STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—YEARLY AND MONTHLY.

CALIFORNIA.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 1,882,846. Total number of deaths reported to the State board of health, 2,134, corresponding to an annual death rate of 13.6 per 1,000 population. Deaths from contagious diseases were as follows: Diphtheria 18, enteric fever 94, measles 5, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 6, and 289 from tuberculosis.

Sacramento.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 35,000. Total number of deaths, 45, including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis. One case of diphtheria reported during the month.

CONNECTICUT—*Bridgeport.*—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 92,000. Total number of deaths, 94, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria, 17; enteric fever, 2; measles, 10; scarlet fever, 5; whooping cough, 4, and phthisis pulmonalis, 2.

Stamford.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population 24,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever, 2; measles, 3; scarlet fever, 4, and tuberculosis, 1.

FLORIDA.—Report from the State board of health for the week ended December 1, 1906, shows as follows: Diphtheria, Duval County (*Jacksonville*), 2 cases; Escambia County (*Pensacola*), 1 case; Hillsboro County (*Tampa*), 2 cases. Enteric fever, Hillsboro County (*Tampa*), 1 case. Smallpox, Duval County (*Jacksonville*), 1 case; Madison County, 1 case. Tuberculosis, Duval County (*Jacksonville*), 1 case.

INDIANA.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 2,648,549. Total number of deaths, 2,847; rate, 12.6. In the corresponding

month last year, 2,681; rate, 11.9. In the preceding month, 3,081; rate, 13.9. Deaths by important ages were: Under 1 year, 515, or 19.2 per cent of the total number; 1 to 5, 236; 5 to 10, 74; 10 to 15, 52; 15 to 20, 90; 65 and over, 684, or 25.6 per cent of the total. Some important causes of death were: Tuberculosis, 323, of which 267 were of the pulmonary form; typhoid fever, 150; diphtheria, 64; scarlet fever, 9; smallpox, 3.

MINNESOTA.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 1,979,658. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 1,210, including diphtheria 28, enteric fever 78, measles 1, scarlet fever 3, whooping cough 10, and 121 from tuberculosis. Deaths reported from State institutions during the month numbered 34, including enteric fever 1, and 9 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MONTANA—*Helena*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 21,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria, 1; enteric, 2.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Franklin*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 6,000. Total number of deaths reported, 6. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 2; enteric fever 1; scarlet fever, 1.

NORTH CAROLINA—*Charlotte*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 37, including enteric fever 3 and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 5, measles 2, scarlet fever 1.

OHIO—*Fronton*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 11,868. Total number of deaths, 13. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Zanesville.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 33, including 3 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 8, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 1.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Higspire*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 1,500. No deaths reported. Two cases of enteric fever and 1 case of tuberculosis reported.

RHODE ISLAND.—Month of September, 1906. Total number of deaths, 706, including 135 from communicable diseases; tuberculosis, 71. Cases of contagious disease were reported as follows: January to September, inclusive, 1906, diphtheria 355, enteric fever 247, scarlet fever 567.

UTAH—*Ogden*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 27, including 3 from enteric fever. Cases of contagious disease were reported as follows: Diphtheria 2, enteric fever 12, scarlet fever 1.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

AUSTRIA.

History of fatal plague case at Trieste.

Passed Assistant Surgeon McLaughlin was directed, November 16 and 19, to proceed to Trieste and Fiume and investigate the reported existence of plague at the former place. (See Public Health Reports, November 16, page 1361, and November 30, page 1425.) He reports as follows, under date of November 24:

In response to Bureau orders received November 20 I left Naples November 21 for Trieste, arriving in that city November 22 at 9 p. m.

At 10 a. m., November 23, I called on Consul Hotschick, and by him was presented to the sanitary authorities, both imperial and municipal. We visited first the president of maritime police, who is in charge of all maritime matters for the Adriatic coast. From this officer and his adviser, the maritime sanitary inspector, who has charge of quarantine matters, I obtained a very clear history of the one case of plague. This history was further corroborated by the head of the municipal board of health.

I went to the Government quarantine station and laboratory and saw the specimens, cultures, etc., from the fatal case. These preparations, slides, cultures, and plates were characteristic of bubonic plague.

The history of the case is as follows: On November 7 a sailor on the steamship *Calypso*, which plies between Trieste and Venice, fell ill and was removed to the hospital at Trieste. On the following day, November 8, he died. He had had symptoms of pneumonia, and post-mortem examination showed bacilli resembling plague bacilli in the lung exudate. The customary tests for plague were made upon guinea pigs and rats, and the animals gave typical signs of plague infection.

The origin of the case is unexplained. The *Calypso* had not been near an infected port. Only one supposition is probable, and this hypothesis is believed by the authorities to explain the occurrence of a case of plague. In the last days of October the steamship *Austria*, of the Austrian Lloyd Line, arrived at Trieste from India with a cargo of jute, cotton, and castor beans. Her cargo was unloaded here. The *Austria* had had no sickness on board, and there was nothing suspicious to point to infection. The vessel was disinfected to kill rats, and only 2 rats were found. These were examined and found not to be plague infected. Part of the cargo of the *Austria* was transshipped here to the *Calypso*, and soon after this the patient referred to was taken sick. After the sick man had been removed the *Calypso* sailed for Venice. When the Trieste authorities decided that the man had died of plague the Venetian authorities were notified and the *Calypso* was quarantined

and disinfected at Venice. All necessary precautions were taken both at Venice and Trieste. All contacts and suspects were held under observation for seven days, and none developed sickness of any kind. It is now sixteen days since the plague death and no new cases have occurred.

The quarantine station and plant here are modern, are under Government control, and in excellent condition.

Trieste is a clean city, with well-paved and well-kept streets. To-day I inspected the emigrant detention barracks of the Austro-American Line. They have a large building formerly used as a hospital, with accommodation for about 800 persons. It is in good sanitary condition and the company, which is a new one, seems anxious to comply with all requirements. They have no steam disinfecting plant, and the facilities for quickly bathing a large number of emigrants are inadequate. The director assured me that the defects would be remedied in the near future and that a good modern steam disinfecting apparatus would be installed.

CHINA.

The sanitary condition of the city and surrounding country is very bad.

On November 28, 1 new case of yellow fever was reported and confirmed at Isabela de Sagua, the seaport for Sagua la Grande, on the north coast of this province. Isabela is at a distance of about 90 miles from this city.

On November 29 another new case of yellow fever was reported and confirmed at Cruces, which case originated from the focus at San Francisco plantation. The attack occurred on November 22, the disease being of a mild form, and the case out of danger at present.

During the month of November there were 5 cases of yellow fever at Cruces, 1 at Santa Clara, 1 at Central Parque Alto, and 1 at Isabela de Sagua, making a total of 8 cases for the province of Santa Clara. Only 2 are reported to have terminated in death.

December 6. One new case of yellow fever confirmed yesterday at Cruces. Infection traceable to focus in said town. * * *

December 9. Case at Jovellanos died. Necropsy proved not yellow fever.

Report from Habana—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Yellow fever—Summary of yellow fever for the month of November, 1906.

During the week there occurred in Habana 5 new cases and 1 death from yellow fever. From other points on the island there were reported—at Cruces 1 case, Union de Reyes 2 cases with 1 death, Isabela de Sagua 1 case.

During the month of November there was a total of 25 cases and 2 deaths from yellow fever in Habana. This is an increase of 2 cases over the total for October, but with 3 fewer deaths. During the month there were reported from towns outside Habana 12 cases and 4 deaths.

December 5. One case yellow fever confirmed December 5.

December 5. One case yellow fever at Cruces.

Passed Assistant Surgeon von Ezdorf reports as follows:

December 12. Two new cases yellow fever Habana confirmed December 11.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels—Yellow fever at Union de Reyes—Summary for month of November, 1906.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Núñez reports, December 3, as follows:

One bill of health issued to a vessel bound to the United States and 1 certificate of immunity granted to a passenger destined to Key West, Fla., via Habana.

On November 29 and 30 last 3 cases of yellow fever, ending in death, were reported at Union de Reyes, this Province. Since then no new cases have been reported.

Summary.—During the month of November last 11 bills of health were issued to vessels leaving for United States ports, having an aggregate number of 323 crew and 7 passengers in transit for United States and Cuban ports; 4 certificates of immunity and 1 of protection from smallpox were granted to passengers bound to the United States and Porto Rico by way of Habana and Santiago de Cuba. One vessel, the American schooner *John Francis*, destined to Tampa, was fumigated. No transactions for the Canal Zone nor for the Republic of Panama.

Four cases and 3 deaths from yellow fever were reported during the month within this Province, as follows: One case reported at Cuevitas, November 7; 3 cases, ending in death, at Union de Reyes, reported November 29 and 30.

The cleaning and sanitation of courtyards and dwellings has been discontinued. The brigade in charge of this work has been detailed for oiling and for the disinfection of houses.

The 3 new cases of yellow fever, ending in death, at Union de Reyes, this Province, reported on November 29 and 30 belonged to one family of Spanish immigrants, composed of father, mother, and daughter, who recently arrived at Union de Reyes from their native country thru Habana. Early in November the daughter, a young girl, was taken sick. About fourteen days afterwards the father and mother developed the disease. The mother died November 28; the nature of the disease was ascertained by a necropsic examination. The father was transferred to a mosquito-proof room at the city hall of the town, where he died twenty-four hours later.

While the last 2 cases were under treatment at Union de Reyes, and before the character of the disease had been determined, a detachment of United States troops, while making a round of the country, encamped one night in the outskirts of the town, and is now held under close observation at the post in this city.

A sanitary squad has been ordered to Union de Reyes to carry out the usual precautionary measures recommended in such cases to prevent the spread of the disease.

Sanitary measures were not taken during the infective stage of these 3 cases.

Report from Santiago—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Case of malarial fever on steamship Alf.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, November 28, as follows: Week ended November 24, 1906. Bills of health issued to 5 vessels bound for the United States. One vessel, the *Ida*, was fumigated. A case of malaria on the *Alf* was removed to hospital.

No quarantinable disease has been reported.

INDIA.

Report from Calcutta—Transactions of service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, November 8, as follows: Week ended November 3, 1906. Bills of health issued to the steamship *Marienfels*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total

crew of 63. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards placed on wharf lines, and Lascars' effects disinfected.

Week ended October 27, 1906, 28 deaths from cholera, 10 from plague, and 3 from smallpox in Calcutta.

In Bengal, week ended October 27, 1906, 61 cases and 48 deaths from plague.

MEXICO.

Beriberi and trachoma.

The following is received from Consul-General Gottschalk, at the city of Mexico, under date of November 16:

Beriberi and trachoma have of late been found to be present in Mexico.

The port of Salina Cruz, the Pacific terminal of the Tehuantepec Railroad, which railroad is in direct communication with the greater part of the Republic, receives from 500 to 1,000 Asiatic coolies monthly. Altho quarantine precautions are taken at Salina Cruz with this class of immigrants, there is always some danger of their carrying the disease inland to the plantations. During the past two years 150 cases of beriberi have been treated at Salina Cruz by the medical officers of the port.

Trachoma has been found present among children in one of the schools of the Republic. The disease is believed to have been imported into the Republic by immigrants.

Report from Veracruz—One case of yellow fever.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Frick reports, November 28, as follows: November 26. A case of yellow fever was officially reported.

AUSTRALIA—*Newcastle*.—Month of September, 1906. Estimated population, 51,200. Total number of deaths, 34. No death from contagious diseases reported.

CUBA.—Month of October, 1906. Reports from the 6 provinces, having an aggregate population of 1,572,797, show as follows: Deaths from contagious diseases: Diphtheria 13, enteric fever 9, malarial fever 23, measles 2, scarlet fever 4, yellow fever 6, whooping cough 2, and 69 from tuberculosis.

Habana.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 275,000. Total number of deaths reported, 494, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 5, leprosy 2, yellow fever 3, and 100 from tuberculosis.

DUTCH GUIANA—*Paramaribo*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 33,535. Total number of deaths, 86. No contagious diseases reported. Malarial fever prevalent.

FRANCE—*St. Etienne*.—Two weeks ended October 31, 1906. Estimated population, 146,836. Total number of deaths, 162, including enteric fever 4, diphtheria 1, and 18 from tuberculosis.

GIBRALTAR.—Two weeks ended November 18, 1906. Estimated population, 27,385. Total number of deaths, 15. No deaths from contagious diseases.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended November 17, 1906, correspond to an annual rate of 15.4 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 15,818,360.

London.—One thousand three hundred and ninety-one deaths were registered during the week, including measles 10, scarlet fever 5, diphtheria 16, enteric fever 8, whooping cough 10, and 29 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.4 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,866 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 10 from diphtheria, 1 from measles, and 1 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended November 17, 1906, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,101,499. The lowest rate was recorded in Galway and Waterford, viz, 7.8, and the highest in Cork, viz, 26 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 191 deaths were registered, including measles 9, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 24 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended November 17, 1906, correspond to an annual rate of 17 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,787,788. The lowest rate of mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 15.2, and the highest in Perth, viz, 27.2 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 582, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 4, measles 10, and 13 from whooping cough.

JAMAICA—*Port Antonio.*—Two weeks ended November 24, 1906. No deaths reported. The health of the port is good.

MALTA.—Week ended October 27, 1906. Estimated population, 205,059. Total number of deaths 79, including diphtheria 2.
