STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—YEARLY AND MONTHLY.

CONNECTICUT—*Hartford*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 95,000. Total number of deaths, 128, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 3, whooping cough 1, and 10 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 29, enteric fever 14, measles 1, scarlet fever 7, and tuberculosis 8.

FLORIDA.—Reports from the State board of health for the week ended December 8, 1906, show cases of contagious and infectious diseases as follows: Diphtheria—Dade County, *Miami*, 1 case; Duval County, *Jacksonville*, 1 case; Hillsboro County, *Tampa*, 2 cases. Enteric fever—Dade County, *Miami*, 1 case; Duval County, *Jacksonville*, 1 case; Hillsboro County, *Plant City* and *Tampa*, 2 cases. Malaria—Hillsboro County, *Tampa*, 1 case. Tuberculosis—Duval County, *Jacksonville*, 1 case; Hillsboro County, *Tampa*, 3 cases; Manatee County, *Braidentown*, 1 case.

GEORGIA—*Columbus*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 20,764: White, 12,244; colored, 8,520. Total number of deaths, 34: White, 13; colored, 21, including enteric fever, 1, and 2 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Lawrence*.—Month of August, 1906. Estimated population, 74,000. Total number of deaths, 144, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 2, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 11, enteric fever 11, measles 1.

Month of September, 1906. Total number of deaths, 130, including diphtheria, 1; whooping cough, 2, and 15 from tuberculosis. Cases

of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 12, enteric fever 10, measles 2, scarlet fever 7, smallpox 1.

Month of October, 1906. Total number of deaths, 111, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 4, and 13 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 23, enteric fever 12, measles 3, scarlet fever 6.

MINNESOTA—*Winona*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 21, including diphtheria 1, and 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Concord*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 34, including diphtheria 1, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 6, tuberculosis 2.

NEW YORK—*Buffalo*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 400,000. Total number of deaths, 486, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 8, measles 6, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 41 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 70, enteric fever 33, measles 406, scarlet fever 75, whooping cough 27, and tuberculosis 62.

Saratoga Springs.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 11,822. Total number of deaths, 20, including whooping cough 2, and 3 from tuberculosis.

OHIO—*Toledo*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 171,656. Total number of deaths, 182, including diphtheria 12, enteric fever 3, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 3, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 102, enteric fever 99, measles 3, and scarlet fever 18.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Dunmore*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 17,500. Total number of deaths, 29, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 1, and scarlet fever 4.

UTAH—*Salt Lake City*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 75,000. Total number of deaths, 90, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 2, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 20, enteric fever 23, measles 2, scarlet fever 4, smallpox 1, and 2 from tuberculosis.

WEST VIRGINIA—*Wheeling*.—Month of November, 1906. Estimated population, 42,000. Total number of deaths, 62, including enteric fever, 5, scarlet fever, 2, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria, 22, and scarlet fever, 28.

WISCONSIN—*Milwaukee*.—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 345,000. Total number of deaths, 350, including diphtheria 9, enteric fever 8, whooping cough 3, and 37 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 84, enteric fever 75, measles 1, scarlet fever 18, smallpox 14, and tuberculosis 61.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

AUSTRALIA.

Plague at Sydney—Examination of rodents for plague infection.

The following information is taken from plague bulletins issued by the department of public health, New South Wales, and forwarded by Consul-General Bray, at Melbourne:

Sydney.—Week ended October 6, 1906, 1 plague case reported. Total cases reported since March 12, 1906, 19, of which 16 were bubonic and 3 pneumonic plague. During the week ended October 6 1,457 rodents were destroyed; 343 examined; found infected, 2.

Week ended October 13, 1906: Rodents destroyed, 1,757; examined, 457; found infected, 1.

BRAZIL.

Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Plague and small-pox—Mortality in Pernambuco and the Federal District of Rio de Janeiro.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, November 14, as follows:

Week ended November 10, 1906. Vessels inspected and received bills of health as follows: On the 5th instant the British steamship *Irisbrook*, for Baltimore, with water ballast, no cargo, no passengers, and with 6 new members of the crew taken on while in this port; on the same date the Portuguese bark *Seares Costa*, for New Orleans, in stone ballast, no cargo, no passengers, and with 2 new members of the crew taken on while in this port; on the 7th instant the British steamship *Tennyson*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee; on the same date the British Bark *Winnipeg*, for Pensacola, in stone ballast, no passengers, and with 5 new members of the crew taken on at this port; on the same date the British steamship *Drumlaurig*, for Baltimore, with no cargo, in water ballast, no passengers, and with 1 new member of the crew taken on while in this port, and on the 10th instant the British steamship *Milton*, for New Orleans, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and with no change in the personnel of the crew while in this port. No other vessels left this port during the week requiring inspection.

Mortality in Pernambuco, Brazil.

A report just received from Pernambuco for the two weeks ended October 15, 1906, shows 246 deaths, including 1 from plague and 15 from variola.

Mortality in the Federal District of Rio de Janeiro.

Week ended November 11, 1906: Estimated population, 912,000; census of September 20, 1906, 811,265. Total deaths, 277. There were 34 new cases of bubonic plague, with twelve deaths, giving a total for the past two weeks of 50 cases, with 19 deaths; 3 new cases of variola, no deaths.

CHINA.

Reports from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Sanitary conditions.

Temporary Acting Assistant Surgeon Mills reports October 30 and November 7, as follows:

Week ended October 27, 1906. Four supplemental bills of health issued to 4 steamships, the crews of which number 617; living quarters inspected. Four emigrants were inspected and past. Sixteen thousand five hundred and sixteen pieces of freight were viséed.

The only reports from outports are from Tientsin which state that no contagious diseases were present during the week ended October 20, 1906.

Week ended November 3, 1906. Two supplemental bills of health issued to 2 steamships, and 1 original bill of health issued to a sailing vessel. Total crews numbering 348, and living quarters inspected and past. Four thousand eight hundred and thirty pieces of freight were viséed. The sanitary condition of the port was marked "Good" on the bills of health issued November 2, 1906, and thereafter, and also the date of the last case of cholera occurring at this station, which was reported October 14, 1906.

The only outport heard from is Tientsin, which reports no contagious diseases.

CUBA.

Reports from Cienfuegos—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Sanitary conditions—History of yellow-fever case previously reported.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Marsillan reports, December 7 and 10, as follows:

Week ended December 8, 1906. Vessels inspected and bills of health issued, 4; crews inspected, 114; no immune certificate issued; no passengers. Three of the four vessels inspected were fumigated, viz: Steamship *Ernesto*, for Mobile; schooner *Teresa*, for Pensacola, and steamship *Nassovia*, for Galveston. Only the living quarters on the last-named vessel were fumigated. All temperatures of crews found normal.

The general sanitary condition of the city and surrounding country remains as bad as previously reported.

No appreciable diminution in mosquitoes is noticed.

The only case of quarantinable disease is that of leprosy, already reported.

The history of the yellow-fever case reported December 6 is as follows: On December 5, at Cruces, a case of yellow fever was confirmed in an Italian peddler who plied his vocation among the plantations of that vicinity. Some days before he was attacked the man visited "San Francisco" plantation, where a focus of the disease was known to exist. He returned at night to a hotel in Cruces, where he occupied a room separated only by a thin wooden wall from another room where a young woman who was infected on November 9 last had just died. The case is well isolated in a screened isolation room and appears to be of moderate intensity.

Report from Habana—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Malarial fever at Marti—Sanitary work at Habana and interior towns—Yellow fever.

There were 2 cases of yellow fever reported in Habana during this week—1 on December 3 and 1 on December 4.

One case of yellow fever was reported at Cruces.

The yellow-fever case reported from Jovellanos was in a man who had arrived from Tana, a small place near Marti, on the railroad from Camaguey to Santiago. The patient died December 7 and necropsy proved the case to be malarial fever. The brother of this man was also taken sick with fever which proved to be malarial. It was also learned that the first man had suffered several attacks of malarial fever during the three months prior to his last illness. (See Public Health Reports, December 7, 1906, p. 1463, and December 14, p. 1489.)

An inspection was made of the district around Marti by a representative of the superior board of health and it was found that numerous other malarial-fever cases had occurred there recently.

Sanitary measures directed especially toward the eradication of yellow-fever infection are being conducted under the direction of the superior board of health at Santa Clara, Parque Alta, which is a plantation near Rodas, Cruces, Union de Reyes, and Isabela de Sagua, besides Habana.

I was informed that the work now being conducted in Habana will be continued thruout the winter.

December 12. One new case yellow fever from sugar plantation Toledo at Marianao reported to-day.

Report from Mantanzas—Inspection of vessel.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, December 10, as follows:

Week ended December 8, 1906. One bill of health issued to a vessel leaving for Mobile via Habana. No new cases of yellow fever have been reported in this province since November 30.

Report from Santiago—Inspection of vessels—Summary for month of November, 1906.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, December 5, as follows:

Week ended December 1, 1906. Bills of health issued to 7 vessels bound for the United States. No vessel was fumigated. No quarantinable disease has been reported.

During the first fifteen days of November there were 4 deaths from yellow fever and 17 from smallpox in Guayaquil. There are 10 cases of yellow fever in the lazaretto at present.

During the month of October, 1906, 14 persons were vaccinated by this office.

INDIA.

Report from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, November 15, as follows:

Week ended November 10, 1906. Bill of health issued to the steamship *Kybfels*, bound for Philadelphia and New York, with a total crew of 57, and to the steamship *Schönfels*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 63. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards on wharf lines, and Lascars' effects disinfected.

The steamship *Kybfels* cleared November 3.

Week ended November 3, 1906. Thirty-eight deaths from cholera, 7 deaths from plague, and 1 death from smallpox in Calcutta.

Week ended November 3, 1906. Eighty-three cases and 56 deaths from plague in Bengal.

PERU.

Report from Callao—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Plague in Peru.

Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, November 17, as follows:

Week ended November 17, 1906. The British steamship *Chile* was dispatched on the 13th for Ancon, Canal Zone, with general cargo and a total personnel of 183, of whom 16 new members of crew, 32 cabin, and 43 steerage passengers were from this port. The vessel was fumigated, steerage baggage was inspected and passed or disinfected, and steerage passengers for Panama were vaccinated unless they showed evidence of immunity to smallpox.

Advices from the director de salubridad, just received, report plague as follows: In Trujillo, a case on the 6th instant; in Catacaos (near Piura, inland from Paita), a case on the 3d instant; in Mollendo, a case on the 3d instant. One house in Lima was disinfected on October 22, and another on the 15th instant, dead rodents having been found in it, and one was disinfected on the 7th instant for smallpox.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Reports from Manila—Cholera in Manila and the provinces—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Quarantine against Amoy removed—Outgoing quarantine of vessels leaving for interisland ports discontinued.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, October 31, November 9, 16, and 19, as follows:

During the week vessels cleared for United States ports as follows:

On October 15 the American steamship *Shawmut*, with 144 crew and 51 passengers, was granted a consular bill of health for Tacoma via Hongkong and Japan ports. All persons on board were inspected at the hour of sailing. Cargo and baggage certified.

On October 18 the American steamship *Dakota*, with 289 crew and 161 passengers, en route from Hongkong to Seattle, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection of personnel and cargo.

On October 19 the American barkentine *Louisiana*, with 15 crew, was granted a consular bill of health for Port Townsend. Crew were bathed and their dunnage disinfected at Mariveles.

On October 20 the British steamship *Chingtu*, with 70 crew and 36 passengers, en route from Yokohama to Zamboanga, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection.

Cholera has practically disappeared from the island of Luzon, which includes Manila. In all of Luzon, for the week covered by this report, only 22 cases and 20 deaths were reported; 5 of these occurred in the city of Manila.

The outlook in the province of Iloilo is grave, principally on account of the attitude which the people of that province take toward the outbreak. In spite of the fact that 630 cases with 446 deaths were reported for the week ended October 27, they refuse to believe that true cholera is present, and they are entirely indifferent to the recommendations of the health authorities. The disease has so far been confined entirely to the province of Iloilo, thus showing that the outgoing quarantine imposed upon vessels has been effective.

During the early part of November the sugar crop, upon which practically all the revenues of Iloilo and nearby provinces depend, must be moved, and it is thought that the present quarantine requirements on vessels will have to be considerably modified, even at the risk of permitting the further spread of cholera.

Upon the recommendation of the governor-general, based upon a request of the provincial board of the province of Iloilo, the quarantine between ports in Iloilo Province was lifted October 19.

Upon the receipt of official information from the American consul at Amoy that no plague had been reported for more than twenty days, the circular letter, copy of which is inclosed, was issued by this office.

Vessels cleared for United States ports, as follows:

On October 24, the British steamship *South America*, with 37 crew, en route from Kobé to New York, was granted a supplemental bill of health. All persons on board inspected prior to sailing.

On October 26, the British steamship *Oanfa*, with 86 crew, en route to Liverpool via Cebu, was granted a consular bill of health.

The following letter was address to the consul at Amoy in response to an inquiry in regard to the withdrawal of quarantine at ports in the Philippine Islands against Amoy. A circular of instructions revoking quarantine of vessels from Amoy was sent to the quarantine officers at island ports.

The UNITED STATES CONSUL, Amoy, China.

SIR: Referring to your cablegram of September 21, 1906, "No plague ten days; when do you intend to withdraw quarantine? Advise by telegraph;" and the reply from this office of September 21, 1906, "Twenty days after last case," and your telegram of October 8, 1906, "No plague three weeks," I have the honor to recommend that you inform the shipping interests at your port that no quarantine will be imposed at Philippine ports on vessels from Amoy as long as the favorable conditions reported by you with regard to quarantinable diseases at Amoy continue to obtain. The usual disinfection which has been done for the past few years, however, will be continued as heretofore. Therefore vessels clearing from your port to the Philippines should be directed to call at the Mariveles (Manila), Iloilo, or Cebu quarantine stations for such disinfection as may be necessary before attempting to enter any Philippine ports.

Owing to the improvement in the cholera situation in Manila and vicinity, hereafter no outgoing quarantine detention will be imposed upon vessels leaving Manila for other Philippine ports, provided the master of each vessel will agree to proceed to the nearest quarantine station in the event that any suspicious illness should make its appearance aboard his vessel.

All vessels leaving Manila will be required to obtain a bill of health, as heretofore.

Cholera in Manila and the entire island of Luzon occurs now only in a sporadic form, and it does not seem to have any tendency to spread. For the week ended November 17, 1906, there were only 21 cases and 18 deaths, which occurred in almost as many widely separated places.

In the province of Iloilo there has also been some improvement as far as the number of cases is concerned, but owing to the failure of the provincial officials to cooperate in carrying out the sanitary measures the disease has spread to the province of Capiz, and cases of illness, suspicious of cholera, have also been reported from Catubig, Samar. Talisay, in Occidental Negros, became infected thru a person who came from Baratoc, but thru the very energetic measures used by the health officials of Negros the disease was finally stamped

out after 3 cases had occurred. The port of Iloilo having been free of cholera for a period of two weeks, upon the recommendation of Asst. Surg. R. H. Creel the outgoing quarantine was lifted November 5, 1906. In this connection it is satisfactory to report that since the outbreak of cholera in August, 1905, the disease has not spread from the ports at which the Service was in charge in any single instance.

The experience with cholera in the islands since American occupation indicates that even tho measures which are directed against the disease are not always entirely effective in eradicating it completely, yet if its progress can be retarded, and if its spread take place slowly instead of rapidly, much good is accomplished, because the disease loses in virulence.

Vessel granted consular bill of health as follows:

On November 17 the British steamship *Nanshan*, en route from Saigon to Cebu, was granted a supplemental bill of health.

Report from Iloilo—Cholera situation during October, 1906—Cholera case on U. S. C. T. Bolinao—Modification of quarantine.

Assistant Surgeon Creel reports, November 3, thru Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser, as follows:

The cholera situation has very materially improved. There have been no cases in Iloilo for the past 2 weeks and only 2 or 3 cases during that period in distant pueblos of the municipality, a condition that apparently justifies raising of quarantine. The number of cases thruout the province has diminished correspondingly.

During the past month one case of cholera developed on *U. S. C. T. Bolinao* on third day of detention in person of a native carrier. No secondary cases occurred. On October 22 quarantine measures were modified according to instructions from the Manila office by abolishing detention on vessels proceeding to ports of this province. On several occasions evasion of quarantine requirements has been attempted, the offenders in each case being fined by collector of customs.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR STATISTICAL REPORTS OF COUNTRIES AND CITIES—UNTABULATED.

BAHAMAS—Dunmore Town.—Two weeks ended November 30, 1906. Estimated population, 1,232. One death. No contagious diseases.

Governors Harbor.—Week ended December 1, 1906. Estimated population, 1,500. No deaths and no contagious diseases reported.

Inagua.—Four weeks ended September 30, 1906. Estimated population, 1,800. No deaths and no contagious diseases.

Nassau.—Two weeks ended December 1, 1906. Estimated population, 12,656. No deaths and no contagious diseases reported.

BRAZIL—Pernambuco.—Two weeks ended October 31, 1906. Estimated population, 210,000. Total number of deaths, 258, including enteric fever 1, smallpox 15, whooping cough 1, plague 4, and 52 from tuberculosis.

FRANCE—*St. Etienne.*—Two weeks ended November 15, 1906. Estimated population, 146,836. Total number of deaths, 115, including enteric fever 5 and 11 from tuberculosis.

GERMANY—*Weimar.*—Month of October, 1906. Estimated population, 31,127. Total number of deaths, 38, including diphtheria 3 and 2 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended November 24, 1906, correspond to an annual rate of 16.3 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 15,818,360.

Bradford.—Two weeks ended November 17, 1906. Estimated population, 288,544. Total number of deaths 163, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, measles 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 3, and 18 from phthisis pulmonalis.

London.—One thousand four hundred and fifty-three deaths were registered during the week, including measles 26, scarlet fever 8, diphtheria 14, whooping cough 5, enteric fever 3, and 24 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,003 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 7 from diphtheria, 2 from scarlet fever, 1 from whooping cough, and 5 from diarrhea.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended November 17, 1906, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,101,499. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 4, and the highest in Kilkenny, viz, 68.8 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 182 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, measles 9, whooping cough 2, and 34 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended November 24, 1906, correspond to an annual rate of 19.1 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,787,788. The lowest rate of mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 11.8, and the highest in Edinburgh, viz, 21 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 653, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 3, measles 13, scarlet fever 4, and 13 from whooping cough.

Nagasaki.—Ten days ended November 10, 1906. Estimated population 163,324. Total number of deaths not reported. Two deaths from enteric fever reported.

JAVA—*Batavia*.—Three weeks ended November 3, 1906. Estimated population, 160,000. Total number of deaths not reported. No contagious diseases reported.

SIBERIA—*Vladivostok*.—Period from September 28 to October 14, 1906. Estimated population, 64,500. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from enteric fever reported.

SPAIN—*Barcelona*.—Ten days ended November 20, 1906. Estimated population, 600,000. Total number of deaths 352, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 21, smallpox 2, and 37 from tuberculosis.

URUGUAY—*Montevideo*.—Month of September, 1906. Estimated population, 307,136. Total number of deaths 433, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 3, measles 19, whooping cough 1, and 64 from tuberculosis.
