October 21, 1906. Vessels inspected and bills of health issued as follows: On the 14th instant the Portuguese bark *Albatroz*, for New Orleans, in stone ballast, with no passengers, and with 7 new

members of the crew taken on here in this port. On the 17th instant the British steamship *Thespis*, for New York, N. Y., with a cargo of coffee, 11 first-cabin passengers and 19 steerage passengers from this port, and also 1 new member of the crew signed on in this port. On the 19th instant the British steamship *Glencoe*, for New York, N. Y., with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and with no change in the crew personnel. This vessel sailed from here to New York via Santos, there taking on her full cargo. On the same date the German steamship *Gertrud*, for New York, N. Y., with one steerage passenger from this port, no cabin passengers, and with no change in the personnel of the crew, and on the 20th instant the British steamship *Merchant Prince*, for New Orleans, La., with a cargo of coffee, no passengers of any class, and with no change in the personnel of the ship's crew while in this port.

No other vessels requiring inspection left this port during the period under report.

*Mortality and morbidity of Rio de Janeiro.*

Week ended October 21, 1906. Total deaths during the week, 229. No deaths from yellow fever, and no cases reported during the week. There were 4 cases of variola reported during the week, but no deaths from this disease; but bubonic plague gives a total of 4 deaths with 19 reported cases, the largest number of cases reported in any one week this current year.

At the close of the week there were in the Hospital Sao Sebastiao, 1 case of variola, 11 cases of bubonic plague, and 28 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

CHINA.

*Report from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Steam disinfection of baggage.*

Temporary Acting Assistant Surgeon Mills reports, October 15 and 23, as follows:

Week ended October 13, 1906. One original and one supplemental bill of health issued to 2 steamships. The U. S. S. *El Cano*, to which the original bill was issued, was not inspected, but was certified to by the acting assistant surgeon on board. One steamer had the quarters of the crew and 48 pieces of effects disinfected. Manifests were viséed for 23,623 pieces of freight.

No official reports have been received from outports, but a bill of health issued at Hankow shows 24 deaths from cholera.

Week ended October 20, 1906. Three original and 2 supplemental bills of health issued to 5 steamships. These vessels and their crews, numbering 527, were inspected and found in good sanitary condition. Ninety-two pieces of baggage belonging to crew were disinfected by superheated steam. This number comprizes the crews of the steamships *Kennebec* and *Ashtabula*.

No contagious diseases reported from outports for the week ended October 13, 1906.

## COSTA RICA.

## CUBA.

*Report from Cienfuegos—History of 2 cases of yellow fever at Cruces.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Marsillan, reports, November 16, as follows:

On the 13th instant I was informed by the city's sanitary board that there were two new cases of yellow fever at Cruces, and that a commission from said board was going by train next morning to examine the cases. This commission came back on the 14th at 8 o'clock p. m.

The first case—M. G. C.—a woman 20 years old, a native of Spain, single, with one year's residence in Cuba, and only fifteen days in Cruces. She felt indisposed on the 9th of this month, being one night near the infected location at Cruces. She had a chill, headache, pain in the bones and in the lumbar region. On the 10th, she felt worse, without spirits to do anything. She then took a purgative in two parts, vomiting the first part, but retaining the second, which operated. On the 11th, more serious symptoms appeared and she was seen by a physician, having since then regular symptoms of yellow fever—flushed face, injection of the conjunctivæ, tongue wide, humid, and coated, gums somewhat reddish and congested, frontal headache, pain in eyes, it being painful for her to move her eyes, and some epigastric tenderness. Temperature, 38.6° C.; pulse, 100.

On the 12th more cephalalgia, pain at stomach continued, and nausea but no vomiting. Temperature, 38.6° C.; pulse, 96—in the evening, temperature, 37° C.; pulse, 88. There was albumen in the urine. On the 13th more grave symptoms appeared, such as nausea, gastric pains when taking any remedy, profound prostration, and a notable weakness of the pulse. Temperature, 38° C.; pulse, 82—in the evening, temperature, 38° C.; pulse, 92; abundance of albumen in the urine. On the 14th, the day when the commission saw the case, her condition was as on the day before. Temperature, 38.3° C.; pulse, 112; albumen in considerable amount in the urine. Case was diagnosed as yellow fever.

The second case was a man, E. V. P., 17 years old, a native of Galicia, Spain, clerk in a coffee house, with one year's residence in

Cuba and five months in Cruces in the infected block where the first case took the disease. All these houses communicate by interior doors and the infection was easy. This case was taken sick on the morning of the 11th instant, and it was then that he first suffered from lumbago, chills, and fever. On the 12th these symptoms continued. On the 13th he was seen for the first time by a physician, and had then a temperature 39° C., pulse 108, and all the symptoms of first stage of the disease with albumen in the urine. He was taken to the lazaretto, where he became delirious. On the 14th he was seen by the commission. Case was confirmed as yellow fever.

Both these cases, as already seen, were infected in the town of Cruces, and this statement was confirmed by the commission.

*Report from Habana—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Yellow fever—Dengue fever.*

During this week 4 new cases of yellow fever were reported in Habana. One of these was from Guanabacoa, a small town located across the bay of Habana. There were also 2 cases of yellow fever reported at Cruces, Santa Clara Province, also one new case resulting in death on November 17, at Santa Clara.

The reports for the month of October, 1906, show that 19 cases of dengue fever were reported in Habana.

The sanitary forces in Habana, operating especially on the work of mosquito extermination, have been reorganized under the following plan: The city of Habana has been divided into 42 districts, and in each district an oiling inspector is detailed, with 2 men to do the oiling under his direction. It is expected that at least 40 houses will be carefully inspected in each district each day and oiling of all possible breeding places done in the houses inspected. A district will be covered every ten days, thus making an average of 400 houses to a district.

There are also 75 men, divided into squads of 1 captain and 4 men, who do oiling of pools and large collections of standing water. Twenty-five of these men are for Vedado and the others (50) for Habana. There are also 24 men engaged in ditching and draining work. Four special or auxiliary inspectors follow up the work done. The fumigating forces comprize 200 men, and are divided into brigades of about 25 men in each.

The occurrence of a case of yellow fever, a recent arrival, early in the month, caused suspicion to be placed on the detention camp at Tricornia. A young Spaniard had arrived November 2, was trans-

ferred to Triscornia November 3, left Triscornia at 3 p. m. on the 4th, and was taken sick with yellow fever at 8 a. m. of the 6th. The case was confirmed on the 10th.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Stansfield reports as follows:

November 21. Two cases yellow fever confirmed November 21.

November 22. One new case yellow fever and 1 death, Habana, November 22.

November 23. One case yellow fever, Habana, November 23.

November 26. Two new cases and 1 death yellow fever, Habana, November 26.

November 27. One new case yellow fever confirmed, Habana, November 27.

*Report from Mantanzas—Inspection of vessels—Bills of health issued.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, November 19, as follows:

Week ended November 17, 1906. Bills of health were issued to 3 vessels leaving for the United States via Cuban ports, and 3 certificates of immunity and one of vaccination were issued to passengers bound to Tampa via Habana.

The British barkentine *Reynard*, which ran aground November 2 when about to leave this harbor, finally managed to get out of her distress free from damage, and was refumigated November 13, when she proceeded to Fernandina, Fla.

No communicable diseases reported, altho enteric fever in sporadic form is still prevailing.

*Report from Santiago—Inspection of vessels—Transactions for the month of October, 1906.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, November 14 and 17, as follows:

GERMANY.

*Report from Hamburg—Medical inspection of vessels during the year 1905.*

The following report of the medical inspection of vessels and special precautions against importation of cholera from Russia by river traffic was received from Consul General Pitcairn under date of November 1:

During the year 1905 the port surgeon of Hamburg inspected 10,776 vessels with 231,552 persons, besides 6,215 vessels, with 184,487 persons, lying in port, and 778 river barges with a crew of 2,318.

In inspecting arriving vessels 14,444 cases of sickness which had occurred during the voyage (of which there were 562 cases of malaria and 20 deaths therefrom) were ascertained.

Vessels arriving from plague-infected ports were held under constant medical supervision during their sojourn in port. In this respect careful search was particularly made for dead or diseased rats on the part of officer especially assigned for such purpose. Suspected dead rats thus found were delivered to the Municipal Hygienic Institute for bacteriological examination. On 4 vessels plague-infected rats were found, altho no cases of plague had occurred among the persons on board. One hundred and ninety-three vessels were disinfected during the year under report.

In August and September, 1905, 3 cases of Asiatic cholera appeared in this city. In consequence of this fact and of the epidemic prevailing at the same time in Russia and eastern Germany, measures were immediately taken to prevent an introduction of the disease by means of the river traffic from the upper Elbe. From September 7 to 12 all river vessels arriving were inspected by officers of the board of health at Entenwaerder, a short distance above Hamburg. On September 13 this quarantine station was removed to Zollenspieker, still farther up the river. At this point a control station was established, with a staff of 1 physician, 1 quarantine officer, 2 police sergeants, and 1 disinfecter. A launch was also stationed on the river to facilitate the duties of the station and to exercise a better control over passing vessels.

The station was equipped with hospital barracks and a floating disinfecting establishment. Barges and other vessels inspected at Zollenspieker were also held under observation upon arrival in Hamburg for a period of 5 days. On November 15 the quarantine station was abolished. Its work from September 13 to November 15 consisted of inspecting 3,805 vessels with 18,006 persons on board. All these vessels, as above-mentioned, had subsequently to undergo a further quarantine in the harbor of Hamburg. No cases of cholera, or persons suspected of the disease, were discovered. The personnel of the harbor surgeon was increased during this period by 2 physicians and 2 quarantine inspectors. The total number of river craft inspected was 13,116 vessels, manned by 51,398 persons.

At the quarantine station of Groden, at the mouth of the Elbe, near Cuxhaven, which is also under the jurisdiction of the Hamburg port surgeon, 1,141 vessels were inspected and 44,215 persons examined. Such vessels were held for inspection because of their arriving from infected ports.

On 593 vessels the prescribed annual inspection of medicine chests and other medical supplies took place. In connection therewith pharmacutico-chemical tests were made of the medicines on 104 vessels.

Furthermore, there were 396 emigrant vessels inspected prior to departure.

The personnel of the service consisted in Hamburg of the port surgeon, 1 assistant surgeon, 5 health inspectors, 6 men forming the crews of launches, and 5 disinfectors, whose duty, outside of disinfection, was to search for dead and diseased rats on suspected vessels. In Cuxhaven the staff consisted of 2 assistant surgeons, 1 chief disinfecter, 1 engineer, and 6 disinfectors.

## INDIA.

*Report from Calcutta—Transactions of the Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, October 25, as follows:

Week ended October 20, 1906: Bill of health issued to the steamship *Knight of the Garter*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 64. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards placed on wharf lines, and lascars' effects disinfected.

Week ended October 13, 1906: 28 deaths from cholera, 11 deaths from plague, and 1 death from smallpox in Calcutta.

In all India, week ended October 13, 1906, 6,278 cases and 4,760 deaths from plague.

November 7. Inspected and past the British steamship *Gloxinia*, bound for a port north of Hatteras via Laguna, with 25 in the crew. Vessel sails in ballast. Inspected and past the Norwegian steamship *Molina*, bound for Texas City via Coatzacoalcos, with 19 in the crew and 1 cabin passenger. Vessel sails with a general cargo.

November 8. Inspected and past the American steamship *Monterey*, bound for New York via Progreso and Habana, with 97 in the crew; 82 cabin and 35 steerage passengers. Vessel sails with a general cargo.

On November 9 a case of yellow fever was reported at the hospital. There are very few mosquitoes.

A fatal case of yellow fever was reported on November 14. The weather is somewhat more favorable. A few *Stegomyia* and

*Anopheles* have recently been seen, but no appreciable increase has been noticed in the number of these mosquitoes. The case reported on the 9th instant, and which ended fatally on November 10, was a resident of Veracruz and lived in the immediate vicinity of the Veracruz and Pacific Railway station.

## PERU.

*Reports from Callao—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Smallpox in Lima—Plague in Callao—Smallpox in Chilean ports.*

Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, October 29 and November 4, as follows:

Week ended October 27, 1906. The following two vessels were dispatched, both on the 27th, viz: The British steamship *Colombia* for Ancon, Canal Zone, with a general cargo and a total personnel of 213, of whom 7 were new members of the crew. Fifty cabin, and 47 steerage passengers were from this port.

The German steamship *Hathor* for San Francisco, Cal., with a general cargo and a total personnel of 85, of whom 1 new member of the crew and 6 cabin passengers were from this port.

Smallpox continues in Lima.

A case of plague occurred in Callao last week and died in hospital on the 20th instant—the first case in this port since March 26 of this year. The health officer of Callao states that the patient, a Chinese laborer, was not a resident of this town, but came from a farm near Lima and had only been in Callao a few hours before his removal to hospital.

No other reports on plague have been received since my last report.

Bills of health from Chilean ports report smallpox as follows: Antofagasta, 4 cases with no deaths in two weeks ended October 17; Coquimbo, 25 cases with 1 death in two weeks ended October 13; Iquique, still present, number of cases unknown.

Week ended November 3, 1906. Vessels were dispatched as follows:

The Norwegian steamship *Hercules*, on October 28, for San Francisco, Cal., in water ballast, with a crew of 31 and no passengers.

The Chilean steamship *Aconcagua*, on November 3, for Ancon, Canal Zone, with a general cargo, and a total personnel of 145, of whom 1 was a new member of crew. Twenty-seven cabin and 37 steerage passengers were from this port.

Both vessels were fumigated, steerage passengers for Panama were vaccinated unless they presented evidence of probable immunity to smallpox, and steerage baggage was inspected and past or disinfected.

No further reports on plague or smallpox in Peru have been received since my last report. Bills of health from Chile record smallpox as follows: Antofagasta, 5 cases, with no deaths in two weeks ended October 24; Coquimbo, 27 cases, with 1 death in two weeks ended October 21.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

*Reports from Manila—Cholera in Manila and the provinces—Inspection of vessels.*

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, October 11 and 17, as follows:

The cholera situation in the island of Luzon and in the city of Manila continues to improve. In the entire island of Luzon there were only 43 cases and 30 deaths, as against 121 cases and 87 deaths for the corresponding period two weeks ago, and 6 cases and 9 deaths, as against 16 cases and 9 deaths for the preceding week in the city of Manila.

In the province of Iloilo, however, mention of which was made in the report of two weeks ago, the situation is not so favorable. Since the outbreak there have been 584 cases with 480 deaths, and several new towns have become infected. At the town of Miagao, at which one of the popular feasts characteristic of the islands was held, the conditions were particularly favorable for the propagation of the disease, and some 80 cases occurred before any action was taken by the local health officials.

So far the outgoing quarantine for the province of Iloilo has proved entirely effective. There is, however, much opposition to it, and the governor-general has repeatedly been requested to intercede with the view of having it removed.

Owing to the improved conditions with regard to cholera in Manila and vicinity, the outgoing quarantine heretofore imposed on vessels has been reduced from sixty to twenty-four hours. Vessels proceeding direct to Iloilo and Cebu, where service officers are stationed, are permitted to sail without detention. A copy of the circular letter issued is inclosed.

The following vessels cleared for United States ports during the week:

On October 1 the British steamship *Hupeh*, with 62 crew, en route from Swatow to Iloilo, was granted a supplemental bill of health. Vessel and personnel were disinfected at Mariveles on arrival from Swatow.

On October 3 the British steamship *Saint George*, with 36 crew, en route from Cebu to Boston and New York, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection of personnel and cargo.

On October 3 the United States army transport *Kilpatrick*, with 151 crew and 116 passengers, was granted a consular bill of health for New York. Crew bathed and their effects and baggage disinfected at Mariveles. All persons on board inspected at the hour of sailing. All cargo and baggage inspected and either disinfected or past, and so labeled.

On October 5 the American schooner *David Evans*, with 10 crew, entered quarantine prior to sailing for Port Townsend.

On October 6 the American schooner *Amazon*, with 14 crew, entered quarantine prior to sailing for Portland, Oreg.

Week ended October 13, 1906. Quarantinable disease reported for the city of Manila: Cholera, 10 cases, 6 deaths.

During the week vessels cleared for United States ports as follows:

On October 8 the British steamship *Kaifong*, with 66 crew and 40 passengers, en route from Hongkong and Amoy to Cebu and Iloilo, was granted a supplemental bill of health. Crew bathed same day on arrival from Amoy.

On October 10 the American schooner *David Evans* completed her 5 days' quarantine and cleared for Port Townsend.

On October 10 the United States army transport *Thomas*, with 180 crew and 1,029 passengers, was granted a consular bill of health for San Francisco via Nagasaki and Honolulu. One hundred and sixty-six crew and 890 steerage passengers were bathed and their effects and baggage disinfected. Decks and steerage compartments of vessel disinfected. Cargo and baggage inspected and certified. All persons on board inspected and past at hour of sailing.

On October 11 the American ship *Amazon* completed her 5 days' quarantine and cleared for Portland, Oreg.

On October 12 the French steamship *Kouang Si*, with 67 crew and 6 passengers, was granted a consular bill of health for Iloilo.

On October 12 the British steamship *Changshaw*, with 72 crew and 38 passengers, en route from Hongkong to Zamboanga, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection prior to sailing.
