UNITED STATES.

Further studies upon tetanus antitoxin—Necessity for an American standard unit of measurement.

Passed Assistant Surg. M. J. Rosenau, director of the hygienic laboratory, under date of April 11, 1907, submitted the following statement showing the necessity of an American standard unit:

The studies upon tetanus antitoxin have progressed satisfactorily. The necessity for establishing an American unit to provide uniformity for this important prophylactic is evident from the following statement:

Report from Vanceboro, Me.—Smallpox on Canadian border—Train inspection.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Young reports, May 6:

Week ended May 4, 1907: Inspected 18 trains carrying about 900 passengers; vaccinated, 28; accepted certificates of vaccination and nonexposure to infection in the case of 40.

It is officially stated that the last cases of smallpox in Nova Scotia will be released from quarantine in a few days.

Report from Portland, Oreg.—Cerebro-spinal meningitis.

Surgeon Magruder reports, May 3:

The total number of cases of cerebro-spinal meningitis occurring in this city to May 1 is 20, of which 14 have been fatal. In only one case has a specimen been obtained by ante-mortem lumbar puncture, and in this the diplococcus was found.

Report from Philadelphia, Pa.—Cerebro-spinal meningitis.

Surgeon Gassaway reports, May 6 and 11:

Cerebro-spinal meningitis has been reported in this city during the past sixty days. During the month of April 125 cases, with 43 deaths, were reported. During the week ended May 3, 14 deaths were reported.

Week ended May 10, 1907. Twenty-three cerebrospinal fever cases, 10 deaths.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES
OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA—*Oakland*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 165, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 23 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 12, enteric fever 4, measles 7, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 7.

COLORADO.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 615,570. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 55 cases, 7 deaths; enteric fever, 66 cases, 15 deaths; scarlet fever, 225 cases, 17 deaths; smallpox, 103 cases, no deaths. Total number of deaths from all causes, 1,006.

Month of February, 1907. Diphtheria, 32 cases, 8 deaths; enteric fever, 57 cases, 12 deaths; scarlet fever, 159 cases, 19 deaths; smallpox, 104 cases, no deaths. Total number of deaths from all causes, 860.

Month of March, 1907. Diphtheria, 43 cases, 10 deaths; enteric fever, 58 cases, 11 deaths; scarlet fever, 376 cases, 28 deaths; smallpox, 144 cases, 2 deaths. Total number of deaths from all causes, 875.

FLORIDA—*Pensacola*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 22,256. Total number of deaths, 41, including whooping cough 3 and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases not reported.

ILLINOIS—*Alton*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 16,700. Total number of deaths, 18, including 6 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Tuberculosis 6.

INDIANA.—Month of March, 1907. Estimated population, 2,648,549. Total number of deaths, 3,502, corresponding to an annual death rate of 15.3 per 1,000 of population, including 38 from diphtheria, 40 from enteric fever, 15 from measles, 18 from scarlet fever, 10 from whooping cough, and 431 from tuberculosis.

Morbidity: Diphtheria, 143 cases in 33 counties; enteric fever, 304 cases in 33 counties; smallpox, 221 cases in 20 counties. In the same month last year 124 cases of smallpox were reported from 16 counties, with no deaths.

IOWA—*Keokuk*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 16,000. Total number of deaths, 35, including 7 from tuberculosis. One case each of scarlet fever and smallpox reported.

KANSAS.—Month of March, 1907. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 106 cases, 13 deaths; enteric fever, 28 cases, 9 deaths; measles, 1,356 cases, 8 deaths; scarlet fever, 81 cases, 3 deaths; smallpox, 273 cases, 3 deaths; tuberculosis, 76 cases, 52 deaths.

Contagious diseases were distributed in the cities as follows:

Coffeyville.—Diphtheria, 1 case; smallpox, 27 cases.

Kansas City.—Diphtheria, 5 cases; enteric fever, 3 cases, 3 deaths; measles, 223 cases, 2 deaths; smallpox, 1 case; tuberculosis, 11 cases, 11 deaths.

Leavenworth.—Diphtheria, 4 cases; enteric fever, 3 cases, 1 death; scarlet fever, 1 case; measles, 70 cases; smallpox, 1 case; tuberculosis, 1 case, 1 death.

Parsons.—Measles, 5 cases; tuberculosis, 5 cases, 2 deaths.

Topeka.—Diphtheria, 9 cases, 1 death; enteric fever, 1 case; measles, 229 cases, 2 deaths; smallpox, 12 cases; scarlet fever, 2 cases; tuberculosis, 3 cases, 3 deaths.

Wichita.—Measles, 5 cases; scarlet fever, 6 cases; smallpox, 63 cases.

KENTUCKY—*Henderson*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 15,000. Total number of deaths, 28, including 4 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 13, measles 4, and tuberculosis 4.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Springfield*.—Year ended December 31, 1906. Estimated population, 76,255. Total number of deaths, 1,136, corresponding to annual rate of 14.9 per 1,000 population, includes 23 from diphtheria, 17 from enteric fever, 4 from measles, 4 from scarlet fever, 21 from whooping cough, and 116 from tuberculosis. Cases reported: Diphtheria 284, enteric fever 111, measles 102, scarlet fever 270, tuberculosis 60.

NEW JERSEY.—Reports to the State board of health for the month ending April 15, 1907, show a total of 3,653 deaths, including diphtheria 67, enteric fever 33, measles 21, scarlet fever 34, whooping cough 18, and 452 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases not reported. The number of deaths reported shows an increase of 512 over the number for the previous month.

Morristown.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 12,500. Total number of deaths, 18. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Scarlet fever 2.

West Hoboken.—Four weeks ended May 4, 1907. Estimated population, 35,000. No deaths reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 10, enteric fever 2, measles 39, scarlet fever 32, and whooping cough 4.

NEW YORK.—Month of March, 1907. Estimated population, 8,340,600. Reports to the State department of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 13,765, corresponding to an annual death rate of 19.8 per 1,000 of the population, includes enteric fever 8, measles 72, scarlet fever 114, whooping cough 85, diphtheria 255, and 1,455 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1,823, enteric fever 557, measles 3,406, scarlet fever 2,265, smallpox 31, and tuberculosis 2,400.

Buffalo.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 400,000. Total number of deaths, 535, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 2, measles 8, whooping cough 7, and 52 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 34, enteric fever 13, measles 349, scarlet fever 49, whooping cough 69, and tuberculosis 36.

Rochester.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 182,000. Total number of deaths, 291, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 7, measles 1, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 27 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 86, enteric fever 16, and scarlet fever 92.

Rome.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 18,000. Total number of deaths, 36, including 3 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, measles 9, and scarlet fever 12.

PENNSYLVANIA—Erie.—Year ended December 31, 1906. Estimated population, 62,000. Total number of deaths, 865, including diphtheria 11, enteric fever 29, measles 1, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 1, and 81 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 79, enteric fever 146, measles 5, scarlet fever 83, smallpox 1, whooping cough 6, and tuberculosis 76.

South Bethlehem.—Three weeks ended May 7, 1907. Estimated population, 18,000. Total number of deaths, 23, including diphtheria 1 and 3 from tuberculosis.

SOUTH DAKOTA.—Year ended June 30, 1906. Estimated population, 436,000. Total number of deaths, 3,644, including diphtheria 50, enteric fever 75, measles 11, scarlet fever 15, whooping cough 26, and 270 from tuberculosis. The total number of deaths from all causes corresponds to an annual death rate of 8.3 per 1,000 of the population.

UTAH.—Month of March, 1907. Reports to the State board of health from 27 counties, having an estimated population of 315,966, show as follows: Total number of deaths 360, including diphtheria 9,

enteric fever 3, scarlet fever 3, whooping cough 4, and 12 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 60, enteric fever 21, measles 44, scarlet fever 42, smallpox 12, whooping cough 131, and tuberculosis 19 (incomplete).

Ogden.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 22. One death from diphtheria reported. Cases of contagious disease reported: Diphtheria 10.

Salt Lake City.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 75,000. Total deaths from all causes, 80, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 2, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 47, smallpox 1, measles 6, scarlet fever 7, and whooping cough 1.

VIRGINIA.—Reports to the State board of health for the month of January, 1907, show as follows:

Fredericksburg.—Population, 5,500—white, 3,600; colored, 1,900. Total number of deaths, 7—white, 6; colored, 1—including 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Lynchburg.—Population, 30,000. Total number of deaths 42, including diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 2, and 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Manchester.—Population, 10,678—white, 7,076; colored, 3,602. Total number of deaths, 16—white, 12; colored, 4—including diphtheria 1, and 2 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Newport News.—Population, 26,000—white, 16,000; colored, 10,000. Total number of deaths, 26—white, 10; colored, 16—including enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 2 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Norfolk.—Population, 66,931—white, 37,779; colored, 29,152. Total number of deaths, 118—white, 61; colored, 57—including scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 14 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Petersburg.—Population, 27,000—white, 14,000; colored, 13,000. Total number of deaths, 50—white, 17; colored, 33—including diphtheria 1 and 7 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Elizabeth City County, including Hampton and Phoebus.—Estimated population, 17,775—white, 8,925; colored, 8,850. Total number of deaths, 31—white, 10; colored, 21—including diphtheria 1, whooping cough 2, and 1 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MORBIDITY.—Reports from 100 counties show contagious diseases as follows: Diphtheria present in 28 counties, enteric fever in 40, measles in 36, scarlet fever in 14, whooping cough in 44, smallpox in 16, and tuberculosis in 73.

WASHINGTON—*Bellingham.*—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 29,000. Total number of deaths, 30, including enteric fever 1, measles 1, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 2, measles 223, scarlet fever 4, and tuberculosis 2.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

BRAZIL.

Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Plague, small-pox, and yellow fever—Sanitary work at Nictheroy.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, April 12 and 15:

Week ended April 6, 1907. Vessels inspected and received bills of health: On the 3d instant, the British steamship *Castilian Prince*, for New Orleans via Victoria, Brazil, and Barbados, W. I., for coal and disinfection, with no passengers, a cargo of coffee, and no change in the crew personnel while in this port; on the 4th instant, the Brazilian steamship *Sergipe*, for New York, with a full new crew signed on here, cargo of coffee, 12 first cabin and 24 steerage passengers for New York and intermediate ports; on the same date, the British steamship *Byron*, for New York, with no change in the crew while in port, a cargo of coffee, 16 first cabin and 35 steerage passengers from this port. No other vessels left for United States ports during the period under report.

Mortality, Rio de Janeiro.—Week ended April 7, 1907. Total population, estimated, 912,900; census of 1906, 811,265. Total deaths, 222. Yellow fever, 5 new cases reported and 4 deaths; plague, 2 new cases reported, 1 death; variola, 2 new cases reported and 1 death. At the close of the week the report for the Hospital São Sebastião showed that there were 7 cases of variola, 2 cases of plague, no cases of yellow fever, and 19 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

Week ended April 14, 1907. Vessels to which bills of health were issued: On the 8th instant, the American barkentine *Josephine*, for Baltimore, with no cargo, in stone ballast, no change in her personnel, and no passengers, and on the 13th instant, the British steamship *Milton*, for New Orleans, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in her crew personnel. No other vessels left this port for United States ports during the week.

Federal intervention in sanitary work in Nictheroy.—A slight outbreak of yellow fever and a similar recrudescence of bubonic plague have occurred at Nictheroy. This city lies across the bay from Rio de Janeiro, at a distance of about 4 miles, and is connected with Rio de Janeiro by numerous small boats and launches, as well as by a regular ferry service. It is also indirectly connected by rail. It is estimated that about 20,000 persons are in daily communication between the two cities.

The sanitary work in Nictheroy has been placed under Federal supervision by request.

Mortality, Rio de Janeiro.—Week ended April 14, 1907. Total deaths, 238. Yellow fever caused 6 new cases with 5 deaths; 2 new cases were reported of plague, with no deaths; 1 new case was reported of variola; no deaths.

At the close of the week there were in the hospital São Sebastião, 2 cases of yellow fever under treatment, 7 cases of variola, 3 cases of plague, and 13 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

BRITISH HONDURAS.

Report from Belize, fruit port.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Robertson reports as follows: Week ended May 2, 1907. Present officially estimated population, 8,500; general sanitary condition of this port and the surrounding country during the week, good.

Report from Hongkong—Quarantine restrictions—Plague and small-pox.

Passed Assistant Surgeon White reports:

Week ended March 30, 1907. Restrictions enforced by Hongkong remain as reported December 1, 1906. Restrictions enforced against Hongkong remain as reported on March 2, 1907. Quarantinable diseases: Plague, 2 cases, 2 deaths; smallpox, 20 cases, 16 deaths.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship *China*, sailing April 9, 1907; For San Francisco, 12; in transit, 3. Of these rejections, all but 1 were for trachoma.

Report from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, April 10:

U. S. PUBLIC HEALTH AND MARINE-HOSPITAL SERVICE,
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF QUARANTINE OFFICER,
Honolulu, Hawaii, April 17, 1907.

SIR: I have to state that in order to avoid delay at mainland quarantine stations it will be necessary for this office to certify that the following conditions have been complied with by your vessels clearing from this port for any port in the United States:

Restrictions for steam vessels.

1. Vessels must lie at least six (6) feet from dock. All ropes leading to the wharf must be guarded by rat funnels. Funnels must be at least three (3) feet in diameter and must be kept stiffened, so that all points of the rim shall be at all times equally distant from the rope encircled. Funnels must be at least six (6) feet from all points on the wharf from ropes, etc., and each rope leading through a funnel must be tarred for at least two (2) feet immediately to the landward side of the same.
2. From sunset to sunrise the gang plank must be lifted to a height of at least six (6) feet from the wharf.
3. This office must be notified of the intended shipment of all personal or household effects, junk, hair, wool, hides, feathers, and food products.
4. All persons embarking at this port will be inspected immediately prior to sailing.
5. An alphabetical typewritten list of cabin and steerage must be furnished the officer in charge of outgoing quarantine at least two (2) hours before sailing hour.
6. As soon as sailing hour has been set same officer must be notified in writing.
7. Steerage passengers and new crew must report at U. S. quarantine wharf at 9.00 a. m. the day before the steamer sails, bringing all baggage with them; permits to travel will then be issued to them. All steerage passengers will be inspected at the gangway as they embark and no baggage, parcels, packages, fruit, or provisions shall be carried on board by them.
8. None but cabin passengers will be allowed ashore.
9. All passengers must make their adieux on the wharf; only those intending to sail will be allowed to go on the ship.

Restrictions for sailing vessels.

1. All vessels will be fumigated unless they remain in the stream or alongside railroad wharf No. 2 during their stay in port. Local steamers, barges, or other vessels must not lie alongside these vessel at night.
2. Masters or accredited agents must arrange for the disinfection of their vessels. This must be done just prior to taking cargo. The day before sailing all sailors and all dunnage, bedding, etc., from forecabin must be sent to the U. S. quarantine wharf. After disinfection this dunnage will be held till the next day just prior to the vessel's sailing, when it may be called for at quarantine wharf. Vessels, crew, and passengers will be inspected just prior to sailing.
3. The officer in charge of outgoing quarantine must be notified in writing of the sailing hour of all vessels.

Health conditions and sanitary measures.

The health conditions of this port and adjacent towns and villages are good. The local authorities continue active in their sanitary work and there has been a notable improvement in this direction. The local physicians are required, by municipal enactment, to report, daily, the names and addresses of all febrile cases to the mayor, who in turn reports the same to me with authority to visit the sick. A recent enactment requires that all deaths be reported to the consulate and that I be permitted to see the dead.

The sanitary work has been retarded by the recent hostilities, but all tanks have been properly screened, most of the water barrels have been destroyed or screened, and all water-closets are oiled once per week. The mayor has named an inspector to see that inspection is made thoroughly weekly and that all necessary repairs are made.

Sanitary measures have not been instituted in the adjacent coast towns nor in Utila and Ruatan.

The agents of the several fruit lines have pledged themselves not to permit people to board their vessels while loading along the coast.

Seventy-five Nicaraguan soldiers are quartered here and about the same number of Honduran soldiers are also stationed in other parts of the town. I inspect their quarters each week.

Report from Puerto Cortez, fruit port—Inspection of localities on line of railroad—Sanitary conditions good—Stegomyia present.

The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.1 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,062 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 4 from diphtheria, 5 from measles, 8 from whooping cough, and 2 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended April 20, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 23.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 12, and the highest in Clonmel, viz, 51.3, per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 215 deaths were registered, including measles 10, whooping cough 7, and 46 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended April 20, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 20 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The lowest rate of mortality was recorded in Paisley, viz, 10.6, and the highest in Leith, viz, 25.6, per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 695, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 4, measles 17, scarlet fever 1, typhus fever 1, and 54 from whooping cough.
